We hope you enjoy AANC's inaugural annual report. It is a compilation of some of AANC's activities, successes and achievements for the year. Despite COVID's continuing impact on our industry and association, and AANC unable to conduct our annual in person Education & Legislative Conference for the second year in a row, AANC was able to weather the storm and end the year profitable.

AANC's membership continues to increase with AANC currently having 443,236 units, a 5% increase from last year. We currently have 758 suppliers, a 8% decrease from last year.

AANC's success this year is due to your membership and the engagement involvement of our AANC Board Members, committee and task force members and affiliate and AANC staff. The AANC Board served as great stewards of AANC's finances and ensured the continuation of great things to come with the development of a new threeyear strategic plan. On the legislative front, AANC succeeded in passing SB644, one of our key legislative priorities this year. AANC surpassed our annual PAC goal of \$25,000 due to the generosity of our members. AANC continues to participate nationally with the National Apartment Association, with 15 of our members selected to speak at NAA's Apartmentalize and our very own Susan Passmore reelected as Regional Vice President of NAA's Region IV.

AANC revised its mission statement and now reads, "AANC is dedicated to leading and supporting its members' ever-changing needs through regulatory and legislative advocacy, industry education and communication." We achieved that mission in different ways and will continue to do so in the coming years.

### **AANC 2021-2023 Strategic Plan Objectives**

#### **Near Term Objectives (0-18 months)**

- 1. Identify additional sources of revenue for AANC.
- 2. Hire a Public Relations firm to increase visibility and streamline communication.
- 3. Provide regular outreach to smaller affiliates to share ideas, identify challenges and provide solutions and services.
- 4. Establish a Super Political Action Committee (PAC).

#### **Medium-Long Term Objectives (18-36 months)**

- 4. Review and assess AANC governance in terms of Board size, term limits, etc., to ensure board remains fresh, engaged and effective. Review committee/task force structure and policies and procedures.
- 5. Have a "plug & play" toolkit available for affiliates to launch programs easily.
- 6. Advocate for housing affordability.
- 7. Expand and improve AANC's Government Affairs influence.
- 8. Have specific education offerings for IROs, student and affordable housing.
- 9. Communicate value of the State Suppliers Council to affiliates by developing incentives for affiliates to encourage their suppliers to join SSC.
- 10. Grow to 500,000 units by 2023.
- 11. Increase market penetration outside of affiliate territories (example: Boone).

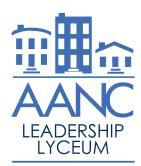

## 2021 LEGISLATIVE RECAP

Five months after releasing the initial version of the state budget and many compromises later, the North Carolina General Assembly and Governor Cooper have agreed to a state budget. The budget passed the House 101-10 and the Senate 41-7 earlier this week. This is the first state budget since 2017 as legislative Republicans have not been able to override Governor Cooper's vetoes of previous budgets. The budget will spend \$25.9 billion in FY2021-22, and \$27 billion in FY2022-23. Coming in at nearly \$1.1 billion more than the current operating budget, the final spending plan is nearly 4.5% larger than the budget enacted in 2017.

The spending plan also issues significant tax relief. The personal income tax rate would be reduced to 3.99% over six years, down from 5.25%. The franchise tax would be reduced, and the corporate income tax rate would be phased to zero by 2030. Additionally, the standard deduction would be raised from \$10,750 to \$12,750, and from \$21,500 to \$25,500 for married couples. The bill will also eliminate state income tax for retired military personnel and will increase the child tax deduction by \$500 per child.

While the budget does not expand Medicaid, it will extend Medicaid eligibility for 12 months postpartum for pregnant women with incomes less than 196% of the federal poverty guidelines. The budget does keep the door open for expansion by creating a joint legislative study committee on health care access and Medicaid expansion.

Realizing the importance of the one-time stimulus from the federal American Rescue Plan and the CARES Act passed by Congress this year and last, this budget appropriates one-time funds to one-time, desperately needed projects. \$5.9 billion will go towards paying down debt and building, repairing, and renovating public school buildings, including in the UNC System and community colleges.

The budget invests heavily in broadband expansion to bring high-speed internet to rural counties. In addition to incoming federal funds from the federal infrastructure bill, the state budget appropriates \$1 billion to broadband infrastructure projects and grants.

The Budget provides \$500,000,000 COVID Relief Money in the form of grants to businesses that suffered economic loss. If the business reaches various eligibility requirements, it is eligible for a grant of equal to the lesser of \$500,000 or 10% or 20% of economic losses. The eligible percentage is determined based on the different paths to eligibility.

While this wraps up most of the General Assembly's work for the 2021 session, there will be a recess for Thanksgiving week and then they will return to finalize a few outstanding items.

## 2021 LEGISLATIVE RECAP



#### **Current Status of AANC Bills of Interest**

- SB 644 Landlord/Tenant Changes: Sponsored by Sens. Britt, Perry and Newton. SB 644 includes three key areas of AANC's legislative agenda. Those are: (1) Clarification of recovery of out-of-pocket expenses and litigation costs in Summary Ejectments; (2) Protects landlords from negligence claims related to a tenant's criminal record; (3) Allows a deceased tenants property to be collected or disposed of by an affidavit.
   SB 644 has passed both chambers and has been signed by the Governor. It is now law.
- <u>HB 366 Regulatory Reform Act</u>: Sponsored by Reps. Yarborough, Bradford, Moffitt and Riddell. HB 366 addresses a wide range of subject matters and is a lengthy complicated bill. This bill formerly included provisions in SB 644. They have been removed since SB 644 has become law. However, this is an omnibus bill that can morph into anything and AANC will want to continue to monitor its progress.
  - HB 366 has become law. With AANC's provisions moved to SB 644, the final version of HB 366 did not contain any provisions relevant to AANC.
- HB 854 Landlord/Tenant Changes: Sponsored by Reps. Hardister, Bradford, Szoka and Richardson. HB
  854 includes four key areas of AANC's legislative agenda. Those are: (1) Clarification of recovery of out-ofpocket expenses and litigation costs in Summary Ejectments; (2) Protects landlords from negligence claims
  related to a tenant's criminal record; (3) Allows a deceased tenants property to be collected or disposed of
  by an affidavit; (4) Tightens regulations around emotional support animals.
  - o HB 854 passed the House with all of the above listed provisions intact. Several of those were included in SB 644 making them unnecessary in the Senate version of HB 854. AANC is working to secure passage of the remaining provisions and possibly using this bill as a vehicle to introduce additional legislative agenda items. Additional, non-related items have been added to this bill to address some zoning technical corrections. We are still working to have our remaining agenda included in this legislation if it moves forward in 2021.
- HB 27 In-Service Magistrate Training: Sponsored by Rep. Clampitt. HB 27 would require magistrates to complete annual continuing education that will include additional training on summary ejectments.
  - HB 27 has become law, but it does require a technical correction in the annual legislative "clean up" bill to clarify the summary ejectment training.
- HB 119 Property Tax Relief for COVID Affected Businesses: Sponsored by Reps. Bradford, Bell, Saine and Hardister. HB 119 would allow businesses that can show actual losses from the prior year, once reaching a certain threshold, to have their property tax valuation reassessed taking into account those loses.
   Much of this was addressed in the state budget through a grant program.
- <u>SB 105 2021 Appropriations Act</u>: Sponsored by Senators, Jackson, Harrington and Hise. SB 105 is the twoyear state spending plan. This year's budget also includes distribution of federal COVID relief money. The House and Senate versions both contain a grant program to small businesses that suffered losses due to COVID shutdowns and executive orders.
  - A compromise version of SB 105 was voted on this week and Governor Cooper signed it into law. Some landlord situations should be eligible for the grant program and AANC is working to understand those requirements and will pass along more information.
- HB 110—Landlord Submission of Hope Application: Sponsored by Reps. Hanig and Brody and amended by Senator Edwards. HB 110 was a House bill that addressed building permits. In response to ongoing challenges with the HOPE program, the Senate amended the bill to allow for landlord submission of HOPE applications with permission from the tenant. Among other things it would also allow for rent recovery on behalf of current or previous tenants, allow for reasonable late fees, and align the recovery amounts with the federal guidelines.
  - HB 110 has passed the Senate and the House Nov. 30th and is awaiting the Governors signature.
  - Prior to passing, HB 110 was subject of a COVID funding Oversight hearing and worked its way through the legislative process.
  - AANC and other stakeholders have been working to secure additional committee hearings and passage prior to session adjournment. If Governor Cooper signs this bill, this will be another legislative victory for the Association.

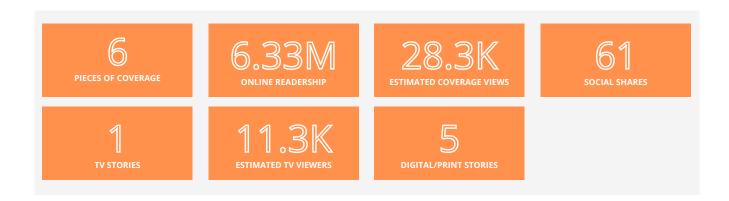

#### **REGION IV RECAP**

- The **NAA Board of Directors** met in March in an open format to discuss strategy with regard to products and services, governance, regional representation, committee purpose, and diversity in volunteer leadership. The group's formal business included reviewing the 2020 audit report and hearing from various task forces. This includes the NAAEI Task Force which continues to explore the future of NAA's credentialing and professional development initiatives and workforce development efforts.
- **NAA Advocate** was held on March 8, 2021, followed by a week of affiliate virtual meetings with their Congressional representatives. Feedback has been provided from more than 130 legislative meetings.
- **NAA Region IV** held regular elections at their virtual May Region meeting for four RVP positions for the 2022-2023 term, as well as a special election to fill one vacant position for the remainder of 2021.
- NAA filed a lawsuit against the federal government seeking \$26.6 billion in damages for rental housing providers who have suffered under the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) unlawful federal eviction moratorium. This lawsuit is open to all rental housing owners operating in a state or locality under the federal moratorium who have been damaged by the CDC eviction moratorium. Housing providers in several states that had more strict eviction restrictions are ineligible. North Carolina was originally on the list of ineligible states. AANC General Counsel, Norm Praet, and Government Affairs Director, Janae Moore, worked with NAA's legal team to ensure that North Carolina property owners were included prior to the filing of the case. - From August 31 to September 2, NAA hosted **Apartmentalize** in Chicago, IL. We are proud to report 15 of the session speakers were from North Carolina. This was a great in-person event and it was nice to see so many familiar faces again.
- NAA's Assembly of Delegates, their largest business meeting of the year, took place November 2-4 in Cincinnati, OH. Boards and committees met and incoming Officers were installed. The 2022 budget was affirmed, delegates voted on various bylaw changes, and the Diversity and Inclusion Committee was renamed the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee. At the installation dinner, Don Brunner was sworn in as 2022 Chairman and Region IV's very own Chris Burns was elected as incoming Secretary. Region IV RVPs were also installed for the 2022-2023 cycle. Those RVPs are Chris Carter with Carter Haston, Susan Sherfield with Mercy Housing, and Susan Passmore with Blue Ridge Companies.
- NAA released its 2021 Income & Expenses Survey (Order 2021 IES Survey), covering 2020 financials including:
  - Current trends that may impact your properties including a look at COVID-19's impact on the industry
  - Updated figures your staff needs to prepare for budgeting and forecasting
  - Data for market-rate and subsidized properties for detailed income and expenses line items
  - Detailed local market operations data (for 67 single markets) and national economic analysis
  - National data by age, size and type of property that will help you compare your portfolio performance against your peers
