



Professional Learning/Continuing Education Units

Attendees may apply for CEU/PLU/NBCC credits for attending the annual conference and will need to complete a form to receive any credits. A charge of \$10 will cover the cost of applying for CEU, PLU and NBCC credit.

If you prepaid for PLU/CEU/NBCC credit, forms will be provided in your conference registration packet to record conference sessions attended. These forms must be turned in to the registration desk by the end of the conference in order to be filed for credit. No late forms will be accepted.

PLU: GSCA will provide opportunities for conference attendees to receive PLU credits as follows: receive 1.0 PLU for every 10 hours attended of professional education including pre-conference and conference workshops/programs, Opening Session, Region Meetings and/or Closing Session. Up to 2.0 PLUs may be received by attending all pre-conference and general conference sessions. For directions to sign up for PLU credit through Northeast Georgia RESA, please visit the GSCA website. You must register with the Northeast Georgia RESA in order to be granted the PLU credits.

NBCC: ASCA grants the NBCC credit hours. You will receive a certificate for these credits from the GSCA Executive Office after conference.

In Memoriam... JOANN MORRIS

Georgia School Counselors lost one of its staunchest supporters with the death of JoAnn Morris on August 1. JoAnn was the only individual to ever serve two terms as GSCA President. JoAnn was president during the years of 1983-1985.

She was a career educator who spent the bulk of her career at G.W. Northcutt Elementary School in the Clayton County School System. For those of us who were privileged to work with JoAnn in GSCA, we have lost not only a stellar leader of our organization but a great friend too. To say that JoAnn had a robust personality was putting it mildly. She was always in a very upbeat mood and had a most infectious laugh that she freely shared with everyone. For many of us, she was our mentor and advocate. Peggy Cooper, (Past President 93-94) said, "She was like a mother to me, always loving and encouraging." Dr. Wayne Huey (Past President 86-87) said the one word he would use to describe JoAnn was "giving." Fleda Little, (Past President 80-81) said she was always "jovial." Lynn Brandon (Past President 88-89) shared that JoAnn was responsible for him being involved in GSCA and that he would always be grateful for the opportunities that he has had because of JoAnn asking him to be part of her leadership team. It was individuals like JoAnn who gave so much of herself to the development and growth of GSCA that helped to build the foundation on which today's successes are built. JoAnn helped GSCA to become recognized at both the state and national level as a model for other state counselor associations.

JoAnn was a devoted wife to her husband, Don who preceded her in death in February of 2011. She is survived by her two daughters, Wendy and Kim, four grandchildren and two great grand children.





Caleb's Caped Crusaders





As a fellow Georgia School Counselor and this year's Service Project Chair, I am proud to introduce you to my son, Caleb Sprinkle. In many ways, Caleb is a typical 5 year old. He is funny, inquisitive, fearless, and full of mischief. He both idolizes and terrorizes his older brother and he is never happier than when he is playing with his trains. He couldn't wait to start kindergarten in just a few weeks.


Caleb also lives with cystic fibrosis. Diagnosed just after birth, he spends hours a day doing treatments and taking medications that will help him in his battle to stay healthy. CF is a life-threatening genetic disease that affects primarily the lungs and digestive system. In people with CF, a defective gene causes the body to produce unusually thick, sticky mucus that clogs the lungs and leads to life-threatening lung infections. It can also obstruct the pancreas and stops natural enzymes from helping the body break down food and absorb vital nutrients. As you can imagine, those living with CF are at a greater risk for all kinds of complications. Something as simple as a cold can easily turn into a two-week hospital stay for kids like Caleb.

Because cystic fibrosis affects so few people (only 30,000 adults and children in the United States), CF is considered an "orphan disease" meaning it relies on the support of private donors to fund the research and development of life-saving treatments and drugs. In the 1950's, few children with cystic fibrosis lived long enough to attend elementary school. Fortunately, because of the unceasing efforts of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and donors like YOU, people with CF are living into their 30's, 40's and beyond!

Each year our family's team walks in the CF Foundation's Great Strides Atlanta walk. We are honored to support the foundation that is working hard to save our son's life and has already done so much to improve the lives of everyone living with cystic fibrosis. I am thrilled to have the opportunity to share our story with my colleagues and to bring awareness to this important cause. I hope you will consider supporting us; your generous donation will help us get to the cure we all so desperately want!

Real progress has been made in the search for a cure, but the lives of people with CF are still cut far too short. There still is no cure for this devastating disease. As a mom, I will not be satisfied until Caleb's life no longer has an expiration date. Caleb's Caped Crusaders will keep fighting until CF stands for Cure Found. I hope you will join us!



School Counselor Education

Miya Boston, Student LOCATION: Verelst

In poverty stricken areas there is often a low rate of students reading and academically functioning at grade level. Some would even argue that because of the low literacy rates in these areas there is a high level of absences and suspensions. Because of these issues, some schools are using programs and other measures to improve the reading ability of their students. In this research two comparable schools in low socio-economic areas were compared using their reading and language arts Criterion-Referenced Competency Test scores (CRCT) from the 2012-2013 school year. School A taugh reading and language arts separately, and School B integrated the reading and language arts curriculum. The literature indicated that not only should reading and language arts CRCT scores improve if reading and language arts are taught separately, but absentee and suspension rates would decrease. After conducting

this research, I found that these differences in instruction did not make a difference in the CRCT reading and language arts scores between School A and School B; however, there was a significant difference in the suspension rate in the with separate reading and language art classes.

How Counselors Can Facilitate Parent Involvement to Gain Student Academic Success

Toni P. Hatcher, Student LOCATION: Percival

Parent involvement has been shown to be an essential component that significantly influences a child's education. In spite of this, many parents fail to become actively involved. This lack of parent involvement appears to have a negative impact on students academically, as well as their social and emotional development. Students who are given support from home are shown to perform better at school, while students who are not given support from parents struggle to maintain academic success in their classes. According to Dr. Joyce Epstein's framework of six types of parent involvement, effective communication with families about school activities and programs is one of the vital roles in students achieving academic success. This study found that End of Course Tests in literature was very positively impacted by having a nontraditional outreach program to parents. School counselors can initiate the connection between classrooms and parents to positively affect the educational needs of children.



School Counselors Positioning Students for the 'Promise' of Success: Preparing students for success after high school

Dr. Rudy Jackson, Georgia Gwinnett College; Dr. LeRoy Reese, Morehouse College LOCATION: Scarbrough 1

The role of school counselors has become increasingly complex as have the challenges facing school districts across Georgia and the United States. From the more mundane yet important responsibility of helping high school students develop course schedules that stretch their abilities and support their interests; to being the nexus for those students requiring support and intervention services academically and/or behaviorally; to serving a triage role and sometimes behavioral health interventionist when there is evidence of impaired psychological adjustment and functioning in the students they serve. Beyond these responsibilities, school counselors are also charged with coaching students as they prepare for life after high school whether this includes college, vocational or trade school, the military or entering the work force. On the issue of college there can unique challenges, it is those challenges and opportunities that are the focus of this presentation. Specifically, this presentation provides a 'best practices' approach to preparing and being competitive in the college application and selection process for those students applying to middle of the road colleges to those applying to the most competitive institutions. An emphasis of the presentation is that the most competitive students don't start in their junior year and that preparation

includes attending to socioemotional development in addition to the academic record. With respect to the former point, one of the reasons many students end up on academic probation their first year or fail out of college is the lack of facility these students demonstrate in managing the increased autonomy and responsibility that college invites. While these observations may not be surprising generally what is often lost are the unique needs of students whom have the academic ability to succeed in college but have to manage known emotional and behavioral health challenges. There is an opportunity here for school counselors to support these students in ways that utilize school partners thereby not increasing the workload of school counselors. This presentation presents an approach to college preparation that addresses academic and socio-emotional aspects of the process.

Supervision 101 for Practicing School Counselors: Preparing to Supervise K-12 School Counselors-in-Training

The group curriculum utilized the evidence based Why Try Program that focuses on building resiliency and motivation in at-promise students.

Experiment with decreasing Social Media usage among high school students.

Brittney Tharpe, Fort Valley State University, Student LOCATION: Percival

Social Networking Sites can be used for many different reasons. One particular reason is to connect with other people, whether they live in the same city or halfway across this country. However, the rise of kids using these social networking sites has increased. That increase has caused a decrease in academic performance, grades, and disciplinary referrals. A group of 15 students were asked to decrease the social media use by 15% for one week to determine if there was any great significance in the change in grades, attendance, and disciplinary referrals. The results showed that decreasing the use of social media by 15% was very statistically significant in regards to academic performance. The recommendation for school counselors would be to implement or create a website that could benefit the students, both academically and socially.

Unveiling the Myths of Virtual Public Charter Schooling


