Board of Directors Meeting

February 7, 2019

<u>Call to Order:</u> ACEC-SC Chair, Cameron Nations, PE, called the meeting to order at 10:02am. The following were in attendance: Keith Overstreet, PE, Jason Eppley, PE, Petrina Butler, PE, Matt Gehman, Jeff Mulliken, PhD., PE, Kylie Page, Rick Fauteux, PE, Melvin Williams, PE (Committee Chair), Ricky Ward, PE, (Committee Chair), Adam Jones and Elaine Mikell. On conference call were: Chuck Black, PE, Kevin Shoemake, PE.

<u>Consent Agenda:</u> Motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the December 6, 2018 Board of Directors Meeting Minutes with the following changes:

- Under National Director's Report, the sentence PAC is over 1.8 million be removed.
- Under the Executive Director's Report, the first two bullet points say the same thing. One bullet should be removed.
- Adam Jones to send promotional materials that was stated in December minutes.

Executive Director Adam Jones said two new members were approved by the Board of Directors on-line. The two new members are:

- Buford Goff and Associates, Inc.
- Tidemark Land Services, Inc.

Financial Report: Secretary/Treasurer Jason Eppley reported on the financial statement

- Year to date income is \$405,362.10, expenses of \$217,358.68, net income of \$188,003.42.
- Motion was made, seconded and approved to accept the financial report as given.
- The ACEC-SC/SCDOT Annual Meeting was great.
- Since ACEC-SC is a non-profit organization, Secretary/Treasurer Eppley suggested we invest some of this money or do something for the members.
- Melvin Williams suggested offering more scholarship opportunities or where members have debt.
- Executive Director Jones reminded the Board that investment ideas have been floated for years but no decision has been made as to the expected return, either high risk-high reward or low risk-low reward.
- Rick Fauteux suggested use the extra money to hire staff for a membership driven position. Jones said ACEC national has membership driven opportunities to make more money.
- Jones suggested revisiting the existing promotional material and improve upon this as well as have more materials-both email and on the print level.
- Mid-level designer's luncheons are no longer providing food, due to SCDOT rules.
- Motion was made, seconded, and approved to accept the financial report as given.
- A finance committee was form to seek suggestions on how to best use this money. The committee
 members are: Petrina Butler, Jason Eppley, Matt Gehman, Adam Jones and Joe Jones. This
 committee will bring forward ideas for print or presentation at the April Board of Directors Meeting.

Chairman's Report (Cameron Nations)

Strategic Plan Progress

- Grow/Diversify Membership-Chair Kevin Shoemake (on phone)
 - Emailed to the Board a spreadsheet all Engineering Companies in SC and lots of pertinent information.
 - Nations stated ACEC-SC historically has been transportation driven and this is shown on the pie chart under Civil Engineering. Nations asked if this could be broken apart to show what companies are transportation.
 - The goal is to diversify the membership.
- Grow The Brand-Co-Chairs Kylie Page/Keith Overstreet. This will also be discussed at the Board Retreat.
- Legislative Influence-Matt Gehman/Adam Jones. This will be discussed during the Committee Reports.
- o Energize and Engage Membership-Adam Jones
 - All events have been well attended
 - January 29th Legislative Reception was the best attended reception.
 - Engineering Excellence Awards had 15 entries, companies that hadn't entered in years.
 - ACEC-SC Winter meeting has around 75 people registered. Nations said he was looking forward to discussions about how social media applies to the design professional. Pecan Pie marketing will be presenting this session. An Ethics training session is also offered.

Vice Chairs Report (Keith Overstreet): Keith Overstreet has been planning the Board Retreat in March

- The retreat begins with the strategic plan update. Joe Clark will be back for a few hours.
- Readdress the strategic business plan.
- The plan is to update the Strategic Plan and move away from the draft.
- Proceed ahead

Executive Directors Report (Adam Jones):

- H.3758-Join & Several Liability-SCCLR.
 - o Representative David Hiott authored the bill
 - Got 64 Co-sponsors on this bill, all of the Committee chairs
 - The Trial bar went to work and we lost three sponsors, including Peter McCoy head of Judiciary.
 - o There is a meeting next week with the Speaker of the House to push for movement.
 - This was placed in a subcommittee that has two trial attorneys on it.
 - He plans to show a video we've worked up to send to our members and the legislators.
- S. 401-Utility Relocation Bill
 - o Bill was introduced by Senator Paul Campbell.
 - As of right now the SCDOT is talking internally whether they will support this, which they did last year but when Brian White said no, they deferred.

- o Mr. White is no longer on Ways and Means so hopefully it will get traction.
- We are obviously for this bill.

• S. 266-State Guard

- This bill is being pushed more by SCSPE, but there are member companies that have employees that serve in the State Guard.
- This gives them a little compensation for their volunteer efforts and gives them an extra tax credit.

• H. 3263-Military & Spouse Licensure

- o This bill deals with licensure by comity if you or your spouse is on active duty.
- Jones met with the author Rep. Murrell Smith on Tuesday, February 5. He said that he wants it to move.
- Once registered they would adhere to our practice act.
- Smith agreed that surveyors should take the state specific law test.
- Smith suggested Jones talk to other concerned parties and take it to Steve Davidson, the attorney in LCI.

H.3622-Lobbyist Definition

- o This bill has become a priority now, since it was given a hearing on Thursday morning.
- Jones spoke with Seth Rose, the author, before the meeting and he explained the intent of the bill.
- o Rose said basically if you don't have to register now for what you do you won't have to after this
- o Jones said he understood his intent, but did testify in opposition as it is written.
- They adjourned debate and said they would work on cleaning up the language.
- The Plastic Pipe Bill and the Building Code Adoption Bills have not yet dropped.
- There is a Bill being introduced in other states that would put tracking on computers used by firms that work with state agencies to ensure "transparency".
 - This came to Jones attention through the NAECE network.
 - The group pushing this has hired lobbyist in 43 states, but they have not come here yet. Jones will remain informed about this.
- Engineers Day at the State House is starting back up.
 - o Jones has had one person join him and Melvin Williams has come a few times
 - o Jones invited all to pick a Wednesday and come join him.
 - Jones is working on scheduling a meeting with the Governor on Wednesday, but Tuesday-Thursday would be okay during Engineers week.
- The Legislative Reception was January 29 at the Palmetto Club.
 - We had a great turnout with 51 legislators, elected officials and commissioners.
 - o Over 160 engineers, surveyors, contractors and architects.

- The Tuesday date seemed to be a success and we may continue to hold this event on Tuesday.
- The Engineering Excellence Awards were held on Tuesday, February 5, 2019
 - o Todd Ellis was a great Emcee and everyone seemed pleased with the Alumni Center.
 - o Cameron did a good job and we had 15 great entries.
 - Thomas and Hutton won the Palmetto Award, the top honor. This is the second time
 in a row Thomas and Hutton has won the Palmetto Award. They were also ACEC
 finalist, this allows them to complete at the national level.
 - o Jones thanked everyone that entered a project and attended the Gala.
- The ACEC-SC Winter Meeting is next Tuesday, February 12.
 - 70 people are registered to attend and there are two great tracks lined up-Business
 Track and an Environmental Track.
- ACEC is taking applications/nomination for Young Professional Award. Look in your company and see if there is a candidate you could nominate.
- George McCall, PE, F.NSPE Past SCSPE President, wants to host the Boards of Directors the
 night before the conference in June at his home. He will also provide a 1 PDH session in his
 blacksmith shop (with drinks) and your spouses can enjoy drinks around his pool.

ACEC-SC National Directors Report (Rick Fauteux)

- o The Ballot for the ACEC National Board was submitted.
- o ACEC is updating their website and is being reformatted.
- o There are no action alerts at present.
- o The Legislative Summit is May 5-8, 2019 at Marriott Wardman Park.
- o National Summit is October 13-16 in Chicago.
- o Dec 1, 2018, was the last National Director's Report from ACEC.
- The ACEC Planning Cabinet meeting is on February 11. One of the action items is engaging young members.
- On February 4th, Fauteux received a draft budget. The dues maintained at the current level.
- Daphne Bryant, ACEC Membership Director, has a specially created committee for new recruitment.
 - Working on profile sheets on all prospective firms
 - Established an executive steering committee
 - Financial operations should be completed by end of 1st quarter.
- Fauteux will be moving to the Chair of the Membership Committee.
- Melvin Williams is on the Transportation committee
 - Working on diversity
 - Set a Federal Legislative agenda going forward. Two goals going forward:
 - Protecting QBS
 - In-sourcing proposals
- Promote program management and eliminate statute overheads, working on white papers.

 - Black sent a list of ABET colleges to send the applications to, pending approval from Jones College student what schools to send the applications.
 - ABET has a tool that can search for accredited colleges

 - Ward is working with Overstreet until the retreat on communication and will give an update then.
 - Goals is to update website, Overstreet said we need to finalize who will manage the website.
 - Jones suggested we invite the current website designer, Grits Designs, to meet with communications committee to chart the course.
 - Nations asked that information about the retreat be added to the website.
 - Jones is still working on the App with the current company, committee wants updates on the app..
 - Social media should also be used to alert about ACEC-SC.
- Membership Committee (Kevin Shoemake)
 - Nothing new to add nothing to add
- Advocacy/PAC (Chair Matt Gehman)
 - Gehman spoke with Bowman Consulting about joining ACEC-SC.
 - Oyster Roast/Auction will be on February 28 at the Seabreeze Marina.

- Nominating Committee (Chair Kylie Page)
 - The Committee is working on how to be more transparent to the membership.
 - There is a document in the Board packet for the Board nominations.
 - Need to let members know how this process works.
 - Put a notice on the website that ACEC-SC is now taking applications for the Board of Directors
 - o Take applications on the website.
 - Start putting forth a slate of potential officers.
 - Document the process of this procedure.
 - At every meeting, we need to talk about the nomination process.
 - Page said some of the bylaws on this procedure are contradictory.
 - Ad Hoc committee was established to address this. Committee consists of: Page, Eppley, Mulliken and Butler. This team will work on bylaws to determine if there is a need to change the bylaws.

Other Business:

- Jones said with the vacancy of the Timmons Senate seat, Dwight is running for this seat.
 - Jones made the recommendation that we contribute to this campaign as we have in past campaigns.
 - Jones said Loftis has been favorable to engineers and surveyors in the past, helped push the Practice Act and has been an ally
 - Gehman asked that more information be provided about how he has voted in the past and if it Would it be better to provide money later for future matters.
 - Jones said he came to our lunches, legislative reception, insurance agent, ways and means committee.
 - o Jones said Loftis has attended meeting with us when we were supporting something.
 - Recommendation was made to get information out to board members and move this to an action item.
 - Motion was made to table this discussion to the next board meeting.

ACEC-SC – Communications Committee Report

March 13, 2019

1. Website reconstruction

Our current website is maintained by Robin Bennett of Grits Design (www.gritsdesign.com), a sole proprietorship. Robin is high energy, appears to be knowledgeable, and extremely price competitive. Details of her services are included on her site, which includes site development, maintenance and daily updates.

Robin has been maintaining the ACEC-SC website for two years, updating the site as requested. She was not involved with the current site development. According to Robin, our current website is built on the WordPress platform. Robin uses the Genesis Framework platform. Based on some limited research, both appear to be popular platforms with good reviews. Both are commercially available, not proprietary.

Robin and I reviewed the results of the Communication Committee's assessment of peer ACEC websites (ACEC, ACEC-GA, ACEC-WI), and several examples of Robin's work (see Portfolio on her site). We discussed the purpose and intent for ACEC-SC's website - to be the primary source of information for members on all things ACEC-SC, a recruitment tool for new members, and a resource for partners. My assessment of her portfolio is good, not the most sophisticated I've seen, but certainly serviceable for our needs.

We also discussed the quality control of the content on our website and who is responsible. Robin was clear that she only posts the information provided to her. She does not provide any spelling or grammatical reviews, or quality control of the information, imagery, or other content. From a practical standpoint, she is not in a position to do this for her clients since she does not have access to the details of her clients' operations. Adam and I talked briefly about the need to develop QC procedures for content we provide to Robin.

Robin is prepared to develop a new website for ACEC-SC. Her approach is very straightforward and timely. Based on the Committee's review of peer websites, our discussion, and a draft sitemap, Robin will develop a test site for our review. From the test site, we'll go through several iterations to refine the site to the point where we are ready to launch. I provided Robin with a draft sitemap (included) as a starting point that aligns with our strategic plan.

Cost and schedule – Robin said her fee is \$300-\$500, and only if the site is launched. This is so far below market price (typically \$10,000-\$15,000) that I believe we would be taking advantage of her to only pay this amount. This can be discussed further.

Given the low risk to starting the process, and after consulting with Adam, Robin is starting the development of a test site. Adam is providing Robin with a variety of imagery to incorporate into the site including projects from Engineering Excellence Awards entries, and photos from various ACEC-SC events. Robin said she would have a test ready by the end of March. At that point, the Communications Committee will work with Robin to review and refine the site for presentation to the Board. While we did not discuss a timeline for this, a target date for presentation to the Board could be in early May.

The real work will be compiling and developing quality content to populate the website. Some of this exists, some resides with committees, some needs to be developed from scratch, and much of it needs to be refined and edited. We'll need to work closely with Adam and his team on the content development.

2. Mobile app

Adam and I discussed the history of our mobile app, the developer who was also to provide ongoing maintenance, and the purpose of having an ACEC-SC mobile app. The developer has not met expectations and may not be in a position to service our needs from a cost and/or support perspective.

ACEC National has limited their app to support events, not to serve as mobile platform for their website. According to Robin, she develops her websites to be mobile responsive, meaning that the site layout and/or content responds/adapts based on the size of the screen it's presented on. A responsive website automatically changes to fit the device. This may influence the purpose of our app, for example, focusing it on supporting our events and political advocacy.

Adam is going to talk with Robin about her experience with apps, app developers she may collaborate with, or other ideas about the possibility of integrating the website and the mobile app. He's also going to investigate other options for supporting the mobile app. Once we are more informed, the Committee will review and discuss, and prepare a recommendation to present to the board on how to move forward with our mobile app. The goal is to bring this recommendation concurrent with the reconstructed website.

By killing the 1099 Filing Mandate,

ACEC members will not have to file a 1099 for each purchase of services or goods valued at more than \$600. One ACEC member, which currently files approximately thirty 1099s each year, estimates it would have had to file nearly 2,500 forms at a cost of \$70,000 under the mandate. ACEC coalition defeated the 1099 filing mandate.

\$238,000 saved!

By passing the 9% A/E deduction

on domestic services revenue in 2006, ACEC has saved its members millions of dollars. One ACEC member firm, with \$10 million in taxable income, decreased its tax liability by \$238,000. How much did your firm save? ACEC was instrumental in gaining this deduction.

\$1,000,000 saved!

By eliminating the 10% retainage

previously mandatory on federal A/E contracts, ACEC has greatly improved the cash flow of affected firms. A member with \$10 million in government contracts preserves up to \$1,000,000 in cash flow. How much has your firm saved? **ACEC led the effort to remove the mandatory retention rules**.



Works for ACEC Member Firms

ACEC/PAC plays an essential role in advancing policies at the national level that benefit engineering firms. Through its ongoing support of pro-business U.S. House and Senate candidates ACEC/PAC has helped to secure a number of recent legislative and regulatory wins.

ACEC/PAC has helped engineering firms by:

- Securing Long-Term Transportation Funding the FAST Act provides \$305 billion over five years for federal highway, transit, and passenger rail programs; it also streamlines infrastructure project reviews and promotes private sector investment in projects.
- Expanding QBS through a provision in WRRDA 2014 requiring communities to use QBS for wastewater projects funded through the State Revolving Fund (SRF) program; WRRDA also created a new financing mechanism for water/wastewater needs (WIFIA).
- **Promoting Contracting Out** through the FAST Act and WRRDA to support more private sector engagement by State DOTs and the Corps of Engineers.
- Reinforcing Federal Audit/Procurement Rules through new regulations issued by FHWA in 2015 (based on legislation ACEC pushed through Congress) that will further enhance the FAR-based audit and procurement rules DOTs must follow, bolster QBS requirements, and promote uniform standards for firms working in other states.
- Protecting Infrastructure Funding ACEC successfully averted drastic cuts to transportation programs threatened in recent congressional budget proposals.
- Promoting Tax Relief including securing a permanent extension of the R&D tax credit and higher Section 179 expensing limits, and extending bonus depreciation and renewable energy tax credits.
- Protecting Against Unfair Tax Burdens including stopping proposed payroll tax increases on S corporation owners, the 3% withholding mandate and an expanded IRS Form 1099 filing mandate.
- Expanding Energy Markets through lifting the ban on oil exports, and provisions in the FAST Act to enhance the security of the electrical grid.

What's Next:

- FAA Reauthorization to expand investments in airport projects and strengthen QBS requirements for projects funded through Passenger Facility Charges (PFCs).
- A New Energy Agenda to expand oil/gas markets, streamline transmission and pipeline permitting, and promote energy efficiency, grid modernization, reliability, and resiliency.
- Balanced Tax Reform to benefit large and small businesses equally, promote research and business investment, and preserve the ability of firms to use cash accounting.
- Protect Against Regulatory Burdens such as proposed changes to the Fair Labor Standards Act and the Administration's so-called "blacklisting rule."
- Promote Infrastructure Investment during the ongoing budget and appropriations process.
- Enforce the use of QBS and the FAR in federal and state contracts using federal funds.
