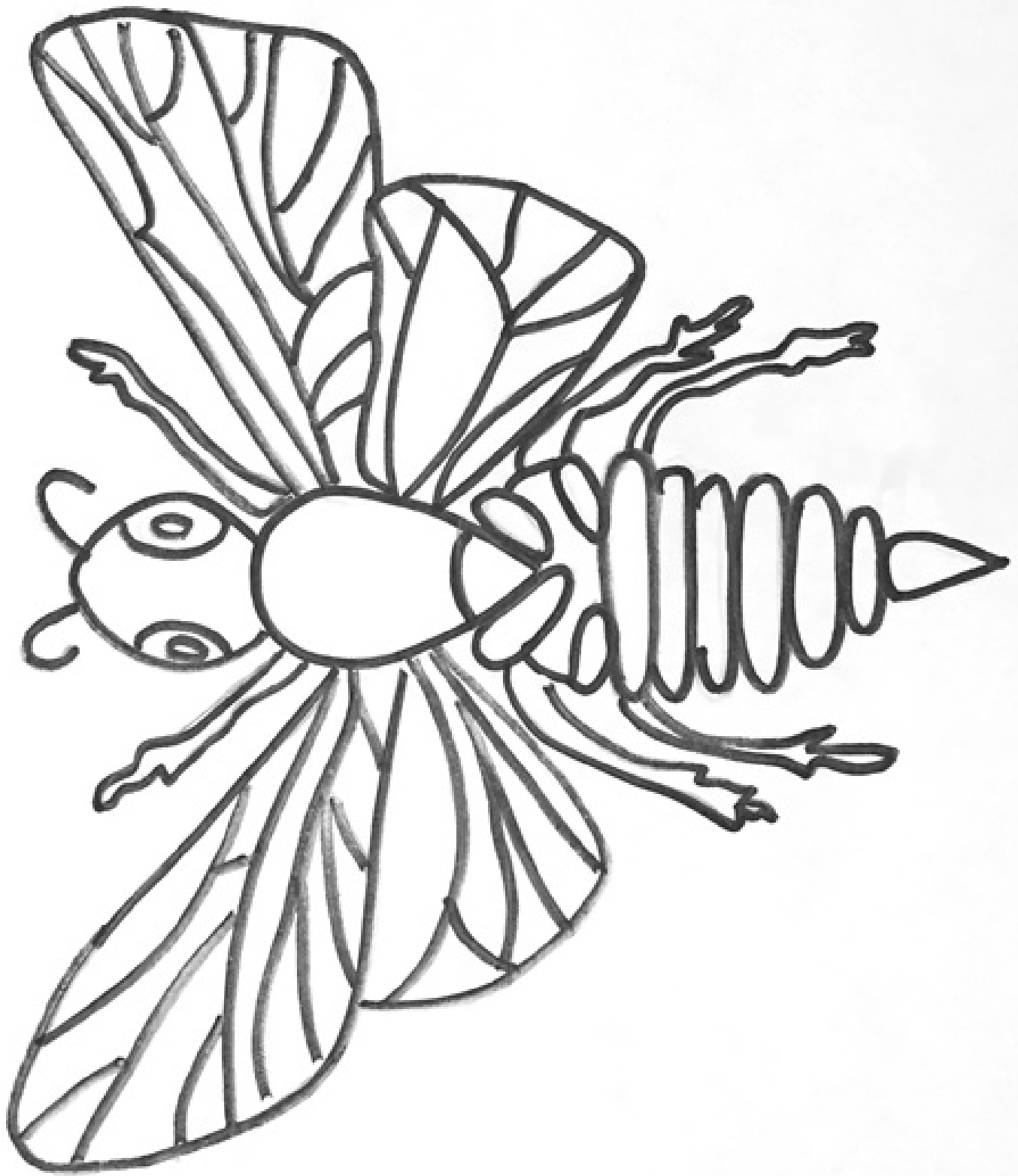

4. Transfer the bee pattern to the center of the canvas.
5. Paint the bee wings, head, and legs Black.
6. Paint the bee body in Black and Saffron Yellow, using the picture of the finished canvas as a guide.
7. Paint the edges of the canvas Black. Allow to dry.
8. Apply a coat of decoupage medium to seal the paint. Allow to dry.

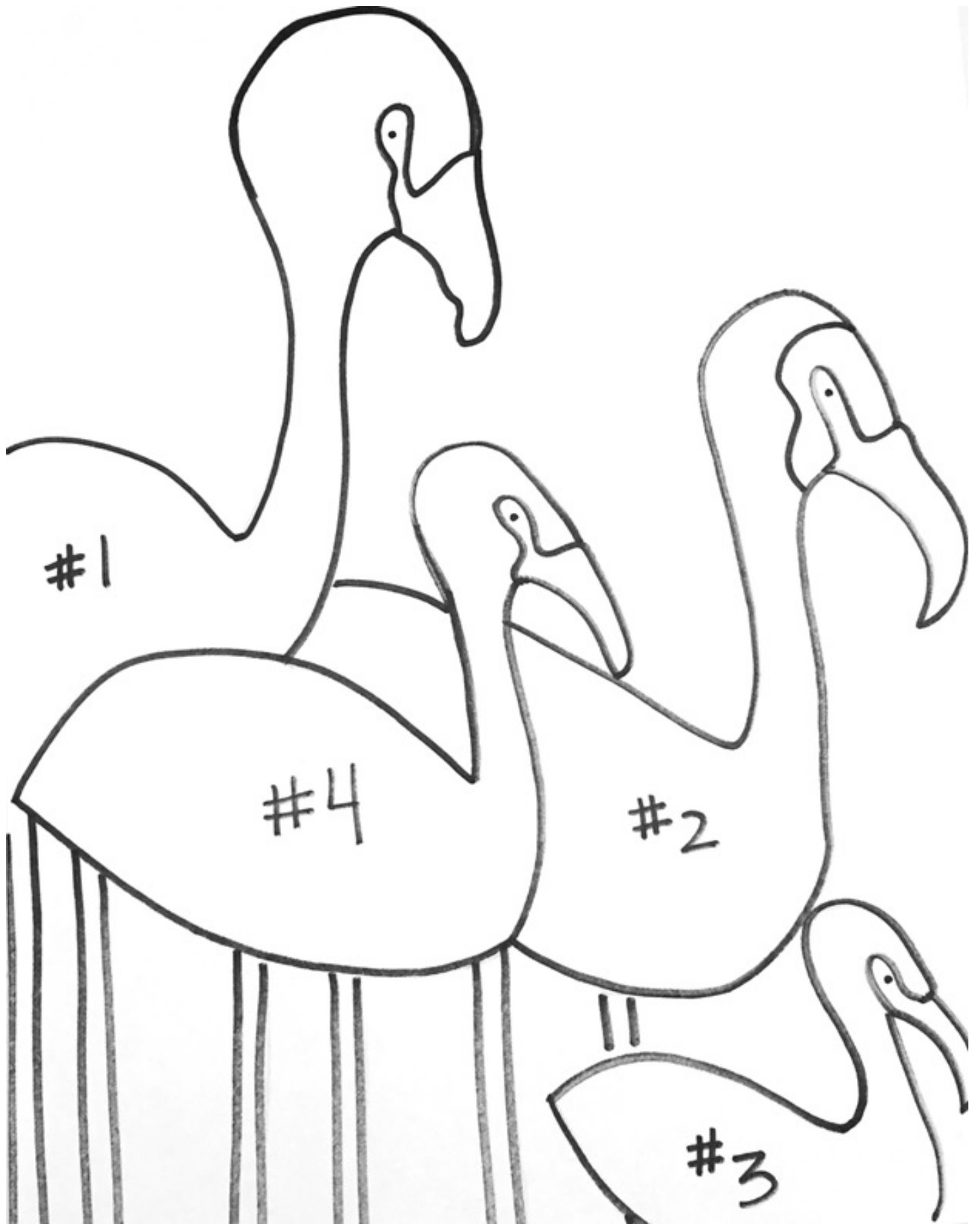

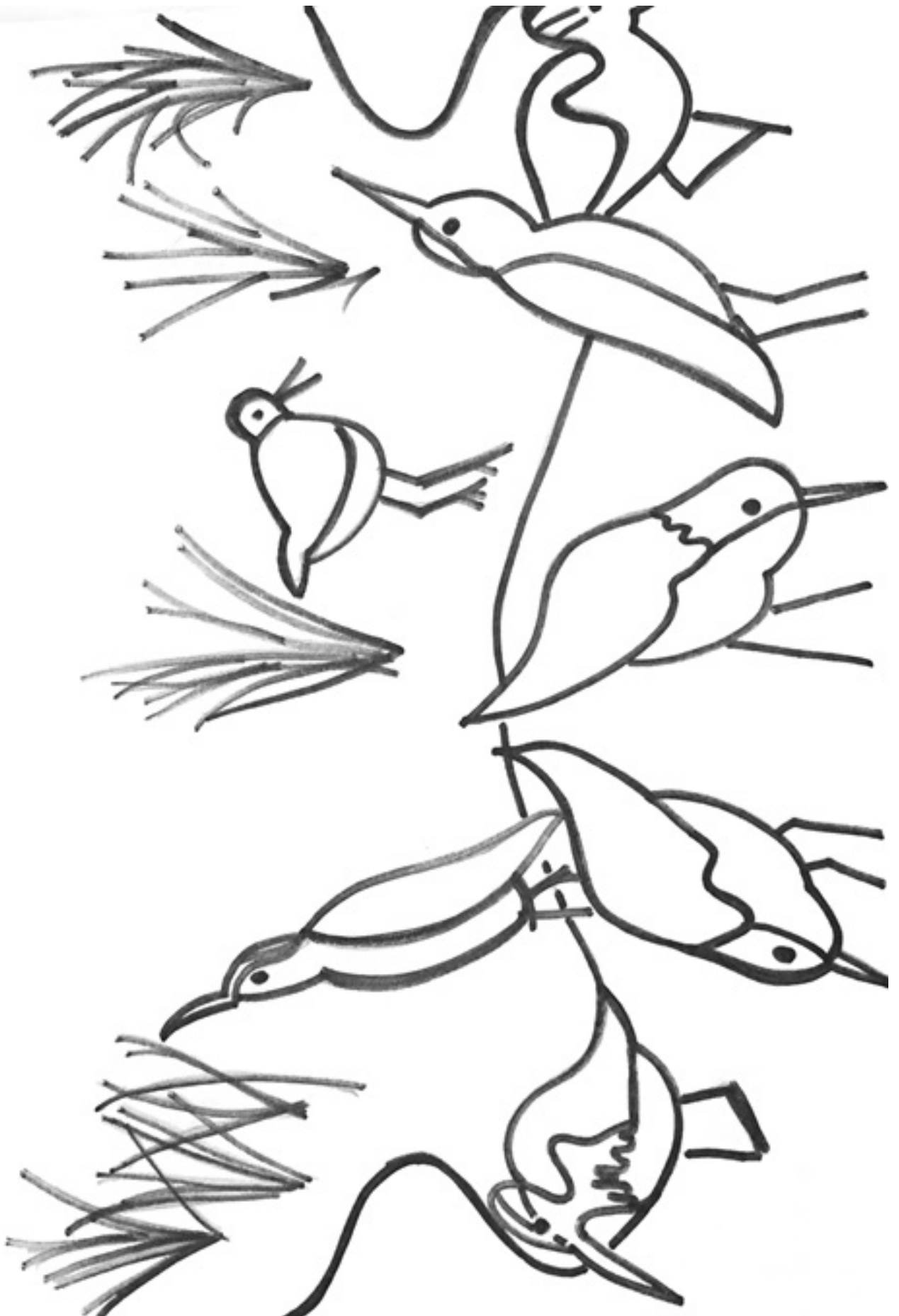

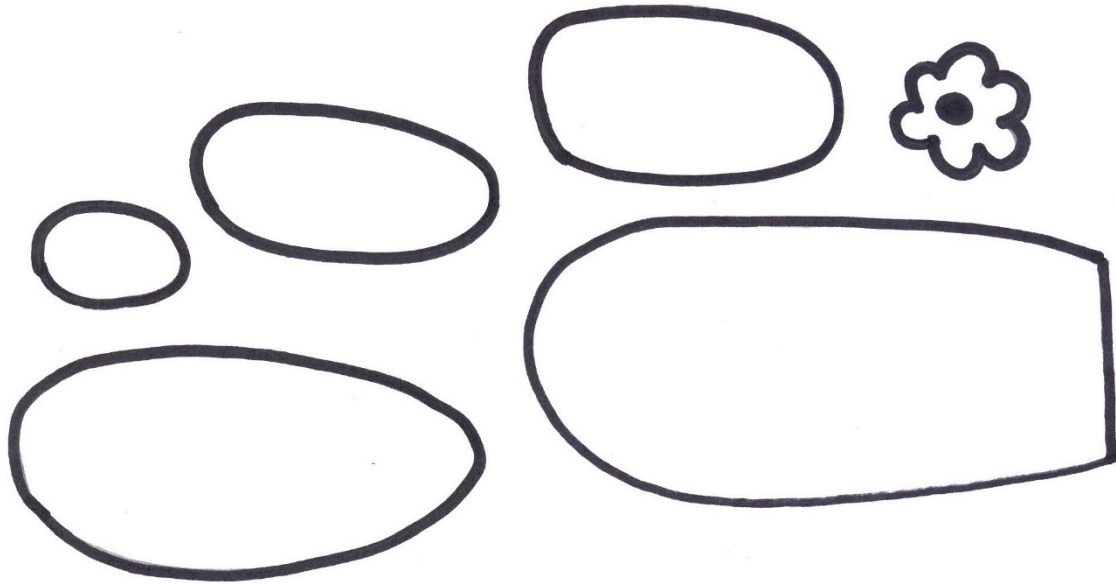

3. Score the back of the cactus branch and the flower and attach them to the main cactus shape.
4. With a clay tool, make wavy vertical lines on the cactus. With dampened fingertips, smooth out all the edges.
5. Out of pinches of clay, shape 4 small rocks. Score and attach to the base of the cactus.

9. Using Fun wire, poke 2 small holes for hanging run in one side of the K-cup. Thread Fun Wire through holes and twist to secure.
10. Glue the K-cup to the back of the flower with the hanger at the top and the perch hole towards the bottom. Glue the wooden dowel into the hole for the perch. Allow to dry.
11. Fill with bird seed, hang, and enjoy.

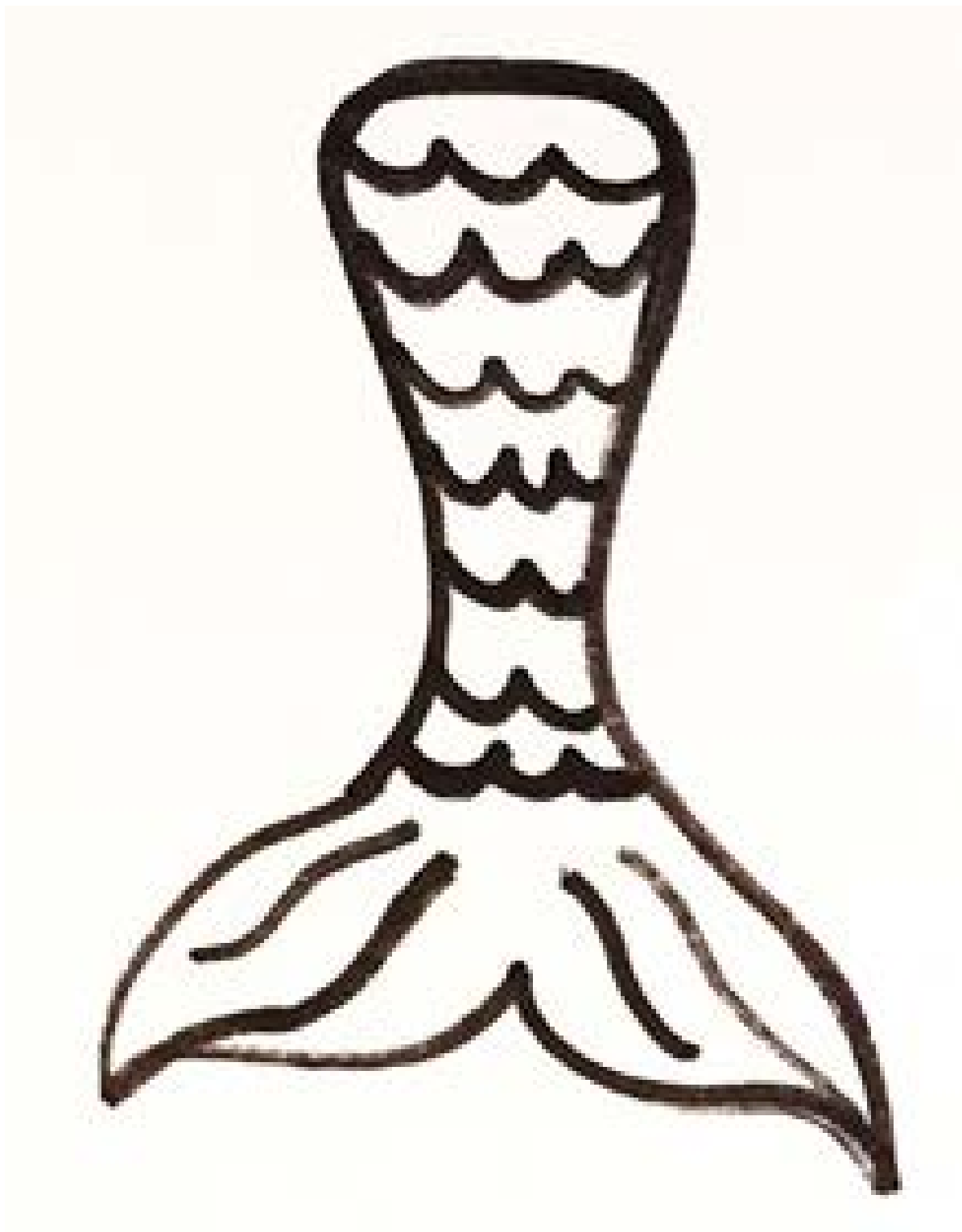

7. Fire to cone 04.
8. Paint each plant, the fish, and the seahorses as desired. Allow to dry
9. Glaze and fire to cone 06.
10. After glazing and firing, fill the bottom of the aquarium with sand and shells. Place the plants in the aquarium.
11. Poke holes in the plate. Run a length of Fun Wire through the holes in the seahorses and fish and twist to secure. Run the other end of the wire through the holes in the plate and secure on top of the plate with a knot.
12. Place the plate over the opening of the bowl. Adjust the wire lengths if necessary so the fish appear to be floating.

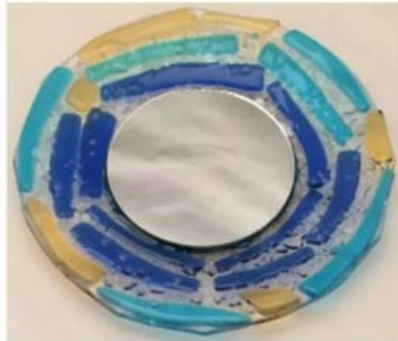

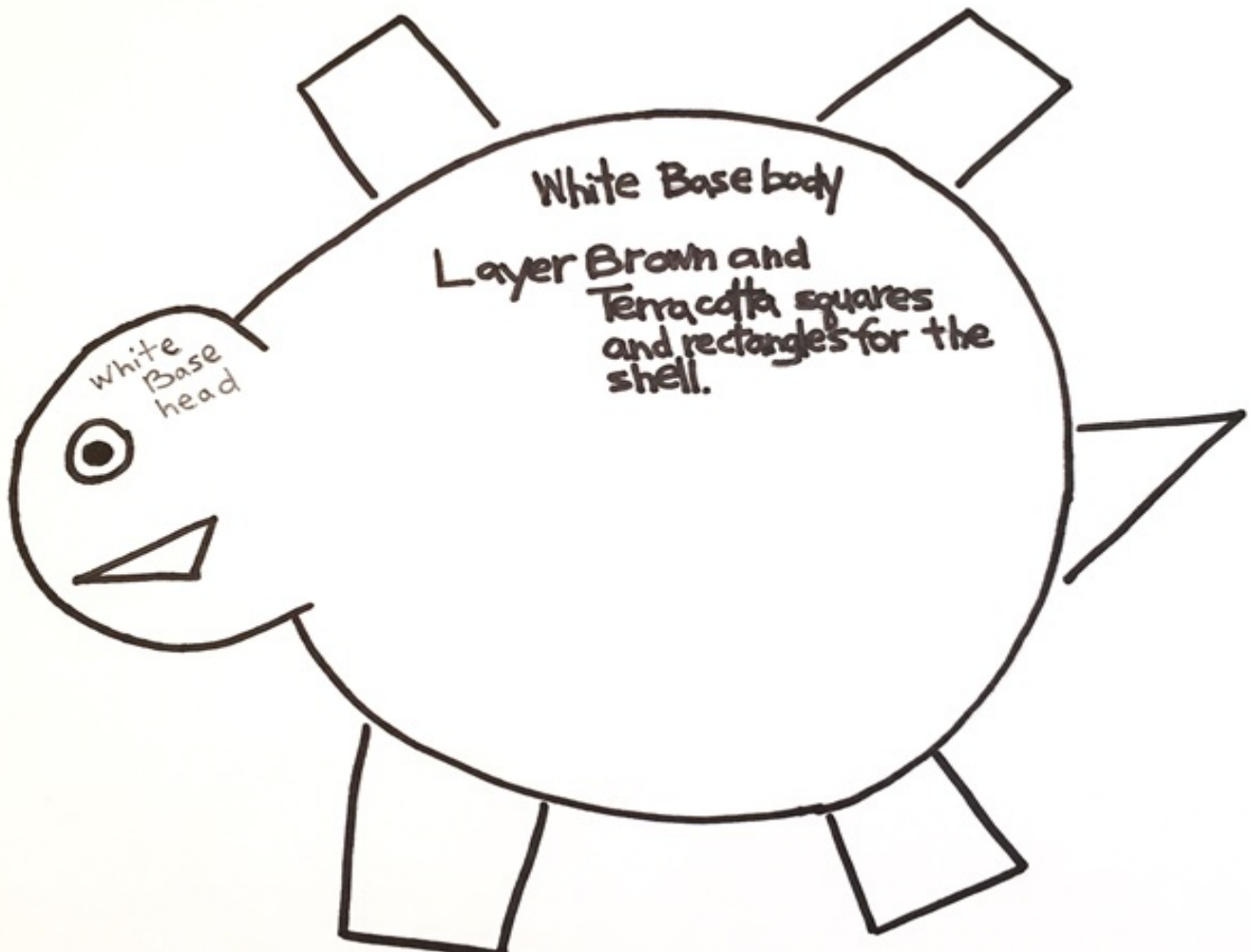

3. If you are planning on hanging these sea creatures later, place a wire U-hook between 2 pieces of glass at the top of the design. Curl the ends of the hooks for added strength and stability.
4. Affix each element to the others and to the Thinfire paper with a pinpoint of glue.
5. Fire to a tack or contour fuse.

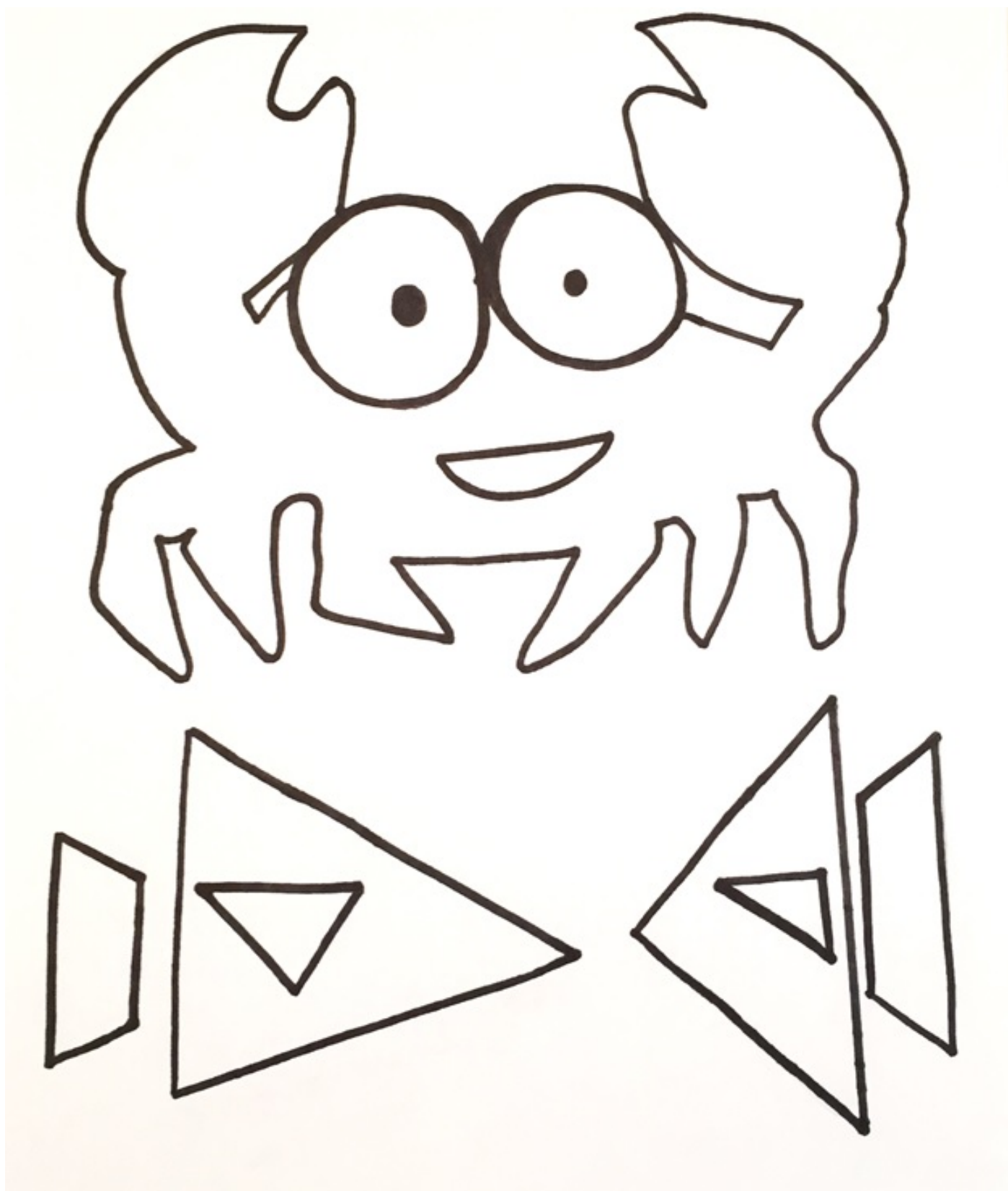

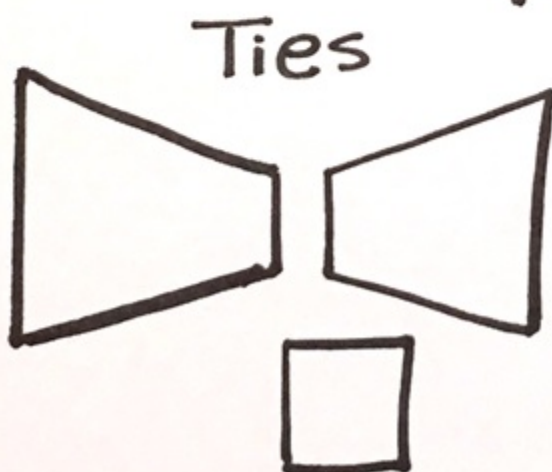

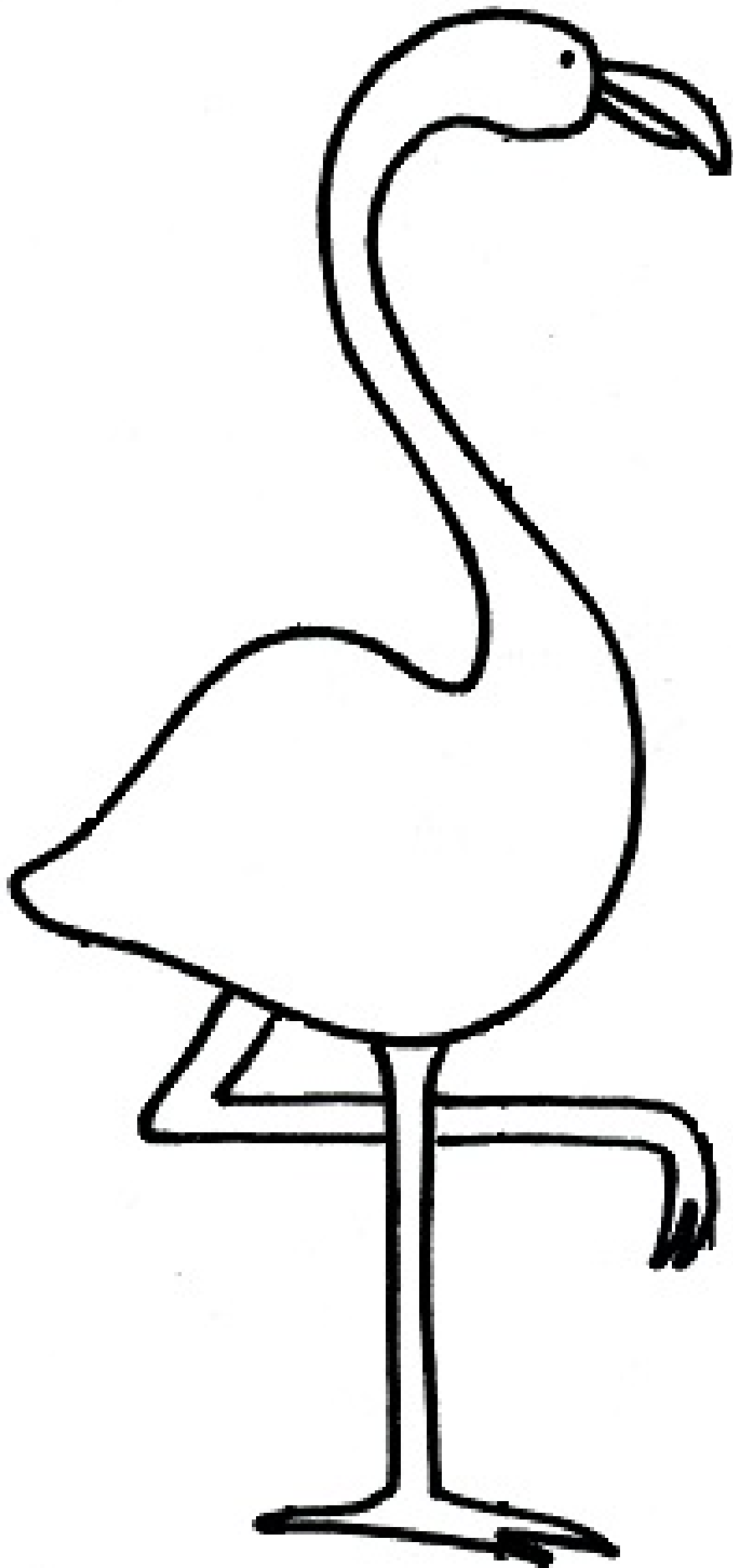

### Glaze Colors

White, Turquoise, Yellow Gold, Green, Pink, Wine, Orange, Brown, Dark Brown

### Directions

1. Paint the front of the plate with 2–3 coats of White. Allow to dry.
2. Transfer the pattern of the first layer of flowers and leaves to the plate.
3. Paint the flowers and leaves as indicated on the pattern. Allow to dry.
4. Transfer the pattern of the second layer of flowers and leaves to the plate.
5. Paint the flowers and leaves as indicated on the pattern. Allow to dry.
6. Paint the edge of the platter Green. Allow to dry.
7. Glaze and fire to cone 06.

## Popsicle Plaque Pottery Painting Project

### Supplies

Rectangular plaque  
Pattern printed on clay carbon paper  
Pencil  
Assorted brushes (fan brush, round brushes)  
Fun Wire

### Glaze Colors

Light Blue, Red, White, Blue, Pink, Green, Yellow,  
Turquoise, Sand, Black, Orange, Off White



### Directions

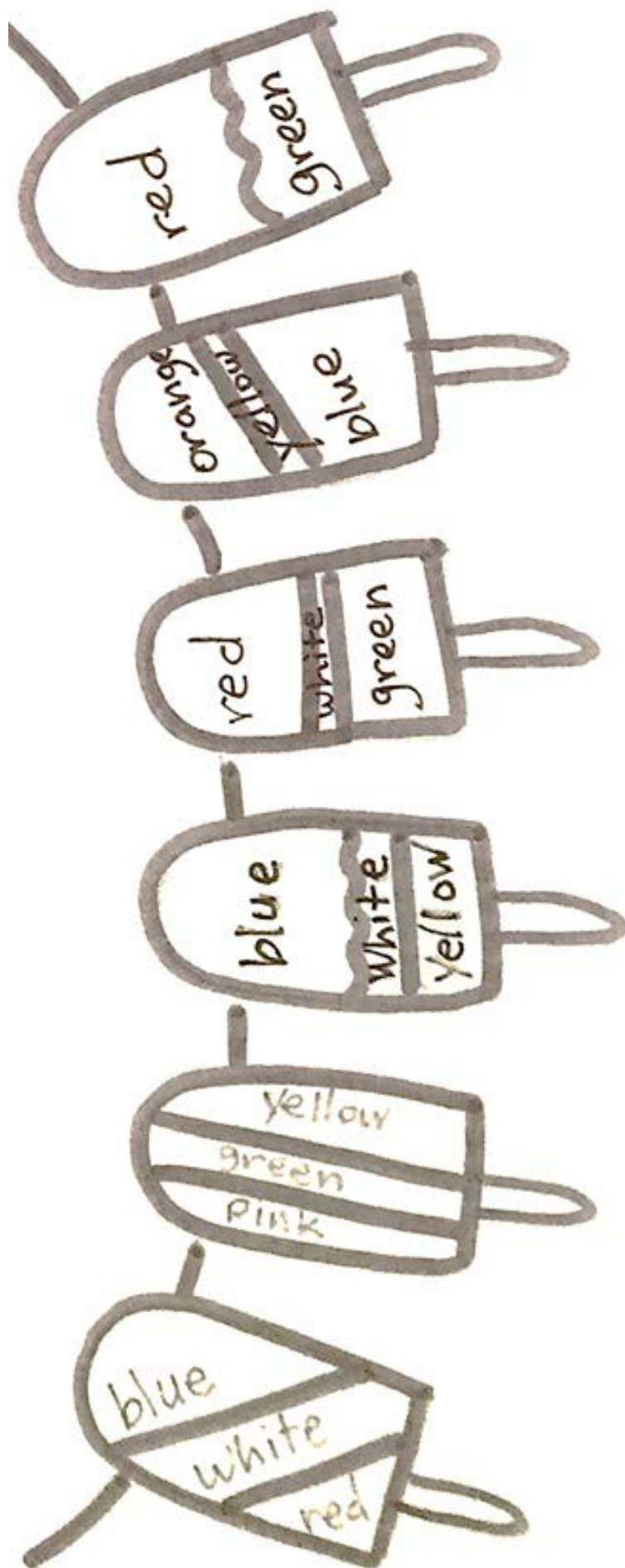
1. Paint the front of the plaque with 2–3 coats of Light Blue. Allow to dry.
2. Transfer the Popsicle pattern to the plaque.
3. Paint the first Popsicle Red, White, and Blue.
4. Paint the second Popsicle Pink, Green, and Yellow.
5. Paint the third Popsicle Turquoise, White, and Sand.
6. Paint the fourth Popsicle Red, White, and Green. Add Black dots.
7. Paint the fifth Popsicle Orange, Yellow, and Blue.
8. Paint the sixth Popsicle Pink and Green. Add Orange dots.
9. Paint the Popsicle sticks Off White.
10. Paint the hanging line White. Allow to dry.
11. Glaze and fire to cone 06.
12. Use Fun Wire to create a hanger.

## Shell Hunting Plaque or Plate Pottery Painting Project

*To create the silhouette pattern, you can search online for “parent and child silhouette” or something similar.*

### Supplies

Plaque or coupe plate  
Assorted shell-shaped add-ons  
Silhouette pattern printed on clay carbon paper  
Pencil  
Assorted brushes (fan brush, round brushes, long liner brush)  
Washable marker  
Writer bottle filled with Black  
Assorted shells (optional)  
E6000 glue (optional)  
Snowtex texture medium



### Glaze Colors

Light Blue, Blue, White, Speckled Sand, Coral, Gray, Black

### Directions

1. Use the washable marker to mark off a jagged shoreline.
2. Paint the ocean area in a combination wash of Light Blue and Blue.
3. Transfer the silhouette pattern, making sure to place the feet of the figures right on the shoreline.
4. Paint the sand area in 2–3 coats of Speckled Sand.
5. Paint the silhouettes in Black. Allow to dry.
6. With the washable marker, write the phrase of your choice near the upper left corner. Go over the letters with the Black writer bottle.
7. Paint the individual shell add-ons in Coral and Gray.
8. Clear glaze all the bisque.
9. Place the shells in the lower right, in the sand area. If you'll be adding real shells after firing, keep this in mind when placing the bisque shells.
10. Fire to cone 06.
11. If desired, glue a few real shells among the pottery shells.
12. Apply Snowtex texture medium along the shoreline.

## **Slice of Summer Plate Pottery Painting Project**

### **Supplies**

Plate  
Pattern printed on clay carbon paper  
Pencil  
Assorted brushes (fan brush, round brushes, long liner brush)

### **Glaze Colors**

White, Bright Yellow, Yellow, Orange, Red, Bright Green, Dark Green, Black

### **Directions**

1. Paint the front of the plate with 2–3 coats of White. Allow to dry.
2. Transfer the pattern to the front of the plate.
3. Paint the lemons in Bright Yellow and Yellow with White seeds. Allow to dry.
4. Paint the oranges in Orange and Yellow with White seeds. Allow to dry.
5. Paint the watermelons in Red, Bright Green, and Dark Green with Black seeds. Allow to dry.
6. Paint the limes in Bright Green with White seeds. Allow to dry.
7. Paint the area around the fruits, the rim of the plate, and the outside of the plate Orange. Allow to dry.
8. Paint a few droplets of juice around the fruit in Red, Yellow, and Green. Allow to dry.
9. Glaze and fire to cone 06.

## Starfish on the Beach Tumbler or Candle Holder Pottery Painting Project

### Supplies

Stemless wine glass  
Pattern printed on plain paper  
Washable marker  
Assorted brushes (fan brush, round brushes, long liner brush)  
Snowtex texture medium (optional)

### Glaze Colors

Blue, Dark Blue, Sand or Light Tan, White, Yellow

### Directions

1. Using the washable marker and following the sample as a guide, draw the sand and water lines on the bisque. Repeat the design as needed to go around the whole glass.
2. Paint the ocean area in Blue and Dark Blue.
3. Paint the sand area Sand color or Light Tan.
4. Paint the foamy surf line White.
5. Using the marker, draw starfish in each sand scallop. Paint the starfish Yellow. Using the back end of a paintbrush, paint dots on the starfish in White. Allow to dry.
6. Glaze and fire to cone 06.
7. If this piece will be used as a candle holder or other nonfood item, apply Snowtex texture medium along the shoreline if desired.
