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

GENERAL INFORMATION

PRE-REGISTRATION

Pre-registration forms and fees for the session of the twelfth annual conference of ARLIS/NA *must be received no later than January 15, 1984*. Pre-registration is required for most special events, such as tours, meals, and receptions, whether an additional fee above basic registration is charged or not. Tours will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis (see below under Tours). Keep in mind that space is limited for almost all special events, so please return your pre-registration materials early. Tickets for all events will be distributed at the Registration/Information Desk upon your arrival. No tickets will be mailed.

Basic registration fees include attendance at all sessions, the Convocation and Reception at The Cleveland Museum of Art, the evening reception in honor of new ARLIS/NA members and first-time conference attendees, and access to the exhibits.

If tickets remain for any special events, they will be available at the Registration/Information Desk. Please keep in mind that the ARLIS/NA Executive Board has established the following policy: Any guests of conferees are encouraged to register for the conference as a whole. Unregistered guests will be permitted to

join tours and special events on a space-available basis only immediately prior to the event, after all registered conferees have been accommodated.

For those unable to pre-register, on-site registration will begin on Friday, February 17 at 5:30 pm and will end on Wednesday, February 22 at 9:30 am. 




PASTELS: From the 16th to the 20th Century






LOCAL TOURS OF UNIVERSITY CIRCLE INSTITUTIONS

Refer to the University Circle map in the registration materials for institution locations. Transportation is by RTA Red Line trains EASTBOUND from the Terminal Tower concourse to the Cedar/University stop. Exit at the EAST end of the platform and transfer to University Circle buses which will provide continuous shuttle to all points.

CLEVELAND HEALTH SCIENCES LIBRARY. The Library's Historical Division includes a substantial number of herbals, artistic anatomies, and other rare medical books dating from the 15th through the 19th centuries. The Division's Howard Dittrick Museum of Historical Medicine is concerned with the history of medical technology. A major new exhibit on the regional development of medicine will open February 13.

FREIBERGER LIBRARY, CASE WESTERN RESERVE UNIVERSITY, the University's humanities collection and rare book room.

GARDEN CENTER OF GREATER CLEVELAND. The Garden Center features an excellent and beautiful horticultural library.

CLEVELAND INSTITUTE OF ART. The Institute is a private professional college of art with an enrollment of 500. The Gund Library and classrooms are in the East Boulevard building, while the recently renovated Ford factory building by Albert Kahn houses studio space.

CLEVELAND INSTITUTE OF MUSIC. The conservatory offers degree-granting programs on undergraduate and graduate levels. The Institute has an excellent music library.

THE CLEVELAND MUSEUM OF ART. "One of the major museums of the American continent with one of the most important recent assemblies in the world."—Apollo. Including the new Ingalls Library wing.

CLEVELAND MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY. A large collection of excellent displays in all areas of natural history.

WESTERN RESERVE HISTORICAL SOCIETY—CRAWFORD

AUTO-AVIATION MUSEUM. A large collection of the history of Connecticut's Western Reserve, housed in two historic mansions and additional buildings. Important collections of furniture and decorative arts. The Auto-Aviation Museum has over 200 vehicles.
