ACEC SC Board of Directors Meeting September 5, 2019 10:00 AM

Conference Call due to Hurricane Dorian

<u>Call to Order:</u> The conference call was called to order at 10:01 AM. The meeting was changed to a conference call due to Hurricane Dorian off the coast. The following were on the call: Keith Overstreet, Jason Eppley, Chuck Black, Cameron Nations, Petrina Butler, Jeff Mulliken, Ben Temple, Rickey Ward, Melvin Williams, Allison King, and Adam B. Jones. A motion was made to accept the consent agenda by Jason Eppley and seconded by Petrina Butler and passed unanimously.

Jones gave a brief membership report.

- Membership dues are tracking normally, and second notices have been sent.
- Jones said there are two ACEC-SC membership applications to approve.
 - Sepi, was sponsored by TRC with a motion from Butler and a second by Eppley and approved.
 - Wilson Ferguson was sponsored by KCI with a motion from Butler and a second by Eppley and approved.

<u>Financials Report:</u> Secretary/Treasurer Matt Gehman was unable to call in due to Hurricane Dorian, so Vice President Jason Eppley gave the financial report: Eppley reported:

- Income of \$180,571.21 versus expenses of \$36,055.11 for a net income of \$144,516.10.
 - Motion to accept financial report made by Butler, Seconded by Eppley, and passed unanimously.
- Discussion on affiliate member dues and regular member dues are reflected on the report.

Chairs Report:

Chair Keith Overstreet said the Strategic Plan would be discussed at the next face to face meeting.

• Overstreet said a Membership Committee Chair is needed.

ACEC-SC's position on Average Overhead Rate on Fixed Fees at SCDOT was the bulk of the discussion.

- Ad hoc Committee formed by Transportation Committee Chair Melvin Williams with Jeff Muliken as Chair.
 - Conference call on the issue on August 13, 2019
 - o A draft white paper written by Mulliken was provided to the board.
 - Mulliken said the Transportation Committee Professional Services Subcommittee has been working on this issue
 - o Professional Services Subcommittee Chair Shawn Epps, F&ME, has spoken with SCDOT about the idea of using an average overhead rate on fixed fees.
 - SCDOT has not said how the rate will be determined.
 - In the calculations of fixed fees. Their intent would be not to use individual firms, but would use in their formula an average overhead rate to establish the overall contract value.
 - o Ad hoc Committee believes average overhead rates is something that ACEC-SC should oppose.
 - Epps suggested speaking with Todd Jones, who fought this with NCDOT
 - Mulliken has spoken with Jones.
- Discussion on current draft of white paper ensued.
- A motion was made by Eppley, seconded by Butler and passed to take a position in opposition of SCDOT using an Average Overhead Rate on calculations of Fixed Fees.
 - It was noted this is an urgent issue, so it does not get pushed through like this did for CEI years back.
 - Board members were asked to read the white paper and give revisions or comments to Mulliken by September 19, 2019.

- o Executive Director Adam Jones is to send white paper to ACEC National for their comments.
- When approved by ACEC-SC Board of Directors, Williams and Mulliken will take it back to ACEC-SC Transportation Committee
 - Professional Service Subcommittee to take to SCDOT.

Overstreet reminded Board Members of the discussion about ACEC National's HB1 Visas webinars.

- National said anyone can have it any time but there is also a fee.
- National said if ACEC-SC wanted to host a "Lunch and Learn" they would allow ACEC-SC use the of the webinar free of charge.
- Jones will get details, date, location and move forward.

<u>Executive Directors Report:</u> Jones said he will start putting his report in the Board Packets for Board Members to read and go over the "needs to know" and let Board Members read the "nice to know" info.

Legislative Report: At our August Board of Directors Meeting the Board voted to move forward in pursuing two pieces of legislation. The first is dealing with the Frivolous Civil Proceedings Sanctions Act. The second, is an indemnity bill North Carolina passed last year. Below is the movement that has been made since August 1, 2019.

- Frivolous Civil Proceedings
 - Language sent to Stephanie Burton, JD (Gibbes Burton, LLC), who brought this to our attention, that would include Engineering Companies with COA's in SC to be in the list of exemptions.
 - Burton said this would not fix the problem, as other groups that would be allies to passage would not be protected by proposed language
 - Jones said he is trying to meet with Burton.
 - Next steps
 - Develop language
 - Look for sponsors
 - Meet with other associations that will support and push the bill
- Indemnity bill
 - Will use language from passed bill in NC (language in packet)
 - Looking for possible sponsors.
 - Will meet with possible sponsors in the coming months
 - Meeting with AGC's lobbyist to see if they will oppose as written (they were in opposition in NC, but it passed.)
- Off-season lobbying effort
 - Meet with legislators that may sponsor Indemnity Bill
 - o Meet with legislators that will support Frivolous Civil Proceedings / sponsor bill
 - o Meet with other groups that will support our efforts

SC Engineering Conference & Trade Show:

- SC Engineering Conference & Trade Show
 - We've received the final bill
 - o Distributions to the partners is being calculated now
 - 2020 will be at the North Charleston Embassy Suites & Conference Center
 - o 2021 will be at the Embassy Suites in Myrtle Beach at Kingston Plantation

This overall contract value typically would not vary significantly between a Firm A or Firm B with different overhead rates, but how that contract value is determined does vary based on staff mix, project team firm mix and individual firm overhead rates.

A sample calculation is provided that shows the implications of this when Firm A has an overhead rate higher than the average and Firm B has an overhead equal to the average. As is demonstrated for this example, both firms will earn the full amount of the overhead and both firms will earn the identical amount of fixed fee. However, Firm A would be required to compensate for their higher overhead by reducing their labor to accomplish the work.

This overall contract value typically would not vary significantly between a Firm A or Firm B with different overhead rates, but how that contract value is determined does vary based on staff mix, project team firm mix and individual firm overhead rates.

A sample calculation is provided here that shows the implications of this when Firm A has an overhead rate higher than the average and Firm B has an overhead equal to the average. As is demonstrated for this example, both firms will <u>earn_the full</u> amount of the overhead and <u>both firms will earn_the identical amount of fixed fee</u>.

However, Firm A would be required to compensate for their higher overhead but reducing their labor to accomplish the work.

The sample calculation is repeated below for the case when fixed fee is instead computed based on the average overhead rate. In this case, Firm A can gain a nominal amount of direct labor cost and firms will earn_the full amount of the overhead. However, Firm A will earn_approximately 15% lower fixed fee than Firm B. As discussed above, determining contract value varies significantly between two project teams based on staff mix, project team firm mix and individual firm overhead rates. Therefore, a comparison of negotiations between two firms or teams on a purely hour-to-hour basis is not practical. This is also a very common issue during negotiations with SCDOT when, discussing tasks and phases of work based on internal staffing assumptions. However you examine the impacts, ACEC-SC member firms have concerns when efforts are considered to "normalize" fee calculations. ACEC believes that when Qualifications-Based Selection is required to be used, the capping of overheads or fees for the purposes of negotiation and payment may be contradictory to the performance of a firm and the quality of work that may be provided. Firms maintain a FAR audited overhead rate that ensures the same rules apply to all firms across the broad spectrum of services. Higher or lower overhead rates reflect more on the size of the firm, utilization of staff and/or the nature of its business, more so than a measure of efficiency.

For the reasons stated above, the vast majority of ACEC-SC member firms agree in their concernity t, and opposition to, the use of "average" overhead rates in the calculation of fixed fees for professional services. In the same regard, ACEC-SC member firms are in one accord in appreciation to SCDOT for our ongoing collaboration and hope that this objection is accepted for consideration.

DESIGNER FAIR CONTRACTING

The Problem

- Often engineers, architects, and other design professionals are asked to sign contracts that require them to indemnify, hold harmless and defend an owner and unrelated third parties against claims for damages that are outside the scope of the engineer/architect's work and control
 - Design firms have no problem indemnifying an owner for their own negligence and mistakes this bill does not change that
- Situations that are of concern are those unrelated to their work on a project yet they are being asked to pay for and resolve these claims
- This demand/contractual obligation is uninsurable under their professional negligence policies so it comes right off the bottom line
- Even more egregious, a "duty to defend" clause would trigger from the outset and could require the design firm to expend hundreds of thousands of dollars defending a third party even when the design firm had no role and contributed in no way to the claim
- These third party indemnity/duty to defend clauses in design contracts create liability without requiring proof of fault
- These provision cause significant financial threats and burdens on design firms, especially smaller WMBE firms.
 - In NC we have specific requirements in public contracts for the use of WMBE firms yet when these provisions are used it undercuts the support we're trying to give WMBE firms and could cause harm
 - In some cases firms sign these contracts and do not fully understand the significance of these provisions
 - Small firms do not always have in-house attorneys that can attempt to address these
 - And in some cases the firm is presented with a "take it or leave it" response
 - In other cases, good firms that would do good work just walk away and do not do the work
 - Also, time and money spent defending an owner against a claim you had nothing to do with takes time and money away from growing your business

An Example

- By way of example, owner requires design firm to indemnify and defend against all claims from third parties, regardless of whether design firm was negligent or involved in the claim.
- Claim comes in from third party and does not involve the design, the design firm, or any of the entities the designer used to complete the work.
- Owner immediately sends design firm a demand to defend them and other parties who may be named in the claim.
- Contractual duty to defend is triggered, and design firm must pay for an attorney, probably of the owner's choosing
- Design firm has no control over the representation or defense, must just pay the bill
- The duty to defend could result in several hundred thousand dollars in defense costs for a claim the design firm did not cause and had no control over
- The duty to defend and money spent is not paid by insurance but paid by the design firm
- Depending on the size of the design firm and size of the financial obligation / claim, this could put the design firm out of business.

Legislation Solves the Problem

- Changes to the law will protect design firms from this unfair, uninsurable liability.
- Adding language to the existing statute to address these indemnity/duty to defend provisions related to design contracts
- The bill as passed in North Carolina clarifies the already stated public policy of the State to address situations that should be covered but are apparently not given the language used in the existing statute, we fell the same could be updated in South Carolina
- The Bill in NC:
 - (a) Maintains the existing law for contractors
 - (b)Added new language addresses third party indemnity/duty to defend clauses in design contracts
 - (c) Provides that this section has no effect on insurance contracts, workers' compensation insurance, etc.
- Similar statutes have passed in North Carolina, Georgia, Florida, and Arizona

Designers Still Responsible for Their Own Negligence

- Design firm will still be responsible for and can indemnify for its own negligence and liability, and for that of those he/she supervises, controls, has hired, etc.
- Where an owner claims an issues or claim is a design issue, the design firm will be involved from the beginning with any other party alleged to be at fault, to work through it, pay money to resolve, etc. this bill does not change this process

Eligibility & General Criteria

Eligibility

Any engineering or surveying firm is eligible to enter the 2019 ACEC-SC Engineering Excellence Awards competition, regardless of whether the firm is a member of ACEC-SC. Any firm may submit multiple entries.

General Criteria

Projects entered in the competition must have been prepared in South Carolina. Local, regional, national and international firms are encouraged to enter projects, executed anywhere in the world, from designs prepared locally.

Research and Studies (Category A) or Surveying and Mapping projects (Category D) must have been publicly disclosed by the client between Nov. 1, 2017 and Oct. 31, 2019. Construction of projects (Categories B through L, with the exception of D) must have been substantially completed and ready for use between Nov. 1, 2017 and Oct. 31, 2019. See "award categories" section for full listing of all eligible categories.

Entries may be placed in any one of twelve categories listed on page 3. The entering firm must select the one category that is most appropriate. A project may be entered only once in any category. However, after a project entered in Category A has been constructed, it may be entered in a different category, B through L, in the year when eligible.

An entry fee of \$450 for ACEC-SC members and \$900 for non ACEC-SC members must accompany the Notice of Intent to be submitted by Friday, October 4, 2019. The entry fee is nonrefundable and required for each project submitted.

Each entry must consist of two components: (Non-compliance with the rules may disqualify an entry. Please read the requirements thoroughly.)

- I. USB flash drive containing submission materials
- II. Photographic display panel
- **NOTE: No QR Codes or embedded links are permitted in any portion of an award submission**

ACEC-SC will not be responsible for any damages to or loss of an entrant's official materials.

The ACEC-SC Engineering Excellence Awards Committee reserves the right to determine eligibility and category classification of any entry.

Judging

Entries will be judged on the basis of overall engineering excellence in each of the 12 categories; the work performed by the entering firm only and the rating guidelines listed. Winners will be notified shortly after judging is completed. Judging will take place in December.

Rating Guidelines for Judging

Each entry will be evaluated based on the following five categories, which are key elements of the project description text required in the electronic submittal described in this brochure.

Rating Guidelines Definitions

1. Uniqueness and/or Innovative Applications of New or Existing Techniques:

- Does the entry demonstrate the use of a new science or a breakthrough in the general knowledge of engineering?
- Does the entry represent a unique application of new or existing technology, techniques, materials or equipment?

2. Future Value to the Engineering Profession and Perception by the Public:

- Will the entry redefine current engineering thinking?
- Does the entry advance a positive public image of engineering excellence?

3. Social, Economic and Sustainable Development Considerations:

- Do the solutions identified produce secondary benefits of value to the community environment?
- Does the entrant's approach provide society with social, economic, or sustainable development benefits?
- Does the entrant's contribution to the project improve the health, safety or welfare of the public or affected environment?

4. Complexity:

- Did the entry successfully address highly complex criteria or unique problems?
- Were extraordinary problems of site, location, hazardous conditions, project requirements, or similar elements present?
- Did the entry require the use of out-of-the-ordinary technology or ingenuity for achievement of the project's goals?

5. Successful fulfillment of Client/Owner Needs:

- Did the engineer or entrant successfully engage the client/owner in the overall project development process?
- Was it an economical and cost-effective solution?
- How did the final cost relate to the original budget estimate?
- How closely does the entrant's solution meet the total goals of the client/owner?
- Did the entrant meet the client's time schedule?

Awards

The Palmetto Award, recognizing the overall highest rated project, may come from any of the categories. An additional award will be presented for the highest rated project submitted by a small firm, defined as less than 30 South Carolina employees. The highest rated projects will qualify for national competition through ACEC. The ACEC-SC Engineering Excellence Awards Gala will be held February 4, 2020 in Columbia, SC.

Publicity

Participating firms must wait until after the Engineering Excellence Gala on February 4, 2020 to publicize winning project(s). ACEC-SC will publish a press release covering all winning projects to local and state media. It is up to individual entrants to publicize its project(s).

- **2. PHOTOS/GRAPHICS:** Maximum of 6 photos and/ or graphics shall be used on the panel. Each image shall be a minimum of 7" x 5" or 35 square inches in area. A background photo is not considered a photograph.
- **3. TEXT/FONTS:** Panel text may not exceed 250 words total, not including captions. Font sizes: 32 pt. minimum font for text or descriptions; 28 pt. minimum font for captions and graphics.
- **4. REQUIRED ELEMENTS:** The front on the panel shall also include the ACEC logo (download from ACEC website), title and location of the project or study, client/ owner's name and location, and entering firm's name and location (minimum 32 pt. font size).
- 5. CORNER SPACE: Leave a 2"x 2" space in the upper right-hand corner of the panel that is free of text or images. Do not leave the "blank" space as a white square; the background scheme should continue, but will be partially covered by the review committee's coding label.
- 6. BACK OF PANEL LABEL: Add a label to the back of the panel with the name of the entrant's firm, the firm address, the project name, and the entry category.
