ACEC-SC Board of Director's Meeting December 2, 2021, at 10:00 AM Zoom

<u>Call to Order</u>: Chair Matt Gehman called the meeting to order at 10:03 AM. The following were in attendance: Matt Gehman, Jeff Mulliken, Chuck Black, Ben Temple, Theresa McClure, Bryan Shiver, Dan Moses, Ricky Ward, Theresa Hodge, Kylie Page, Jim O'Connor, David Montgomery, Melvin Williams, Adam B. Jones, Allison King, and Sarah Waldrop.

A motion was made to approve the November 4 meeting minutes by Secretary/Treasurer Chuck Black, seconded by Director Theresa Hodge, and passed unanimously.

Membership Report: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported:

- AECOM's dues are on the way. Ardurra is in the process of paying. Construction Sciences
 was bought by REI, but they will be separated on the membership report. Stevens and
 Wilkinson was purchased, and ACEC National does not believe they will renew.
- Zuendt Engineering
 - Sponsor: Director Ricky Ward, RK&K
- Melvin Williams noted ATCS was not present on the membership report. Jones said we will add them.

A motion was made to approve today's applicant by Director Dan Moses, seconded by Black, and passed unanimously.

Financial Report: Secretary/Treasurer Chuck Black reported:

Total Income: \$445,034.08

• Total Expenses: \$145,559.88

- Our assets are in good shape.
- PAC checks will be taken to the State House soon.
- We are about halfway through the budget for Chernoff-Newman expenses.

A motion was made to approve the financial report by Communications Committee Chair/Director Theresa McClure, seconded by Hodge, and passed without objection.

Chair's Report: Chair Matt Gehman reported:

- Gehman noted we're very close to our goal of 100 member firms, but we need to do better about diversity.
- We've done well growing our brand.
- We're moving forward with McMaster's fundraising event, perhaps a lunch or dinner.

- Moving forward, how does everyone feel about in-person board meetings? Would people prefer virtual meetings? Discussion ensued.
 - The consensus was positive for virtual meetings.
 - Moses raised his concerns for lack of mask requirements or negative test results for the Annual Meeting next week.

<u>Executive Director's Report</u>: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported: <u>Legislative Report</u>:

- IIJA
 - o Passed November 5, 2021
 - SC expects close to \$5 billion in investments over the next five years
 - \$4.6 billion for federal-aid highway appropriated programs and \$274 million for bridge replacement and repairs.
 - \$366 million for public transportation
 - \$70 million to support the expansion of electric vehicle charging network
 - \$100 million to invest in broadband coverage across the state
 - \$15 million to protect against wildfires
 - \$18.3 to protect against cyber attacks
 - \$510 million to improve water infrastructure
 - \$161 million for airport improvements/development
 - Significant investments in weatherization to help with extreme weather events
 - SC will need to raise a minimum of \$100 Million annually to get the surface transportation funding.
 - SCDOT would like to get \$200 million/annually to take advantage of other grants in the IIJA
- PPP
 - ACEC is trying to keep in the Defense Bill
 - Rand Paul is trying to take it out
- Vaccine Mandate/EO 14042
 - Lawsuits for the constitutionality of the mandate
 - Governor McMaster passed Executive Order that so State Agencies do not have to abide (SCDOT specifically)
 - ACEC is still seeking clarifications
- SC General Assembly returned December 1, 2021
 - Working on re-districting
- Senate District 31 (Leatherman's District)
 - Vacant seat will open at noon Friday, 12/03/2021
 - Filling for the vacant seat will close at noon on 12/11/2021
 - o Primary Election 1/25/2022
 - o Election 3/29/2022
- Off-Season Lobbying Effort
 - We have sent requests for meetings

Other:

- Ricky Ward asked about a backdrop with all of the logos with it for Engineers' Day on The Hill.
- Hodge asked if the Board be able to submit comments on the charter.
 - Yes, the Board will be able to see it; however, Secretary Hall has not seen it yet.
 - Chair Matt Gehman noted that SCDOT has been the main source of comments for the charter.
 - Jones added that we have drafted bylaws too. Comments on those have to be back before the end of the year.
- The SC Engineering Conference & Trade Show has issued a call for papers.

- Jones additionally noted we are working on setting times with Senator Kent Williams and Bill Sandifer for off-season lobbying.
- ACEC-PA Executive's house burned down. There is a Go Fund Me. Do we want to donate?
 - Adam will share the link.

ACEC National Director's Report: National Director Kylie Page reported:

- Page said she participated in the nominating committee, and she is turning in her ballot.
- ACEC-SC needs to sign-off on the ballot.

A motion was made to approve the ballot by Ward, seconded by Hodge, and passed unanimously.

Committee Reports:

- Transportation Committee: Transportation Chair David Montgomery reported:
 - o Gehman noted he appointed Mitchell Metts (ICE) for the Partnering Committee
 - effective January.
 - o Transportation Chair David Montgomery reported:
 - SCDOT is migrating software.
 - There are no on-call updates.
 - SCDOT is submitting packages next month for project priority list.
 - Chris Gaskins of the Design-Build Subcommittee was worried about using all allocated money on on-call contractors list.
 - The Mid-Level Subcommittee elected two alumni from Future Leaders to be new co-chairs on the subcommittee.
 - David Russell is now on the Design-Build Subcommittee and found replacement for his old Mid-Level Subcommittee position.
 - SCDOT is removing the Standard of Care language from contracts.
 - AGC won the battle.
 - ACEC-SC spoke out against it so it was on record so AGC can't use it against ACEC in the General Assembly.
- **BRE Committee:** Secretary/Treasurer Chuck Black reported:
 - There was no report from Black.
 - o Vice Chair Jeff Mulliken reported on Future Leaders.

- Jeff Mulliken noted Noble Anumbe will be speaking on December 16 about Project Management.
- As for the Community Service Activity, we are looking at a Pinewood Derby competition at the SC Engineering Conference & Trade Show.
 - There is a debate whether if the winning Future Leaders team should be sponsored to go to the ACEC National Conference next year.
- Mulliken extended an invitation to Board members to participate.
- We will be sending speaker evaluations to Future Leaders.
- Ward suggested for mentors that we should create an activity related to the topic of the upcoming meeting before the next meeting to help the information stick better and be more meaningful.
- **Communications Committee:** Communications Committee Chair Theresa McClure reported:
 - McClure thanked JMA for updating the website and keeping the information fresh and relevant.
 - We heard great feedback on the Op-Ed about IIJA. Chernoff-Newman came up with an idea for a focused campaign for this. The approach is in the agenda. Names need to be voted on:
 - Infrastructure Works
 - Infrastructure Matters
 - Critical Infrastructure
 - Hodge submitted the name "Infrastructure 4U."
 - The vote was for "Infrastructure Works" and passed unanimously.
 - The campaign starts in January; topics will be discussed later.
 - The email structure has been edited to concentrate information, and it looks really good. We didn't have to transfer systems.
 - We need board members to speak on topics for the campaign. Let Theresa McClure know if you are interested.
- Membership Committee: Membership Committee Chair Bryan Shiver reported:
 - o The membership social campaign will start up next year.
- PAC/Advocacy: Executive Director Adam B. Jones reported:
 - We've reached our goal for the year.

Other Business:

- Jones spoke with Environmental Committee Chair Tom Jordan about the Environmental Committee meeting. If there are any topic suggestions, please let Adam know.
- Jones noted the Board Retreat is March 10-12, 2022, at the Asheville Grove Park Inn.
- Mulliken reminded everyone to bring toys or monetary donations for Toys for Tots to the Annual Meeting next week.

South Carolina is poised for a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity that can improve the quality of life for its citizens while growing our state's economy. South Carolina stands to receive nearly \$5 billion in federal funds from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) — a multi-trillion-dollar federal spending bill that provides funds to build and improve infrastructure across the United States.

To access the IIJA funding, South Carolina must identify opportunities to provide matching dollars. The South Carolina General Assembly will be required to raise at least \$100 million annually in state funds to begin to draw down the federal dollars outlined in the IIJA for surface transportation funding. The real goal for the S.C. legislature, however, should be to raise \$200 million annually in state funds to ensure that the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) is able to take advantage of the many grants outlined in the IIJA. Access to these grants is critical to SCDOT's ability to implement road and bridge improvements across the state.

I urge all South Carolinians to speak to their elected officials and advocate for allocating the \$200 million in state funds needed to secure the federal dollars and investment in South Carolina. Our local elected officials alone hold the ability to secure this funding by making a reoccurring commitment to support a lifetime of opportunity. It is unlikely that there will ever be another chance like this for our state.

This generational achievement for our country and for South Carolina will allow the state to improve and/or replace our state's aging infrastructure while also creating opportunities to expand access to critical infrastructure, like broadband internet, to the areas of state that need it most.

The types of projects that the IIJA will fund in South Carolina are investments that will allow our state to continue to prosper by creating and facilitating opportunities for economic development and the continued growth of the state's economy. The bipartisan bill outlines long-term investments that will provide jobs to thousands of South Carolinians over several years and ultimately leave South Carolina a better connected, safer and prosperous state for our children and their children.

This level of investment in our state's infrastructure would allow for \$4.6 billion to be allocated for federal-aid highway appropriated programs and \$274 million for bridge replacement and repairs, \$510 million to improve water infrastructure, \$366 million for public transportation, \$161 million for airport improvement and development, \$100 million to invest in broadband coverage across the state, \$70 million to support the expansion of electric vehicle charging network,\$18.3 million to protect against cyberattacks and \$15 million to protect against wildfires.

South Carolina will also benefit from the IIJA's proposed \$3.5 billion investment in weatherization technology and infrastructure to soften impacts from extreme weather events.

SCDOT, South Carolina Ports Authority (SCPA), Palmetto Railways and other members of the supply chain, along with their private sector partners, deserve to be applauded for the infrastructure improvements and efficiencies they have been able to create in their respective industries. With the additional funding the IIJA will provide, economies of scale can be applied to provide necessary funding to undertake several large projects at the same time or closely together. This will allow agencies and other state and municipalities to coordinate on projects as they occur in real-time and with confidence once funding for these projects is secured in full.

South Carolina cannot afford to miss this opportunity if we wish to continue improve the safety and efficiency of our states' transportation infrastructure.

- The FY'22 spending package. Congress still needs to pass the spending bills that fund various federal agencies and programs action is expected by mid-February -- and this legislation is likely the next available vehicle for ACEC's PPP amendment. Right after January 1st, we need to engage in a new grassroots effort which will target Senators on the Appropriations Committee. That roster can be accessed here, and we will be sending you draft language to send to each of these offices to request a meeting to discuss our issue and request their support for a legislative fix.
 - Engaging Senator Rand Paul. As we've discussed previously, the primary obstacle remains the senior Republican on the Senate Small Business Committee Senator Rand Paul (R-KY). We're working with Russ Romine and his ACEC/KY members on new outreach to the Senator, including reiterating our request for a meeting to make our case for a waiver from the FAR credits clause.
 - Outreach to the Senate Small Business Committee. As part of our effort to engage Senator Paul, we also need to engage the Republican members on the Senate Small Business Committee to request their support for a fix. That roster can be accessed here. Similar to the Appropriations strategy noted above, we will be sending those of you who have Republican Senators on the Committee a sample request for meetings in January.
- Communications. The fourth pillar of the strategy will focus on communications to heighten attention to the issue and the need for a fix. This will include re-engaging with reporters we worked with over the past year, engaging through social media, the placement of op-eds in certain states and congressional districts around the country, and letters to the editor from impacted firms. We will be working with Jeff Urbanchuk and his team to develop sample materials that you can use, and coordinate with you on placement in key newspapers and other media platforms.

FACT SHEET: EPA & The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law

Following the passage of the historic Bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will be making significant investments in the health, equity, and resilience of American communities. With unprecedented funding to support our national infrastructure, EPA will improve people's health and safety, help create good-paying jobs, and increase climate resilience throughout the country.

The single largest investment in water that the federal government has ever made.

The nation has underinvested in water infrastructure for too long. Insufficient water infrastructure threatens America's security, and it risks people's health, jobs, peace of mind, and future prosperity. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law delivers more than \$50 billion to EPA to improve our nation's drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure. This is a historic investment that includes:

Safe Drinking Water

\$3.5 billion for Superfund site clean-up work.

What this means

More than one in four Black and Hispanic Americans live within 3 miles of a Superfund site. No community deserves to have contamination near where they live, work, pray and go to school. With this funding, communities living near many of the most serious uncontrolled or abandoned releases of contamination will finally get the protections they deserve.

Brownfields Revitalization

\$1.5 billion to scale-up community-led brownfields revitalization.

What this means

Blighted and polluted sites in communities across America will be assessed, cleaned up and made available for safe reuse, spurring job creation and economic opportunity in areas that need it most.

Waste and Recycling

\$350 million for Solid Waste and Recycling Grants and \$25 million for Battery Recycling.

What this means

Communities across the country are burdened by pollution impacts from inefficient waste management systems. This historic investment will transform recycling and solid waste management across the country while creating jobs. This investment will also improve the nation's battery recycling programs while promoting the safe handling of used batteries.

A major investment in electric and lowemission school buses and healthier air for children.

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invests in making the nation's school bus fleet cleaner, including:

Electric and Reduced Carbon Buses

\$5 billion for decarbonizing the nation's school bus fleet.

What this means

More than 25 million children ride the bus to school each day, some breathing polluted air from diesel school buses. By deploying electric and lower emission school buses, fewer children will face increased asthma risks and other health problems linked to diesel air pollution.

Increased funding for pollution prevention.

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law increases resources to help businesses reduce toxic pollutants, with a new focus on underserved and overburdened communities, including:

Pollution Prevention

\$100 million for the Pollution Prevention (P2) Program and the launch of a new program targeting environmental justice.

What this means

More businesses will be able to get assistance to reduce toxic pollutants, cut water usage, improve efficiency, and lower costs, which will improve their operations while better protecting the communities in which they operate.

DESIGNER FAIR CONTRACTING

The Problem

- Often engineers, architects, and other design professionals are asked to sign contracts that require them to indemnify, hold harmless and defend an owner and unrelated third parties against claims for damages that are outside the scope of the engineer/architect's work and control
 - Design firms have no problem indemnifying an owner for their own negligence and mistakes this bill does not change that
- Situations that are of concern are those unrelated to their work on a project yet they are being asked to pay for and resolve these claims
- This demand/contractual obligation is uninsurable under their professional negligence policies so it comes right off the bottom line
- Even more egregious, a "duty to defend" clause would trigger from the outset and could require the design firm to expend hundreds of thousands of dollars defending a third party even when the design firm had no role and contributed in no way to the claim
- These third-party indemnity/duty to defend clauses in design contracts create liability without requiring proof of fault
- These provisions cause significant financial threats and burdens on design firms, especially smaller Women-owned and DBE firms.
 - In some cases, firms sign these contracts and do not fully understand the significance of these provisions
 - Small firms do not always have in-house attorneys that can attempt to address these
 - And in some cases, the firm is presented with a "take it or leave it" response
 - In other cases, good firms that would do good work just walk away and do not do the work
 - Also, time and money spent defending an owner against a claim you had nothing to do
 with takes time and money away from growing your business

An Example

- By way of example, the owner requires the design firm to indemnify and defend against all claims from third parties, regardless of whether the design firm was negligent or involved in the claim.
- The claim comes in from a third party and does not involve the design, the design firm, or any of the entities the designer used to complete the work.
- The owner immediately sends the design firm a demand to defend them and other parties who may be named in the claim.
- Contractual duty to defend is triggered, and the design firm must pay for an attorney, probably of the owner's choosing
- The design firm has no control over the representation or defense, must just pay the bill
- The duty to defend could result in several hundred thousand dollars in defense costs for a claim, the design firm did not cause and had no control over
- The duty to defend and money spent is not paid by insurance but paid by the design firm
- Depending on the size of the design firm and size of the financial obligation/claim, this could put the design firm out of business.

Legislation Solves the Problem

• Changes to the law will protect design firms from this unfair, uninsurable liability.

- Adding language to the existing statute to address these indemnity / duty to defend provisions related to design contracts
- The bill as passed in North Carolina clarifies the already stated public policy of the State to address situations that should be covered but are not given the language used in the existing statute, and we feel the same could be updated in South Carolina
- The Bill in NC:
 - (a) Maintains the existing law for contractors
 - (b)Added new language addresses third party indemnity/duty to defend clauses in design contracts
 - (c) Provides that this section has no effect on insurance contracts, workers' compensation insurance, etc.
- Similar statutes have passed in North Carolina, Georgia, Florida, and Arizona

Designers Still Responsible for Their Own Negligence

- The design firm will still be responsible for and can indemnify for its own negligence and liability and for those they supervise, control, hire, etc.
- Where an owner claims an issues or claim is a design issue, the design firm will be involved from the beginning with any other party alleged to be at fault, to work through it, pay money to resolve, etc. this bill does not change this process
