








ON-SITE REGISTRATION

For those unable to register early, on-site registration will begin at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 23. An additional charge will be made for registrations made after February 15, 1989 or those made on-site.

AUTOMOBILE PARKING

The Hyatt Regency Phoenix is located at 122 North 2nd *Street* (602) 252-1234 at the intersection of 2nd Street and Adams. Valet parking is available for \$6.50 per day or cars may be self-parked in the adjacent garage for \$4.50 per day. There are several commercial parking lots (uncovered) within a two block radius whose prices are subject to change.

THE HOTEL

The Hyatt Regency Phoenix is located in the heart of downtown Phoenix just ten minutes from Sky Harbor International Airport and directly across the street from Phoenix Civic Plaza, the Convention Center, and the new Herberger Theater Complex. North on Central Avenue the Phoenix Art Museum, The Heard Museum, and the Public Library can be easily reached by means of public transportation or a short taxi ride. Within its 24 stories, the hotel provides 711 rooms, 24 meeting and ballrooms, 2 restaurants, 2 bars, and a full complement of visitor and convention services. The Terrace, offering breakfast, lunch, and dinner, is immediately adjacent to the Hyatt's 8-story atrium and the ARLIS/NA exhibits area. There is ample room for casual conversation and relaxation. The Compass Room is open for lunch, dinner, and an excellent Sunday Brunch—make your reservations early for Easter Brunch! Both the Compass Lounge (great for sunsets) and the *Plaza Bar* are open for happy hour buffets. Within the hotel are five retail outlets and a branch of the Phoenix & Valley of the Sun Convention & Visitors Bureau. The registration desk and the hotel concierge will be available for local information and sightseeing advice.




galleries will be open during this reception. Preregistration is required.

FUNDRAISER



TRANSPORTATION





AIRPORTS

All Phoenix inbound air traffic utilizes Sky Harbor International Airport located near central Phoenix, about ten minutes by car from the Hyatt Regency Phoenix.

All airport terminals are served by independent cab companies and SuperShuttle. A cab ride to the Hyatt Regency Phoenix should be \$7-\$8, exclusive of gratuity. Generally there is no charge for additional passengers. SuperShuttle offers a \$5 per person fare to and from downtown hotels.

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Many cab companies serve the Phoenix area. Three are:

Taxi service in Phoenix is not regulated. Prices will vary. In general, the first mile should range from \$2.05 to \$2.40; additional miles should cost about \$1.20 each.

Distances between points of interest can be extravagant, so plan ahead for cab fares. For destinations in Scottsdale or Tempe car pooling is advised.

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When making a reservation with Alamo Rent-A-Car, request Goup I.D. #37938 and rate code G-5. The telephone number is (800) 732-3232.

DOWNTOWN PHOENIX AND THE VALLEY

Getting around Phoenix is not a problem. Detailed maps of the area are included among your registration materials. It is, however, *vital* that you notice whether addresses are *streets* or *avenues*.

In the Phoenix/County system, numbered AVENUES, DRIVES and LANES run north-south and are located *west* of Central Avenue. Named STREETS and ROADS run east-west with Central Avenue demarcating east from west. The city is primarily arranged in a grid pattern. For your own peace of mind, and for that of cab drivers as well, be sure to notice east or west/avenue or street before hitting the road.

PHOENIX TRANSIT

A Bus Book is available at the Registration Desk. Please refer to this publication for accurate schedules and routes.

A convenient Central Avenue Shuttle runs from Southern Road to Indian School Road on Central Avenue. Buses depart every ten minutes between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. The fare is 25 cents, exact change. This service provides efficient transportation to the Phoenix Art Museum, Phoenix Public Library, and The Heard Museum. Park Central Shopping Center is also on this route. North of Indian School Road and at other times the bus fare is 75 cents, exact change.

The Hyatt Regency Phoenix Concierge Desk will also help with any transportation problems or requests.
