[14:03] Cara List: Hello and welcome to the first post-conference Lunchtime Chat.

[14:03] Meebo Message: bnowlin is now known as Bridget Nowlin

[14:03] Cara List: Today's chat is the Spring Conference Round-up.

[14:04] Cara List: We're pleased to have Eamon Tewell, the Senior Library assistant at the Moore College of Art and Design as our speaker today.

[14:04] Eamon Tewell: Thanks for having me! I always enjoy sharing conference experiences

[14:05] Cara List: Eamon attended both the Association of College and Research Libraries (ACRL) conference in Philadelphia, and the College Art Association (CAA) conference in New York

[14:05] Cara List: Eamon, would you like to share some of the highlights of each of these conferences with us?

[14:05] Meebo Message: guest928192 is now known as Anna S>

[14:06] Eamon Tewell: Certainly! I spent a solid three days at ACRL this past March/April...

[14:06] Eamon Tewell: for those who aren't familiar, ACRL is a division of ALA geared

towards college/research libraries

[14:07] Eamon Tewell: And the sessions certainly reflected that. Not a great deal was focused on the arts, but the sessions that were, were excellent

[14:07] Eamon Tewell: One session was on "A Field Guide to Visual Literacy"

[14:08] Eamon Tewell: The three presenters covered Core Visual Literacy Standards, Image Use Among Arts Researchers, Integrating Visuality into Instruction

[14:08] Eamon Tewell: ...and I should mention, do interrupt me with any questions!

[14:09] Eamon Tewell: A lot at ACRL was not art-specific, but still relevant for those in academic settings

[14:09] Cara List: was this session related to the ACRL project to define visual literacy? I think there are some ARLIS members who've been involved.

[14:09] Heather Koopmans: I was just going to ask the same thing

[14:11] Eamon Tewell: Yes, that's correct! The first session was presented by Ann Medaille and Denise Hattwig

[14:11] Eamon Tewell: Joan Beaudoin discussed image use among arts researchers...

[14:12] Eamon Tewell: And Holly Wilson and Laena McCarthy rounded out the session, presenting on strategies for incorporating visual learning into instruction sessions

[14:13] Eamon Tewell: FYI, the full ACRL schedule is at:

[14:13] Cara List: for any of you planning to be at ALA in NOLA this summer, I see that there is a panel on Visual Literacy planned for that conference as well..

[14:14] Meebo Message: iclibref is now known as Jenny Strickland

[14:14] Alice Whiteside: Eamon, did Visual Literacy (or related issues) come up at CAA as well?

[14:14] Eamon Tewell: Thanks for the link Cara!

[14:15] Eamon Tewell: CAA did not have any sessions on visual literacy or library/VR related sessions, that I saw

[14:16] Eamon Tewell: There were three library-related poster sessions, however, which I thought was great

[14:16] Eamon Tewell: The posters are here:

[14:17] Eamon Tewell: I found CAA to not have much in the way of libraries/visual literacy, but was great for discerning trends in arts research

[14:17] Alice Whiteside: cool. Thanks for the link

[14:17] Heather Koopmans: I was wondering about that myself - I understand it's more practitioner/teaching faculty focused?

[14:17] Anna S>: What trends did you notice, if any stick out?

[14:18] Eamon Tewell: Heather yes, very much so.

[14:18] Heather Koopmans: What has been the value of attending CAA from the librarian's point of view?

[14:18] Heather Koopmans: ditto @Anna S' question

[14:18] Eamon Tewell: Some trends I noticed were an emphasis on the digital - curating new media, digital art, making physical objects from data...

[14:19] Eamon Tewell: As well as feminism and world art, and representing traditionally underrepresented areas/artists

[14:19] Eamon Tewell: The themes are shown well in the "Centennial Sessions":

[14:20] Eamon Tewell: For me, the value of CAA was simply becoming more familiar with trends in arts research

[14:20] Heather Koopmans: thanks for the link!

[14:21] Cara List: did you attend any of the sessions that dealt with archives-- I think there was one on oral histories and one on Latino art.

[14:21] Eamon Tewell: I did run into a few faculty at my institution, so that was a nice coincidence

[14:21] Eamon Tewell: faculty *from* my institution at the conference

[14:22] Anna S>: It's a nice way to stay integrated with faculty.

[14:22] Eamon Tewell: I only had the chance to attend one day of sessions at CAA, so I missed any archives-related session

[14:22] Eamon Tewell: Anna S: yes, exactly!

[14:23] Anna S>: And how was your session received?

[14:23] Anna S>: What was the level of interest like?

[14:23] Eamon Tewell: The sessions at CAA I *did* go to were on Making Museums Matter (integrating programs with college courses), and The Art of Pranks, both enjoyable

[14:24] Eamon Tewell: To be honest, it was minimal. I think part of it was the posters were in a hall not frequently used

[14:24] Eamon Tewell: But the poster attendees who were interested were very interested.

[14:24] rkfriedman: I attended one day of CAA this year, and attended a very good session entitled Beyond the Slideshow: Teaching the History of Art and Material Culture in the Age of New Media - very interesting and VR-related. I can look at my notes for more info.

[14:24] Heather Slania: Any useful tidbits from Making Museums Matter?

[14:26] Cara List: yes--'d love to hear more about the Making Museums Matter session. The art historians here do quite a bit with the museum, and many of my grad students work in the museum, and end up writing theses on objects in our museum.

[14:26] Eamon Tewell: The session really emphasized paying attention to the course curriculum and tailoring events/exhibits towards the student calendar

[14:27] Eamon Tewell: Very micro-level integration with the syllabus, combined with a lot of dialogue/planning with instructors

[14:28] Cara List: so the intended audience would have been university museum administrators?

[14:29] Eamon Tewell: Yes, administrators and curators. Very little practical advice, but it was an interesting session regardless as I don't often hear about outreach from a non-library perspective

[14:30] Anna S>: What kind of strategies were discussed in Beyond the Slideshow: Teaching the History of Art and Material Culture in the Age of New Media?

[14:30] Eamon Tewell: It's a long list!

[14:32] Eamon Tewell: Yes, I'd be interested to hear as well

[14:32] Cara List: while Rebecca is thinking about an answer-- did anyone else here attend CAA?

[14:33] Cara List: Or have any of you attended in the past?

[14:34] Anna S>: Not I.

[14:34] Heather Koopmans: I was not at CAA or ACRL, I'm just here to see what everyone else has to say 😊

[14:34] Anna S>: Ditto!

[14:35] Cara List: me too-- I'm just curious to hear from others how they felt this conference prepared them for the work they do with students and faculty.

[14:35] rkfriedman: one speaker spoke about how she uses images in unique ways for a "new geography of art," for example, searching for "maple sugar" in ArtStor in relation to trade routes

[14:35] Eamon Tewell: This was my first CAA--in terms of Cara's question I do feel a little more prepared to discuss their research

[14:36] Eamon Tewell: The sessions also work as a good conversation-starter post conference back at work

[14:36] rkfriedman: maps as artistic examples in their own right; she's a landscape expert at CUNY graduate center

[14:37] rkfriedman: I think it's critical to attend CAA once in a while, if possible, so as to know what issues are being discussed and just for general education, as I mentioned earlier (I just went up for the day b/c I could take the train)

[14:38] rkfriedman: another speaker in that session described a new digital media lab and how to create one from scratch; included innovative ways that students are using wikis for classes and tools like Prezi to enhance presentations at the Bard Graduate Center

[14:39] rkfriedman: another speaker, long-time VR curator at Rutgers, spoke about his use of Second Life for virtual classes

[14:39] rkfriedman: the organizer of the session was a VR person, ABD in art history and now works for ArtStor

[14:40] rkfriedman: or, not ABD (I believe she finished, actually - PhD)

[14:40] Eamon Tewell: Sounds like a great session. That was last year's CAA?

[14:40] rkfriedman: Yes, in NYC - this past February

[14:42] Heather Koopmans: Not to get off topic, but earlier in the chat @Eamon mentioned some interesting non art topics/ themes from ACRL.

[14:42] rkfriedman: very relevant to us librarians - not surprising, b/c Johanna Bauman also has a library degree (organizer)

[14:42] Heather Koopmans: What were some of these?

[14:42] rkfriedman: librarians need to infiltrate CAA more, perhaps. I attended one other session which was not good at all, however - speakers were not organized, and one used no images. (on Latin American Art - not archives)

[14:43] Eamon Tewell: Yes, ACRL had some major themes that will sound familiar to any academic librarian...

[14:43] Eamon Tewell: Assessment and demonstrating value were big concerns

[14:44] Meebo Message: caralist is now known as Cara List

[14:44] Eamon Tewell: As well as information literacy outcomes and measuring learning in the library classroom

[14:44] Eamon Tewell: ACRL is also good for tech stuff: Mobile technologies and how to easily implement things like smartphone apps were in a few sessions

[14:45] Eamon Tewell: Also online instructional videos, and QR codes

[14:46] Cara List: I'm always interested in Collection development themes-- any conversations about patron driven acquisitions?

[14:47] Cara List: (also to Rebecca, and anyone else interested in "infiltrating" CAA, this coming year's conference will be in LA from Feb 22 to 25.)

[14:47] Eamon Tewell: I believe there was one session on patron-driven acquisitions but I wasn't able to attend

[14:48] Eamon Tewell: If I remember correctly there is a session on the same topic at ALA this summer

[14:49] Eamon Tewell: A couple sessions at ACRL also talked about evaluating print vs. electronic resources, always a big topic

[14:50] Eamon Tewell: The ACRL Virtual Conference website is at <http://www.learningtimes.net/acrl/2011/>

[14:50] Cara List: Any outstanding tips that came from the E v P evaluations?

[14:50] Eamon Tewell: Which contains some "slidecasts" of the sessions that were presented

[14:51] Eamon Tewell: Cara: not that I heard--was off doing something else during the sessions!

[14:51] Cara List: ok

[14:52] Heather Koopmans: Eamon, you anticipate testing out any of the ideas you've gathered at ACRL at your library? It's always interesting to hear how others apply information they've gathered from conferences.

[14:52] Eamon Tewell: One thing that really excited myself and my colleagues was the announcement of a "shelf reading app"...

[14:53] Cara List: that sounds interesting ?

[14:53] Eamon Tewell: Shelf-reading takes a lot of student worker time at our library, and a professor at Miami is working on a smartphone app to "read" the books on the shelf

[14:54] Eamon Tewell: Long story short, it isn't ready yet, but it sounds very useful

[14:54] rkfriedman: PDA is an interesting element of e-book subscriptions nowadays. This came up when EBSCO recently came to my institution to talk about the new NetLibrary.

[14:54] rkfriedman: Many e-books can be viewed, but patrons have the option of purchasing to see fuller content - various options for how to present this model at an institution.

[14:54] Eamon Tewell: An article on the app at Library Journal: <http://tinyurl.com/4xuxhsv>

[14:54] Alice Whiteside: I believe Stacy Brinkman is involved with the shelf reading app project - another ARLIS connection

[14:54] Eamon Tewell: Alice: That's correct!

[14:55] Heather Koopmans: That sounds pretty cool!

[14:55] Eamon Tewell: Rebecca: interesting, I haven't heard of a "view on demand" option with e-books

[14:55] Cara List: It does sound cool. It would save libraries tons of time and \$\$!

[14:56] rkfriedman: Yes, EBSCO recently bought NetLibrary (changing the name of it soon), and are developing the interface now which should be fairly seamless with EBSCOhost

[14:57] rkfriedman: Eamon-thanks for sharing all of these great tidbits with us

[14:57] Eamon Tewell: Of course, glad I could share

[14:58] Heather Koopmans: Yes, thanks!

[14:58] Eamon Tewell: The only downside to attending ACRL and CAA was I couldn't attend ARLIS!

[14:58] Cara List: We're getting close to the hour. Thank you so much for joining us today Eamon, and to everyone else for participating!
