Ensuite vous visiterez le site de transmission culturelle Uashassihtsh. Vous ferez d'authentique rencontres avec des artisans qui observent toujours les techniques ancestrales. Enfin, une dégustation de banik et de thé vous sera proposée. Coût: \$100 US (spouses/quests welcome).

Accès

The AATF will organize shuttles between the Quebec City Airport and the Montagnais Hotel. Shuttle schedules will be determined based on flight schedules but generally this will mean departing the airport toward Saguenay in the late afternoon and leaving Saguenay in the early morning. If you plan of using our shuttle, schedule your flights accordingly to arrive in Quebec City by 4 p.m. and to depart Quebec City after 12 p.m. The cost will be \$50 US per person one-way or \$85 US round-trip. Shuttles will be offered on July 5, 6, 7, 8, 11, 12, 13 providing that a minimum of 15 people sign up. In the event a shuttle is cancelled, the amount paid will be refunded. Schedules will be confirmed at least 2 weeks in advance.

bec. If you have never visited the region, now is the time to explore this wonderland. Located about two hours north of Quebec City, Saguenay boasts that it is *un fjord, une ville*. It includes Chicoutimi, where our hotel, the Montagnais, is located, Jonquière, and La Baie, which you will have the opportunity to visit. Not far from beautiful Lac St-Jean, the Saguenay region boasts of lakes, mountains, valleys, and a magnificent fjord. It provides opportunities for numerous outdoor activities and offers breathtaking scenery.

Chicoutimi traces its history back to the French fur merchants and trappers in the late seventeenth-century. The fur trading post operated until 1782. With the arrival of the Canadian National Railroad, the economy shifted to timber and paper-making. You can visit La Pulperie, an industrial complex in operation from 1898 to 1910, now a museum. Here you will become familiar with the culture of the region. Chicoutimi is currently an administrative, cultural, and educational center. The University of Ouebec at Chicoutimi is an impressive center of learning and research. It is especially noted for its work in aluminum, forestry, and geology. Its professors also conduct extensive research in linguistics. The

will soon be seeing it in person!

In Saguenay, you can add to the immersion in natural beauty a true French immersion. Here everyone speaks French! You will also have the opportunity to meet other teachers of French and to exchange ideas. We have many and varied presentations which will enrich your professional life and give you new ideas for your classes. Some of our participants will be part of the Leadership Program, which enables current and future AATF officers to develop techniques for success. You might want to meet them this year, and consider nominating someone for next year. You can also meet the Commission chairs and members. Consider joining one of them vourself, and become more involved in the AATF.

If you cannot attend the convention, you can still participate in AATF activities. Read and contribute to the *National Bulletin* and *The French Review*. Attend your local Chapter meetings. Congrès

NEW MIDDLE SCHOOL HONOR SOCIETY

The AATF and the Société Honoraire de Français (SHF) are pleased to announce the formation of a new honor society for middle and elementary school students. Full details can be found on the Honor Society Web page at [www.frenchteachers.org/jaf].

The new society, called Jeunes Amis du Français (JAF), was approved by vote of the SHF sponsors. The Jeunes Amis du Français will function similarly to the SHF. SOCIÉTÉ HONORAIRE DE FRANÇAIS



CHICAGO RALLIES IN SOLIDARITY WITH THE FRENCH

Chicago-area Francophiles gathered in Daley Plaza on a bitterly cold and snow-covered Sunday afternoon, January 11, to show solidarity with France after the terrorist attacks in Paris on January 7 at *Charlie Hebdo* in the 11th arrondissement and on January 9 at a kosher supermarket near the *Porte de Vincennes*. The Chicago rally organizers urged attendees to honor the victims and to manifest support for democratic values, freedom and tolerance, in tandem with the civil march in Paris on the same day.

About 600 people, according to the organizers, filled Daley Plaza during the rally that began about 3:00 and lasted until 4:30. Organizers Eve Zuckerman, president of the French Club at the University of Chicago, and Vladimir Miraton, undergraduate student in business at Purdue University North Central, both spoke at the event. Asked to bring pens, pencils, flags, candles, and support signs to the rally, the crowd brandished many "Je suis Charlie" signs and French and American flags, while chanting affirmations of unity. They also sang "La Marseillaise" and lit votive candles lined in rows, placing some in front of heart-shaped signs bearing the names of the French victims. A minute of silence was held to honor the victims—journalists, cartoonists, hostages, and police officers.



Organizer Eve Zuckerman, who has French and American citizenship, reflected,"I was impressed and heartened by the crowd, which, despite the cold, reacted with great vigor every time I would shout out: 'Are you afraid?' 'No!' And I was humbled by their profound respect and emotion when we listed the names of the deceased together. It was an incredibly powerful—and necessary—moment I will never forget." Vladimir Miraton, a second organizer, added, "During the lighting of the candles, a few people came to me and thanked me profusely, in a way I never thought they would. It was actually touching to see that the event made a difference."

Radio, television, and print media covered the event. A number of AATF members attended the rally and when interviewed were asked why they had come to the rally. The following day, Meredith Rodriguez, *Chicago Tribune* reporter, wrote, "Three American teachers of French held "Je Suis Charlie" signs and said they attended the rally to make a statement for free speech and tolerance and to show solidarity with the French,

who marched the same day at *Place de la Nation*, a public square in Paris."

This rally in Chicago was remarkable for a number of reasons. It was initiated by two young people, initially unacquainted, who used their resources and called upon their allies to spread the word to Francophiles

and within a very short period of time, to stage this event. The catalyst was Vladimir Miraton, a French citizen, who felt a moral obligation to be part of the momentum of solidarity that was building in France. He was aware of the event with 200 people that the French Club of the University of Chicago had held at the Alliance française de Chicago on the same day as the Charlie Hebdo massacre, but he wanted to be part of an event that would bring more French and Americans together. He felt that there was a choice either one could take "refuge" out of fear or one could stand united. He saw that France had chosen unity and wanted that choice to be offered to the French and American communities in the Chicago

region. He contacted the French Consulate in Chicago and was connected to the press and communications attachée, Pascale Furlong, and to Eve Zuckerman, who had coordinated the rally on January 7 at the Alliance française de Chicago. Madame Furlong was instrumental in contacting a number of French community associations through social media and the American media about the event and in providing large French flags for the event. Eve Zuckerman found support from the French Consulate, the Alliance française de Chicago, the Groupe Professionnel Françophone, French in Chicago, ADFE (Association démocratique des Français de l'étranger—Français du Monde), and Digiworld. Through her contacts, she was able to acquire city permission to use Daley Plaza for a rally, a megaphone, and signs, and to increase public awareness of the event. Messages were sent to many regional Francophones and groups, asking that the announcement about the rally in two days be shared widely with the hashtag "NousSommesCharlie."

In January, rallies of solidarity were held in a number of cities across the country, by religious and civic groups, on college campuses, and by Francophone and Francophile organizations. French teachers/AATF members, active and retired, are frequently members of other Francophile groups. For example, following the lead of the rallies in Chicago, members of the *Alliance française du North Shore*, in the north suburbs, held their own rally on January 19 to demonstrate their solidarity with the French and for expression of free speech. Members sang "La Marseillaise," prepared signs,

waved French flags, and raised pens and pencils to show their support. After a moment of silence to remember those who had lost their lives, the attendees formed French conversation groups to discuss the events in Paris and the resulting questions about free speech and tolerance.

At this Alliance française event, the connection that AATF had to the cartoonist, Cabu, one of the victims at Charlie Hebdo, was shared as an anecdote. Twenty-five years ago, Jean-Noël Rey, Deputy French Cultural Attaché in Chicago, invited Cabu to contribute an original cartoon for a promotional brochure produced by the AATF (Chicago/ Northern Illinois Chapter) in association with the French Cultural Service in Chicago. The AATF and the Cultural Services of the French Embassy in the U.S. then published the brochure, which was distributed across the country. With the title, "French is more than...," Cabu's cartoon, playfully and perhaps irreverently, captures some of the long-time stereotypes that Americans imagine when they think about Paris—a couple embracing, a seductive Parisienne, a rotund, mustachioed bartender in a long apron, a motorcyclist, the metro, the French lottery, and, naturally, the Eiffel Tower. Of course, the American is represented stereotypically as well, a student wearing a baseball cap and sipping a soda!

The tragic events of January 2015 have certainly encouraged numerous public demonstrations and expressions of solidarity with the French. They have also vigorously renewed conversations about terrorism, free speech, tolerance, and democratic values. Likewise, AATF members, who have been witness to the events through the media and sometimes present at rallies of solidarity, have also been inspired to engage their students in these same debates, which touch not only France, but also the world.



GRANDMOTHERS IN SCHOOLS CREATE CHANGE IN SENEGAL

In the Velingara area of southern Senegal, adolescent girls face many challenges that may hinder their development and well-being, including early and forced marriage, teen pregnancy, female genital mutilation (FGM), and leaving school at an early age. The U.S. international non-profit organization Grand-

mother Project— Change through Culture (GMP) has developed an innovative, and successful, approach to addressing these concerns. Recognizing the central role of grandmothers in matters related to women and children in non-Western cultures, GMP employs a grandmotherinclusive strategy to harness their knowledge and



GMP was co-founded in 2005 by Dr. Judi Aubel, anthropologist and health educator, and grew out of a series of successful experiences involving grandmothers as leaders of change in community maternal and child health programs in Laos, Senegal, Mali, Uzbekistan, Albania, and Mauritania. In each case it was found that involving grandmothers contributed to improved outcomes. A pioneering approach to community development evolved from this work that leverages cultural strengths, and family and community systems to bring about lasting change. This approach is vastly different from many development initiatives, which primarily focus on changing the attitudes and behaviors of young people.

GMP's holistic strategy includes a focus on schools as community institutions directly related to children's well-being. Of particular concern is the impact of early marriage and/or teen pregnancy on young girls' education. Teenage pregnancy is partly due to girls attending school and moving beyond the scope of family supervision. Parents fear that if girls continue at school beyond puberty they risk getting pregnant. Therefore, as a preventive measure, they often take

them out of school and marry them off to avoid a pregnancy out of wedlock, which would ensure that the girl would never have a "proper marriage." A lack of communication and trust between schools and families, and communities in general, contributes to this ongoing problem.

To address these issues, GMP works



to unite communities and schools by integrating positive cultural values into school materials and classroom curricula, and to involve grandmothers as resource persons in classrooms. This strategy, which has received the support of the Ministry of Education in Senegal, has included the production of a series of booklets and other tools in French to assist teachers with student activities around traditional knowledge and culture. These efforts have resulted in increased trust and improved relationships between parents, and grandparents, and teachers. More girls are staying in school and this shift has contributed to reduced teen pregnancy and changes in family attitudes about early and forced marriage.

How can AATF members help with this work? GMP relies on bilingual volunteers for document translation from English into French and from French into English, as well as for post-translation proofreading and editing to ensure the quality of each translation. Translation projects include documents of varying lengths, such as articles and reports on GMP's work, and are dependent on the availability of each volunteer. FUTURE LEADER FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM MEMOIRES 2014

If you are considering applying for the Future Leaders Fellowship program to pursue an active leadership role in your AATF chapter, I highly encourage you to participate. The Western New York Chapter nominated me to attend

last July. I met eight passionate AATF Future Leader candidates at the program and learned how their chapters strive to support French teachers and their students in instruction and enrichment of the French language and Francophone world. I would like to share with you AATF experiences I have also experienced first hand to advocate French language study.

At the Future Leaders Fellowship Pre-convention Program, we met several key people in the **Executive Council including Pres**ident, Mary Helen Kashuba, SSJ, Executive Director, Jayne Abrate and Co-Founder of Future Leaders and Past-President, Ann Sunderland. Leadership Director Janel Lafond-Paguin introduced us to several AATF members that work at the national level to help us discover the various tools that Headquarters offer to advocate for French teachers and instruction, including participation in the National French Contest and French National Honor Society as well as the importance of membership

recruitment and program advocacy in

our schools.

During the pre-convention program, the candidates shared strategies for AATF membership recruitment and advocacy that we have pursued in our home chapters. In my chapter, I have been actively helping with researching potential school district sites to add to our chapter e-mail list. We hope to reach out to French teachers to become members and to have them participate more actively in our events. For instance, last May, I chaired a French Immersion chapter committee. My building hosted a High School French Immersion Day for all students in Grades 8 through 12 in our community. Our collaborative committee of twelve enthusiastic high school and university French teachers provided workshops and supervised the four-hour event. For our first year, we had over 50 students participate from both public and private schools. We also received donations from our chapter National

French Contest and individual local supermarkets (four stores donating food gift cards to our school events in the community). Students enjoyed participating in our opener game, *Qui*, receiving their *passeport* program comprised of

four workshops at their level, a Frenchstyle pique-nique buffet and then a final group activity. Ability levels were broken into Grades 8, 9 and 10, 11 and 12, correlating to our state checkpoints A, B and C. At the end, we stamped their French Immersion Day passeports to show their own French teacher their participation and attendance. Workshops included games such as Pétanque and La Course des Serveurs, learning French slang Verlan, singing Francophone tunes like "Aux Champs-Élysées" (France) or "La Ronde des écoliers du monde" (Senegal) with live musical instruments, and discussing a Movie Clip featuring Maurice Richard's role in Quebec history in The Rocket, etc. Hosting the French Immersion Day, brought together several French teachers in our community who continue

to advocate our chapter's activities and participate more actively as AATF members. Every year, I also participate in our chapter's National French Week Organizing Committee that starts meeting in May through July to prepare for our Francophone-rich events in the fall for *la Semaine du Français*. We start by send-

ing a sponsorship letter to businesses that could support our events like our *Gala* d'automne. I help by putting together a database of local businesses' and organizations' addresses that our committee had researched, and then we collaborate to produce a uniform sponsorship letter with benefit opportunities to those potential businesses for their support. Additionally, my own French students and French club members attend various National French Week activities such as the Tops French Cooking Class, the Old Fort Niagara's French Heritage Day, and our chapter's Franco-Festibal du Beau Fleuve in Buffalo. Throughout the fall, I continually inform our chapter membership of our National French Week events by sending out e-mail announcements and coordinating with chapter colleagues on such events as our Family French Film night and the French cooking class.

We always encourage AATF members to join us as well as encourage other French teachers to join the AATF. The hard work and collaboration by our committee members is greatly appreciated by the chapter officers. With each other's support and participation, AATF members actively help promote and advocate for French programs as well as encourage their students to attend these fun-filled activities. As an AATF Future Leader Fellow, I plan to continue this effort in recruiting and encouraging Western New York colleagues to join our AATF membership and enjoy the benefits of collaboration for French language study.

PLAN NOW TO CELEBRATE NATIONAL FRENCH WEEK NOVEMBER 4-10, 2015



LES CLOCHES DE PÂQUES

Schools nowadays are very careful about including anything relating to religion in their classes, but since France is, at its origin, a Catholic country, it is difficult to dislodge traditions connected to the church calendar from the culture of daily life. Language is an expression of a culture, so I have no difficulty including activities in the classroom that reflect the lives of those who speak French. *Les cloches de Pâques* find their way into French families, whether or not they are particularly religious. *Pâques* borrows its name form the Jewish religion (Passover—*le jour de Pâque*—note singular) which corresponds with the same season. Bunnies, chicks, and lambs are part of the symbols of the holiday, but in France it is the bells that distribute the eggs. The eggs actually have pagan beginnings, before becoming part of Easter. Tradition tells us that the



bells leave their church towers from Thursday before Easter to travel to Rome to be blessed (giving us a chance to review the days of the week: *lundi, mardi, mercredi, jeudi, vendredi, samedi, dimanche*). In every village and city across the country, starting at daybreak on Sunday (*le lever du soleil*), the bells ring (*les cloches sonnent*) as they return home, dropping decorated eggs and chocolate eggs into the backyards or balconies of the homes or apartments of French children. As in America, children hunt for the eggs—*la chasse aux oeufs*. Sharing a cultural tradition is a healthy thing, a way to build tolerance and respect for other cultures. Plus it is fun!

YOUNG STUDENTS: We make des cloches

MATERIALS NEEDED: 3-oz. paper cup (un gobelet en papier)

lollypop with sturdy stem (une sucette)


cork (un bouchon) Doesn't every French teacher have wine corks on hand? Can be eliminated or re

placed with an eraser.


PROCEDURE: Poke a hole in the bottom of the cup. Insert stem of lollypop and secure with cork as a handle. Cup can

be decorated with stickers

OLDER STUDENTS - The images of the flying bells dropping the decorated eggs can be found in several places on the internet for teachers to use. Go to: cloches de Pâques. Copy or use your own drawings as a way to drill vocabulary, numbers, time—whatever needs reinforcement. It's a fine time to practice the pronunciation of *un oeuf* (pronouncing the "F") and *des oeufs* (where the "F" is silent). A way to remember it is to tell them "One egg is enough (*un oeuf*)." Copy the drawings on the following page or make your own to reflect what you want to practice in your classroom.

ESSAY CONTEST

Deadline: Received by **November 15, 2015.**

Submit: All essays must be submitted by e-mail to [essays@frenchteachers.org

Guidelines: Each entry must be the original work of a current French student whose teacher is an AATF member for 2014. No group entries. There is a limit of five entries per school. Essays must be written in English. The student's name, grade, level of French, school, school address and telephone number, teacher's full name, e-mail address, and AATF chapter name must be written at the beginning of the essay. Submissions with incomplete information will not be judged. The required essay lengths, by division, are:

- Grades 3-5: Maximum 150 words;
- Grades 6-8: Maximum 250 words
- Grades 9-12: Maximum 350 words
- College: Maximum 500 words

Judging Criteria: Relevance to the theme, originality, written expression. All essays become the property of the AATF and may be used in AATF publications or materials. All participants in the AATF Essay and Video/Animation Contests will receive certificates. A student may enter both contests. First, second, and third place winners of each division will receive prizes to be announced.

AATF OUTSTANDING SENIOR IN FRENCH AWARD

Beginning in 2003, the AATF established an Outstanding High School Senior in French Award. In 2005, the Executive Council voted to extend this award to the college/university level. Any public or private secondary school or college/university student with at least one French teacher who is an AATF member may participate. Only one name per school per year will be accepted. In the event that there are multiple French teachers or professors in a given school or department, they must decide among themselves who the nominee will be and submit only one name to the AATF. In the event of multiple submissions, only the first name received will be considered for the award, based on postmark. The nomination must be made by a current AATF member.

To qualify for the award, a student must:

- have maintained an "A" average in French;
- have maintained a "B" average over-
- be in his or her senior year at a public or private secondary school or at a public or private college or university;
- have demonstrated exceptional commitment to the study of French by participating in extracurricular activities related to French which may include but are not limited to the *Grand Concours*, study abroad, National French Week activities, Société honoraire de français (for high school students) or French Club, Pi Delta Phi (for university students), tutoring;

- at the time of graduation, have completed at least three years of formal French study;
- be a non-native speaker of French;
- be nominated by an AATF member.
 Only one student per school per year will be accepted.

Students will receive a certificate acknowledging their award and a press release to distribute to local media; a congratulatory letter will be sent to the principal or dean, and the student's name will be placed on the AATF Outstanding Senior Honor Roll on the Web site. The registration fee for the award is \$25. For an additional \$10 fee, students can also receive an Outstanding Senior in French medal.

There is no deadline for this award. The nomination form is posted on the AATF Web site. Nominations can also be made through the On-line Store.

LOOKING FOR PAWPAW FRENCH

As a native New Englander with Acadian origins who grew up hearing French spoken by aging Franco-Americans, imagine my surprise when I heard Jacob McCleland's NPR broadcast, "Saving a French Dialect That Once Echoed in the Ozarks" (September 23, 2014). In his broadcast, McCleland reports about how Pawpaw French of Missouri is unfortunately disappearing. As Professor of French at Canisius College in Buffalo, NY, I strive to make French relevant to students. In other words, if students know that French is spoken in areas in North America other than just the Canadian province of Quebec, they will come to appreciate it better. It is thus that I have created curricular units that focus on the history of the Franco-Americans of New England (victims of violence from the KKK in the 1920s) and the Cajuns of Louisiana (direct descendants of the Acadians deported from Nova Scotia during le *Grand Dérangement* in 1755). My interest was piqued when McCleland related:

Language lovers and locals of an isolated mining region of the Ozarks are scrambling to preserve what's left of a dialect known as Pawpaw French before it fades. The dialect once dominated this community in southeastern Missouri, but now, it is barely a whisper.

Kent Bone didn't grow up speaking Pawpaw French. But he listened to his grandparents gossip in the language, and as an adult, Bone decided to learn it himself. He says his mother, who's 82, understands him when he speaks to her in Pawpaw. It's common for people who are now in their 70s and 80s to know some Pawpaw French but not enough to be fluent.

McCleland then spoke of Cyrilla Boyer, 78, whose testimony is eerily similar to that of New England's Franco-Americans. She says in the 1920s and 1930s, teachers would smack students' knuckles for speaking any French in the classroom. The language became stigmatized, so parents didn't think it was worth passing on. Now, only a handful of people speak it, and most know only a smattering of words and phrases.

So how is it that Pawpaw French, which McCleland informed us is "named after a local fruit-bearing tree, is a linguistic bridge that melds a Canadian French accent with a Louisiana French vocabulary," has managed to survive in Old Mines, Missouri? After all, Pawpaw French faded from other areas such as

De Soto, Bonne Terre, and Ste. Genevieve. The only possibly correct answer is that Old Mines is more remote.

Thus, as a means of instilling in today's students a sense of the varied development of the French language in North America, a short lesson on Pawpaw French is highly worthwhile. One can easily begin by accessing McCleland's NPR full report at [www. npr.org/2014/09/23/349853440/savinga-french-dialect-that-once-echoed-inozarks], which not only provides some initial background information on the history of Pawpaw French but also a few video clips of Pawpaw French speakers. For those wanting to hear more Pawpaw French speakers, checking out the three-minute YouTube video at [https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=gNBpRyB5T1M#t=17] is another good avenue. An even more beneficial source is the PBS documentary available on-line at [http://video.optv.org/ video/1392954094/]. Moreover, a wonderful bilingual resource that taps into the culture of Pawpaw French is It's Good to Tell You: French Folktales from Missouri where readers take enormous delight, for example, in learning that the word for "skunk" is "bête piante." This book's abstract found on MOSpace explains:

> The stories told in this book, like the stories on television, illustrate the triumph of good over evil; the rewards of heroism and virtue; and the endurance of the human spirit when faced with tragedy and catastrophe. In addition, these fairy tales offer the thrills of exotic settings and of exciting adventures. They are spiced with humor, both focused and broad. Like other traditional stories, they provide an interesting mirror of cultural values that indicate western European influence. There is evidence that these tales and their direct ancestors have evolved from the ancient Sanskrit and Persian cultures to the European Middle Ages, from the Age of Enlightenment to the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, wherever oral cultures had flourished. We held our first interviews in the summer of 1977, after we decided that we would offer that September a free class for anyone who wanted to learn or to relearn the Old Mines French dialect. The

purpose of the interviews was to enable us to find material for these lessons. We sought out people who spoke French in the Old Mines area and conversed with them in French, as well as was possible.

By expanding this MOSpace citation, one is able to download the entire book, including beautiful illustrations by Ronald W. Thomas, free of charge. This collection of French stories was reprinted with the permission of Northwestern University. The stories were originally written in Pawpaw French by Joseph Médard Carrière and first appeared in 1937 in Tales from the French Folk-lore of Missouri. The 1981 edition is a bilingual one and contains twenty-one stories in Part One. As both the English and Pawpaw French titles are very intriguing, it is worth including them here, especially as the Pawpaw French titles give an indication of the pronunciation used by the speakers:

 Part Two of the 1981 bilingual edition provides historical background on the

Old Mines community and its people as well as the character and culture of the Missouri French. Also included in Part Two is an overview of a fairy tale and the fairy tales in the 1930s.

McCleland's NPR broadcast ends on a bittersweet yet hopeful note when he describes Dennis Stroughmatt, a historian and musician whom he views as Pawpaw French's ambassador to world beyond Old Mines:

> He first visited Old Mines back in the 1990s for a class project while a student at Southeast Missouri State University. At the time, there were hundreds of Pawpaw speakers there.

Stroughmatt says Pawpaw French has what he calls "a big accent."

"You can hear it, these big kind of like rolling things about it. You tip your jaw a little bit when you're talking the language," he says.

Stroughmatt harbors no illusions that the language will ever be spoken by many more people, but he hopes parts of it will survive and that kids will learn some phrases—something, anything that will help them retain some identity of Missouri's Pawpaw French here in the Ozarks.

Rather than let Pawpaw French die a lonely death, may we as French teachers encourage our students to explore its rich culture and its significance in the history of the American Midwest.







The advantage of the AATF membership card is the fact that it is written in French and thus is understandable to all. Several years ago teachers received free entrance to major French museums such as the Louvre. This is no longer the case. However, some city and departmental

museums as well as private museums will grant teacher discounts upon seeing the AATF membership card. I always ask whenever I visit any museum in France and hope for the best. Sometimes the policy is to grant full admission; oftentimes I am granted admission at a reduced price. Some bookstores in France also grant a 10% reduction to teachers upon seeing a card.

My French friends have been amazed at the savings I've accrued in various museums in France. Even my teacher friends are surprised when I show my card, as they often are not aware of the possibility of receiving teacher discounts. My advice is to plan ahead and enjoy this benefit of AATF membership.
