Kim Case is the Regional Impact Manager for myFutureNC, serving North Carolina's Northwest Prosperity Zone, with a career rooted in public education that began with 19 years of classroom teaching. Her work spans from early childhood to postsecondary education, with leadership roles including principal, instructional facilitator, and Coordinator of Innovation and Online Education for Caldwell County Schools, where she partnered with businesses and educational institutions to enhance student engagement and workforce readiness. Kim is actively involved in community and state organizations supporting youth and education, including Communities in Schools, the Rotary Club, and the Educational Innovation Network NC. She co-developed the Educational Innovation Framework and is a certified District C coach and OWL ambassador. Holding advanced degrees from Appalachian State and Gardner-Webb University, she continues her commitment to lifelong learning with certification in Trauma & Resilience from Florida State University. Rachel Hunt, North Carolina's 36th Lieutenant Governor, brings a lifelong commitment to public service, education, and family. An attorney and small business owner, she founded Hunt for College, LLC to help families navigate the college admissions process. After pausing her legal career to focus on raising her children, she spent over a decade volunteering in Charlotte-Mecklenburg schools and serving on community boards such as the League of Women Voters and Lillian's List. In 2018, she was elected to the NC House, defeating a four-term incumbent, and was re-elected in 2020 before winning a seat in the NC Senate in 2022. Rachel's leadership reflects a legacy of service inspired by her parents, Governor Jim and Carolyn Hunt, and her dedication to making North Carolina the best place to live, work, and raise a family.
