ACEC-SC Board of Director's Meeting November 4, 2021, at 10:00 AM Zoom

<u>Call to Order</u>: Chair Matt Gehman called the meeting to order at 10:03 AM. The following were in attendance: Matt Gehman, Jeff Mulliken, Chuck Black, Ben Temple, Dan Moses, Ricky Ward, Theresa Hodge, Jim O'Connor, Adam B. Jones, Allison King, and Sarah Waldrop.

A motion was made to approve the October 7 meeting minutes by Chair Matt Gehman, seconded by Secretary/Treasurer Chuck Black, and passed unanimously.

Membership Report: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported:

- Jones noted we are waiting to hear from Bunnell-Lammons. Jones has reached out to others that have not paid and expecting do get the dues income from most of them
- New membership applications:

A motion was made to approve applicants by Ricky Ward, seconded by jeff Mulliken, and passed unanimously.

Financial Report: Secretary/Treasurer Chuck Black reported:

- Jones noted we will be sending National its dues soon. Any non-paid members will be dropped at that time.
- Jones noted we are waiting on sponsorships from the ACEC-SC/SCDOT Annual Meeting.
 Those are still coming into the office.
- Black addressed the issue of some Chernoff-Newman bills having been accidentally mislabeled. They were correctly reapplied on the sheet for this month, as noted.
- Jones added that SCCFLR is "South Carolina Coalition for Lawsuit Reform." We have always been a member of that since its inception, but its name changed.

- Gehman thanked everyone who attended the National meeting in Florida last week. It
 was successful. ACEC National will be holding a Fall Private Market Symposium in
 Charleston on December 2-3, 2021, on rails, freight, ports, etc. Go register!
- Communications Committee Chair Ricky Ward has requested Director Theresa McClure take his place as Communications Committee Chair position. She has accepted.
- Brand awareness has increased, especially through social media. We are receiving more visibility.
- We have reached our PAC goal for the year. Thank you to everyone who has donated to the PAC.
- ACEC-SC would like to host an event in the first quarter for 2022 for Gov. McMaster.
- Question: When looking at the LinkedIn hits, it seems like they have decreased.
 - Jones responded: We have been posting all posts from Facebook and Twitter to LinkedIn. We'll put more dollars into advertising on LinkedIn.
 - Sarah Waldrop commented: Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter have post scheduling functions. LinkedIn does not, which makes posting delayed on LinkedIn occasionally. A social media scheduling platform would help create consistency with all social platforms and posting.

TEC

- Jim O'Connor spoke of his excitement for the potential positive impact of this Committee.
- Gehman added: We have the drafted bylaws for the Committee. Please provide comments on the bylaws.
- Ward requested the meeting minutes from the last TEC meeting as background for those looking at the bylaws, to see what issues are at the top of the list.
 - Jones said he will send an email on the TEC charter and bylaws to the Board.

Covid-19

- There has been discussion about returning to in-person meetings beginning next month. Davis & Floyd has opened its doors to us as a meeting space.
- o Discussion ensued.
- The general consensus was positive toward meeting in-person for the Board meeting in December.

<u>Executive Director's Report</u>: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported: <u>Legislative Report</u>

- IIJA
 - House & Senate passed another short-term program extension that funds surface transportation until 12/3/2021
 - House is stripping parts of the bill that have been controversial trying to get it passed

- The "Reconciliation "agreement is what is driving timing in the House
 - \$175 Trillion is what is expected
 - Expected a vote on 11/2/2021
- Tax impacts
 - Increase Corporate Tax Rate 26.5% (publicly traded companies)
 - Limit 199A 20% deduction to \$400k individual/\$500K joint
 - Increase top individual rate to 39.6% and capital gains rate of 25% for incomes over \$400k

PPP

- Brown-Katko amendment in National Defense Authorization Act has been adopted in the House.
- o Currently sitting in the Senate
- Vaccine Mandate from WH
 - ACEC engaging on two fronts:
 - Federal Contractors December 8th deadline for vaccination mandate
 - ACEC authored a letter to Whitehouse asking for clarifications and asking for the option of testing for non-vaccinated. (American Road & Transportation Builders Association, American Subcontractors Association, Independent Electrical Contractors, Independent Office Produces & Furniture Dealers Alliance, National Association of Surety Bond Producers, National Office of Products Alliance, National Society of Professional Surveyors, and Office Furniture Dealers Alliance all signed on the letter) copy in packet
 - All businesses vaccination mandates for firms with 100 or more employees;
 OSHA regulatory starting
 - ACEC-SC surveyed membership on its impacts
 - Results in packet
- Senator Hugh K. Leatherman
 - Has been diagnosed with an aggressive cancer
 - Hospice has been called in
 - Rumored that Senate President Harvey Peeler, Gaffney, will become Chairman of Finance
 - Not as friendly to infrastructure
 - Senator Alexander will become President of the Senate
 - He would have to stepdown as LCI Chairman
- Off-Season Lobbying Effort
 - Chuck has returned the PAC Checks. We will start making appointments with recipients next week.

ACEC National Director's Report: Affiliate National Director Jim O'Connor reported:

- The National budget was announced at the Conference in Florida. The information is available in the Board packet.
- National has purchased a townhome in D.C.
- A National Institute has been established to research issues with infrastructure.
- O'Connor recommended we push the Conference to more member firms in SC.
- Jones added that we were recognized for our 2% membership increase at the Conference in Florida.
- Jones noted he will keep the Board updated on dates for the D.C. office visits as constituents for several political leaders.

Committee Reports:

- Transportation Committee: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported:
 - The meeting had some hiccups, but we completed the voting.
 - Results:

- Voting Members: Eric Burgess (KCI), Daniel Atkinson (Holt), Stephen Ross (Michael Baker Int'l), Raven Gambrell (HDR), and David Beaty (Stantec).
 - Neither voting member was present, so we had to improvise within bylaw guidelines.
- o The finalized agenda for the Annual Meeting is at SCDOT waiting to be approved.
- O'Connor added: there is agreement language for Standard of Care in the RFP that is fantastic for the contractors who work with SCDOT. The AGC is against this language. We would love to have ACEC National back the argument with legal defense as to why it's appropriate to be included.
 - Jones said he will send the issue to Matt Reiffer at ACEC National.
- Question: What is happening with the seating for the Design/Build Subcommittee?
 - Jones responded that the nominations will be examined in the upcoming weeks.
- **BRE Committee:** Secretary/Treasurer Chuck Black reported:
 - Black noted that he and Waldrop got together about application corrections.
 Both parties will touch base around the holidays to make sure we are on the right track.
 - Mulliken spoke on Future Leaders.
 - Our next meeting is November 11 at 3:00 PM at The Palmetto Club. He extended an invitation to all Board members to join us.
 - The community service activity is still TBD.
- Communications Committee: Communications Committee Chair Ricky Ward reported:
 - Chernoff-Newman wants ACEC-SC to brand our PR/Social Media Efforts. Names for the brand are being vetted.
 - This would be an on-going campaign.
 - o CN is tracking issue sentiment on social media.
 - Jones noted they are brainstorming PAC events. They offered a silent auction, but we've tried that before and are looking for something new.

 - The membership postcard will be released mid-month.

Other Business:

- Gehman put out a call for someone to speak to the Board about 404 Permitting Process about Navigable Waters. We need an Environmental Committee report update. The lack of representation will be addressed.

RE: Standard of Care Language in Design-Build Contracts

Mr. Gambrell,

The American Council of Engineering Companies of South Carolina (ACEC-SC) would like to request that the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) continue to use the Standard of Care language in its Design-Build Request for Proposals and Contracts. ACEC-SC believes it serves all parties in the contract.

The current language providing that, "The standard of care for all design professional services performed by the designer of record and its sub-consultants pursuant to this agreement shall be the care and skill ordinarily used by members of the design profession practicing under similar condition at the same time locality of the Project" follows the common-law model and reinforces the state statute providing for a negligence-based standard of liability.

Deviating from the common law language usually tends in the direction of a perfection standard. This standard is, in effect, uninsurable for design professional firms because professional liability insurance will cover negligence, not failure to achieve perfection.

ACEC-SC believes striking the contractual language that ties an indemnification obligation to negligence can render the resulting risk exposure uninsurable. Once again, design professionals are only insured for errors or omissions that rise to the level of professional negligence.

Moreover, consultants feel that removing the provision sends a negative message to consultants considering teaming up with a contractor on a Design-Build project.

Though South Carolina does have a standard of care in its statute, we feel keeping this language in future Design-Build Contracts will promote competition. Many qualified firms will decline to partner or compete for Design-Build work because of the unreasonable exposure to liability. We do not believe the standard puts additional risk on the SCDOT or contractor, and keeping the language in the contract gives the benefit of clarity.

ACEC-SC appreciates SCDOT allowing us to comment on this issue and would like the Department to consider keeping it in the current standard of care language.

Bike & Pedestrian Safety: Understanding the Action Plan 10:00 AM - 10:50 AM

Between 2015 to 2019, there were 5,311 pedestrian collisions and 2,490 bicycle collisions in South Carolina – the sheer vulnerability of pedestrians and bicyclists make them at greatest risk of injury or death on our roadways. SCDOT, along with agency partners and stakeholders, are working in collaboration to develop South Carolina's first Statewide Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Action Plan (PBSAP) to address pedestrian and bicycle safety. The PBSAP will provide a framework for implementing proven pedestrian and bicycle safety countermeasures, and targeting improvements in areas that have a high number – or are at high-risk for – pedestrian and bicycle collisions. The discussion this morning will focus on the objective, data-driven approach that analyzed existing pedestrian and bicycle collision data to understand the statewide crash patterns.

Duncan Smith. PE - SCDOT

Duncan began working with the South Carolina Department of Transportation in 2011 in Aiken County Maintenance, followed by a stint in the Roadway Design Support unit of the Preconstruction Division, where he served as the Roadway Design Support Engineer. Duncan joined the Traffic Division as State Traffic Safety Engineer in May of 2019.

Emily Thomas - SCDOT

Emily has worked in the field of highway safety for nearly 14 years. As part of implementing a Complete Streets policy, design guidance and processes must be updated. This session discusses changes to SCDOT's Roadway Design Manual as well as future AASHTO manual updates, with an emphasis on integrating multimodal accommodations within the transportation system.

Carol Hamlin, PE - SCDOT

Carol spent several years as the District Permit Engineer for SCDOT's District 1 Office before joining Engineering Support as the Road Design Policy Engineer in 2018. Carol has been involved in recent updates to the Roadway Desian Manual that support SCDOT's Complete Streets Policy and is particularly interested in helping engineers solve difficult problems related to compliance and flexibility in design.

Highway Pavement, Maintenance & Rehab 2:50 PM - 3:40 PM

This session looks at the traffic speed deflectometer (tsd) and how it can assist the South Carolina Department of Transportation with making more informed decisions on pavement planning, design, maintenance and construction support. The presentation will discuss how TSD was utilized on I-85 Design-Build projects to help provide recommendations on existing pavement structure and design changes. Also, there will be discussion and examples of the other potential benefits and insights the data can provide through each stage of an existing pavement's life.

Eric Carroll, PE - SCDOT

Eric is a registered Professional Engineer in South Carolina and has over 19 years of experience with SCDOT. He started as a part timer in liquid asphalt/ mix design testing units while attending USC and has since served in various positions with the Department including his current role as the State Pavement Design Engineer where he guides the pavement design, pavement evaluation, geotechnical materials, reclamation materials and independent assurance units.

Jay Thompson, PE - SEPI, Inc.

Jay has been involved in the fields of geotechnical engineering, pavement engineering and construction and materials for 20 years. He had the opportunity to spend 10 of those years at SCDOT serving in the roles of Resident Construction Engineer and State Pavement Design Engineer. He is currently employed by SEPI Engineering and Construction Inc. as its CEI Manager for SC, but still spends considerable time focusing on payement related issues and projects.

AASHTOWare/Site Manager Update 10:00 AM - 10:50 AM

SiteManager has been the construction management system for SCDOT the last 21 years. Its replacement, AASHTOWare Project, is scheduled to go live next year and phase out SiteManager. We will discuss the benefits and challenges for making this large change.

Travis Driggers - SCDOT

Travis currently serves as the Construction Support Specialist for the SCDOT Director of Construction's Office. He has worked for the South Carolina Department of Transportation for 12 years. Travis currently maintains the SiteManager application and is actively working to implement its replacement, AASHTOWare Project Construction and Materials.

1-77 Over Catawba River Deck Replacement 11:00 AM - 11:50 AM

The I-77 bridges over the Catawba River in York County, SC, which carry 105,000 vehicles per day, were originally constructed in the 1970s and have experienced a significant increase in traffic count and loading since their constructions, resulting in rapidly deteriorating concrete decks that needed continuous repairs. SCDOT awarded a project to United Infrastructure Group, Inc. to remove and replace the southbound bridge deck in just 17 days.

Michael Gantt, PE - United Infrastructure Group

Michael Gantt is the Construction Operations Engineer with United Infrastructure Group, a heavy highway and bridge contractor headquartered in Great Falls, SC. He has worked with United for 12 years as a Construction Engineer, Project Engineer, and estimator on many large design-build projects and pursuits in Missouri, North Carolina, South Carolina, and internationally.

Transportation Asset Management 1:50 PM - 2:40 PM

Bringing together SCDOT's Transportation Asset Management Plan, The Ten-Year Plan and Performance Management's goal is to create a streamlined, performance-based approach to address challenges facing the transportation system.

Erin Porter, PE, PMP - SCDOT

Erin has spent over 20 years in private consulting managing water, wastewater and land development projects, and is now with the South Carolina Department of Transportation, Office of Planning working with Feasibility Reports.

US 21 Over Harbor River Bridge Replacement 2:50 PM - 3:40 PM

The US 21 Over Harbor River Bridge Replacement is an excellent example of a successful SCDOT Design-Build project. The 3,340-ft long bridge in Beaufort County serves as the only means of vehicular access to Hunting Island and Fripp Island. Here, we will discuss unique design elements, environmental challenges, construction of the new high-level replacement bridge, and demolition of the original swing-span bridge.

Billy has over 45 years of experience in bridge/highway construction, 43 of those years have been with United Infrastructure Group, Inc. He is currently the Project Manager on the Carolina Crossroads Phase 1 and Phase 2 Projects.

Barrett has over 23 years of experience in various environmental disciplines, and currently manages the Environmental Service Group for ICE.










Objective

The objective of the public relations campaign is to create a communications vehicle through which ACEC-SC can engage media outlets across the state as a thought leader on topics related to infrastructure, engineering, infrastructure planning and other relevant subjects.

Overview

The public relations campaign will be a named initiative designed to provide ACEC-SC with increased visibility to media outlets, SCDOT, the South Carolina General Assembly and the public. This campaign is designed to support ACEC-SC's legislative and thought leadership priorities on pertinent issues by folding the public relations efforts under one comprehensive program that provides consistency and purpose to external communications efforts. Media outreach and response would be branded under the campaign to allow for consistency in messaging and delivery, and would result in a heightened awareness of the public policy, regulatory and other issues important to ACEC-SC. The campaign would also provide the opportunity to highlight ACEC-SC's political advocacy and lobbying efforts on these issues to show a comprehensive approach to addressing infrastructure and engineering needs in South Carolina. Lastly, the campaign can also be used to create speaking opportunities for ACEC-SC leadership to engage with the leadership and/or membership of relevant organizations (Chambers of Commerce, economic development groups, etc..) to build a coalition of advocates for investment in infrastructure development and improvement.

Implementation

- 2. Establish a list of relevant topics and legislative priorities on which ACEC-SC would like to be a thought leader and take a position on publicly.
- 3. Develop list of ACEC-SC staff or Board Members who are comfortable authoring op-eds, letters to the editor and/or speaking to media. Media training can be provided by Chernoff Newman.
- 4. Draft external communications (press releases, op-eds, LTEs, etc..) around the topics established in Phase 2.
- 5. Identify reporters and media outlets to pitch. Identify relevant organizations for speaking engagements.
- 6. Announce the public relations campaign and its purpose through a press release distributed to media outlets across the state.
- 7. Begin pitching press releases, op-eds and LTEs to media outlets outlined in Phase 5. Begin reach out to relevant organizations for speaking engagements.
- 8. Maintain ongoing awareness of current topics and pitch ACEC-SC Board or Staff to journalists as interview or background opportunities.
