

Professional Learning/Continuing Education Units

CEU: Attendees must submit their information to a certifying body to receive CEU credit.







Due to historic marginalization, students of color may encounter multiple barriers to education, which could include: negative academic experiences, feelings of isolation, power differences, increased discipline referrals, low retention rates, and graduation rates (Holcomb-McCoy, 2007; Losen, 2011). The Many Voices of School Counselors: Leaders, Advocates and Systems Change Agents

What is the school counselors' role in dispelling the myth of low expectations? What does it really mean to be a student advocate promoting equity, access and opportunity for all? How do school counselors become the "Leaders we are waiting for?"

People have been telling Trish Hatch to slow down for years - in fact, since she was a child - but that hasn't stopped her yet, especially when it comes to helping school counselors become effective and indispensable professional educators. Hatch describes her energy as having no limits. "I don't really know where all my energy comes from," said Hatch. "But



I know that I'm a passionate advocate for school counseling, and maybe that's part of it."

The field has changed, and continues to change, and Hatch hopes to help direct those changes into ways that gather "social capital" for school counselors, which occurs when principals recognize that their schools - and students - can't function without school counselors. In other words, when administrators sit down at the table to discuss personnel decisions, principals support their counselors, saying that "because of the counselors, kids are behaving better and achieving better."

"We must emphasize that school counselors' roles in schools are not just to be counselors to kids because if we're just counselors and we don't align to student achievement and student success then we will be perceived as just ancillary mental health workers in schools instead of educators with specialized training in mental health issues."

This session will leave you feeling motivated, inspired, and passionate about helping children learn to achieve and teaching children behaviors that lead to success in life.








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
