Lettre de la Présidente

Colleagues,

Twelve sponsors attended the breakfast and business session this year in San Jose. Discussion focused on the establishment of a "Junior" SHF which, it is thought, would be a great incentive to students to continue in French. General consensus suggested that the group should have its own logo and tee-shirt, but that cords, other logo products, and the travel stipend, should be available only to SHF. If invited to participate in the writing competition, there should be a separate category. Three questions: Should exploratory programs be included? Should qualifications for membership be the same or relaxed? What should the group be called? Send opinions and name suggestions to one of the addresses below.

Executive Secretary Todd Knox submitted a **financial report** indicating a balance on hand on June 30, 2009, of \$4,624.93. Most of the funds received during a year are invested in supplies in preparation for a quick turnaround as orders arrive.

You will find details in the September issue of the *National Bulletin* for nominating a student for the AATF Outstanding Senior in French award and for an Academic Palms summer scholarship. The Year of the Comic Strip is being celebrated in Brussels in 2009. Take a virtual stroll through the city and delve into the 'comic strip trail' with 32 walls in the capital being covered with famous comic strip painted murals. Visit statues, specialized book shops, or one of the many exhibits held at the Belgian Comic Strip Center.

A question has arisen about the difference between the **travel essay and the creative writing essay**. The travel essay is described in the middle of the cover form on page five as stating "your reasons for applying for this travel award" and, written in the student's own cursive handwriting, is to be submitted along with the materials for that concours (page four). The creative writing entries are to address the topic on page six and are to be typewritten. The competitions are completely separate and, within the limitations set forth in the rules, a student may enter both.

If you would be interested (or if you can recommend a colleague who would be interested) in serving on the **committee work**ing toward the formation of a junior SHF, revising the national by-laws or creating a new set to provide for the new junior organization, making decisions about pins and teeshirts and/or adding new logo products, your input would be most welcome. We would also welcome information about your chapter's service requirements.

Concours - SHF Travel Awards

In recent years, up to ten (10) awards have been made, each in the amount of \$750.

1. Each **chapter** may submit no more than two applications.

- 2. The teacher of the student applicant must be a member of AATF by Feb. 1, 2010.
- 3. The applicant must be a member of the SHF by the application deadline, currently studying French, and possess a good knowledge of the language.
- 4. Awards must be used for travel, not tuition, course fees, etc. Proof of registration by May 1st in the program described on, or attached to, the application form and/or travel reservations may be required before disbursement is made.
- 5. The applicant must be registered in, or able to register in, a program approved by the SHF sponsor. Although independent travel is discouraged, exceptions will be made if the applicant and sponsor provide a detailed program of travel/study and justification.
- 6. Travel must be completed within 12 months of the award deadline (by 2/1/11).
- 7. The **recipient is expected to send** to the address below a brief description of the travel/study experience and its significance within one month of completion of the trip.
- 8. Only applications which are complete will be reviewed. The sponsor must mail all the following items in one envelope:

Official transcript through first
semester 2009-10

- Letter of recommendation, signed and dated, from current French teacher
- Letter of recommendation, signed and dated, from another faculty member of the school the applicant is now attending

The topic for this year's writing competition is one which was suggested by Carole Wilk, former sponsor of SHF in one of our New York high schools, in collaboration with Executive Secretary Todd Knox. You may choose to respond to the questions in poetry, conversation or prose.

Construit au bord de la Seine à la fin du 12^e siècle, le Louvre se servait de forteresse royale sous le règne de Philippe 11. Pendant le 16^e siècle, François 1 l'a transformé en édifice un peu plus moderne, et ensuite Le Roi Soleil, Louis XIV, l'a rendu un vrai palais. Grâce aux caprices et aux besoins de tous les rois, le Louvre a subi beaucoup de changements à l'intérieur. La façade du bâtiment comme on le voit aujourd'hui est à peu près celle achevée sous le règne de Louis XV, mais le Louvre était devenu de moins en moins important après la construction du Palais de Versailles. Depuis 1793, Le Louvre sert a un musée d'art, et il jouit du rôle du musée le plus visité du monde.

En 1983, sous la direction de Francois Mitterand, la modernisation du Louvre était confiée à l'architecte l.M. Pei, ce qui a inclus la construction d'une énorme, et deux petites, pyramides dans la grande cour. Son but était présentant de multiples facettes : il a voulu y présenter pas seulement une lucarne et une nouvelle entrée mais et aussi une reconnaissance de l'ensemble de l'antiquité et la modernité. Au sous-sol il y a un grand centre commercial et un parking.

Il existe plein de gens qui sont d'accord avec I.M. Pei... ils apprécient énormément les changements, en disant que c'est plus facile d'y entrer, et qu'en fait, les pyramides en verre sont spectaculaires. On dit que l'addition des boutiques, surtout celles d'origine américaine, comme Apple et Virgin Megastore, attire une plus grande clientèle. Et, il y a des gens qui n'aiment pas du tout ces structures; pour eux, c'est un envahissement de la beauté classique française et leur « look » dérange l'équilibre de l'ancien palais avec ses jardins parfaitement sculptés. Pour eux, ce site a, en fait, perdu quelque chose.

Comme un jeune américain, qu'en pensez-vous ? Pouvez – vous apprécier et admirer ces pyramides ? Pensez-vous que la lucarne est nécessaire pour l'amélioration de ce musée, ou est-ce que vous croyez que c'est superflu et inutile ? Pourquoi ? Que pensez-vous de la modernisation la plus récente du Louvre en générale ? Réfléchissez-y aux points de vue économiques, esthétiques et pratiques. Est-ce bien pour le tourisme ? Pensez-vous que les touristes, surtout les Américains, regardent la nouvelle cour comme encore une autre destruction de la culture française de jadis, ou une addition à sa splendeur ?

Maintenant, imaginez-vous un(e) jeune français(e) et répondez aux mêmes questions. Pensez-vous que vous auriez le même avis? Pourquoi ou pourquoi pas?
