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

With this enabling technology and the properly produced video material, teachers and students of foreign language can study and catalogue the behaviors that create a great deal of the

### **Twentieth-Century Literature I: Romanciers et idéologues**

**La Cristallisation d'un désaccord: Sartre et Aron devant mai 1968**, James P. McNab, Univ. of North Carolina-Wilmington

Les événements de mai 1968 cristallisent les nombreux désaccords entre Sartre et Aron. Tandis que Sartre croit y voir la praxis héroïque à l'oeuvre, Aron voit surtout des scènes de burlesque. Les deux interprétations révèlent une différence de tempérament fondamentale et une rupture de dialogue historique.

### **(En)gendered Space: the House as Maternal Metaphor in Mauriac's *Génitrix***, Patrice Proulx, Univ. of Nebraska-Omaha

In Mauriac's *Génitrix*, the constructed space of the Casenave home functions as a symbolic extension of Félicité, the matriarch of the household. The female body has often conjured up images of both sanctuary and incarceration—this paper examines the implications of Mauriac's primarily malevolent portrayal of maternal space. Félicité's own decay is mirrored in changes which are concomitantly transforming and weakening the structure of the house. These changes contribute to her ultimate physical and moral disintegration within the (en)gendered female space of the house.


### **Lakoff's Categories and Gide's *L'Immoraliste***, Paul A. Fortier, Univ. of Manitoba

The concept of categories pioneered by Eleanor Rosch and her colleagues, and recently expanded in George Lakoff's *Women, Fire, and Dangerous Things* is applied in a quantitative fashion to Gide's *L'Immoraliste* to demonstrate that objective methods and the latest discoveries of cognitive psychology can be combined to produce fruitful interpretations of literary texts.

### **The Mystical Union: A Reexamination of Wiesel's *Le Mendiant de Jérusalem***, Simon P. Sibelman, Univ. of Wisconsin-Oshkosh

Suffering and redemption, destruction and resurrection represent two of the mystical axes upon which Elie Wiesel's literary universe turns. In his *récit*, *le Mendiant de Jérusalem*, past and present unite to open a way to the future. Characters exist in Chagall-like kingdoms where reality and dreams fuse. The author weaves complex tapestries of phantasmagorical testimony and Hassidic fantasy in which personal memories of the past and the collective history of the

## Literature and Film

**Cinematic Epistolarity and *Les Liaisons dangereuses*,** Robert N. Lamoureux, Columbia Univ. (NY)

This presentation will closely examine the process of cinematic adaptation of works of literature, using Laclos' epistolary novel as a model in conjunction with the four adaptations it has inspired: Roger Vadim's *Les Liaisons Dangereuses* (1960), Charles Brabant's *Les Liaisons dangereuses* (1979), Stephen Frears' *Dangerous Liaisons* (1988), and Milos Forman's *Valmont* (1989).

**Character and Characterization: Teaching *Madame Bovary* through Novel and Film,** Anna V. Lambros, Georgia State Univ.

In this paper, the teaching of the Vincent Minnelli's *Madame Bovary* is proposed as a tool for the acquisition of 19th century French culture. Although this version is a product of Hollywood, social customs and behavior and economic/ideological forces are read in the fabric of the film text. This study will consider the detailed elaboration of Flaubert's *Madame Bovary* and the "Hollywood" style adaptation of that text. Segments of novel and film will be presented in order to demonstrate how the visual and aural signs in the film choose to adapt the verbal signs of the original text. Then the reader and spectator of both texts will be discussed in terms of how cultural information is transmitted by both novel and film.





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

There is a discrepancy in Béroul's *Tristan* between the medieval value system and the attitude of the narrator. Several factors, including ironic contrasts embedded in the narrative itself, suggest that the attitude of Béroul's narration can best be understood as itself ironic. This interpretation is supported by examining the modern reader's response to the text.

### **How Not to End a Fabliau, Norris J. Lacy, Washington Univ. (St. Louis)**

Fabliau closure is a complex matter, all the more because authors often hone their narrative finely, paring away all inessential and distracting material, only to conclude the anecdote by morals (frequently inappropriate, multiple, or nonsensical) or by digressions that may not flow logically out of the story. This paper studies the ways fabliaux end—or, just as often, resist ending—and evaluates the purposes and effects of their closures.

### **Preparing the Reader: Comic Strategies in the World of the *Heptaméron*, Jerry C. Nash, Univ. of New Orleans.**

This study will focus on *Heptaméron* 71 as a narrative model for reading other stories of Marguerite de Navarre's work. It will explore the comic strategies of anticipation and the fabliau art of distance which are found in so many of her *contes à rire*. The modern narratological concepts of prolepsis/analepsis will be used to help clarify the comic strategies at work in the *Heptaméron*.

In an integrated French curriculum, literature plays various roles. Through literature students can develop a full range of linguistic, interpretive and cognitive skills, synchronic cultural knowledge and "sensitivity", as well as an awareness of diachronic processes and the significant issues or concerns within given epochs.

Drawing from a corpus of interviews recorded in Tours, this presentation will show patterns of "information flow" in spoken French. What linguistic structures does the speaker employ to introduce new referents into discourse, and how are these referents tracked across discourse time?

#### Reconsidering Open Syllabification in French, Barbara Bullock, Penn State Univ.

Traditionally, it has been assumed that syllabification in French tends to create a series of vowel final, or open syllables, except in word final position. However, this paper argues that this assumption is overstated and that there are many more processes in French that actually conspire to create syllables closed by consonants, both at the end of words and within words. This tendency is illustrated quite clearly in the word game, verlan (backwards language), where all words of one syllable end in consonants. It is also demonstrated by the deletion of the "e-muet". This paper, then, discusses a phonological approach to the French syllable which will define the possible structure of the syllable and will explain why certain processes occur to close syllables in French.

#### The Role of Conversation in Developing Syntax in French as a Second Language, Maria Myers, Queen's University

Givon (1985) believes that some language knowledge for communication will be acquired in a subconscious way and some other as conscious and explicit. We will look at methods of syntactization over time. Pictures will be used to show the development of syntax in a collaborative way.

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

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

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
