Applied Demonstrations: Applied Demonstrations allow a presenter to share applied, systematic demonstrations of clinical, performance management, supervisory, or training activities that address a unique question or demonstrates a creative application of ABA-based strategies with clients, caregivers, or staff. The abstract clearly describes the primary take away(s) for the audience (e.g., how can the audience put the information into practice). Note – the project need not be formal research.

Score	Criteria
5	• Abstract clearly describes how attendees will use the information in practice. • Content answers a unique question or describes a creative application of ABA-based strategies. • Graphs are complete (baseline/intervention data for ≥ 1 participant). • Statement included that consent was obtained for all data and information collected and presented.
4	• Abstract describes how attendees could use the information in practice. • Content answers a common question or demonstrates the application of commonly used ABA-based strategies. • Graphs in progress (baseline complete, intervention underway for at least 1 participant). • Statement included that consent was obtained for all data and information collected and presented.
3	• Abstract is compelling but somewhat vague in terms of how attendees could use the information in practice. • Content answers a question or describes the application of ABA-based strategies that may be relevant for only a subset of practitioners. • Graphs include baseline/pre data and one treatment data point/post data for at least one participant. • Statement included that consent was obtained for all data and information collected and presented.
2	• Abstract is vague or unclear. • Content related to a specific topic but does not answer questions or describe applications of ABA-based strategies. • Graphs are not included but there is a statement related to the intervention being underway. • No statement that consent was obtained.
1	• Abstract is insufficient for review (not enough content, too short). • Content is too broad to be useful. • Graphs are not included, no mention of progress on the intervention. • No statement that consent was obtained.
