A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the May 2, 2019 Board Meeting Minutes.

Membership report: The board had two membership applications to approve.

 - Overstreet will continue the Strategic Plan
 - o ACEC-SC Annual Calendar was laid out.
 - Future Leaders Program was revamped
- ACEC National Conference was represented well by ACEC-SC with a few members serving on national committees:
 - National Director Rick Fauteux, HDR served as Vice Chair of the Membership Committee and ACEC
 Planning Cabinet
 - o ACEC-SC Director Melvin Williams, S&ME is serving on the ACEC Planning Cabinet

- While in Washington, DC, ACEC-SC met with the South Carolina Delegation.
- In the spring, the Annual Scholarship Golf Tournament at the Lexington Country Club was held for the Larry Hargrove Memorial Scholarship Fund.

SC Frivolous Civil Proceedings Sanctions Act

Issue: In 2005 South Carolina passed a Tort Bill. The bill adopted a gatekeeping statue which allows a plaintiff to bring a professional negligence suit against a licensed professional if a plaintiff files a complaint with expert witness saying a professional was negligent.

- In action for damages alleging professional negligence against a professional licensed by or registered with the state of South Carolina and listed in subsection (G)... the plaintiff must file as part of the complaint an affidavit of an expert witness which must specify at least one negligent act or omission claimed to exist and the factual basis for each claim based on the available evidence at the time of filling of the affidavit."
 - (... has language dealing with hospitals and medical professionals)
- Parties listed in sub section (G): Architects, Attorneys at law, CPAs, Chiropractors, Dentists, Land Surveyors, Medical Doctors, Marriage & Family Therapists, Nurses, Occupational Therapists, Optometrists, Osteopathic Physicians, Pharmacists, Physical Therapists, Physicians' Assistants Professional Counselors, Professional Engineers, Podiatrists, Psychologists, Radiological Technicians, Respiratory Therapists, & Veterinarians.

ACEC-SC's Concern: A federal district judge says this does not apply if the defendant is a company, so plaintiff's attorneys are now skirting the law by going after design firms.

DESIGNER FAIR CONTRACTING

PCS for Senate Bill 569 and House Bill 871

The Problem

- Often engineers, architects, and other design professionals are asked to sign contracts that require them to indemnify, hold harmless and defend an owner and unrelated third parties against claims for damages that are outside the scope of the engineer/architect's work and control
 - Design firms have no problem indemnifying an owner for their own negligence and mistakes this bill does not change that
- Situations that are of concern are those unrelated to their work on a project yet they are being asked to pay for and resolve these claims
- This demand/contractual obligation is uninsurable under their professional negligence policies so it comes right off the bottom line
- Even more egregious, a "duty to defend" clause would trigger from the outset and could require the design firm to expend hundreds of thousands of dollars defending a third party even when the design firm had no role and contributed in no way to the claim
- These third party indemnity/duty to defend clauses in design contracts create liability without requiring proof of fault
- These provision cause significant financial threats and burdens on design firms, especially smaller WMBE firms.
 - In NC we have specific requirements in public contracts for the use of WMBE firms yet when these provisions are used it undercuts the support we're trying to give WMBE firms and could cause harm
 - In some cases firms sign these contracts and do not fully understand the significance of these provisions
 - Small firms do not always have in-house attorneys that can attempt to address these
 - And in some cases the firm is presented with a "take it or leave it" response
 - In other cases, good firms that would do good work just walk away and do not do the work
 - Also, time and money spent defending an owner against a claim you had nothing to do with takes time and money away from growing your business
- North Carolina has a statute prohibiting these types of contracts as against public policy but it's an old statute that has some gaps that need to be closed for design firms especially because they do not have insurance for these unfair obligations that are not related to their own work

An Example

- By way of example, owner requires design firm to indemnify and defend against all claims from third parties, regardless of whether design firm was negligent or involved in the claim.
- Claim comes in from third party and does not involve the design, the design firm, or any of the entities the designer used to complete the work.
- Owner immediately sends design firm a demand to defend them and other parties who may be named in the claim.
- Contractual duty to defend is triggered, and design firm must pay for an attorney, probably of the owner's choosing
- Design firm has no control over the representation or defense, must just pay the bill

- The duty to defend could result in several hundred thousand dollars in defense costs for a claim the design firm did not cause and had no control over
- The duty to defend and money spent is not paid by insurance but paid by the design firm
- Depending on the size of the design firm and size of the financial obligation / claim, this could put the design firm out of business.

Legislation Solves the Problem

- The PCS for Senate Bill 569 and House Bill 871 will protect design firms from this unfair, uninsurable liability.
- A new subsection (b) is added to the existing statute to address these indemnity/duty to defend provisions related to design contracts
- This bill clarifies the already stated public policy of the State to address situations that should be covered but are apparently not given the language used in the existing statute
- To walk through the sections of the bill:
 - (a) Maintains the existing law for contractors
 - (b) New language addresses third party indemnity/duty to defend clauses in design contracts
 - (c) Provides that this section has no effect on insurance contracts, workers' compensation insurance, etc.
 - (d) Maintains the exemptions to the indemnity language in subsection (a)
- Similar clarifying statutes have been recently enacted in Georgia, Florida, and Arizona

Designers Still Responsible for Their Own Negligence

- Design firm will still be responsible for and can indemnify for its own negligence and liability, and for that of those he/she supervises, controls, has hired, etc.
- Where an owner claims an issues or claim is a design issue, the design firm will be involved from the beginning with any other party alleged to be at fault, to work through it, pay money to resolve, etc. this bill does not change this process

Contractors Already Protected and Not Affected by this Change

- Contractors are already protected by the existing law
- We asked them if they wanted to be included in the bill and they said no okay with existing statute
- Original bill would have made changes to their statute, and we took out those changes in the PCS
 to only address the issues faced by design firms
- Primary difference between new design firm subparagraph and existing law for contractors is addressing "duty to defend" provisions it is uninsurable for design firms, typical GL insurance policy of contractors covers these contractual obligations

ACEC-SC Investent Strategy Info

ACEC MO	Investment Stratagey
ACEC-MO	ACEC Missouri uses an investment advisor through our bank. Our reserves are largely invested in mutual funds and managed for an approximate 6% return per year on the balance. Our investment strategy is growth and income. That would equate to a moderate risk objective. Currently we have a little over 40% of annual income in reserves.
ACEC-VA	We started putting funds, every 6 months, in CDs, until we develop something letter The interest rate is coming up.
ACEC-KS	Adam, we don't do anything more adventurous than a money market account
ACEC-WI	We just recently moved it to a money market earning 2.5% and that was after moving it last year to a 2% one.
	We formed an investment committee – and there is a bit of a stop/start history as we initiated this in 2008 and fortunately sat out of the market!
	Form an investment committee, primarily made up of CFOs of member firms (4-5) and an investment policy Identified risk tolerance through some small surveys and what we could 'afford to lose'; and what reserves were for. We were probably about a 60 of 100 in long term stability so we can handle minor fluctuations
	We ended up with a 25/75 split 25% in laddered CDs which we set quarterly so ¼ of the 25% comes due each year. We may consider longer than 1 year terms if there is a major difference in rates but still pretty close and I think we are about 2.25% on this
ACEC-NY	75% in a managed fund with a professional who gets a small cut off the top as management fee (as opposed to getting funds that build that in)
	We did suffer early losses as we got in towards a higher market but by year end (12 months in) we ended up with a 1.5% rate of return.
	One thing I learned and would change if I did it again would be to add one additional level of conservativism to appease my engineer members. Instead of jumping in to the 75% fund at once, I would have done 25% per quarter to minimize shocks. Of course if market had screamed upwards, I would be jumping for joy. Don't try to market time. Play the long game and averages.
	FYI, our reserves are about 1.1 million; 750k in long term managed; 50k CDs (4 of them) balance is in a money market that moves in and out of checking as we need it. Our cash flow will jump in the next month as early dues come in and we may do a short term- 6 month (?) cd if it is substantially more than MM.
ACEC-NJ	Good question and happy to share. We also wanted to invest but didn't want to tie up our money for long stretches in case we needed the liquidity. Two years ago we took half the money we wanted to invest and opened a 6-month CD. With the other half we opened a MM. We're earning north of 2% on each. We decided to diversity so that we wouldn't ever need to tap the CD mid-term. We've been rolling the 6-month over but as rates creep up I may move it to a 12-month. We wanted
	to start conservatively and now that we have a comfort level, I suspect we will sock more into the MM or open an additional CD sometime in the next year. Hope this helps.
ACEC-ND	We have our excess dollars in a 12-month Certificate. We're earning about 1.45%. It comes due in December and we will likely move it into something else, but haven't decided what yet. I'd be interested in a summary of what you get from other folks. We have about \$70K, so not a huge amount, but like to have about a year's budget set aside in case the economy tanks and we lose membership.

ACEC-SC Investent Strategy Info

ACEC-NC	We have everything in CD's. Our Board (and me) don't want to get too risky with the member's money. Basically, if it's not "insured" (FDIC or otherwise), we don't invest in it.
ACEC-NC	That being said, all of our CDs are 1-year term. But, we have CDs coming due every quarter. And, we have the fairly well balanced to where approximately 25% of the reserve comes due each quarter. That way, if rates go up, we can "ride the wave." Of course, the risk is that rates will go down, but, oh well#@%^ happens.


