ARLIS/NA Creates Open Access Task Force

Formed in spring 2016, the Open Access Task Force (OATF) was charged with researching and developing recommendations for the implementation of an ARLIS/NA open access publishing program that builds upon the Society's existing open access Learning Portal service. This fall, a second task force (OATF2) will conduct a detailed analysis of the options available to support a greater degree of openness for the society's publishing program.

Help Make ARLIS/NA's Art Documentation More Open

This Open Access Week let's all try to make Art Documentation as open as possible! The University of Chicago Press currently allows authors to make their articles openly available in institutional repositories after a one-year embargo. This means that Art Doc relies on its authors to make their work open access, and many studies have shown that despite a big push for self-archiving, deposit rates remain low. Let's make sure Art Doc is an exception! If you've had an article published in Art Doc, take a moment this Open Access Week to deposit it in your institution's open repository (you can even deposit the formatted PDF). We also encourage you to find out if you can deposit any

ARLIS/NA Plans Open Access related Conference Panels and Workshops
