It replaces control and predictability with resilience and growth to handle challenges so that all sides benefit. So, attendees are invited to bring a leadership challenge for which our collective intelligence will help us explore adaptive versus technical solutions. We'll bring into the mix emotional intelligence, organizational justice, vulnerability, and win-win problem solving. Current situations benefitting from adaptive leadership might come from K-12 and higher education, outdoor adventure programming, corporate and community social justice work, and moving from Covid back to community.
