ACEC-SC Board of Director's Meeting

October 7, 2021, at 10:00 AM

Zoom

<u>Call to Order</u>: Chair Matt Gehman called the meeting to order at 10:03 AM. The following were in attendance: Matt Gehman, Jeff Mulliken, Chuck Black, Jason Eppley, Ben Temple, Theresa McClure, Bryan Shiver, Dan Moses, Ricky Ward, Theresa Hodge, Jim O'Connor, David Montgomery, Melvin Williams, Adam B. Jones, Allison King, Sarah Waldrop, Shawn Epps (F&ME), and Nick Murray (Chernoff-Newman).

A motion was made to approve the September 2, 2021, meeting minutes by Director Dan Moses, seconded by Vice Chair Jeff Mulliken, and passed without objection.

Membership Report: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported:

- We are tracking normally on membership dues.
- We have a new member, Haley & Aldrich.
 - The sponsor is Davis & Floyd.

A motion was made to approve the member with the contingency of a SC COA by Ricky Ward, seconded by Dan Moses, and passed unanimously.

<u>Financial Report:</u> Secretary/Treasurer Chuck Black reported:

- Total Income: \$292,575.37Total Expenses: \$71,031.72
- Black noted that there were a few coding errors that will be corrected in next month's financial statement. TDB bank did not cash a few checks, so we took a \$304.00 hit on our financials.

A motion was made to approve the financial report by Mulliken, seconded by Director Theresa Hodge, and passed without objection.

Chair's Report: Chair Matt Gehman reported:

- Gehman thanked everyone involved in making ACEC-SC more visible to the public.
- TEC
 - A memo was sent out to the member organizations detailing the new TEC.
 - A comment was made that workload size and employee count do not correlate to determine firm size for the TEC. JMT is not a small firm.
 - Jones responded that SCDOT made the determination based on workload.



- A suggestion was made that backlogs should be examined and used as a criterion.
- Jones noted the TEC reports to the ACEC-SC Board of Directors, not the Transportation Committee. Notes will be disseminated within the days following the meeting.
 - Meetings will be in-person only. The meetings with SCDOT will not be recorded.
 - The first meeting will be next Thursday. It will be recorded.
- Gehman noted he requested to be present at the meeting next week.
- Op-Ed
 - The op-ed was great but still unable to garner the votes we needed to pass the bill.
 - Mulliken suggested Zoom meetings in the future might be beneficial. Overall, he thought it went well.

Executive Director's Report: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported:

• Jones noted the KPI (key performance indicator) report.

Legislative Report:

- Infrastructure, Investment, and Jobs Act
 - ACEC & ACEC-SC launched a call to action before the expected vote on September 27/30, 2021
 - Had a targeted Call to Action to firms in Congressman Rice's district
 - ACEC has 10+ Republican votes in favor. Rice was identified as someone who may vote for the bill.
 - Published an op-ed in support of passage
 - Due to in-fighting with Democrats, no vote was held
 - House & Senate passed a 30-day extension of existing transportation programs
 - This gives the House 30 Days to have a vote on the IIJA
- PPP / Far Credits Clause
 - Amendment for a PPP/Far Credits Clause waiver put in the House version of the National Defense Authorization Act
 - This passed with the amendment on September 23, 2021
 - ACEC is working members of the Senate keep the amendment in the bill when it is debated/voted on
- Vaccine Mandate from White House EO 14042
 - According to USDOT's General Council's Office, if the source of the funding is from a federal grant, the EO mandate does not apply
 - If sources of funding is from USDOT (firm contracting directly with FHWA or FTA), the mandate does apply

- Off-Season Lobbying Effort
 - o Met with Rep. Caskey & Rep. Ott
 - Discussed spending of American Rescue Plan dollars
 - I told them we would like to see the money go to widening I-26 and other projects McMaster/SCDOT discussed.
 - Invest heavily in upgrading the water infrastructure
 - Redistricting is taking up a lot of their time
 - Masks/COVID-19 are also hot button issues in the House, Senate, and Executive Branch
 - Will schedule in-district meetings with people we will be giving PAC Donations too

Transportation Executives Committee:

- A memo went to membership on September 21
 - Made it clear that this Committee reports to the ACEC-SC BOD
 - o Jones will take minutes at each meeting and send them to BOD
- October 14, 2021, first meeting (ACEC-SC members only)
 - Seating is a priority
 - o Proposed Agenda Items?

Investments/Banking/Edward Jones

- Funds were moved in early September
 - Moved primary Checking to Edward Jones
 - We Will move other accounts once we have gotten used to the new bank
- Money is "already working for us."

ACEC-SC/SCDOT Annual Meeting

- The agenda has been finalized by Committee (in SCDOT's hands)
- Dale Murphy is the Keynote Speaker
- Sponsorships are coming in
- If the % positive rate is under 5%, I do not offer a virtual option unless SCDOT requires it.

Engineering Excellence Awards

- Ten Submissions in
- Recommend extending the deadline two-three weeks
- Jones requested we extend the deadline for EEA submissions.

Event for Governor McMaster

- Jordan Marsh reached out after speaking to someone from TranSystems
 - Asked about doing an event for McMaster
 - I told him we were interested
- ACEC-SC has not supported Gubernatorial elections



- Great way to raise our profile
- Great way to get our foot in with the Governor
- ACEC-SC PAC can only give so much, so we would have to figure out how to do sponsorships, and/or members would need to be prepared to write checks.

SC Engineering Conference & Trade Show

- The list for attendee splits is with ASCE-SC
 - An additional split of the money from Santee Cooper will add to what ACEC-SC gets
 - ACEC-SC had the best attendance out of the partners

COVID 19 Restrictions

- ACEC-SC/SCDOT Annual Meeting, if % positive rate is under 5%, I do not see offering a virtual option unless SCDOT requires it.
- Other states are hearing about firms not allowing travel/participation
- Most southern states remain in-person
- "Swim at your own risk," approach
- Covid-19 Restrictions
 - Jones requested information on meeting and travel restrictions with firms and Covid-19.
 - o There was a question about vaccine mandates with engineering firms in SC.
 - O'Connor noted JMT sent an email giving advice on vaccine mandates and installing a new rule that all new hires must be vaccinated. By December 8, 2021, all JMT employees will have to prove vaccine receipts to the HR Department.
 - Discussion ensued.

- Jones discussed hosting an event for Governor McMaster.
 - A concern was discussed that there might be an issue to "pick one horse to back."
 - Jones addressed the issue that he does not think anyone but Massey could give McMaster a run for his money. If this happens, we will host a second fundraiser for Massey.
 - Affiliate National Director Jim O'Connor advised we be careful of picking sides.
 ACEC-SC is apolitical.
 - No decision was made to move forward with this event today.

National Director's Report: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported:

- We are short of our goal. Please donate to the PAC.
- There is still more time to enter the ACEC-SC Fall Sweepstakes.

Committee Reports:

- **1.** <u>Transportation Committee</u>: Transportation Committee Chair David Montgomery reported:
 - Partnering Committee Meeting
 - There were discussions on the project pipeline.
 - o COGS may be getting additional funding.
 - o Several COGS will have safety projects coming out soon.
 - SCDOT said things were trending upwards.
 - o SCDOT believes on-calls will start trending upwards too.
 - Rob Bedenbaugh updated everyone on RPG, District, and Pre-Construction staff conflicting feedback. He also discussed BlueBeam.
 - Jones noted everyone will find Design-Build Subcommittee meeting minutes in the packet. SCDOT sent an RFP about cost; it's Phase 2 of a pre-existing study.
 - Williams added to the chat: "On Transportation: Senator Graham held an infrastructure round table in the Low Country. It was well attended by local government officials and SCDOT Leadership. Sen. Graham gave his support to infrastructure needs across our State."
 - Jones requested submissions for Transportation Committees.
- 2. BRE Committee: Secretary/Treasurer Chuck Black reported:
 - Black noted he wanted to discuss scholarship application updates.
 - Mulliken discussed the first Future Leaders event. It went well. The first educational meeting is next Thursday.

- 3. <u>Communications Committee</u>: Communications Committee Chair Ricky Ward reported:
 - Nick Murray discussed Brand Watch. It monitors ACEC-SC's buzzwords and legislation being tracked and provides data on the information input into the system. It monitors online sentiment towards these topics, mentions/volume,
 - There was lots of negative sentiment about Senator Graham's vote on IIJA.
 - McClure added that the IIJA Bill was one of the trending conversations in SC related to infrastructure.
 - Murray noted the top influencers talking about the IIJA Bill.
 - Murray said they were unable to successfully pitch the op-ed to *The State* and *The Post & Courier*. There was a smaller business journal that carried the news in the Upstate, Midlands, and Lowcountry.
 - Jones noted Rep. Caskey caught wind of the issue, and he was able to discuss it with him.
- 4. Membership Committee: Director Bryan Shiver reported:
 - We are sending out a new membership mailer very soon.
- 5. <u>Advocacy/Pac:</u> Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported:
 - Ideas for PAC events are still being discussed with CN. There have been only small margins of profit for each event proposed so far.

ACEC-SC Transportation Executives Meeting October 14, 2021

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 9:31. The following were present: Rick Day, PE, Jim O'Connor, PE, Berry Still, PE, David Kinard, PE, Matt Gehman, Derek Staton, Gina Bennett-Norris, Ed Parrish, and Adam B. Jones.

ACEC-SC Chair Matt Gehman thanked everyone for serving on the Committee. Gehman went over how the Committee came to be and the ACEC-SC Board of Directors Executive Committee's discussion with SCDOT. Jones explained that the firm size for this Committee is based on SCDOT workload, not FTEs like ACEC-SC's dues. He pointed out this is the reason that JMT is serving as a small firm. Discussion ensued about how firms were chosen. Workload versus employee count, and who would serve the one-year term. The Committee agreed that we could flip coins to decide that. Derek Statton stated he would like to be the two-year term for small firms, and Jim O'Connor is ok with that.

The question was asked about how ACEC-SC heard about the cost issue. ACEC-SC Executive Director reported he had heard about it from a member who had spoken to Deputy Secretary Leland Colvin at an AGC meeting. Jim O'Connor has spoken to Deputy Secretary Justin Powell and asked him what their problems are. O'Connor explained part of the problem is due to SCDOT's staff's scoping and contracts. Fees are escalating because they of change orders.

This Committee hopes to speak to SCDOT upper management and ask them to trim and improve contracts. It was suggested that a limited scope contract, instead of scoping all the way to contracting, would help reduce fees.

It was stated that what SCDOT needs is a partner. ACEC-SC should be this partner, and this Committee will help the relationship between ACEC-SC and SCDOT.

The Committee discussed what the Charter should look like and what the next steps are. The first meeting with SCDOT will be a listening session, and after that, we will create an agenda to discuss important items to the membership and SCDOT.

Future agenda items will be:

- Escalation of fees
- Percent of fee
- Contract value.
 - o Contract value and percent of what they're spending on design and CEI are higher.
- How does ACEC-SC help?

ACEC-SC needs to research "cost" around other states and as well as research what projects/contracts in other states look like. It was stated that fighting over scoping is comparing apples to oranges, so we need more data. It was noted that penalizing change orders increases fees. We may want to promote using lump-sum contracts, as lump sum helps control cost and has a clear scope of work.

It was determined that as a group, we need to help them solve the problem. We need to be able to say, "Here is why SC contracts are different from here." Before we do that, ACEC-SC needs to:

- Hear from them what the actual problem is.
- Where are you seeing it so that we can address it.
- "Let them know that we'll solve your problem, and we need to be part of the solution.

ACEC-SC has to listen and give ideas. ACEC-SC will go ahead and start our research, but the first meeting will be a listening session, and our answer is "How can we help."

After the first meeting, the action items:

- Adam Jones will write the first draft of the bylaws/charter
- Adam Jones will set up the first meeting with SCDOT
- Committee look at contracts to compare for research.

The meeting concluded at 10:35 AM.

Experts predict that more than 3 million people who would otherwise be uninsured will gain health insurance. Also make Affordable Care Act premium tax credits available through 2025 to 4 million uninsured people in uncovered states.

Dear Members of the Safer Federal Workforce Task Force and FAR Council:

On behalf of the American Council of Engineering Companies – the voice of the nation's engineering industry -- we wish to convey the concerns and questions our members have related to Executive Order 14042, "Ensuring Adequate COVID Safety Protocols for Federal Contractors."

ACEC is the business association of the nation's engineering industry. ACEC members – numbering more than 5,500 firms representing over 600,000 employees throughout the country – provide a wide range of services supporting federal agencies in the built environment, including military installations, public buildings, national parks, levees, dams, and waterways.

Federal vs. Non-Federal Contractors

Executive Order 14042 (EO) suggests that federal contractors will be required to verify and document the vaccination status of all employees, without exception. The EO suggests that this requirement may be required for all employees in any workplace location in which federal work is performed.

Most engineering firms perform a mix of federal and non-federal work, often with the federal work representing a fraction of the total work performed. Even among firms who provide

significant federal government services, most firms also serve a considerable volume of private and non-federal clients within the same or adjacent spaces.

It remains unclear whether and how a company can successfully segregate employees by their involvement in federal contract work, as many employees work collaboratively in teams, both within their own firm and also with other companies. In many instances, just a small segment of a firm's employees are client-facing and interacting with the federal government. In others, they work with subconsultants or as subconsultants themselves on a project. With numerous firms making up federal contracting teams on a design and-construction project, the layers of participants including very small, technical members of the trades community can make this EO very difficult to operate under.

The issuance of the FAR clauses resulting from EO 14042 will mostly likely cause some increased cost and schedule growth. Some firms do not derive significant revenue from the federal government and will elect to stop participating on projects when this new requirement is established on on-going work. The prime firms will then be forced to seek other firms to complete the work with the corresponding additional cost and potentially time. We would expect prime firms to submit requests for equitable adjustment for these additional costs and the potential additional time.

Impacts on Firms: Recruiting, Retention and Administrative Burdens

The Executive Order seems to effectively mandate vaccinations for all employees of all firms who perform any amount of federal work, leaving no accommodations for routine testing. The vaccine mandate, without an allowance for regular testing, differs significantly from the current reporting of the proposed Emergency Temporary Order that the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) is drafting for employers with 100+ employees. This forces federal contractors to risk significant employee attrition because many current and future employees remain unwilling to accept a vaccination. This puts employers in the position of having to choose either to keep those employees or keep the federal government as a client.

As previously stated, many firms work on teams, both within their company as well as with other firms, serving as either a prime contractor or a subcontractor. The documentation, transmission, and ultimate safekeeping of this personal information is a concern to many businesses, large and small. For very large companies with locations throughout the United States, verifying vaccination status presents challenges unforeseen or not easily resolved, including what form(s) of documentation is acceptable and how long it must be maintained.

Initial guidance has suggested that implementation will begin at or above the simplified acquisition threshold of \$250,000. Engineering services are unique in that they involve multi-year contracts, including smaller task order contracts known as an Indefinite Delivery/Indefinite Quantity (ID/IQ). The guidance is unclear in terms of how it will apply to those ID/IQ contracts – will the rule apply to individual task orders above the simplified acquisition threshold, or is the intent to apply the requirement to the cumulative amount of work under the contract (or multiple contracts)? That clarification is essential, particularly as requirements are flowed down to

subconsultants who may perform limited services for one firm but may have multiple clients performing federal work.

Limiting Competition for Government Contracts

The requirements that the EO prescribes will limit the number of companies who are willing to accept federal government work. It will unnecessarily act as a barrier to entry to the federal marketplace. It will also reduce the volume and diversity of provider options for the federal government, causing more disruption in an increasing uncertain and fragile period of economic recovery. This is already evident from the results of mandated vaccinations in the healthcare sector. Healthcare providers are experiencing significant attrition as a result of vaccine mandates at the state and local levels. The size of the A/E community is already constrained by the high level of education and licensure required for professionals. The potential for retraining and development of new resources is extremely limited when compared to other sectors. At a time when a large national infrastructure program seems imminent, the reduction in engineering professionals available to work on that program is problematic.

As the FAR Council continues preparing to execute this executive order, our members remain concerned over its implementation, how it will impact their firms and their employees working on federal contracts. The challenges to an A/E firm employing personnel that work on projects both federal and non-federal, with teams outside of their firm, and at times, remotely and/or not client-facing are immense and cannot be overstated. We appreciate the opportunity to provide this input and stand ready to work with the FAR Council as it continues its important work to ensure compliance with EO 14042.

On behalf of the undersigned organizations representing thousands of businesses serving the federal government, we are writing to address certain challenges our members face navigating Executive Order 14042, "Ensuring Adequate COVID Safety Protocols for Federal Contractors", including recommendations to enhance implementation.

We strongly support the goal of the President's policy and agree that vaccinations are essential to controlling the spread of the virus, saving lives, and restoring a sense of normalcy to society and the economy. At the same time, we are concerned that the timeline and elements of the policy will undercut the ability of the businesses we represent to support the critical needs of our federal agency clients and the taxpayers they serve. These critical services include the maintenance, design and construction of critical infrastructure, supporting federal agencies in the built environment, including military installations, public buildings, national parks, levees, dams, and waterways. Our community is under constant pressure to find and retain qualified employees. Given the nature of workforce and workplace, many employees work in outdoor settings which limits their risk of exposure to or spreading of the virus.

We believe that we can achieve the goals of the President's policy in a manner that would limit disruptions in the essential work we perform for our federal clients. In this spirit, we would **respectfully request a delay in the implementation of the Executive Order** to allow for the implementation of the following recommendations:

- Include the option of testing for non-vaccinated employees. Including a testing component
 would align EO 14042 with the President's Path out of the Pandemic, where an allowance for
 testing was included in the President's directive to the Occupational Health and Safety
 Administration (OSHA) in drafting their Emergency Temporary Standard. We believe a
 similar accommodation is essential for federal contractors, otherwise thousands of essential
 employees would be unable to perform their duties.
- Clarify timeframe and guidance for transmission of booster shots. As the increased eligibility to receive a booster shot is approved for use, it is believed that companies will be required to continuously ensure employees receive the latest booster shot in order to be "fully vaccinated". If so, how long after a booster shot is approved for their individual use does the employee have to get it before the employer is noncompliant? This unknown timeframe and lack of guidance places employees into different vaccination categories depending on the initial vaccination that they received, thus making it much more difficult for employers to track compliance.

- *Include definitions of terms used with the Executive Order*. Although the order delineates application between product- and service-based contracts, it does not clearly define the two in the guidance provided by the Safer Federal Workforce Taskforce. This is leading to greater confusion, especially regarding the flow down from prime contractors to subcontractors.
- Ensure consistent enforcement across agencies. The companies we represent have significant concerns related to consistency of enforcement, both within agencies, as well as with individual contracting officers that they partner with. The immediate impact this will have on our workforce, and thus readiness to serve our federal clients cannot be overstated. We have reviewed contract modifications that state "acceptance of the contract modification is mandatory for all Federal Supply Schedule contractors," and that certain agencies will be "flagging contractors that have not accepted the modification". Furthermore, agencies such as the General Services Administration (GSA) are including vaccination requirements in other contracts that are not required to be covered by E.O. 14042, such as applying the mandate to contracts below the Simplified Acquisition Threshold. The chilling effect coupled with the significant uncertainty that this creates for many businesses further erodes the partnership between the private sector and their federal clients.

Once again, we understand and support the Administration's goals of bringing this pandemic to a close, but it has been made abundantly clear by the thousands of companies we represent that its implementation will be extremely difficult, leading to unintended consequences and considerable disruptions in the services we provide to our federal clients. In the Architecture-Engineering-Construction (AEC) industry alone, we can envision a number of negative impacts, such as breach of contract, defaults, business failures, bankruptcies, and labor shortages. Our member companies are working proactively to ensure their workforce is vaccinated and they are leading by example, but additional time and improvements are needed to the policy to ensure effective outcomes.

Thank you for your consideration of these recommendations, and we look forward to working with you to achieve success on this critical effort.

This SCDOT/ACEC-SC Transportation Executives Committee Charter has been agreed upon by both SCDOT and ACEC-SC.

PROPOSED BYLAWS FOR ACEC-SC TRANSPORTATION EXECUTIVES COMMITTEE

In an effort to further enrich our relationship between the American Council of Engineering Companies of South Carolina (ACEC-SC) and the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT), ACECOSC and SCDOT have created the Transportation Executives Committee, consisting of ACEC-SC Member Firm Principals and SCDOT's Secretary of Transportation and the Deputy Secretaries to focus on highway-related engineering services. The ACEC-SC/SCDOT Transportation Executives Committee (TEC) will discuss high-level matters from procurement, strategic issues, and legislative issues. The Committee will be made up of transportation executives from the following size ACEC-SC member firms: two members from large firms, two members from medium-size firms, two members from small firms, and one member that is a DBE firm as well as the ACEC-SC Executive Director. For the purpose of this Committee, firm size will be determined based on the current workloads of the firms conducting work with SCDOT.

The Transportation Executives Committee will report to the ACEC-SC Board of Directors and will work at the behest of the Board of Directors. The Executive Director will take meeting minutes and copy the Board of Directors.

Committee members' terms will start on January 1st of each year.

The ACEC-SC Board of Directors will solicit nominations from membership organizations to serve on the Transportation Executives Committee. The Board will vet the nominees and vote on the Committee members. A call for nominations will be issued after the September Board of Directors meeting each fiscal year, with the selections being made at the November Board of Directors meeting.

Terms will be two years, rotating one member in each of the "firm-size" categories each year. DBE members will serve two years.

To best represent ACEC-SC on the Committee, ACEC-SC representatives must be from active member firms. The representative must be a member firm owners or stockholders, decision-makers, or run the transportation departments of the firms' South Carolina office and be able to make business decisions for the firms when it comes to their transportation clients. The representatives must have extensive experience in the transportation space and have a proven records of working with SCDOT while with the committee members' current firm.

- The rotation of the Committee members should be staggered to maintain continuity on the Committee.
- Former SCDOT employees may serve, but they must have been away from SCDOT for an appropriate amount of time

To meet the above goals, the following rules for rotation of the Transportation Executives Committee members have been established as follows:

1. Transportation Executives from large, medium, small firms as well as a DBE firm member will be added to the Committee to make a total of seven ACEC-SC representatives, not including the ACEC-SC Executive Director. Each member will serve a two-year term. Terms begin January 1st and end two years later on December 31st.

- 2. At the end of every calendar year, one member from each firm size will rotate off, and three will remain on the Committee for the following year.
- 3. Those ACEC-SC members wishing to serve on this Committee will submit a resumes and letters to the ACEC-SC Chair along with their experiences with working with SCDOT by October 1st.
- 4. The ACEC-SC Board of Directors voting members will review all applicants and vote on the three most qualified candidates for a two-year terms. The ACEC-SC Executive Director will notify the SCDOT Deputy Secretary of Engineering of the new members.
- 5. All Committee members must work for an ACEC-SC member firm and be in good standings with ACEC-SC.
- 6. Each Committee member must commit to attending and participating in no less than 100% of the Committee meetings and provide regular reports to the ACEC-SC Board of Directors.
- 7. If for some reason an ACEC-SC Transportation Executives Committee member must resign, the ACEC-SC Board of Directors may select a replacement or that position may remain open until the application process begins after the September Board of Directors meeting. If the seat is filled by the Board of Directors before the end of the term in which the previous member resigned, the incoming Committee member may only serve the remaining time of the resigned members' term. However, the replacement member may submit an application for the following term.







EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- There were 71 mentions this week. Mentions include: the Berlin G. Myers Parkway project will begin in 2022, a new bridge was completed on I-26, an I-85 widening project update, SC ports have been handling record cargo volumes flowing into CHS ports, and U.S. Sen. Jon Ossoff is fighting to get \$10 billion included in the budget reconciliation bill for high- speed passenger rail in the Southeast.
- Since January 2021, Brandwatch has identified over over 14k mentions of the American Council of Engineering Companies: SC, South Carolina infrastructure, South Carolina roads and bridges and other relevant terms.
- There were many mentions of Senator Lindsey

 conversation of over 5k mentions.


Weekly Mentions: October 15-22

Yearly Mentions Excluding National Political Mentions: 5,252











EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- There were less than 12 mentions identified as negative sentiment by Brandwatch this week.
 Negative sentiment comes from individuals expressing their frustration with poor infrastructure in S.C., and the Build Back Better agenda revisions taking too long.
- In the total conversation, negative sentiment is higher than in the more focused South Carolina conversation. Peaks were around Sen. Graham initially not supporting the Biden infrastructure bill and then Graham being censured when he decided to vote in favor of the bill. Users responded with the most positivity when he changed his mind for the good of South Carolina.
- In looking at the conversation more specific to South Carolina, many South Carolinians were angry when Graham initially did not support the bill, others felt he did not support the GOP when he changed his mind. The D+ rating for S.C.'s infrastructure also drew negative attention. Users responded positively to funds coming to the state to aid in infrastructure repairs (bridges mentioned specifically) and more recently to improvements to I-26.


Weekly Sentiment: October 15-22
