# Report from John Schwetman

With the aid of the French National Honor Society, I had a great trip to France this summer. I spent nine days in Avignon, in southern France, at a program called "Rencontres internationales" which was presented in conjunction with the drama festival occurring at the same I arrived in Avignon on July time. 22 alone and uncertain of my future. After about 20 minutes of wandering, I found my way to the Lycée Mistral and met other people who explained to me how to get meals and where to find a room. Then, I was left to meet people from all over the world and experience the world of French drama.

The people I met were of all different types and nationalities. A few felt more confident in speaking English than in French, but for the most part, I relied on French for communication. This was

the first time in my life that I had ever been immersed in the French lanquage, speaking it primarily. took me a few days before I became confident with speaking French, but each day brought its own share of triumphs when I discussed a newer, more complicated topic in French. Of course, speaking French was almost always easier than understanding it (especially in trying to understand the Franco-Arabic melange spoken by the Algerians between each other). One day, I went with a small group to the Radio France-Vaucluse studio to record an interview for their midday report. I was very nervous, but I managed to answer the interviewer's questions, if not with the greatest wit and coherence. Experiences such as this and my many discussions with others in French all greatly improved my confidence with the French language.

Also, the program offered various excursions to the surrounding area and the opportunity to see many plays in French. I took the opportunity to visit a town called Uzès and Baux de Provence. These trips were nice because not only were the towns interesting but it was easier to get to know the other people in the program in conversations during the excursions. The trip to Baux de Provence was overnight. We slept "sous les belles étoiles" in the shadow of this incredible mountain top fortress. The next day, we explored the ruins of Baux de Provence and saw other sights in the area.

The program ended on July 31, and it was sad to see everybody leave after nine days. We all took the train, drove, or hitchhiked in our own separate directions. However, when I went to Paris, I ran into four of the people I had met in Avignon. It is quite a thrill to bump into someone you know, in Paris, when surrounded by unfamiliar ter-

ritory. I also visited the cities of Nancy, Strasbourg, and Besançon before returning to the United States. I will never forget the amazing things I saw and did on this trip to France. I would like to thank the French National Honor Society for its financial assistance to this experience.

While in France I went to so many places and saw so many sights that I do not know where to begin. During my pre-session in Paris I went on a boat ride on the Bateaux-Mouches, climbed the Eiffel Tower, and visited the Champs Elysées, Versailles, Montmartre, and the Latin Quarter.

Alsace was even more exciting.
The people there were unique. I
visited a Saboterie and also saw
how glass and crystal are made. I
went to the vineyards and tasted

Strasbourg. The list just goes on

My session in France was a won-derful experience. I made some new friends, and I also learned much about French culture. My French has improved and I am hoping to study abroad in France for one or two years. Again, I would like to thank you for the travel allowance.
