KEY ACTIVITIES: Division of Professional Practice:

The last two months have been focused both on reflection about the recent European Congress of Psychology in Cyprus (July 1-4, 2025) and preparation for ICAP: our own IAAP congress in Florence in 2026: **The International Congress of Applied Psychology (ICAP: July 21-25, 2026)**

- ECP: Cyprus (July 1-4, 2025)
 - As mentioned in our July E-News, three of our Executive Committee (James Bray, John-Francis Leader and Robyn Vines) attended on behalf of Division 17. The Congress was hosted by EFPA (The European Federation of Psychologists' Associations) and included the General Assembly of EFPA and multiple other events.

 - Symposium: "International Perspectives on Psychologists in Integrated Health Care: Equitable, Accessible and Innovative Models"
 - Workshop: James Bray presented a workshop on 'Extending Accessible Health Care with Digital Mental Health Apps' which was well-attended and generated a lot of interest.
 - o **Roundtable:** John Francis Leader participated as part of a panel focused on the 'European Year of Mental Health':
 - Networking: As is always the case at these international conventions, it was a superb opportunity to network with our colleagues from the IAAP (including those involved in representing the profession of psychology at the United Nations and World Health Organisation), the IUPsyS, EFPA and other Psychological Associations around the world (e.g. the APA, BPS, APS, etc). We look forward to this opportunity at ICAP in Florence in July, 2026 and invite all those interested to submit abstracts.
 - Consumer Representation: An interesting and valuable feature of the Congress was
 the presence and advocacy of Mental Health Consumers amongst those attending.
 Ms Poly Gregora an 'Expert by Experience' opened the Congress with an
 eloquent call for those whom we impact so profoundly with our interventions (i.e.

patients, clients, consumers) to be included in discussions around quality control of services provided and optimal engagement.

• ICAP, 2026: Florence

- O Invited symposia and other presentations: 'Integrated health care'
 In line with our 15-year-campaign focused on the need for integrated general and mental health care, involving psychologists as a core part of a multi-disciplinary team in primary and hospital-based mental health care (since ICAP in Melbourne in 2010; ICP: 2012, Capetown; ECP: 2013, Stockholm; ICAP: 2014, Paris; ECP: 2015, Milan; ICP: 2016, Okinawa; ECP: 2017, Amsterdam; ICAP: 2018, Montreal; post-COVID ECP: 2023, Brighton; ICP: 2024, Prague; ECP: 2025, Cyprus) —
 we are re-convening multiple invited symposia and other presentations advancing this cause. Further details will be provided, once abstract submissions are in and confirmations received.
- Other presentations have also been welcomed with our President, Susan McDaniel issuing an <u>invitation</u> to all IAAP and Division 17 members to submit ideas and abstracts for all presentations: symposia, workshops, posters, etc. The submission deadline (28.9.25) may have passed by the time September E-News is received; however, it has been a key part of our activity over the past month to review and encourage multiple submissions in different areas.
- Monthly Division 17 Executive Committee zoom meeting: our latest meeting was held on 9th September with attendees from the USA, Ireland, Argentina and Australia, a key focus was ICAP and generating ideas for symposia, workshops, etc.
 We now have a monthly series in which members of the Executive make presentations.

Matias Salgado: presented his work in Argentina which is based on the Method of Levels (MOL) approach, in which psychological distress is understood as having one main psychological process – control of experience. This is based on Perceptual Control Theory, under-pinned by 3 principles – control, conflict, and re-organization. This is a flexible a-diagnostic therapy created by our own President-Elect: Tim Carey - see below. It is client-led and aims to help them shift their awareness to higher levels, where reorganization can resolve the conflict.

There are 2 therapeutic goals: (1) explore the problem in detail by asking curious questions and (2) explore disruptions (shifts in the focus of awareness). Research findings support this approach and Matias presented a series of articles outlining the therapeutic model. In addition to good empirical outcomes, there is a lot of positive feedback from clients and low drop-out rates.

Presentation Summary

Human behavior is characterized by collective irrationality, as reflected by human-induced global warming, continuing wars, and nuclear proliferation. Although individual level irrationality has received considerable attention from psychologists, collective irrationality remains almost completely neglected. This discussion explores collective irrationality, which is more than and different from the sum of individual irrationalities. Solutions are also discussed, and it is argued that omniculturalism - the active celebration of human commonalities - is our best solution.

Fathali Moghaddam

Fathali M. Moghaddam is an Iranian-born professor of psychology at Georgetown University and Editor of the Cambridge University Press series on Progressive Psychology. His recent books include: Political Plasticity (2023), The Psychology of Revolution (2024), The Psychology of Dictatorship (2013), The Psychology of Democracy (2016), Mutual Radicalization (2018), Threat to Democracy: The appeal of. Amid recent administration policies on autism that are stoking misinformation, confusion, and fears about patient privacy, psychologists have reported an upsurge in autism evaluation cancellations and medical record redaction requests. "Diagnosis is supposed to be a doorway to support, not a trap. Autistic people already face devastating rates of trauma, suicidality, and mental health misdiagnosis," said autistic psychologist and neurodiversity advocate **Karissa Burnett, PhD**.

Study: Extreme Thinkers, Left or Right, Share Many Brain Patterns

A recent study, published in APA's *Journal of Personality and Social Psychology*, reveals similar brain responses in individuals with extreme political views, whether far-left or far-right. Researchers measuring brain activity of participants who watched a heated political debate discovered that those with more extreme political views had stronger neural responses in brain regions associated with processing emotions, particularly fear and threat. They also found heightened physiological arousal, suggesting emotions and arousal play a role in reinforcing individuals' political beliefs:

The shifting hormones of midlife can bring troubling symptoms like hot flashes, mood shifts, and memory changes for many women. Now, researchers are learning more about the short-and long-term health effects of menopause. Clinical health psychologist **Rebecca Thurston**, **PhD**, joined APA's *Speaking of Psychology* podcast to discuss links between menopause symptoms and long-term cardiovascular and Alzheimer's risk; evolving treatments, including hormone therapy and nonhormonal options; and why midlife can be an empowering as well as challenging time for women.

Key Testimony on AI in Health Care

On Sept. 3, APA's Vaile Wright, PhD, testified at a House Committee on Energy and Commerce Health Subcommittee hearing on "Examining Opportunities to Advance American Health Care Through the Use of Artificial Intelligence Technologies." Wright underscored the critical need for psychological science in shaping oversight of AI in health care at every step and ensuring "a human remains in the loop." She called for clear regulatory quardrails, age-appropriate safeguards to protect youth and other vulnerable populations, a strong federal privacy law to protect patient data, and other critical protections. "The core mission of health care—to help and do no harm—must be our guiding principle," said Wright. "Al should be seen as tool to augment, not replace, the clinical judgment and therapeutic relationship that are the bedrock of quality health care." Some Therapists Are Secretly Using ChatGPT During Sessions, Risking Trust and Privacy

The prevalent use of and reliance on large language models has raised concerns, particularly when AI tools like ChatGPT have been used as substitutes for therapists. A less discussed but more recent issue is how some therapists are integrating AI into their practice, potentially at the expense of patient privacy and trust. In an MIT Technology Review article, many report shock and betrayal at receiving AI-generated emails from therapists who were apologetic when confronted. While AI can support communication or administration, especially for time-strapped therapists, it is crucial to remain transparent with patients, obtain their consent, and recognize that AI chatbots are not HIPAA compliant. https://www.technologyreview.com/2025/09/02/1122871/therapists-using-chatgpt-secretly/



How To Give Better Advice

While offering advice can make us feel helpful, unsolicited suggestions can strain relationships. In professional settings, they can be perceived as self-serving and are less likely to be considered. Research suggests that advice is received as more meaningful and credible when people actively seek it. In this New York Times article, experts recommend training yourself not to automatically dispense words of wisdom and seeking permission such as by asking, "Do you want my advice?" It can make the listener feel more empowered, said Shannon O'Neill, PhD, a psychologist at Mount Sinai West. "They made the choice to hear you out," she said. "And that allows an individual, hopefully, to be less defensive and less resistant."
