"Last school year, almost 3 out of 4 public schools reported higher rates of chronic teacher absenteeism, or teachers missing 10 or more days of work, according to the U.S. Department of Education. At the same time, 77% of schools reported having <u>more difficulty finding substitutes</u> to fill in while regular teachers were out, with 61% saying it was 'much more difficult' than it had been before COVID-19 began to spread."¹
