- Encourage the FAA to issue a competency-based part 147 so that aviation maintenance technician schools may develop curriculum based upon student outcome rather than seat time.
- Develop a mission, values and goals for the organization keeping true to our roots as the voice of aviation technician education.
- Push our legislative priorities in Washington DC and prepare for the first industrywide fly-in on Capitol Hill.
- Finalize the business office transition to executive director Crystal Maguire.
- Encourage aviation maintenance technician schools to <u>provide graduate data</u> to aid industry recruitment and student placement efforts.
- Work with industry to bring critical information to schools to enhance their curriculum.

There is no shortage of things that need to be done, and the council's success will be directly tied to the engagement of its volunteers. I encourage you to get involved, join a committee and get to work. ATEC is your organization and I will do everything I can as your president to ensure that ATEC remains "the voice" of technician education and more.
