

Georgia Utility Contractors Association (GUCA)

GUCA's very important and annually well attended Lobby Day is tomorrow morning on February 6 in the Empire Room on top of the Twin Towers across from the Capitol. Please make sure you attend to represent your industry, hear from Georgia's political leadership about what is going on at the Capitol, and talk about issues important to you with your local legislators.

This past week saw legislation introduced on utility contractors and business licensing, continuing education, and on utility workers' safety.

HB 904 changes certain provisions relating to electrical contractors, plumbers, conditioned air contractors, low voltage contractors, and utility contractors as far as licensing and continuing education. HB 880 relates to licenses for transitioning members of the armed forces, so as to allow military spouses to use an existing license in good standing from another state to obtain employment in this state. HB 1033 provides for protections for utility workers and for enhanced penalties for simple assault, aggravated assault, simple battery, and aggravated battery committed upon utility workers in certain circumstances.

In 2023:

GORCC was done away with in HB 76. The Georgia Occupational Regulation Review Council (GORRC) was statutorily established in 1986 to "ensure that no programs of licensure and certification are imposed on any profession or business unless required for the safety and well-being of the citizens of this state". It has turned into a headache for many industries attempting to change, create, or delete licensing requirements in Georgia.

HB 193 was vetoed by the Governor. This bill's topic was of great interest to GUCA last year. Our lobbying team understands all of the contractor industry groups were good with the bill after the changes that were made. It relates to public works contracting and bidding requirements, so as to increase the dollar values of certain public works construction contracts exempt from bidding requirements.

There was legislation regarding licenses for transitioning members of the armed forces and expediting licenses by endorsement for spouses of active or transitioning members of the armed forces and enacting statutes to facilitate licensure of transitioning service members, military spouses, and other qualified individuals who have certifications from or work experience in the military or licenses from or work experience in another state. It is SB 195 from Senator Larry Walker.

There is also a licensing bill from Senator Brian Strickland dealing with those who have had criminal convictions in the past, SB 157, that is mentioned below also. It passed the Senate and is in the House.

There is also a lot of discussion about licensing boards in general in Georgia, and GUCA is on top of this.

The 2024 Georgia General Assembly had its 11th - 14th official days of legislative session this past week. Every day began early in the morning with Committee meetings at 7 AM or 8 AM, legislative session at 10 AM, and Committee meetings from 1 PM into the evening, and there were of course informal meetings and conversations throughout the days.

The House continues to hold its Appropriations meetings in Appropriations SubCommittees to "mark up", edit, adjust, and eventually pass the State Budget, which is its only legal requirement to pass under state law.

There have now been thousands of bills and resolutions filed in the 2023-2024 General Assembly.

Crossover Day, the day that a bill has to pass out of its initial original chamber, is February 29 (the 28th legislative day), and the final day of session will be March 28. Keep in mind, just because a bill doesn't pass out of its original chamber by Crossover doesn't mean it is "dead". This is because language from the "dead" bill can be attached to another bill out there that is "alive" after Crossover Day.

As was mentioned in the initial report, legislation from 2023 is "alive" for passage in the 2024 legislative session due to it being a biennial session system. Thrash-Haliburton has been in constant communication with our leadership about issues and legislation coming up for our industry in the 2024 session.

Here's to another great year for our industry in 2024 at the State Capitol!
