ACEC-SC Board of Directors Meeting Board Meeting Thursday August 6, 2020 WebEx

<u>Call to Order:</u> ACEC-SC Chair, Jason Eppley called the board meeting to order at 10:01 AM. The following were in attendance: Jason Eppley, PE, Chuck Black, PE, Theresa McClure, and Ben Temple, PE Keith Overstreet, PE, Matt Gehman, Petrina Butler, PE, Jeff Mulliken, PhD, PE, Bryan Shiver, PE, Melvin Williams, Adam Jones, and Allison King,

Agenda Approval: A motion was made by Butler, seconded by Black and passed unanimously to accept the consent agenda.

Membership Report: Executive Director, Adam Jones

- Dues went out beginning of July and are coming in steadily
- Second notices will go out next week

<u>Financial Report:</u> Secretary/Treasurer, Jeff Muliken, PE, PhD reported:

- Year end financials look good.
 - o Total Income \$546,511.57
 - Total expenses \$447,545.38
 - Net Income for year: \$99,946.19
 - Best year to date
- Financial report:
 - o Total income \$105,862
 - Total expenses \$30,622.891
 - Total net income of \$75,240.05

Chairman Eppley activated the Budget Committee. The Committee will consist of Jeff Muliken, PE, PhD, Matt Gehman, and Adam B. lones

A motion was made to approve the financial report by Butler with a second by Black. Motion was passed unanimously.

<u>Chair's Report:</u> Chairman Eppley thanked everyone for participating in the planning retreat in March and the second planning session in July.

- Eppley asked the Board to review the Strategic Plan and Operational Plan
 - He asked board members to help list the measures of success.
 - o Operational Plan needs volunteers who are responsible.
 - o The Board must continue to ask themselves, "Are we who we think we are"?
 - The only way to become who we think they are is to move the strategic plan forward.
 - The Strategic Plan will dictate the Board meetings moving forward.
 - As items are completed, we will add new objectives.

In discussion about moving ACEC-SC forward, Melvin Williams asked about how members can bring items to the Board of Directors. There was brief discussion.

Jones said he would publish Board Meeting dates to membership and ask for input from membership.

Eppley, closed saying he will need Board members' help to move the strategic plan forward.

Executive Director's Report: Executive Director Jones gave the following report:

Legislative Report:

- Little movement since last meeting
- SC Senate & House Business Liability Subcommittees met
 - Discussed Safe Harbor Legislation

- Bill was not introduced.
- Hopeful it will be introduced in September.
- ACEC-SC supports this
 - Calls to action to come.
 - Explainer video.
- ACEC and ACEC-SC continued to lobby Congress for infrastructure funding.
- Both as a part of the CARES act and to pass the FAST Act.
 - o SCDOT in favor of FAST Act, but thinks a one time hand out in CARES Act would be a band aid.
 - o They have told Delegation as such.
 - Answer Call to Action if you have not already.

Future Leaders:

- Still plan to recognize graduates.
- Membership meeting in fall.
- Engineering Excellence Awards if not able to host before.

Engineering Excellence Awards:

- Call for entries goes out in August.
- Recommend we follow normal timeline.
 - o Can postpone Gala if needed, but Firms can submit same as other years.

National Director's Report: Affiliate National Director Melvin Williams reported ACEC National has a lot going on.

- Williams said ACEC is supporting the "Hero's and the Hills Act".
- ACEC is pushing on an Infrastructure package.
- ACEC Planning Cabinet is very active.
 - o Implementing the five-year strategic plan.
 - Working on diversifying the group. (looking at this from the top down)
 - o Risk Management Committee is doing a study on best practices of Design Build Committee.
 - The ACEC Research institute has commissioned a study on QBS is being conducted.

Committee Reports:

- Transportation Committee: Transportation Committee Chair David Taylor reported:
 - o ACEC-SC sent a letter of concern to the SCDOT in June.
 - SCDOT sent a letter back last week.
 - o The letter is agreeing to disagree.
 - o Taylor reported SCDOT published the numbers for the firms of their ranking.

McClure asked if we would do anything going forward. Overstreet said he would not recommend doing anything.

After discussion, The Board decided the ACEC-SC Board will continue to monitor the Two-Tier selection process, but it will be held on a committee level moving forward.

- Taylor went over the planning of the ACEC-SC/SCDOT Annual Meeting.
 - He reported currently SCDOT said they would not participate this year.
 - Jones asked the Board if they would support a highly discounted rate for SCDOT to attend.
 - Jones also spoke to the contractual obligations ACEC-SC is currently under for the meeting to be held in person.

It was decided that a decision will be made after the Partnering Committee has met to see what if any SCDOT involvement will take place.

- BRE Committee: Committee Chair Chuck Black reported the scholarship applications had been sent in. He suggests we award the scholarships to the two applicants. The Board supported the two recipients. Discussion ensued on how well the scholarship program works.
- *Communications Committee*: Theresa McClure reported the committee is working on a Communications plan to help move the strategic plan forward.
- Membership Committee: Theresa McClure reported she had gotten an adjusted quote for a survey. She moved that ACEC-SC accept it. Discussion ensued. The Board voted to move forward with the survey and seconded by Shiver.

ACEC-SC Executive Directors Report 9/3/2020

Legislative Report:

- The SC Legislature returns in mid-September.
 - o Unclear if the lobby will be open to the public
 - Legislators have not been taking face to face meetings
 - o Will monitor session remotely but will go to Statehouse if needed
- ACEC-SC is pursuing Safe Harbor legislation to protect our firms against COVID-19 liabilities during session.
 - o Work alongside the business community to pass this legislation.
 - o ACEC-SC will send letter of support before they return.
 - o If a bill is introduced, will then launch call to action.
- Committees have been meeting in preparation.
 - o Senate Finance Committee met Tuesday
 - o Heard from Department heads
 - o Secretary Hall testified on how SCDOT has been impacted
 - Senator Leatherman said they need to plan for the worse and hope for the best
- Comptroller General Richard Extrom closed the books on FY19-20 on Thursday August 27,2020.
- State closed with a \$775 Million surplus.
 - This includes the \$462 million in revenue collected above projections that legislators used last year to right the budget as well as unspent reserves from the last two years.
 - ACEC is still pushing for an infrastructure package to be included in the next round of COVID relief, we are pursuing:



Eligibility & General Criteria

Eligibility

Any engineering or surveying firm is eligible to enter the 2021 ACEC-SC Engineering Excellence Awards competition, regardless of whether the firm is an ACEC-SC member. Any firm may submit multiple entries.

General Criteria

Projects entered in the competition must have been prepared in South Carolina. Local, regional, national and international firms are encouraged to enter projects, executed anywhere in the world, from designs prepared locally.

Research, Studies and Consulting Engineering Services (Category A) or Surveying and Mapping Technology Projects (Category D) must have been publicly disclosed by the client between Nov. 1, 2018 and Oct. 31, 2020. Construction of projects (Categories B through L, with the exception of D) must have been substantially completed and ready for use between Nov. 1, 2018 and Oct. 31, 2020. See "award categories" section for full listing of all eligible categories.

Entries may be placed in any one of twelve categories listed on page 3. The entering firm must select the one category that is most appropriate. A project may be entered only once in any category. However, after a project entered in Category A has been constructed, it may be entered in a different category, B through L, in the year when eligible.

An entry fee of \$450 for ACEC-SC members and \$900 for non ACEC-SC members must accompany the Notice of Intent to be submitted by Friday, October 2, 2020. The entry fee is nonrefundable and required for each project submitted.

Each entry must consist of two components: (Non-compliance with the rules may disqualify an entry. Please read the requirements thoroughly).

I. USB flash drive containing submission materials

II. Photographic display panel

NOTE: No QR Codes or embedded links are permitted in any portion of an award submission

ACEC-SC will not be responsible for any damages to or loss of an entrant's official materials.

The ACEC-SC Engineering Excellence Awards Committee reserves the right to determine eligibility and category classification of any entry.

Judging

Entries will be judged on the basis of overall engineering excellence in each of the 12 categories; the work performed by the entering firm only and the rating guidelines listed. Winners will be notified shortly after judging is completed. Judging will take place in December.

Rating Guidelines for Judging

Each entry will be evaluated based on the following five categories, which are key elements of the project description text required in the electronic submittal described in this brochure.

1. Uniqueness and/or innovative application of new or existing techniques ... 20%
2. Future value to the engineering profession and perception by the public ... 20%
3. Social, economic and sustainable development considerations ... 20%
4. Complexity ... 20%
5. Successful fulfillment of client/owner needs ... 20%
Total ... 100%

Rating Guidelines Definitions

- 1. Uniqueness and/or Innovative Applications of New or Existing Techniques:
 - Does the entry demonstrate the use of a new science or a breakthrough in the general knowledge of engineering?
 - Does the entry represent a unique application of new or existing technology, techniques, materials or equipment?
- 2. Future Value to the Engineering Profession and Perception by the Public:
 - Will the entry redefine current engineering thinking?
 - Does the entry advance a positive public image of engineering excellence?
- 3. Social, Economic and Sustainable Development Considerations:
- Do the solutions identified produce secondary benefits of value to the community environment?
- Does the entrant's approach provide society with social, economic, or sustainable development benefits?
- Does the entrant's contribution to the project improve the health, safety or welfare of the public or affected environment?

4. Complexity:

- Did the entry successfully address highly complex criteria or unique problems?
- Were extraordinary problems of site, location, hazardous conditions, project requirements, or similar elements present?
- Did the entry require the use of out-of-the-ordinary technology or ingenuity for achievement of the project's goals?

5. Successful fulfillment of Client/Owner Needs:

- Did the engineer or entrant successfully engage the client/owner in the overall project development process?
- Was it an economical and cost-effective solution?
- How did the final cost relate to the original budget estimate?
- How closely does the entrant's solution meet the total goals of the client/owner?
- Did the entrant meet the client's time schedule?

Awards

The Palmetto Award, recognizing the overall highest rated project, may come from any of the categories. An additional award will be presented for the highest rated project submitted by a small firm, defined as less than 30 South Carolina employees. The highest rated projects will qualify for national competition through ACEC. The ACEC-SC Engineering Excellence Awards Gala will be held February 10, 2021 in Columbia, SC.

Publicity

Participating firms must wait until after the Engineering Excellence Gala on February 10, 2021 to publicize winning project(s). ACEC-SC will publish a press release covering all winning projects to local and state media. It is up to individual entrants to publicize its project(s).

ENCINEERING EXCELLENCE AWARDS





ACEC is a federation of 52 independent state and regional Member Organizations (M.O.s). As incorporated nonprofit trade associations, the M.O.s are separate entities; however, they are still subject to common principles of nonprofit governance established under federal and state laws. This guide is a compilation of recommended principles for M.O. governance as exercised through an M.O.'s Board of Directors, its Executive Committee, and individual Board members. Note: The following principles are not intended to constitute legal advice. Readers should consult with their M.O.'s legal counsel as appropriate to obtain advice on any particular legal matter.

Roles and Responsibilities of the M.O. Board of Directors

The Board of Directors is the highest governing body of the Member Organization, with the ultimate responsibility for the administration of the M.O. The members of the Board of Directors owe three generally recognized **fiduciary duties to the M.O:**

- 1. The **Duty of Care** requires directors and officers to use ordinary and reasonable care in the performance of their duties in a manner demonstrating honesty and good faith. A Board member must act as a good steward for the organization, and take appropriate care to ensure that well-considered decisions are made on behalf of the M.O.
- 2. The **Duty of Loyalty** is an obligation to be faithful to the M.O. This duty requires, for example, that officers and directors take great care to disclose even potential conflicts of interest and to recuse themselves from discussions and voting on matters that touch on their personal interests. Board members cannot compete with the M.O for business opportunities or use their M.O. positions for personal gain. Protecting the confidentiality of Board discussions and non-public information entrusted to or obtained by reason of their M.O. positions is also part of the duty of loyalty.
- 3. The **Duty of Obedience** requires that officers and directors comply with the M.O.'s articles of incorporation, its bylaws and other governing documents; the governing documents of ACEC as they apply to M.O.s; and all applicable laws and regulations.

Each Board member should be mindful of his or her fiduciary duties in every aspect of the governance of the M.O. These governance functions include the following:

- 1. Establishing and articulating the vision of the M.O. (The national ACEC Strategic Plan is a significant resource for this purpose, and can be accessed here.) The vision is a statement of what the M.O. ultimately wants to achieve. It should reflect the Board members' values and aspirations for the organization.
- 2. Developing and implementing the M.O. **Strategic Plan**. Once again, the national Strategic Plan can help to guide this process. It is recommended that all M.O. stakeholder groups have input into the Strategic Plan development process.



- 3. Selecting, and providing oversight for, the **Executive Director** or volunteer who will be responsible for the day-to-day management of the M.O. A key element of the success of an M.O. Board is the selection of a paid staff leader or volunteer who will work closely with the M.O. leadership in pursuit of the organization's success. The Board, or a designated Board committee, is also tasked with reviewing the performance of the Executive Director or volunteer on an annual basis.
- 4. Providing oversight for compliance with all M.O. **legal and ethical requirements**. M.O.s are encouraged to provide appropriate **indemnification** for Board officers and directors in the exercise of their governance responsibilities. In addition, **Directors and Officers liability insurance and cybersecurity insurance coverage**, if not already in place, should be procured as soon as possible with the assistance of a qualified insurance broker.
- 5. Providing **financial oversight** over M.O. budgeting, reporting, and financial controls, including securing an independent audit on an annual basis. Board members should review the financial reports of the M.O., ask questions as appropriate, and work with the professional staff as necessary to ensure that the M.O.'s financial administration follows best practices and maintains a high degree of transparency.
- 6. Enhancing the **brand and image of the M.O.** Board members should be mindful that they are ambassadors for the M.O. and for ACEC, and should therefore govern with the constant objective of enhancing the prestige and stature of the M.O. and the national Council.
- 7. Establishing **strong communication channels** with the Member Firms and the general public. The Board should support and encourage M.O. efforts to strengthen its information-sharing efforts in an ever more complex and competitive media landscape.
- 8. Establish strong M.O. policies on avoiding **conflicts of interest** and complying with the **antitrust laws**. These policies should be circulated at meetings of the Board, Executive Committee, and M.O. committees. The Federal Trade Commission publishes a guide to the federal antitrust laws that is a good resource on this topic. The guide can be accessed here. It is also recommended that the members of the Board annually sign a statement agreeing to comply with the Conflict of Interest and Antitrust Compliance Policies of the M.O. and ACEC. The ACEC policies can be found here. In addition, the American Society of Association Executives (ASAE) provides a number of sample conflict of interest statements for signing, as well as examples of antitrust compliance policies. These can be accessed on ASAE's Sample Policies page here.

Role and Responsibilities of the M.O. Executive Committee

The role of an Executive Committee is to function as the Board's principal means of accomplishing its objectives. As such, the Executive Committee typically has special responsibilities and authority above all other committees.

The Executive Committee generally consists of the Officers of the Board, with the Executive Director serving as a non-voting ex officio member. It should be noted that, in keeping with the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee members are bound to the same three fiduciary duties noted above.

In between meetings of the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee provides oversight and governance for the M.O. on behalf of the Board and within the Board's authority. However, the Executive Committee does not typically have the power to amend the M.O.'s bylaws, elect or remove Board members, create or appoint permanent committees, hire or fire the Executive Director, approve or amend the overall budget, or make major structural decisions regarding the organization such as mergers, dissolution, or transferring substantial assets. Such functions are within the purview of the Board of Directors.

The responsibilities of the M.O. Executive Committee generally include the following:

- 1. Overseeing the implementation of M.O. **policies and directives**. The Executive Committee typically works in close cooperation with the Executive Director and staff on M.O. objectives.
- 2. Communicating the **strategic direction** of the M.O. to the full Board. A key aspect of the Executive Committee's role is to act as a major communications conduit to the Board of Directors on M.O. operations, success in achieving goals, and areas where additional attention is required.
- 3. Providing guidance on **high-level organizational issues**. Oversight of major financial matters below the budget-approval level; authorization of M.O. structural and programmatic reforms in consultation with the Executive Director and staff; and the creation, sunsetting, and oversight of non-permanent committees are some of the functions commonly performed by the Executive Committee.
- 4. Providing oversight for the M.O.'s **programs, products, and services** to ensure their effectiveness. The Executive Committee should be regularly briefed by the professional staff on the aforementioned programs, products, and services, and provide ongoing guidance and recommendations.

Role and Responsibilities of the Individual M.O. Board Member

The individual volunteer member of the M.O. Board of Directors serves a critical role in ensuring the good governance of the organization. As noted above, each member of the Board is an ambassador for both the M.O. and for ACEC, with a personal responsibility for enhancing the M.O. and ACEC brands. In legal terms, each member is a fiduciary of the M.O. and owes the duties of care, loyalty, and obedience. Board members must act collectively with the other Board members. In similar fashion, Board members who are officers only have the management authority specifically delegated in the Bylaws or by the Board. With all this in mind, the following represents a general list of responsibilities for M.O. Board members:

- 1. Make every effort to attend M.O. **leadership orientations** to help prepare for assuming Board responsibilities.
- 2. Read and become familiar with the M.O.'s monthly **financial statements** and ask questions as necessary to ensure proper financial oversight for the M.O.
- 3. Learn about the M.O. PAC, ACEC/PAC, and M.O. program initiatives.
- 4. Work to advance the M.O. and national **Strategic Plans**.
- 5. Actively participate in initiatives to increase M.O. **non-dues revenue**.
- 6. Actively participate in the recruitment of potential **new ACEC member firms**.
- 7. Actively participate in at least one M.O. **committee**, **coalition**, **or forum** as either a member or a Board liaison.
- 8. As an ambassador for the M.O. and ACEC, visibly and vocally **support the M.O.** and the national Council.
- 9. Actively **cultivate and recruit exceptional candidates** for consideration as M.O. Board members.
- 10. Consider **national service** on ACEC Committees, the ACEC Board, and the ACEC Executive Committee.
- 11. Be **present** in person and spirit at M.O. meetings, events, and activities and encourage others to do so.

Principles for Reducing M.O. Board Member Personal Liability Risk

As fiduciaries of the M.O., Board members potentially have personal legal exposure if their actions or the actions of the Board as a whole cause harm to the organization. To avoid this, the following principles of risk reduction for Board members are offered:

- 1. Be thoroughly **prepared** for all Board meetings.
- 2. Be an **active participant** in Board meetings, commenting and asking questions as circumstances dictate.
- 3. Read the **minutes** of Board meetings carefully and check them for accuracy.
- 4. Help to ensure that **legal counsel** and other appropriate advisors are consulted on any matters with uncertain ramifications.
- 5. Help to ensure that the M.O.s **finances are periodically audited**, and review the M.O.'s financial reports.
- 6. Attend **all meetings of the Board** and read the M.O.'s publications carefully to keep fully informed of the organization's policies and activities.
- 7. Review and help to ensure compliance with the M.O.'s articles of incorporation, bylaws, and other governing documents; the governing documents of ACEC as they apply to M.O.s; and all applicable laws and regulations.
- 8. Minimize any **conflicts of interest** in dealing with the M.O. by fully disclosing any potential conflicts annually and as they arise.
- 9. Be familiar with the general principles of the **antitrust laws** and assist the Board where necessary in ensuring full compliance.
- 10. Avoid creating the appearance that any public statements are made on behalf of the M.O in any official capacity or represent the views or positions of the M.O., unless specifically authorized to do so by the bylaws or the Board.

Last week Friday, August 28, Matt Reiffer and our FAR consultant Dan Purvine led a meeting between ACEC member firm representatives, CPA firms, and State DOT auditors at the virtual AASHTO Audit Committee conference. There were approximately 170 participants in the liaison meeting, the vast majority of whom were DOT representatives.

Matt and Dan reviewed the questions and concerns they are hearing from ACEC member firms about the impact of the pandemic and resulting changes in business practices on their overhead rates. While the specific circumstances vary for each firm, in general, many firms anticipate a lower overhead rate for 2020 because of decreased indirect costs (less travel, conferences, marketing activities, etc.) and increased direct costs from higher-than-expected staff utilization. Some firm indirect cost rates will go up because of work stoppages and a significant amount of unproductive labor, and/or because of increased IT equipment purchases to accommodate remote work.

Matt and Dan also noted the uncertainty about the FAR treatment and potential of a credit to indirect costs from forgiven PPP loans. They summarized the current federal guidance and ACEC engagement seeking correction and clarification on this issue, including the impact on firms performing primarily state and local agency work, not direct federal contracting.

One State DOT representative said that there have been some basic conversations among the state DOT auditors about the impact of the pandemic on firm rates. There seems to be an understanding among the DOTs that 2020 is an anomalous year and rates will fluctuate much more widely than under normal circumstances. They are also aware of the PPP questions and concerns. The topics will be on the agenda for an October meeting of the DOT auditors. None of the states have developed any specific guidance or response yet, as the year is not over and the specific impacts are not completely known. They also noted that they'd rely on FHWA guidance, especially on the FAR treatment of forgiven PPP loans.

ACEC and AASHTO representatives agreed to establish a small working group of members to continue talking through these issues and try to identify some consistent and reasonable options for accommodating industry concerns. No timeline was set, but there is an awareness of the urgency to provide as much certainty to firms as possible. FHWA officials will be included in those discussions.

We'll continue to keep you updated on this and other developments.

of South Carolina ACEC-SC Legislative Issues

The American Council of Engineering Companies of South Carolin a (ACEC-SC) has many issues it follows at the South Carolina Statehouse. The following issues are what we will be focusing on this fall and next session as well as other issue that my present themselves.

Safe Harbor Legislation

ACEC-SC supports the introduction and passage of safe harbor legislation when the SC Legislature returns in September.

- o Engineering firms are struggling due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- ACEC-SC requests the SC Legislature act quickly to give businesses protection from potential liability lawsuits stemming from employees contracting COVID-19 in the workplace and by customers and clients on company premises.
- We are not asking for blanket protection or permanent coverage.
- We understand the protection should have parameters for businesses to follow.
- The stress of lost revenue coupled with the fear of liability for a company's workforce and customers is significant, and weighs heavily on owners. Passing legislation during this session

Tort Reform (H.3758)

ACEC-SC sees the need for reform of South Carolina's current joint and several liability laws. ACEC-SC works along side with the South Carolina Coalition for Law Suit Reform to insure that SC citizens only pay their fair share when involved in an accident.

Designer Fair Contracting Act

ACEC-SC worked with Senator Alexander and legislative services to introduce the Designer Fair Contracting Act last year. We were able to draft a bill, but due to the legislature shutting down for COVID-19 it was not introduced. We plan to work with Senator Alexander this fall to prefile this legislation.

The Problem

- Often engineers, architects, and other design professionals are asked to sign contracts that require them to indemnify, hold harmless and defend an owner and unrelated third parties against claims for damages that are outside the scope of the engineer/architect's work and control.
 - Design firms have no problem indemnifying an owner for their own negligence and mistakes
 this bill does not change that .
- Situations that are of concern are those unrelated to their work on a project yet they are being asked to pay for and resolve these claims.
- This demand/contractual obligation is uninsurable under their professional negligence policies so it comes right off the bottom line.
- Even more egregious, a "duty to defend" clause would trigger from the outset and could require the
 design firm to expend hundreds of thousands of dollars defending a third party even when the
 design firm had no role and contributed in no way to the claim.
- These third party indemnity/duty to defend clauses in design contracts create liability without requiring proof of fault .

Legislation Solves the Problem

- Changes to the law will protect design firms from this unfair, uninsurable liability.
- o Similar statutes have passed in North Carolina, Georgia, Florida, and Arizona

Designers Still Responsible for Their Own Negligence

- Design firm will still be responsible for and can indemnify for its own negligence and liability, and for that of those they supervises, controls, has hired, etc.
- Where an owner claims an issues or claim is a design issue, the design firm will be involved from the beginning with any other party alleged to be at fault, to work through it, pay money to resolve, etc. – this bill does not change this process

Procurement of Public Work Through Direct Negotiations

Qualifications Based Selection (QBS) is a competitive procurement approach for selecting and retaining design professionals that emphasizes qualification to achieve final project performance and ownership cost objectives, which is for public good and is legally required to be used by government agencies by the Federal "Brooks" law. ACEC-SC believes the best way to select engineering services is by QBS. Currently, QBS is required on federal and state projects, but we would like to see the use of QBS pushed down to political subdivisions.

ACEC-SC plans to introduce this process as part of the Engineers and Surveyors Practice Act. ACEC-SC would like the following to be added in Section 5, Chapter 22, Title 40:

"A registered engineer or surveyor may not enter into a contract for professional services on public work on any basis other than direct negotiation thereby precluding participation in any system requiring a comparison of compensation. However, a registered engineer or surveyor may state compensation to a prospective client as part of direct negotiation after their selection as the most qualified provider and where engineering and surveyor services necessary to protect the public, health, safety and welfare have been defined." SC Frivolous Civil Proceedings Sanctions Act

Issue: In 2005 South Carolina passed a Tort Bill. The bill adopted a gatekeeping statue which allows a plaintiff to bring a professional negligence suit against a licensed professional if a plaintiff files a complaint with expert witness saying a professional was negligent.

- "In action for damages alleging professional negligence against a professional licensed by or registered with the state of South Carolina and listed in subsection (G)... the plaintiff must file as part of the complaint an affidavit of an expert witness which must specify at least one negligent act or omission claimed to exist and the factual basis for each claim based on the available evidence at the time of filling of the affidavit."
- Parties listed in sub section (G): Architects, Attorneys at law, CPAs, Chiropractors, Dentists, Land Surveyors, Medical Doctors, Marriage & Family Therapists, Nurses, Occupational Therapists, Optometrists, Osteopathic Physicians, Pharmacists, Physical Therapists, Physicians' Assistants Professional Counselors, Professional Engineers, Podiatrists, Psychologists, Radiological Technicians, Respiratory Therapists, & Veterinarians.

ACEC-SC's Concern: A federal district judge ruled this law does not apply if the defendant is a company, so plaintiff's attorneys are now skirting the law by going after design firms.
