Chères et chers Collègues,

Au seuil de cette nouvelle année, je voudrais vous présenter mes meilleurs voeux de santé, bonheur et réussite professionnelle. Comme toujours, cette année sera chargée d'activités que nous organisons à votre intention pour vous aider dans votre enseignement et dans la promotion du français.

Congrès AATF de San Jose, 2-5 juillet 2009

Les préparatifs en vue de notre congrès se précisent. Nous avons reçu de nombreuses propositions de sessions et ateliers sur des activités de classe, la didactique du français langue étrangère, les littératures d'expression française, différents aspects culturels, la présentation de films, sans oublier la promotion et la défense du français aux États-Unis. Nous avons invité plusieurs personnalités et nous organisons des excursions et visites avant et après le congrès (Monterey, San Francisco, la route des vins) pour une manifestation qui promet d'être mémorable. J'espère donc que vous projetez d'y participer.

Élections provinciales au Québec

Les élections du 8 décembre ont vu la victoire de Jean Charest qui entame un troisième mandat de Premier ministre. Le Parti libéral reste ainsi au pouvoir avec 42,05% des voix, alors que le Parti québécois, situé en deuxième position avec 35,15% des suffrages, redevient le parti de l'opposition. Action démocratique du Québec recule vers la troisième position et ne reçoit que 16,35% des voix. Viennent ensuite

Québec solidaire (3,79%), Parti vert du Québec (2,28%) et plusieurs partis qui obtiennent moins de 1% des suffrages [www.monvote.qc.ca/fr]. Le site de l'Assemblée nationale du Québec [www.assnat.qc.ca] offre toutes sortes d'informations sur sa composition, son histoire, la chronologie des parlementaires et Premiers ministres ainsi qu'une visite virtuelle des lieux. Une section intitulée «Mission éducative» propose des activités à caractère pédagogique destinées à des élèves de différents niveaux.

Fin de la présidence française de l'Union européenne

L'Union européenne (UE) n'a pas de président comme c'est le cas en France ou aux États-Unis. De ce fait, chaque État membre assure la présidence du Conseil de l'Union européenne à tour de rôle pendant six mois. Du 1^{er} juillet au 31 décembre 2008, c'est la France qui a présidé l'UE. Elle a succédé à la Slovénie et, depuis le 1^{er} janvier, c'est la République tchèque qui assure cette fonction (voir le calendrier sur [www.touteleurope.fr]). Une émission sur le bilan de cette présidence a été diffusée sur TV5 et les discours du président Sarkozy sont disponibles en ligne sur [www.elysee.fr].

Guide du professeur de français

De nombreux collègues, en particulier en début de carrière, se sentent isolés dans leur établissement scolaire, étant parfois le seul professeur de français ou ne sachant pas à qui demander conseil. Afin de répondre aux besoins de ces collègues et de tous nos membres en général, je prépare un guide qui s'adressera aux professeurs de français de tous niveaux. Cet ouvrage collectif contiendra la réimpression de documents publiés dans notre National Bulletin ou préparés par nos commissions ainsi que des activités de classe, le partage d'expériences, ou encore des ressources dans différents domaines dont, en particulier, la promotion et la défense du français. Je vous invite à me faire part de vos suggestions sur les rubriques que vous aimeriez trouver dans ce guide [koop@unt.edu].

TV5 Monde

Si vous n'avez pas encore accès à TV5 Monde [www.tv5.org], la chaîne de télévision francophone internationale, je vous conseille vivement de vous y abonner ou d'y faire abonner votre établissement (DishNetwork, Verizon) pour une somme modique. Cette chaîne offre en effet une variété de programmes dans tous les domainesactualités, culture, littérature, voyages, etc. Elle diffuse des émissions, des films et des vidéoclips de divers pays francophones (France, Québec, Commu-nauté française de Belgique, Suisse romande, Afrique) que l'on peut enregistrer et projeter en classe. Elle représente ainsi un outil indispensable pour tout professeur de français. Le site Internet de cette chaîne contient une section réservée aux enseignants avec des fiches pédago-giques sur les émissions au programme, des enregistrements sonores et de nombreuses séquences vidéo. Je vous signale tout particulièrement l'émission «7 Jours sur la planète», diffusée le samedi matin et sous-titrée en français, qui résume l'actualité de la semaine précédente.

Salons du Livre en pays francophones

Plusieurs pays organisent un salon annuel du livre. Ces manifestations permettent à toutes les grandes maisons d'édition d'y être représentées et offrent des

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rencontres avec leurs auteurs qui dédicacent leurs derniers ouvrages ou participent à des débats. On peut déambuler parmi les stands comme à l'intérieur d'une librairie gigantesque. Plusieurs activités sont au programme comme, par exemple, des lectures publiques, des conférences, des expositions ou encore la manipulation des «e-books» ou livres électroniques. En France, cet événement aura lieu du 13 au 18 mars à la Porte de Versailles, et le Mexique y sera à l'honneur [www. salondulivredeparis.com]. Au Québec, ce Salon se tiendra à Montréal du 18 au 23 novembre à la place Bonaventure [www.salondulivredemontreal.com]. La Foire du Livre de Bruxelles foiredulivredebruxelles.be] sera organisée du 5 au 9 mars et le Salon du Livre de Genève du 22 au 26 avril [www. salondulivre.cf/fr]. Pour l'Afrique, il existe quelques manifestations ponctuelles, comme le Salon du livre africain en mai 2005 ou la manifestation Livres d'Afrique organisée le 28 octobre 2006 dans les salles de l'UNESCO à Paris.

Expolangues

La 27e édition d'Expolangues se déroulera à Paris du 14 au 27 janvier 2009 [www.expolangues.fr]. Cette manifestation annuelle a pour but de promouvoir l'apprentissage des langues et d'encourager les échanges internationaux. Elle réunit des exposants et intervenants de quelque 20 pays, et 60 langues y sont représentées. On peut assister à des communications et ateliers sur la didactique des langues et visiter le salon des exposants où l'on propose manuels de langues étrangères et matériel multimédia. Cette année, Expolangues accueille l'Union euro-péenne.

IN MEMORIAM

Our dear colleague, Barbara Ransford, former AATF Vice-President, lost a long and valiant struggle with cancer on November 24, 2008. She was 63 years old. Barbara is survived by George, her husband of 42 years, and two children.

Barbara was always cheerful and positive, even in the face of the cancer she struggled against for so long. She was unfailingly friendly to everyone she met, from colleagues to service people in hotels, restaurants, planes and trains. Never a word of complaint or self-pity. Barbara was always so upbeat and positive, she was an inspiration to us all. She contributed tirelessly to many organizations and causes.

Barbara taught French for many years in the Camden Fairview School District in Arkansas. She had a difficult assignment, working in two schools, teaching at both the middle and high school levels. She conducted student trips to France, organized home stays for French students, and promoted her program in myriad ways. She was a forceful advocate for French.

Barbara served many roles, including District Chair, Vice-President, and President of the Arkansas Foreign Language Teachers Association (AFLTA) and President of the Southwest Arkansas Foreign Language Alliance. Barbara received the Lifetime Achievement Award from AFLTA in April 2007. Barbara became a Central States Leadership Fellow in 1996 and later served as a board member of the Central States Conference. She was a member of ACTFL and a frequent presenter at their annual conference.

Barbara's contributions to AATF are legion. She served as a national Vice-President from 2005-2007. As President of Arkansas AATF Chapter, she rallied a group of foreign language teachers to fight against a legislative agenda to make Spanish the official foreign language of the state. She had to do this twice and was successful both times. Afterwards she made several presentations at ACTFL and AATF conferences about this advocacy effort. In her many roles with AATF and AFLTA, she frequently brought noted speakers to the state to give workshops and presentations for Arkansas teachers.

The loss of Barbara is a great sorrow to all of us who found in her a visionary leader, creative colleague, wise mentor, and faithful friend. Her valiant battle against cancer not only gave us several additional years of her grace and talents but also provided a gentle model of how to handle adversity in such positive and productive ways.

NATIONAL FRENCH WEEK AT THE COLLEGE LEVEL

My university's French Club recipe for celebrating National French Week is simple and easily replicated.

On the Friday of National French Week we organize dinner and a movie night. Because the goal of National French Week is to reach out beyond the classroom, we do not always feel obligated to show French movies with English subtitles. This year, for instance, we showed A Good Year which promotes a positive image of the French way of life and which gave me the opportunity to introduce the Oscar-winning Marion Cotillard. Last year we showed Ratatouille and invited children who are in a local program for those whose parents work in the evenings and cannot help them with their homework. Even though it is a Disneyesque cartoon, the movie allowed us to discuss French attitudes to food. Incidentally I cooked a ratatouille for the potluck.

On Saturday we have a wine and cheese party off campus. The students dress in cocktail attire and invite their favorite professors or coaches. The students choose the French wine (keeping the price below \$10 per bottle) and cheese. We very carefully invite only those students who are 21 and above.

On Sunday we host a concert of French music. Professors and students from the Department of Music perform pieces by French composers or composers with some connection to France or the French-speaking world. The music students do a little research about the piece or the composer and introduce them to the audience, which typically includes members of the local town and a nearby town's Alliance française as well as many faculty members from other departments. This year we brought a French viola player from Austin, and he performed with music faculty. The program notes were written in English, but he commented on them in French.

One day in the week we have an art professor demonstrate techniques used by French artists on the grass outside the art building with a picnic provided by the French Club. For example, last year he demonstrated Impressionism; this year *pointillisme*. The "artists" get to keep their creations so it is very popular with students from across campus. We call this event "Art sur I'herbe," and this year the Art Club cosponsored it.

One day, a Francophile/Francophone history professor gives a lecture. Cospon-

sored by the History Club, he talked last year about 18th century Lyon. The previous year he talked about his recent visit to Rwanda, where he grew up and painted a lively picture of life in this African country he knows well. He has talked in the past about Napoleon.

On National French Week kick-off day this year, our campus radio station played one song in French each hour (with music on CD provided by the students). Last year French Club members distributed pencils provided by the AATF to which they had attached French expressions that we use in English, such as *joie de vivre*. Both activities help the student body connect to French, though the former is a great deal less work!

Relatively easy to organize, such events promote French through collaborations with faculty and students from other disciplines and enrich campus life. All events are publicized in the student newspaper. National French Week is alive and well in Texas A&M University-Kingsville.

In addition, there will be several package options which include just registration, registration plus the Welcome Luncheon and Awards Banquet, registration plus all meals.



JNCL/NCLIS EXECUTIVE SUMMARY NOVEMBER, 200

- The 110th Congress considered over five dozen bills dealing with languages and international education, such as the Access to Language Education Act, the Foreign Language Education Expansion Act, the National Security Language Act, the National Security Culture and Language Training Act, and five education bills dealing with foreign language partnerships. Also, there were a number of English as the Official Language bills, offset by a number of English Plus bills.
- Two such bills are Rep. Rush Holt's International Education Leadership Act of 2008, H.R. 5179, which would "establish in the Department of Education an Assistant Secretary of International and Foreign Language Education and an Office of International and Foreign Language Education" and H.R. 2111, the Foreign Language Partnership Program Act, introduced by Rep. Holt after extensive discussions with the language community. The bill has been endorsed by over 70 international, language, and education associations.
- The President's budget request for FY2009 increases International Education and Foreign Language Studies in Higher Education from \$109 million to \$110 million. \$24 million was requested for Advancing America through Foreign Language Partnerships as part of the National Security Language Initiative. The Foreign Language Assistance Program (FLAP) received level funding. Thirteen small programs, of which foreign languages and international education are a part, such as Civic Education, Gifted and Talented, and Magnet Schools, among others, are eliminated.
- In Congressional appropriations considerations for FY2009, the Committees have recommended increases in SMART grants by about \$90 million to between \$301 and \$308 million. TEACH grants would increase by \$7 million to \$14 million. The House would level-fund FLAP at \$25.7 and the Senate would raise it to \$27 million. The Senate level-funds Foreign Languages and International Education in Title VI and the House would increase it to \$118.8 million. The President's request for \$24 million for Advancing America through Foreign Language Partnerships still has not garnered support in either chamber.
- The College Cost Reduction and Access Act (H.R. 2669) is now Public Law 110-84. This law will provide student loan forgiveness to borrowers who serve in "areas of national need such as early childhood educators, nurses, foreign language specialists ... and public sector employees". It establishes a TEACH Grant program provid-

ing tuition assistance to students who commit to teaching a high-need subject in a high-need school for four years.

- The 110th Congress passed and the President signed into law the America COM-PETES Act (America Creating Opportunities to Meaningfully Promote Excellence in Technology, Education, and Science Act). The law is very broad in scope and creates programs in a number of federal agencies. In the Department of Education, it will increase the number of AP and IB programs dealing with math, science, and foreign languages; develop more math, science, and critical foreign language teachers; and create a new program of articulated critical foreign languages from elementary school through postsecondary education.
- After five years of deliberations, Congress finally passed and the President signed the College Opportunity and Affordability Act reauthorizing the Higher Education Act. This 1158 page bill creates a very broad definition of "critical foreign languages," creates a new competitive grant program for math, science, technology, and critical foreign languages to support teachers, provides loan forgiveness for teachers in "high need areas" including foreign languages, includes foreign languages as content areas of national need, revises Title VI in order to fine-tune a number of current programs, and creates a new position of Deputy Assistant Secretary for International and Foreign Language Education.

REGIONAL REPORTS

REGION V: Southeast

In spite of a particularly difficult hurricane season this year, chapters in Region V (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee) have worked hard meeting the professional needs of their members and cooperating with state foreign language associations, the French consulates in Atlanta, Miami, and New Orleans, and the *Alliance française*.

Members took part in a number of activities to promote French: commemorations of the 400th anniversary of the city of Quebec, Mardi Gras celebrations, National French Week and International Day festivals, Cercles de français, Sociétés honoraires de français, participation in local and regional language festivals and writing competitions, trips to art exhibits, exchanges with French schools, immersion days or weekends, etc.

Participation in the *Grand Concours* and FLES Contest was strong again this year: 15,175 students from Region V participated; 1,633 students representing 220 schools received national medals. Several states had increased participation, including Georgia (12.48%), Tennessee (6.32%), South Carolina (5.80%) and Florida (3.29%).

Many Region V teachers attended and presented papers at local and national conferences in 2008: 50 members attended the annual convention in Liège, and several gave papers at the SCOLT conference in Myrtle Beach on topics that included *la chanson francaise* (4 sessions), AP French, Quebec cinema, "Digital Storytelling in the Classroom," "Les Élections provinciales 2007 au Québec," "The Belgian Connection."

Congratulations to several colleagues who received scholarships and local and national awards. Metka Zupancic of the University of Alabama was named *Chevalier dans l'Ordre des Palmes Académiques*, and Muriel Hoequist of the Alabama School of Math and Sciences received the "Claes Nobel Educator of Distinction" award through the National Society of High School Scholars

The Alabama Chapter participated in the annual Weekend Immersed in Language Development (WILD) organized by the Alabama Association of Foreign Language Teachers. It sponsored several sessions on contemporary Francophone literature and culture at the 2008 annual AAFLT conference. The 2009 conference will include a workshop on using theater in the classroom by *Le Théâtre du rêve*, a Francophone theater group from Atlanta, as well as sessions on Le Clézio, Quebec City, Belgian comic books, and politics and immigration in

France.

The Florida Chapter held its second annual immersion weekend for teachers. Séjour sans souci in January. It took part in the fifty-sixth Congrès de la culture française in April (theme: La mode). This Congrès is an annual French language academic competition which brings together more than 1000 students and 600 teachers from 60 schools. The students compete in drama, song contests, speeches, and they win awards and scholarships (including two from the chapter). The chapter awarded two \$500 Grand Concours scholarships for top scorers who continue their study of French after high school, and two teacher scholarships for National Board Certification candidates. The chapter has strong ties with the French Consulate in Miami (the Attaché culturel regularly contributes an article for the chapter's Bulletin). It worked with the Florida Department of Education to renew its France-Florida Agreement and extend its scope beyond the Miami area. The chapter was also involved in the organization of the 2008 ACTFL conference.

The Georgia Chapter sponsored a successful immersion weekend at Camp Rock Eagle in Eatonton, Georgia. 137 students from 24 high schools attended, and Julie Fournier-Angelo, from the French Consulate in Atlanta, shared materials and resources. The chapter awards travel grants to the annual FLAG Conference to teachers who present on Francophone topics. The sessions this year included papers on Rodin, Notre Dame de Paris, and French and American table manners. The fall chapter meeting included a presentation on "Le Louvre Atlanta" by a representative from the High Museum and a discussion of the pedagogical materials provided by the AATF. French teachers and students will have increased opportunities for educational and cultural exchanges thanks to a new Memorandum of Understanding signed by the Georgia Department of Education and the Académie of Besancon.

In Mississippi, two of Virginia Jolly's French III students from Gautier High School placed in the top 15 in the writing competition sponsored by the French Consulate in Atlanta to celebrate *la Semaine de la Francophonie*. Helene Berton's students from Oxford High School visited an impressionist exhibit in Memphis. Keltoum Rowland and four students from USM provided members of the 177th Armored Brigade at Camp Shelby with a day-long crash-course in French instruction in preparation for a humanitarian mission in Djibouti.

The North Carolina Chapter held two

meetings this year. The spring meeting (with AATSP) had a focus on technology. The fall conference, in conjunction with FLANC, included sessions on contemporary Canadian cinema, the use of commercials to teach culture, and teaching across the curriculum in French classes; Nicole Swanson, recipient of a scholarship to France, reported on her experience. The Chapter selected Elizabeth Bucrek as the winner of its 2008 Concours pédagogique. The chapter received a generous donation from the estate of Dr. John Philip Couch, a professor at UNC-Greensboro who died in 2006. The gift will be used to award study-abroad grants to college students enrolled in French programs in North Carolina.

The South Carolina Chapter helped organize the 2008 SCOLT conference in Myrtle Beach, Executive Director, Javne Abrate, was invited to speak about the promotional campaign conducted by the AATF and the (details French Embassy [www.theworldspeaksfrench.org]) and on "Using YouTube Videos as Authentic Materials." Josette Page Sharwell was recognized for her excellent work as National French Contest Administrator. The Chapter worked with the SC Department of Education and the French Consulate in Atlanta to organize a two-day workshop for Georgia teachers at Cardinal Newman High School in Columbia. The purpose was to learn creative methods to foster communication in the language classroom. The sessions were run by Francis Yaiche, maître de conférences at the Sorbonne, École des Hautes Études en Information et Communication. In the spring. chapter members were involved in the production and performance of Jean Anouilh's Le Bal des Voleurs by the Allliance française of Columbia. The SC Department of Education signed an agreement with the Académie de Clermont Ferrand; school partnerships are a key component of the agreement.

The Tennessee Chapter held its annual meeting at the Tennessee Foreign Language Teaching Association meeting. Ms. Ginette Chenard, the Quebec Governement Representative in Atlanta, was invited as guest speaker to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the founding of Quebec City. There were several stimulating sessions on *la Francophonie*, Belgium, the French Revolution, the Alsatian language, as well as a workshop on the film *Persepolis* and a singalong concert with "Au Coeur du Vent" [w w w . u t m . e d u / s t a f f / g l o b e g / atelmusique.shtml].

Region V teachers affiliated with the French Consulate in Atlanta will miss their Attachée culturelle Diane Josse and

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Attachée culturelle adiointe Julie Fournier-Angelo, whose terms expired in the summer. Diane did a fabulous job keeping us informed about cultural events and scholarship opportunities, and Julie attended many chapter meetings and conferences to offer support (and distribute prizes) with great humor and enthusiasm. We thank them both and look forward to working with Katherine Wickhorst and Émilie Renouvin in the future. The Cultural Services of the French Embassy are a great resource, and I encourage French teachers in Region V to subscribe to the cultural and educational newsletters of their area consulates (Miami for Florida, New Orleans for Louisiana, and Atlanta for Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee). It has been a pleasure meeting and/or corresponding with teachers from our region this year. Best wishes to you and your students for 2009, and I hope many of you will participate in the *Grand Concours*, the *Semaine de la Francophonie*, and the annual meeting in San Jose.

REGION VI: East Central

Ohio members also enjoyed wine and cheese at a reception following the Chapter business meeting at the OFLA conference. The Northwest Indiana Chapter piggy-backed on an International Film Festival held at Valparaiso University, offering discussion in French after showing the film Persepolis. They also heard a presentation by member Belinda Potoma on her sabbatical in Rouillac in Brittany at their fall business meeting. Michigan French teachers were served by a well-received workshop on music presented by members Suzie Martin and Marge Mandl at the Michigan World Language Association meeting. Also in Michigan, Mary Blain of the Utica Schools hosted a concert by Éric Vincent

Immersion activities: Chapters are convinced of the value of immersion experiences to help teachers connect with each other and maintain language skills. The Detroit Chapter has a long-standing immersion program: it held its 25th immersion weekend at Camp Dainava. At that time they placed a marker in honor of deceased members who were faithful participants in the immersion weekend and other chapter activities. Becky Tatters-Mevers. Caren Kindel, and Elizabeth Tessem. The Ohio Chapter is active in providing immersion opportunities for teachers and students. They held a full-day Immersion Workshop for teachers at the OFLA conference, and sponsored an Immersion Weekend at Mohican State Park in September, cosponsored the Teacher Immersion Day at Wright State University in August, and cosponsored a High School French Immersion Day at Wright State in November (in which 200 high school students participated). The Northwest Indiana Chapter sponsors monthly potluck Immersion dinners, which help to create a sense of community among members, and in 2008-09 are creating a second small immersion event each month.

Funding: The Ohio Chapter has been able to allot funds to members for travel to conferences and has refined their selection methods to spend funds wisely. The Northwest Indiana Chapter sponsors a modest scholarship for a graduating high-school student continuing to study French in college (applicants' teachers must be chapter members). Honors: Suzie Martin, Detroit Chapter member, was honored as "Teacher of the Year" at the Michigan World Language Association meeting Northwest Indiana members Karen Berrier and Paula Callaway were to be honored as French Teachers of the Year at the Indiana Foreign Language Teachers Association meetings.

Advocacy: With assistance from Tennessee Bob Peckham, Indiana now has an Advocacy Web site for the state, viewable at [www.valpo.edu/foreignlanguages]. Members from several Region VI chapters were active in the spring meeting and summer workshop organized by Margot Steinhart to work toward creating a "French Language"

Advocacy Kit." Participants from Region VI were Carol Goss and Ricky Baron of Northwest Indiana, Karen Query of Indiana, Suzie Martin of Detroit, and Deborah Stout of Ohio. The Ohio Chapter blog continues to be a good source of information for members seeking advocacy facts, with links to several up-to-date sources.

Several chapters have new leaders elected in spring or fall 2008, and there are several new *Grand Concours* administrators, including the Michigan Chapter's Mijo Pappas and Ohio's Michelle Garlock. I would like to express my thanks to both outgoing and incoming leaders and administrators, as well as those continuing. Their dedication to serving French teachers is invaluable.


South Carolina Chapter

AATF French Government Scholarships

The French Cultural Service is offering AATF members who teach at the K-12 levels six scholarships for study in France during the summer 2009. One of these scholarships is reserved for a French immersion teacher to attend a program in Strasbourg. The programs provide intensive study of French language, teaching French, and modern French culture through writing, theatre, the movies, etc.

The scholarship covers the cost and fees for a three-week program, round-trip train travel from Paris to Strasbourg or Grenoble, and partially covers food and lodging for the three-week period. This year the stages will take place between July 6 and July 24, 2009. Candidates can indicate a preference of studying in Paris, Strasbourg, or Grenoble.

AATF members must apply for French government scholarships through the AATF using our application form. Nonmembers should submit the French government application form to the appropriate consulate.

Québec

Le Ministère des Relations internationales du Québec (MRIQ) attribuera douze bourses pour un stage en langue, culture et société québécoises seront offertes aux membres de l'AATF. As a follow-up, recipients are expected to (1) prepare a cultural unit on the country to be disseminated through the AATF Lending Library and (2) present a session around the same topic at the 2010 AATF conference in Philadelphia.

Université McGill

Depuis 2006, le Département des programmes de langues anglaise et française de l'Université McGill (Québec) offre chaque été une inscription gratuite dans son Programme intensif de français. Cette inscription est réservée au niveau le plus avancé du programme, niveau menant, sous certaines conditions, à l'obtention du Certificat de compétence en français de l'Université McGill.

Ce concours s'adresse à tous les membres de l'AATF qui enseignent le français au niveau secondaire ou collégial. Les candidats doivent posséder une compétence correspondant au niveau intermédiaire élevé sur l'échelle de l'ACTFL (ou son équivalent), compétence minimale pour être admis au niveau 5 du programme.

La bourse couvre les droits de scolarité et les frais d'inscription (des frais d'une valeur d'environ 2200 \$ CA). Elle ne comprend pas le transport, l'hébergement à Montréal, les assurances et les dépenses personnelles.

Reconnu pour la qualité et le dynamisme de son enseignement, le Programme intensif de français accueille chaque année des centaines d'étudiants du monde entier. Constitué de cinq niveaux, ce programme à plein temps prépare les étudiants à communiquer efficacement dans un environnement francophone, tant à l'oral qu'à l'écrit, et leur permet de découvrir de nombreuses facettes de la culture québécoise et d'autres cultures francophones. Tout étudiant terminant le niveau 5 avec une note minimale de 75% est admissible au Certificat de compétence en français de l'Université McGill. La session d'été dure 8 semaines : du 22 juin au 14 août 2009.

Eligibility

Applicants for all of the scholarships must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents whose first language is not French. The recipients must hold a teaching position in French during 2009-2010. Preference will be given to members who have been in good standing since January 1, 2007. Current AATF chapter presidents and Executive Council members are not eligible. Members who have received an AATF scholarship during the past five years (2004-08) are also not eligible. Scholarship recipients agree to make a presentation at a foreign language conference in 2009-2010.

Selection Process

The scholarships will be awarded to members who indicate a plan to use the scholarship to benefit themselves professionally and to enhance or expand the curriculum for the students. Applications will be reviewed and the decisions will be announced in early April 2009. A number of factors will be weighed: clarity and specificity of the candidate's statement (1-2 pages); reasons for applying and level of French (candidates are expected to have a level of proficiency which will allow them to follow university-level coursework in French); teaching assignment; evidence of professional commitment; future career plans in education; and letters of recommendation.

Application

Application forms are available on the AATF Web site [www.frenchteachers.org], or can be requested from National Headquarters. Forms can be duplicated.

Applicants should do the following:

- Complete both sides of the application form, and attach additional pages as necessary.
- (2) Submit two letters of recommendation enclosed with the application in sealed envelopes. (One of the letters should come from the principal, dean, or department chairperson, and one from someone who knows the candidate and his/ her work well.) These letters of recommendation should contain a serious, detailed evaluation of the applicant's profes-

sional and personal qualities.

- (3) Send application to AATF Summer Scholarships, Mailcode 4510, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, IL 62901.
- 5) The application must be **postmarked by February 15, 2009**, to be considered.

MOLIÈRE WORKSHOPS

North Park University French professor Jennifer Morrissey received an AATF Small Grant from the Chicago/Northern Illinois AATF Chapter and then a larger grant from the national AATF. The AATF monies allowed Dr. Morrissey to launch a three-part

program on Molière. Tim Mooney, a professional actor, producer, and translator of Molière's plays, led the first part of the program: an interactive actors' workshop.

Tim Mooney provided a biographical and historical account of Molière's life and times. Molière aimed to achieve the greatness of Corneille and Racine, and today his work is

most often compared with Shakespeare's. Students participated in scenes from *Tartuffe, Le Bourgeois gentilhomme, l'École des femmes,* and *le Malade imaginaire.* The actors' workshop was conducted in English, using Tim Mooney's translations.

A second seminar focused on pedagogical strategies for integrating role-play and readings from Molière into the French language curriculum. Guest speaker Larry Norman, a French professor from the University of Chicago and author of *The Public Mirror: Molière and the Social Commerce of Depiction*, began the seminar with a passionate discussion of Molière's relevance today and the political impact of farce. Next, Jennifer Morrissey described strategies in-

cluding four corners exercises, anticipation guides, readers' theatre, book-ina-box activities. inside-outside portraits, story maps, and pyramid think sheets. Judy Sugarman then introduced her FilmArobics series and described her philosophy of lan-

guage acquisition through film. She gave a lesson from her study of the film *Molière*.

The third part of the series of workshops on Moliere was *Molière Than Thou* by Tim Mooney. It is a 75-minute one-man-show featuring reenactments of famous scenes from *Tartuffe, le Bourgeois gentilhomme, l'École des femmes*, and *le Malade*

imaginaire. The English translations used were the actor's own. Tim Mooney called upon audience members to participate.

More than 300 high school students and faculty from Oak Park, Barrington, Niles, Freeport, Wilmette, and Chicago attended.

Students and faculty from DePaul, Dominican and North Park Universities also were there. Audience members gave Tim Mooney their full attention. Both quiet snickers and loud guffaws were heard. Seven students' names were drawn in a tom-

2009 AATF BOOK CLUB: PATRICK CHAMOISEAU'S CHEMIN-D'ÉCOLE

The 2009 AATF Book Club, continuing the theme of Education inaugurated by Pagnol's Le Temps des secrets, now proposes the marvelous autobiographical novel of a child beginning school in Martinique in the mid-20th century. Patrick Chamoiseau's Chemin-d'école, published in 1994, is the second volume of the trilogy Une Enfance créole. In the first volume, Antan d'Enfance (1990), the narrator explores memory, reconstituting a child's sensory perceptions and free-flowing imagination linked to meaningful geographical space—the space in and around his childhood home. The third volume, À bout d'enfance (2005), grapples with questions of change, of sexuality, and of death. As we would expect from the co-author of L'Éloge de la créolité, throughout the series Chamoiseau displays his fascination with language, memory, and Creole culture. As in his novels and plays, Chamoiseau never hesitates, when French is inadequate, to invent language using Creole roots.

Chemin-d'école is dedicated to all children who have shared the bittersweet experience of attending a colonial school system. The main character is referred to simply as the négrillon. In the first part of Chemin-d'école, entitled "Envie," the child longs to emulate his older brothers and sisters by going to school. The second, "Survie," recounts the trials and tribulations of the classroom as well as the conflict between the French ideal and the reality of the Creole experience.

When the boy's older siblings leave every morning for a mysterious destination, he remains alone in a house whose every nook and cranny he has already explored. Worn down by his constant begging, his mother first buys the négrillon a small book bag complete with slate and chalk, then finally takes him to a kindergarten where the teacher introduces him to such concepts as Winter and Spring and to stories of Sleeping Beauty or Cinderella. His mother is delighted, but his father complains about him sketching apples instead of mangoes. He experiments with chalk and slate, enthralled by the skill with which his siblings can recognize the meaning of words and capture reality with letters.

Leaving kindergarten, he finds himself in a real school. Here, fascination for learning is in constant conflict with his fear of the stern Schoolmaster, whose primary weapons are shame and mockery. The Schoolmaster, also a black Martinican, sees his role as bringing Civilization to the unenlightened masses. At the heart of Civilization is the French language, and consequently Creole must be rooted out. In spite of the child's terror, the Schoolmaster does become a

source of inspiration, opening up the world of books, of writing, and of the interplay of language.

One particular classmate finds a major place in the narration. Gros-Lombric is a country boy, skilled in math but mocked by his classmates and teacher because of his roots in the local culture. But Gros-Lombric explains the world of magic and remains unbowed by the Schoolmaster's sarcasm. If the Schoolmaster represents Universal French Culture, Gros-Lombric represents Creole Culture and becomes a model for the néarillon.

Some suggestions for discussion:

- Why does the négrillon long to attend school?
- Try to remember your first days of school and compare them to those of the négrillon.
- What makes school such an unpleasant experience?
- How does the Schoolmaster understand his role? Can we compare the purpose of school in this narrative to our own understanding of the role of education?
- What strategies does the négrillon use to survive in the classroom?
- Why does Gros-Lombric become such an important figure for the narrator?
- In the text, the narrator speaks to those he calls Répondeurs. Who are the répondeurs and what is their function?
- What elements of the text contribute to its oral nature?
- Think about the passages in which writing is evoked. Why is writing so important to the narrator?

AATF OUTSTANDING SENIOR IN FRENCH AWARD EXTENDED TO THE COLLEGE LEVEL

Beginning in 2003, the AATF established an Outstanding High School Senior in French Award. In 2005, the Executive Council voted to extend this award to the college/university level.

Any public or private secondary school or college/university student with at least one French teacher who is an AATF member may participate. Only one name per school per year will be accepted. In the event that there are multiple French teachers or professors in a given school or department, they must decide among themselves who the nominee will be and submit only one name to the AATF. In the event of multiple submissions, only the first name received will be considered for the award, based on postmark. The nomination must be made by a current AATF member.

To qualify for the award, a student must:

- have maintained an "A" average in French;
- have maintained a "B" average overall.
- be in his or her senior year at a public or private secondary school or at a public or private college or university:
- have demonstrated exceptional commitment to the study of French by participating in extracurricular activities related to French which may include but are not limited to the *Grand Concours*, study abroad, National French Week activities, or French Club, Pi Delta Phi, tutoring;
- at the time of graduation, have completed at least three years of formal French study:
- be a nonnative speaker of French;
- be nominated by an AATF member.

Only one student per school per year will be accepted.

Students will receive a certificate acknowledging their award and a press release to distribute to local media; a congratulatory letter will be sent to the principal or dean, and the student's name will be placed on the AATF Outstanding Senior Honor Roll on the AATF Web site. The registration fee for the award is \$25. For an additional \$10 fee, students can also receive an Outstanding Senior in French medal.

There is no deadline for this award. The nomination form is posted on the AATF Web site and can be found on page 30.

A ATF DOROTHY S. LUDWIG EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING AWARDS

The AATF invites nominations for four annual awards for outstanding teachers, one at each level: elementary school, middle school or junior high school, high school, and higher education (university, college, or community college). The purpose of the award is to recognize teachers who have demonstrated excellence and commitment in the teaching of the French language and French and Francophone cultures and literatures.

Each award winner will receive a framed certificate from the AATF recognizing his or her outstanding contribution to the teaching of French and a one-year complimentary membership in the AATF for 2010, a cash award, and a one-year subscription to *Le Français dans le monde.* An official presentation will be made at the AATF Awards Banquet in San Jose, California in July 2009.

Nominations may be made by any AATF member in good standing or by an AATF Chapter. The nominee must be an active member of the AATF. All documents must be submitted by **February 1**, 2009.

The selection committee will consist of two members of the AATF Executive Council and one member at large. Any nomination that does not conform to the guidelines below in length or content will not be considered. A teacher may receive the award only one time at a given level. If there is no suitable candidate at a given level, the AATF reserves the right not to make an award.

The AATF will acknowledge the recipients of the awards by sending a letter to their principal and/or supervisor and will issue a press release, if requested. The *National Bulletin* will include a feature article on the recipients.

TIME LINE

Because the awards will be presented at the annual convention, the postmark deadline for submitting all documents to the awards chairman will be **February 1, 2009.** Decisions will be made by March 1, 2009. Recipients will be notified by March 15 so that they can make arrangements to be present at the awards program.

REQUIRED QUALIFICATIONS

- Nominees must have a minimum of five years teaching experience at the level for which they are candidates and must be teaching currently at that level.
- 2. Nominees must have been members of the AATF for the past five consecutive years.
- 3. Current AATF officers are not eligible for these awards.
- 4. Nominees must have made a significant impact on students, school, and community at the award level.
- Nominees must be active participants in AATF activities locally, regionally, or nationally.

EVALUATION CRITERIA

Nomination packages will be evaluated for evidence of (1) outstanding teaching experience, (2) professional growth and development, and (3) contribution to the profession.

Evidence of outstanding teaching experience may include but is not limited to

- a. demonstration of students' exemplary proficiency in French, knowledge of French language and Francophone cultures and literatures, and motivation for continued study of French,
- increased enrollment or expansion of curricular offerings, or previous teaching awards,
- student participation in extracurricular French activities, exchange programs, internships, and competitions, or
- d. students' high performances in French on standardized tests.

Evidence of professional growth and development may include but is not limited to

- a. participation in AATF chapter and national activities,
- b. participation in foreign language conferences, workshops, and seminars,
- c. pursuit of advanced degrees and education, or
- d. grant-supported research, projects, workshops, or travel.
 Evidence of contributions to the profession may include but is not limited to
 - leadership and service in professional organizations, including the AATF,
 - research or presentations at conferences or publications in professional media, or
 - sponsorship of extracurricular activities or student exchange programs or other innovative programs.

NOMINATION PACKET

The nomination packet may not exceed a total of five pages and must include the following:

- 1. A résumé of education, teaching experience, membership and offices in professional organizations, AATF activities and other professional activities, and awards, using only the officially provided two-page form (found on the AATF Web site, from Chapter Presidents, and upon request from AATF Headquarters), so that all candidates will be compared in identical rubrics. This two-page required form constitutes pages one and two of the five-page packet. Cover letters from nominators will not be included as part of the five-page packet forwarded to the selection committee.
- A one-page personal statement by the nominee in which he or she addresses in detail the following topic: Of your contributions in and out of the classroom, of which are you the most proud? Explain your choice (page 3)
- 3. Two one-page letters of recommendation that address the candidate's teaching excellence, professional growth and development, and contributions to the profession. These two letters of recommendation are limited to one page each and constitute pages 4 and 5 of the five-page packet. They should come from colleagues or superiors who have first-hand professional knowledge of the candidate's classroom performance.
- All nominations and forms should be submitted together.
 PLEASE NOTE: the nomination packet should NOT be bound or presented in a scrapbook or folder.
- Submit the nomination packet to AATF Teacher Awards, Mailcode 4510, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, IL 62901. The nomination must be postmarked no later than February 1, 2009.

SUMMER LANGUAGE ACADEMY

The Middlebury-Monterey Language Academy (MMLA), an intensive summer language immersion for middle- and highschool students, completed its inaugural summer with great success. Some 620 students enrolled to study one of four languages (Arabic, Chinese, French, and Spanish) for four weeks at three different sites (Vermont, Massachusetts, and California).

The students ranged in age from 13 to 18 and hailed from all over the U.S. as well as a few international locations. French and Spanish proved to be equally the most popular languages of study.

Just like their Middlebury College Language School counterparts, MMLA students take the Language Pledge®, promising to speak only the target language at all times. Students are strongly and creatively encouraged to stay in the language, and most manage to do so despite the enormous challenge it presents for this age group.

One French student, while acknowledging that "by the end of the second week, you're pretty exhausted," credited MMLA and the Language Pledge® with her "phenomenal leaps in progress" and concluded that "this month was much better spent than actually going to France."

The MMLA experience is challenging; it's very hard work. But students who consistently invested effort and self-discipline reported major breakthroughs in their language. Upon returning home, one student reported, "My Chinese tutor here said after our first conversation after MMLA that I had improved so much it scared her."

Whether students were taking on the subjunctive in a small-group tutoring session, cooking Chinese soup noodles and fried rice, creating a Spanish music video, or studying the influence of soccer on Arab cultures and playing a game against the French team, they were fully immersed in the 24/7 language classroom. "There was this real sense of 'Yes, we're in school, yes, we're learning, but it's so much fun," summarized one parent.

For 2009, MMLA will offer Arabic, Chinese, French, and Spanish to students who have completed grade 7 through those who have completed grade 12.

Interest in MMLA was high last year—necessitating the creation of a wait list in February—and promises to be even higher for 2009 as the word gets out about the Academy's dynamic program. Admission to MMLA is selective, and MMLA encourages students to apply early at [www.mmla. middlebury.edu] or to call (802) 296-2459 for more information. AATF SMALL GRANTS

At the Liege Convention, the Executive Council again renewed the AATF Small Grants program for 2009 to support local projects by Chapter members who need an extra infusion of cash in order to get their project off the ground or to bring their project to completion. The total amount of funds available is \$5000, with the maximum award being \$500. Matching funds from the chapter to which the applicant belongs or from another source must be committed. In this way, it is hoped that the applicant can attract sufficient overall funding.

Application procedures and requirements remain the same as in previous years. A letter specifying the following should be sent to the Executive Director, Mailcode 4510, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, IL 62901 postmarked by March 1, 2009: (1) name of applicant and Chapter to which he/ she belongs; (2) a brief summary of the project, including purpose, individuals involved, inclusive dates; (3) total anticipated budget; (4) funds requested; (5) other sources of funds being sought, INCLUDING AMOUNT TO BE MATCHED FROM CHAP-TER TREASURY, if applicable (This must be attested to by the Chapter Secretary-Treasurer). PLEASE NOTE: Every year some interesting requests remain unfunded because of lack of financial support at the Chapter level; it is important to begin the application process AS SOON AS YOU READ THIS by alerting your Chapter officers to your upcoming request.

Applicants should remember that the basic purpose of this modest program is to aid those members who need supplementary funds to carry out a worthy project that would otherwise be unfunded or underfunded. Projects must bear a relationship to the purposes of the Association, namely furthering the study of French in the U.S., and be of potential benefit to other AATF members or to his/her students. Under no circumstances will awards be made to carry out strictly personal research or to travel abroad for the sake of general enlightenment. Members at all levels of instruction may apply.

A committee will evaluate the applications and determine the recipients. Preference will be given to new projects having a wide impact. Projects for National French Week 2009 are encouraged.

It is designed primarily for high school or college. Switzerland in Sight can be ordered in classroom sets of 10 plus a teacher manual, which provides ideas for use in the classroom.

There are also other materials that can be ordered:

- "Switzerland in its Diversity" Poster: one side of this fold-out poster is a scenic view, the other has statistical information and a time line.
- "Swissworld.org" postcard explaining a very useful and comprehensive Web site on Switzerland in detail.

L'Éducation et ses défis

LE DESTIN FABULEUX DE GREGORY LEMARCHAL (1983-2007)

«Le principal mot d'ordre à retenir c'est ça, c'est la rage».1

Il est rare qu'une vedette populaire de 23 ans ait le pouvoir d'émouvoir tout un pays, mais le cas du jeune Gregory Lemarchal est exceptionnel. Un beau garçon célèbre pour sa «voix d'ange» et pour son courage face à une grave maladie génétique, Gregory Lemarchal est devenu l'objet d'un culte d'adoration et dans sa vie et dans sa mort. Les Français ont fait sa connaissance en 2004, quand il a participé à la Star Academy. une émission de TF1 qui ressemble à notre American Idol, et a fini par remporter le titre avec 80% des votes. Pendant quatre mois, ils l'ont vu participer à toutes les épreuves présentées aux candidats de la Star Academy, et ceci sans broncher, sans se plaindre et, surtout, sans tousser. C'est pour cela que la nouvelle de sa mort le 30 avril 2007, des suites d'une mucoviscidose, a tant bouleversé ses milliers de fans qui avaient cru fermement que la volonté et l'énergie de Gregory allaient prendre le dessus sur sa maladie.

Gregory est né le 13 mai 1983, à la Tronche dans l'Isère au sud-est de la France. Quand il arrive à l'âge de vingt mois, ses parents s'inquiètent de sa santé et l'amènent chez le médecin. Ils découvrent qu'il est atteint de la mucoviscidose (fibrose kystique), maladie qui est le plus souvent diagnostiquée dans l'enfance, lorsqu'on observe un retard de croissance et de poids, des infections bronchiques fréquentes et des troubles digestifs. Les symptômes associés à cette maladie sont les suivants: mucus épais dans les poumons, infections pulmonaires, essoufflement constant, problèmes digestifs, toux persistante, fatigue et malnutrition. Malheureusement, l'espérance de vie d'un enfant atteint d'une forme sévère de cette maladie est de trente et un ans,2 et il n'existe que des traitements pour calmer les symptômes: oxygène, antibiotiques, drainage et massage des poumons, régime hypercalorique.

Au lieu de lui obliger de ralentir le pas, ce diagnostic semble pousser Gregory à vivre la vie à fond. En 1995, à l'âge de 12 ans, il devient champion français du rock acrobatique, défiant ainsi toutes les règles imposées aux victimes de la «muco». Paradoxalement, Gregory semble même reconnaissant d'avoir à subir cette maladie parce qu'à son avis : «Si je n'avais pas eu la muco, peut-être que je ne serais jamais devenu chanteur. Peut-être que je serais devenu, je ne sais pas, moi, maçon ou architecte. Je ne sais rien du tout!» Son aventure avec la chanson commence par

hasard après quelques séances très réussies de karaoké. En 1999, il participe à l'émission *Graines de Star* (émission de la chaîne M6) où il se fait remarquer pour sa voix et son beau sourire, sans pour autant être retenu. Ce n'est qu'en 2004 que tous ses efforts donnent des fruits quand il réussit à impressionner les réalisateurs de *Star Academy* pendant son casting.

Star Académy, une émission de téléréalité de la chaîne TF1 dont le présentateur est Nikos Aliagas, comprend un concours de chant tout comme American Idol. Comme son homologue américain, l'émission attire un très grand nombre de spectateurs, et pour la finale en 2004, presque neuf millions de Français ont assisté au triomphe de Gregory. Ce qui différencie cette émission de la version américaine c'est que les téléspectateurs suivent tout aussi bien les hauts et les bas de la vie commune des concurrents («élèves» ou «académiciens») pendant leur entraînement professionnel et leur temps libre passé dans un grand château (ou dans un hôtel particulier dans le Marais à Paris, comme en 2008). Les élèves n'ont que deux heures de vie privée par jour parce que les caméras fixées à chaque coin du château enregistrent leur vie 22 heures sur 24.

Après un casting fait pendant l'été, un jury choisit de seize à dix-huit candidats qui seront peu à peu éliminés en quatre mois de programmation quotidienne. De septembre à décembre, TF1 diffuse une émission journalière de 45-50 minutes où les spectateurs assistent aux meilleurs (et aux pires) moments des cours de danse et de chant et aux péripéties de la vie commune des candidats. Le vendredi soir, l'animateur célèbre Nikos Aliagos présente un «prime» de deux à trois heures pendant lequel un «élève» parmi trois «nominés» est sauvé par le public, un autre est sauvé par ses collèques et le troisième est éliminé.

Pour Gregory, le point tournant dans la compétition est arrivé le 5 novembre 2005, lors d'un prime pendant lequel il a chanté, accompagné d'un orchestre, la magnifique chanson de *Starmania* «S.O.S d'un terrien en détresse». Cette chanson avait été d'abord interprétée par Daniel Balavoine, chanteur très célèbre mort le 14 janvier 1986, dans un accident d'hélicoptère pendant que celui-ci installait des pompes à eau en Afrique tout en suivant la course automobile Paris-Dakar. C'est pendant son interprétation brillante de cette chanson prémonitoire, que certains disent maudite, que Gregory a réussi à dépasser le caractère

superficiel d'un concours télévisé de talent pour pénétrer dans le cœur du public français. Les paroles qui semblaient décrire sa vie, les questions métaphysiques, sa voix de cristal, son regard pénétrant: tout a contribué à rendre sa performance inoubliable et magique.

> Pourquoi je vis, Pourquoi je meurs Pourquoi je ris, pourquoi je pleure Voici le S.O.S D'un terrien en détresse J'ai jamais eu les pieds sur Terre J'aimerais mieux être un oiseau Je suis mal dans ma peau⁴

Même ceux qui n'aimaient pas *Star Academy* et qui n'avaient pas apprécié Gregory ont été éblouis par sa luminosité ce soir-là:

Je n'étais pas «fan» de Gregory, mais il m'a pourtant ému lors d'un prime, en chantant à la perfection une chanson pourtant très difficile qu'un seul et unique chanteur avait réussie avant lui: le «S.O.S. d'un terrien en détresse» de *Starmania*! Ce soir-là, Gregory ne se contenta pas de chanter, il enchantera le prime comme Balavoine lui-même avait enchanté *Starmania* en son temps, arrivant même à atteindre les aigus les plus élevés, que seul le regretté Daniel Balavoine avait la possibilité d'atteindre avant lui...⁵

La participation de Gregory dans Star Academy a eu l'heureuse conséquence de donner une visibilité à la mucoviscidose et à sensibiliser le public français à ses effets sur les corps. Pour cela, le professionnalisme et stoïcisme de Gregory a beaucoup ému les spectateurs et lui a gagné le respect de ses co-académiciens. Dans un entretien au lendemain de sa victoire. Gregory avait expliqué la philosophie de vie qui l'a toujours guidé malgré l'omniprésence de la mucoviscidose: «J'ai réussi à surpasser la maladie jusqu'à maintenant parce que je vais au-delà d'où j'ai mal. Ça veut dire que j'arrive à la repousser ou même à franchir cet obstacle, à rechercher ce qui est le plus positif en bas. Et euh, et ça sort. C'est vrai que ca vient vraiment du fond du ventre».6 Et en effet, il ne se ralentit pas du tout, partant en tournée avec ses collègues de Star Ac', enregistrant un album (Je deviens moi) qui est rapidement certifié platinum. Les chansons les plus connus de cet album, «Je deviens moi». «Je suis en vie». «Même si ». «À corps perdu» et «Une Vie moins

ordinaire», ont toutes un certain rapport avec la réalité que vit Gregory, comme on peut le voir dans le refrain de «Je suis en vie»:

> Je suis en vie Ça n'a pas de prix Ce n'est pas à vendre Je suis en vie Je respire et j'espère Que tu seras tendre⁷

En janvier 2006, le premier album de Gregory est auréolé de l'un des honneurs les plus importants que l'on puisse recevoir en tant qu'artiste francophone: «la Révélation francophone de l'année» aux NRJ Music Awards. Rien ne semble pouvoir l'arrêter, et il passera les six mois à venir à travailler furieusement sur un nouvel album et à donner des concerts. En mai et juin 2006, il part en tournée, donnant même trois concerts complets à l'Olympia, un des musichalls le plus prestigieux de France. Il est ravi aussi de son nouveau rôle de porte-parole pour la mucoviscidose, et il va souvent dans des hôpitaux, accompagné de la chanteuse Liane Foly, pour rendre visite à des enfants souffrant de cette maladie. Bien que suivi d'une équipe de médecins, le rythme de cette vie de star lui devient difficile à supporter; cependant Gregory semble heureux et motivé. Il parle de sa soif de vivre dans un entretien: «Une grosse partie de la philosophie de ma vie, c'est, ça veut dire que, peu importe les merdes et tout ça, il faut y aller, il faut foncer. Et puis sans se retourner, et puis voilà. Qu'on puisse se dire voilà, j'ai tout donné, et puis malgré les merdes que j'ai pu avoir, au moins je n'ai pas de regret et puis voilà».8

Quelques mois avant sa mort, Gregory annonce une pause dans sa carrière pour des raisons de santé, ce qui ne l'empêche pas pourtant d'enregistrer une chanson avec son amie Hélène Ségara. Il meurt le 30 avril 2007, entouré de sa famille et quelques amis dans l'attente d'une greffe de poumons. Les fans de Gregory ont tout de suite érigé partout en France, de petits autels décorés de roses blanches, devenues le symbole de la pureté de Gregory. Pour honorer sa mémoire, TF1 a organisé un événement télévisé relativement spontané qui a eu lieu juste quatre jours après sa mort. Beaucoup de stars y ont participé: Patrick Bruel, Hélène Ségara, Lara Fabian, Marc Lavoine, Pascale Obispo, Céline Dion et beaucoup d'anciens concurrents à la Star Academy. À peu près dix millions et demi de spectateurs ont regardé cette émission qui a récolté 7,5 millions d'euros pour l'association «Vaincre la Mucoviscidose». Et un mois plus tard, en juin 2007, sa famille a fondé «l'Association Gregory Lemarchal» pour lutter contre la mucoviscidose [www.associationgregorylemarchal.com/accueil.html] et dont la devise est «Pour que plus jamais la mucoviscidose nous arrache à ceux qu'on aime...».

The AATF now has a Commission on Advocacy to defend your French program, whether you are a member or not.

We have a Web site to explain our goals and objectives entitled Ideas for French Language & Culture Advocacy in the U.S. [www.utm.edu/staff/globeg/advofr.shtml] with a number of state-specific Web sites and informational databases linked to it.

What do we do? We work with you to develop a group of local and state allies (at school, in business, in the local and state political scene, among parents, etc.). We help you develop a corpus of local-specific knowledge and give you state-specific reasons why French is important. Among these allies, in most cases we can put you in contact with a chapter advocacy team.

What kind of knowledge do we offer? Recent economic, demographic, historical knowledge about your state that can be openers with power brokers or part of a winning argument in a debate. We offer the addresses of valuable contacts from consulates, state supervisors, your state's AATF chapters, regional chapters of the *Alliance française*, and many more.

What else will we do? We will help you create a game plan, and then play an appropriate role in its execution.

Though we cannot guarantee to thwart the bad guys, we can be your best chance to save a good program, provided you let us know early enough. Of course, AATF members receive regular news of what we are doing through our paper publications and on our Web site [www.frenchteachers. org].



SALUT LES JEUNES

métro - boulot - dodo

The expression *métro-boulot-dodo* (subway-work-sleep) is how many a Parisian might describe his life! Clearly using the *métro* is second nature for any Parisian and the *métro* holds a fascination for tourists visiting the city. Created in 1900, it is efficient, often crowded, often beautiful, filled with wonderful publicity on the walls, often filled with music, and many stations are decorated in a unique way. Any family who visits Paris from my school now knows to bring back used *métro* tickets for my students and extra *métro* maps from hotels. If you don't have the real thing, though, you can visit one of several Web sites under Paris *métro* and you can print tickets in color (*un ticket*) for your students and a copy of the map (*le plan du métro*). Blow up the map as large as possible for classroom use. I ordered a full-sized *métro* map from Teacher's Discovery [www.Teachersdiscovery.com] or 1-800-832-2437) which I post on the wall and have the students write their name on a ticket and place it anywhere on the map. That spot becomes the location of their hotel. They will learn to describe the *métro* route from that hotel to a monument in Paris for their classmates. Then they choose the monument they are going to visit from a collection of postcards.

Explain that the system is really quite easy! *C'est facile!* Each line has a number and all they need to find is the name at the end of the line to indicate the direction they will travel. If they have to change lines, that's called *une correspondance*. We use the sample below as a class to learn the procedure, then students have to figure out their individual *métro* trip on their own. If it becomes confusing, some Web sites will describe the route from start to finish for you!

Some useful vocabulary:

RATP = Régie autonome des Transports parisiens (métro)
RER = Réseau Express Régional (connects metro to suburbs)
une station de métro = une "gare"
le guichet = où on va pour acheter un ticket
un carnet de dix (10 tickets) = C'est moins cher.
Formule 1 = un billet pour une journée
Paris Visite = un billet pour 3 - 5 jours
un Coupon jaune = un billet pour 6 jours
une Carte orange = un billet pour un mois
une correspondance = Si la route n'est pas directe, il faut changer de train.

AATF SEEKING NOMINATIONS FOR VICE PRESIDENT

The Nominating Committee is asking all AATF members to submit nominations for the position of AATF Vice-President for the term 2010-2012.

According to the constitution, the duties of AATF Vice-Presidents are as follow: "The Vice-Presidents shall oversee particular Association functions or undertake special projects as determined by the Executive Council." Further explanations have been developed as follow:

To serve and assist at the discretion of the President:

by attending executive council meetings;

by attending the full annual conference of the AATF:

through excellent communication skills:

through designated areas of focus germane to the concerns of the AATF;

To support and promote the mission of the AATF [www.frenchteachers.org/hq/ aatfmiss.htm].

To facilitate program development by supporting permanent concerns of the AATF

promotion and advocacy; recruitment;

leadership development.

Additional areas of focus could in-

clude, but are not limited to: development of materials centers; development of resource packets; development of Web sites; inter-commission liaison:

grants and scholarships:

workshops and other presenta-

support of commission projects as needed;

correspondence with allies (local politicians, PTO, business executives, etc.);

To initiate one or more special projects based on individual's area of interest and expertise as it meets with the AATF's mission and focus.

To submit an annual written progress report to the President.

Nominees for the position of Vice-President should have made significant contributions to the AATF on the Chapter level as well as in their region or even on the national level and should possess leadership qualities.

The term of office of the Vice-President begins on January 1. The Vice-President is "limited to two consecutive terms of three years or one term if over a year has been served just previously in filling a vacancy."

Keeping these terms and qualifications

in mind, we ask that all of you consider possible candidates for this position. The term of office will begin on January 1, 2010 and run for three years, renewable for another three years.

The committee will present a slate of two candidates and an alternate for this position to the Executive Council for its consideration at the Annual Meeting in San Jose in July. In addition, we ask chapter presidents and other colleagues to submit nominations.

We ask that you check with the person or persons whom you nominate to be certain that they are willing to run for office and that they understand the terms of office and duties of the office of Vice-President. You may send their CV at the time of nomination or it may be sent later, but should arrive by the closing date for nominations, March 1, 2009. The CV should stress the work of the person with AATF as well as other languagerelated organizations. It shall be limited to no more than five (5) pages in length. If additional information is required, the committee will request it. While publications and career paths are important they should not be the primary focus of the CV.



SMALL GRANT REPORT: LE MAINE FRANCOPHONE: HIER ET AUJOURD'HUI

To commemorate the 400th anniversary of Champlain's founding of the city of Quebec, Casco Bay High School (CBHS) students prepared a documentary exhibit entitled "Le Maine Francophone: Hier et Aujourd'hui "which told the story of Franco-Americans in Maine. The exhibit took place at the Franco-American Heritage Center in Lewiston, Maine in June 2008.

From January through June 2008, Casco Bay High School French students went to La Rencontre, the monthly lunch at the Franco-American Heritage Center in Lewiston, where they interviewed Franco-Americans from the Lewiston area. The individuals whom the CBHS students interviewed will be the subjects of the documentary exhibit. Each interview focused on a theme in the history of Franco-Americans in Lewiston. Students also read portions and analyzed data presented in "La genèse s'une communauté canadienne-française en nouvelle-angleterre: Lewiston, Maine, 1800-1880." (mai 1988). (Thèse présentée à l'École des gradués de l'Université Laval pour l'obtention du grade de Philosophe Doctor (Ph.D.), Faculté des Lettres, Université Laval, Québec). In the process, CBHS students conducted their interviews in French to use the language in an authentic wav.

Thanks to the support from the AATF Small Grants Program, students were able to travel to Lewiston to conduct the interviews. In addition, we were able to welcome a Franco-Amercian Panel to Casco Bay High School. The panel included Rita Dubé, Executive Director of the Franco-American Heritage Center; Yvon Labbé, Director of the Franco-American Center in Orono, Maine; David Vermette, a Franco-American researcher: and Lillian Richard, a Franco-American from Rumford, Maine, The \$500 dollars from the AATF Small Grants Program was matched by funds and donated services from the Maine Community Foundation, The Franco-American Heritage Center (Lewiston, Maine), The Portland Educational Partnership, and The Franco-American Center (Orono, Maine).

Some student reactions to the project include the following:

I am enjoying this project very much...I absolutely LOVE going up to Lewiston and meeting the adorable old people who really enjoy telling us their story. They're not afraid to tell us things and I really think that's great because a lot of negative things happened to them. I also appreciate the respect between the two age groups. The teens are respecting the older folk and they're respecting us, which is hard to find these days. As a

teenager, a lot of people think we're awful people. I really am enjoying this.

I did not know anything about Franco-



Americans, except for the fact that my grandfather is French Canadian. But I didn't know anything about his family history at all. So everything I've learned in our studies has been new information to me.

I wouldn't say it has changed [my knowledge of the Franco-American Experience], but my knowledge has most certainly grown. I always have known a bit about Franco-Americans in Maine, but more so in Manchester, New Hampshire. This year I really feel a connection between my family in New Hampshire and what I have been learning about in Maine.

The successful applicant will be a senior scholar in the field of language education with proven capabilities, high standards in research, writing and publication, and editorial experience, including familiarity with the electronic-text-to-printed-page process. The Editor is served by a Managing Editor who corresponds with submitting authors, schedules volunteer reviewers, communicates suggested revisions to authors, and edits all contents of the journal. THE TÊTE-A -TÊTE INITIATIVE

"I struggle with decisions and lesson plans. The classroom atmosphere is very bad—if you could find someone to help me that would be great. I am hoping for a mentor who can help me with difficult topics and with lesson plans."

"I've been teaching multi-grades and am the only French teacher. The specialty in our school is Spanish. I feel as if I'm doing too much but not enough....I'm beginning to feel very discouraged about what I'm doing, but there's no one to tell me that what I'm doing is good. Would it be possible for you to find someone in my area who would be willing to mentor me?"

"I'd like to get an idea of what other teachers at my level are doing and how they teach so that I can improve my teaching. I have no one to support me. I want to make this a strong program."

"Madame: I have had many setbacks. The administration has decided to offer French only in the upper grades with students of different levels put into the same classroom. The students are losing interest since these changes were initiated and several have now quit. I may lose my job."

Have you ever had these feelings, fears, and doubts? Have you met a foreign language teacher battling some of these same problems? I personally met one of these discouraged colleagues during a shopping excursion. The woman helping me with my French purchase commented on my beautiful pronunciation as I asked her for the French product. I smiled and told her that I should be able to pronounce it as a French teacher with 35 years of teaching and touring experience. She nearly jumped over the counter to embrace me. She was a French teacher working "after-hours" in a French store. She desperately needed help with her French program, as it was being phased out in favor of another language. I told her about what we had done to combat the same problem when it occurred in my school district. We talked at length about possibilities, and I e-mailed her during that school year to give her support.

As I shared this interesting experience with Margot Steinhart, she asked if I would be willing to initiate a National Mentoring Program for the AATF. Suzanne Hendrickson, Chair of the Articulation Commission, and Diana Regan, former Region IV Representative (PA) began working on this initiative with me in 2004. Across the nation, we have had great response from chapters who want to become involved in fostering communication among French teachers. Each chapter has been asked to designate a Mentoring Coordinator whom we can contact when we get requests for help. Chapter Coordinators can also e-mail us the names

of their volunteer mentors for our new data base. Suzanne and I will then pair a volunteer with the colleague asking for help.

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YOUR FRENCH PROGRAM IS WORTH SAVING

What are some of the challenges of declining enrollments? (1) assessing the future of graduate literature programs; (2) going beyond literature to attract majors; (3) encouraging vs. discouraging split majors; (4) dwindling enrollments in grades 5-8; (5) attracting students; (6) assessing the usefulness of French.

What are some of the negative attitudes that might thwart language teaching? (1) language as enrichment rather than core subject; (2) language as part of a gifted/talented or special project; (3) language not part of a "school-to-work" curriculum; (4) languages and literatures as "high culture" subjects; (5) difficulty recruiting qualified teachers; (6) funding shortfalls; funding is presently based on literacy and numeracy; (7) relative difficulty of learning a language; (8) reduced contact hours; (9) global studies programs with no language requirement.

What is advocacy and how does it differ from promotion?

Promotion is advertising; we tell people what we want them to know about French. La Semaine du français is a prime example of this type of campaign. Those who are advocates respond to more fundamental problems at a program level—how to retain or increase necessary funding for a program; how to avoid cuts in requirements or to increase requirements, how to impact school board policies affecting languages.

Former AATF Vice-President Barbara Ransford described her personal battle with the Arkansas legislature when, during her tenure as AATF Chapter President, a Senator proposed Spanish as the primary foreign language in the state. Ransford related her scramble to round up a coalition of colleagues who could testify about the importance of many languages and thus prevent the bill from being passed. Ransford stressed the need to be vigilant, to watch which way the politicians are leaning, and to put together a defensive team before it is needed. "Don't sit back!" she urged members. "Know your constituency and be vocal."

Teachers who promote French and teachers who advocate for French need to work together, and often their efforts will overlap. They need to build their own resources: (1) find local business people who promote languages in their business; (2) outline French moments in American and local history; (3) locate well-known people in your state/community who speak French; (4) profile the local school districts and colleges/universities in your area; and (5) use available resources such as the French Embassy or Consulates, Invest in France Agency, Alliances

françaises, French-American Chamber of Commerce, world trade organizations, etc.

The AATF Advocacy Depot provides many ideas for chapters on how to mobilize their troops at the grass roots level. Former AATF Vice-President "Tennesse" Bob Peckham has developed templates for "New York Needs French/Tennessee Needs French" and encourages local advocates to begin to gather information on the status of French in their state for their own "state Web page." He also needs stories of advocacy projects-those which have worked as well as those which have not-to document and pass on to others. 



WALTER JENSEN SCHOLARSHIP FOR STUDY ABROAD

Thanks to the generosity of the late Walter Jensen, the AATF is able to offer a scholarship for study abroad to a future teacher of French. Income from gifts of stock given by Mr. Jensen will fund one \$1500 scholarship per year to help a student pay for a semester or year's study abroad. This award is intended to allow a deserving student to participate in a long-term study abroad experience he or she might not otherwise be able to afford. This award will be made for the academic year 2009-2010.

Eligibility Requirements


The student applicant must be at least 18 years of age at the time of application and enrolled in an established teacher education program (B.A., B.S., or M.A.T.) in French. Applications for independent study abroad trips or summer programs will not be considered. The applicant must be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident and a non-native speaker of French. He or she must be recommended by an AATF member teacher.

Scholarship

The \$1500 scholarship will be paid directly to the study abroad program of the winner's choice to cover tuition, fees, travel, or housing costs for a semester-long or one-year study abroad program in a Francophone country. The recipient may attend an established program in any Francophone country that is accredited by his or her American university. Students may also attend established programs sponsored by universities other than their own providing credit is transferable. Cash payments will not be made directly to recipients.
