FROM THE EDITOR

At the end of the program for the International Sunbelt Social Network Conference, a preliminary version of which is in this issue, you will find an announcement of a meeting of the International Network for Social Network Analysis. You should try to stay in Tampa for this meeting, because we will be discussing a restructuring of INSNA and an editorial change for CONNECTIONS. Yes, I have been managing INSNA and editing CONNECTIONS for as many years as I can afford to give in such service. As Barry Wellman says in Ties and Bonds (this issue) it is an awesome task and must be shared among several persons who are in a position to carry it off well.

I have done the best I could do, but these are tough times for publishing journals on a small scale. We have tried to keep costs down, knowing that many academics have not been getting decent salary increases these past several years and knowing that institutional libraries are cutting back rather than adding to their periodical hold-

ings. We now have just 60 institutional subscribers and 207 members.

INSNA runs on a narrow financial base. With more than half of our members outside of the United States, our postage rates are high. I have tried to keep the subscription costs down, holding at \$30 for these past four years. We have improved the look of CONNECTIONS, and we have been trying to improve the quality of articles by introducing peer review, though I must say the articles that Barry published when he edited it were already of high quality. All this is expensive, and running at a narrow margin, there is no room for error. If a member complains of not receiving a given issue I have to send another one out without any way of recouping those additional charges of both producing the journal and mailing it.

As a service to INSNA members, we handle your subscriptions to SOCIAL NETWORKS, charging you the individual rate of \$52 for the subscriptions that we get at the group rate of \$50. There is a lot of account management and communication with the publishers in this kind of arrangement. If a single mistake is made in handling one of your subscriptions, it requires more than 25 others to make up the difference. The publishers in the Netherlands charge institutions \$135 for SOCIAL NETWORKS. Fortunately for them, and for us, I guess they have enough institutional subscribers to make the whole business economical. We have not been able to do that yet at

this end.

There are a lot of services that INSNA should be providing, as THE "international network for social network analysis." I simply have not had the time to develop those services. Although I have been using teleconferencing as long as most social scientists, going back with some of you to the days of the famous EIES network of network scholars, I have not been able to use that experience and expertise to make our INSNA function as a truly efficient and effective network. Also, I have not been able to keep up with all the computer software that we should be publicizing through CONNECTIONS and perhaps even making available through INSNA. Since John Sonquist retired from the faculty at UC Santa Barbara, I have not found a replacement for him in the office of Computer Editor of CONNECTIONS. Is there a volunteer?

Please come to the INSNA meeting on Sunday afternoon, February 14, 1993, and help us give INSNA a new structure, some new faces, and some new ideas. As you will read in Ties and Bonds (this issue) Barry Wellman is

willing to continue to help and so am I. But we cannot do it ourselves.

BACK TO THE FUTURE? A PERSONAL EDITORIAL

BACK: You probably don't realize it, but INSNA has been run as a small business for all of its 16 years. When I founded it in 1976, I decided the best way to get started was to get started. I quickly recruited an advisory board, schmoozed with them about what to do. I sent out membership forms, you sent in your dues, & I put out the 1st issue of Connections. Legally it was a small business, run out of my hip pocket & its own checking account. Technically, it was profit-making because that's the easiest way to set up things, although I never took a cent. We've never been in debt, either.

This was the right decision — then. It kept things quick, cheap and casual. We scrounged like mad, using the resources of our department & research centres — sometimes with their knowledge. You were content to let me do most of the work, & I was content at the time to do it. Grad students had fun doing volunteer work — even collecting abstracts & proofreading (in the typewriter days) — and also learned something. We paid only for printing & postage.

Two things changed over time. I started paying students to keep up membership files & proofread because even grad students have their limits. This raised prices a few bucks. And I started resenting the time that running INSNA & Connections took from getting my own work done. Running it was always fun, but I'm an ambitious guy,

& I didn't want to be known only as an organizer & editor.

So I put the word out that I would like to pass INSNA on. It took 2 years because we didn't have — and still don't have — a mechanism for such things. Fortunately at U. So. Florida, Susan Greenbaum took over Connections & Alvin Wolfe took over INSNA. After Susan became departmental chair, Alvin has heroically done both jobs. It's an exhausting task. Soon Alvin will be intimating that it is time for him to pass on the baton.

THE CURRENT SITUATION: One possibility is that we again find one or two persons to run things. If the right people could be found — entrepreneurial, lateral, organized, collectively-oriented — I could live with that. But towards the end of my term, I started thinking of some ways we might transform INSNA & share the labor, the

fun, the networking, & the glory.

I can see some old hands becoming terrified at this point. When we started running INSNA, we vowed to keep it casual. We've succeeded & I hope that we keep succeeding. Who wants to have still another journal? Who wants to go to a conference that doesn't have Peak Tanning Hours as its guiding principle? We have to keep being vigilant — I've been appalled that the ratio of suits to T-shirts has been rising each year at the Sunbelt!

Yet what were good tactics for start-up is not sustainable in the long run. There are costs to the current way our tactics implement our strategy. I've mentioned the first: no mechanism for succession or for giving out jobs.

But I see other costs: The second is that we are not reaching out to potential members. At a time when network thinking is explosively proliferating, the membership of INSNA has declined. We have become a bit in-bred, with an aging membership. At the same time, there are large numbers of potential members who are not being reached: Think, for example, of all the unconnected people studying personal relationships (each of the 2 organizations in that field have more members than INSNA), organizational matrices, world-systems, communications networks. They need us — for our methods, theories and findings — and we need them — for all those reasons & to open us up cognitively.

The third cost is that INSNA has not grown much in what it does. We've been doing INSNA & Connections for a long time, but little else has developed other than the biannual European conference. There are no summer institutes, no specialized conferences, no awards (other than the Sunbelt keynoter), no attempts to organize sections at the American or International Sociological Associations. In effect, INSNA has become an organization that sends a magazine three times a year (so rarely & sometimes so delayed that people forget they are members)

& hosts a sunsplash annually.

The fourth cost is that there is no regularized decision-making structure beyond the coordinator's hip-pocket. This is not all bad — it speeds things up in small ways, & I immodestly think we've always had smart & conscientious hip-pockets. But I know that I craved having a group of people to whom I could turn for advice & load-sharing. Now we have to twist arms on an ad hoc basis. For example, we don't have any current mechanism for regularizing the relationship between INSNA & the Sunbelt. Each year the Sunbelt organizer decides how to deal with surplus and debts, with no ongoing kitty and no payback to INSNA for mailing lists and publicity.

I don't know of any other organization that links so many disciplines, interests and countries. We're linked by a way of looking at things, a paradigm if you like. That's been one of our most exciting things, especially because INSNA-niks have not been disciplinary or national chauvinists. But it does make for a good deal of organizational complexity. Our way of handling it so far has been democratic centralism. But there may be other solutions that

are better for us now.

THE FUTURE? I want to emphasize that these are my own ideas. No group has been floating trial balloons or is plotting. Rather, after much meditation, I'm sitting alone in Toronto on a grey November Sunday spinning

them out. Nor do want to be Coordinator or Editor again - I've done my share. It's your turn!

1. Set up a Council of about 8 outside advisors, plus the INSNA Coordinator, the Connections Editor, the Social Networks Editor, the Sunbelt and Eurobelt organizers, and some emeriti like Alvin and me (Hey, did you think I could totally let go?). There should also be an inner Steering Group for very quick consultations. All Council members should be on email & try to meet once a year at the Sunbelt & every other year at the Eurobelt. We might ask the INSNA Coordinator to nominate a slate with a bit too many names, publish the list in Connections, invite write-in additions, and have an election. In addition to wisdom & responsibility, the most important thing is diversity — in geography, discipline & specialization — even if this means under-representing American sociologists. The Council and the Coordinator would also nominate people for other posts and committees — in my experience people don't like to volunteer but will often respond willingly if they are honored with a nomination. (The need for flexible diversity means that we shouldn't have straight elections — if we did, we'd need unnecessarily elaborate rules as to where the Council members should come from.)

2. Have a large number of Associate Coordinators, representing specialized interests, disciplines and geographical areas. We could have someone responsible for communications networks, community analysis, personal relationships, Netherlands, Africa. Indeed, where membership and demand warrants, we could combine coordination by interest and geography, for example, an Associate Coordinator for British anthropology, East European sociology, American + corporate interlocks. Turf overlap would only promote healthy activity, for each Associate Coordinator would be responsible for recruiting members; organizing or promoting specialized sessions,

workshops, conferences, etc.; sending abstracts, book summaries and news to Connections.

3. If we don't do the above, then we need some other posts, such as membership secretary, abstract coordinator, computer programs editor, etc. [On the subject of abstracts, I've repeatedly checked out the obvious idea of using Sociofile to ease the burden. Unfortunately, Sociological Abstracts refuses to let us use it on copyright grounds. And they keep the price for a CD-ROM subscription so high that only libraries can afford it.]

4. We should also formalize the procedure of splitting the posts of INSNA Coordinator and Connections

editor. The combination is a huge job, and we'll only get volunteers if the jobs are do-able.

5. We might think about a few other committees, such as would give out awards. I'm ambivalent about this: The negative side of awards is that for everyone who gets it, a dozen others are hurt and angry they didn't get it. The positive side is that awards give us lots of credibility with deans & granting agencies, as well as a cheap way of rewarding service & excellence. Perhaps the answer is to give lots of awards.

6. There are a bunch of other suggestions, but I will stop here. There'll be a big session at the Sunbelt to

discuss such matters. Please be there. What do you think?

COLEMAN GETS WHAT HE DESERVES

James Coleman (Soc, Chicago) received the Am Soc Assoc's 1992 Distinguished Publication Award for FOUNDATIONS OF SOCIAL THEORY. Edward Lawler for the awards committee said that the book addressed the most fundamental & enduring theoretical issues of sociology with rigor, precision, elegance & insight. The book moves from a rational-actor foundation to the explanation of macrosociological phenomena, giving testable answers to Qs about the relation of structure & insight, how norms emerge free-rider problems, and the role of trust in systems of exchange.

NICK REMEMBERED

The Society for the Social Studies of Science has created the annual \$500 "Nicholas Mullins" award for an outstanding piece of scholarship by a graduate student in science & technology studies. Papers (published or not), thesis chapters, books are eligible, with a max length of 10K.

ED ASCENDS; BARRY CASHES IN

1. Ed Laumann has been appointed Provost of the Univ of Chicago, where he had been dean of the graduate social sciences. For those not into American academe, provost is the 2nd highest rank in a university, and essentially the highest administrator of all academic matters. I've always been pleased & amazed that Ed has kept his research up while playing in the administrative sandbox. Hope it keeps up.

2. Meanwhile Barry Wellman is part of a group (mostly computer scientists) who've gotten \$2.8 million to develop, implement & evaluate a system that allows folks to collaborate at a distance more effectively. They will be connected by PC-controlled video (up to 8 at a time) and simultaneously have shared access to the same computer file — everybody can edit at once with duelling cursors.

OPENING TO THE EAST

The world's first book about network analysis – in Hungarian – has just appeared. Although my knowledge of the Hungarian language is even worse than my knowledge of Japanese, I am able to tell you that among the authors and articles are Laszlo Cseh-Sombathy and Peter Somlai (each on the family), Endre Sik on the informal economy, Agnes Utasi on social support, Peter Robert on status, Tamas Hofer on patron-clientage, plus other articles by Rudolf Andorka, Josef Kiss and Zoltan Toth. It is subtitled vol. 1, so there may be more to come.

It's not surprising that network analysis is flourishing in Hungary. When I first lectured there in 1988, one of the above authors told me: "Of course we are all network analysts & understand social density. We have all slept with each other!" Empirical confirmation was provided.

DEEP THOUGHTS

"When people reach out to people, the come closer together & reach out to God himself." [Rabbi George Schlesinger, preaching the sermon for my cousin Marc's Bar-Mitvah at the Marlboro, NJ Jewish Center, 14 Nov 92.] This networking will be accomplished multiculturally. The sermon was followed by announcements that the synagogue was to hold a Japanese-style Karaoke sing-along in a few days.

I find bar-mitzvahs to be good places to catch up on Bible reading. Two passages in Deuteronomy caught my attention:

On how faculty should treat graduate students (chap. 15, verses 12-18):

"If thy brother, the Hebrew, or a Hebrew woman, be sold unto thee; he shall serve thee six years; and in the seventh year shalt thou let him go free from thee.

"And when thou lettest him go out free from thee, thou shalt not let go away empty:

"Thou shalt furnish him liberally out of thy flocks, and out of they threshing-floor, and out of they wine-press; wherewith the Lord thy God hath blessed thee, that shall thou give unto him.

"And thou shalt remember that thou had been a bond-man in the land of Egypt and the Lord thy God hath redeemed thee; therefore do I command thee this thing today.

"And it shall be, if he say unto thee, I will not go away from thee; because he loveth thee and thy house, because he is well with thee:

"Then shalt thou take an awl, and thrust it through his ear unto the door, and he shall be unto thee a servant for ever; and also unto thy maid-servant shalt thou do likewise.

"It shall not seem hard unto thee, when thou sendest him away free from thee, that for double the wages of a hired labourer hath he served thee six years; and the Lord thy God will bless thee in all that thou doest."

On the denial of tenure (chap 21, verses 18-21):

"If a man have a stubborn and rebellious son, who hearkeneth not to the voice of his father, or the voice of his mother, and they chastise him, and he will not hearken upon them:

"Then shall his father and his mother lay hold on him, and bring him out unto the elders of his city, and unto the gate of his place.

"And they shall say unto the elders of his city. This our son is stubborn and rebellious, he will not hearken to our voice; he is a glutton and a drunkard.

"And the men of his city shall stone him with stones, that he die; and thou shall put away the evil from the midst of thee; and all Israel shall be afraid."

SOFTWARE

The Data Collector

Hypercard Stacks for Analysis of Text, a review by Charles Jones, Dept of Sociology, University of Toronto.

The Data Collector is a pair of Hypercard stacks which allow the researcher to analyze text data. It features a coding menu, Boolean searching, comparative viewing, predesigned report formats and the ability to copy text to topic cards or to export text to a word processor. A coding menu allows the user to add, delete and change code-words during data analysis.

Being a Hypercard application, The Data Collector runs only on the Apple Macintosh. As a research tool, it is useful for much the same kinds of problems as GATOR (Giordano et al., 1988), TACT (developed at the University of Toronto's Centre for Computing and the Humanities) and the textbase part of Nota Bene on IBM-standard machines (Jones 1987).

The authors cite Wellman and Sim (1990) and indicate that they followed their criteria for a text analysis system that would be useful for social scientists. The Wellman-Sim article compared the text analysis capabilities of WordPerfect, the textbase part of Nota Bene, and TACT according to eleven criteria: flexibility, ease of preparation, large linked files, preservation of richness of material, ease of use, analytic power, speed of use, integration of textual analysis and writing, integration of statistical and textual analysis, cost, and availability.

Those who analyze texts have a wide variety of requirements. I have found that the textbase portion of Nota Bene is a very useful general tool for handling interview quotations and abstracts and scholarly notes in general. Not Bene is particularly useful because it can deal with text in one file or many, can handle pieces of text of varying length, has powerful search capabilities and links to a state of the art bibliography manager called IBID. However, social researchers often deal with the sequencing of themes in scripts or stories and special programmes are more useful for this. They may also treat pieces of a larger text as discrete units to be tagged or coded for their content and linked to a file of quantitative data in SAS or SPSS. Such discrete units of text may be mutually exclusive or — more realistically, and more difficult to handle — they may overlap each other. GATOR is oriented to this latter approach, but it demands a lot of work from the user and, although I am a registered user, I have found it difficult to obtain advice from the author.

My own inspection of The Data Collector has been limited because the diskette was physically damaged and unreadable by the time it reached me. Careful reading of the manual indicate that The Data Collector is only moderately powerful by comparison with other packages. It should be a useful tool for researchers who are happiest with an Apple Macintosh and will only deal with small-scale projects. Those who have access to an IBM-compatible machine will find the textbase portion of Nota Bene or the GATOR or TACT packages to be more powerful.

Additional Comments by Barry Wellman.

I was disappointed that although The Data Collector supposedly follows Wellman and Sim's criteria, their manual states that they live up to only four of them: flexibility, preserve richness, ease of use, and analytic power. Here are the ones they DO NOT claim to do:

- Ease of preparation: Making Hypercard stacks is nonetheless easy.
- Large files: I doubt that large files can be handled easily.
- Multiple files: It appears that each file will be handled separately.
- Speed of use batch and interactive: Hypercard is pretty slow on a Mac, but should be fast enough in interactive mode to pursue a few concepts.
- Integration with writing: some import and export capabilities.
- Cost: not stated.
- Availability: low. I've never seen the program in stores. The authors, Sandra Turner and Marianne Handler, are based at National-Louis University, which is not listed in my ASA guide to all American universities with any sort of sociology program.

In short, I am flattered that they refer to our criteria, but the manual suggests that this program is useful only for small projects.

one daughter (one of whom was named as the primary helper), a son is selected rather than a daughter as the primary helper. The analysis revealed the importance of geographic proximity in predicting the involvement of adult children in parental helping networks. The integral role of daughters and other female family members was also highlighted. Other factors, such as parents' marital status, gender, level of functional impairment, and family structure, were also examined.

Tausig, Mark. 1992. Caregiver network structure, support and caregiver distress. American Journal of

Community Psychology 20(1):81-96.

Examines the relationship between the structure of caregiver personal networks, support, and perceived distress. It is argued that network structure should have little direct effect on distress but should have indirect effects via support. Data from 83 family caregivers to chronically mentally ill family members living at home in Summit County, Ohio, are used to test these assertions. The results provide mixed support for the general hypothesis. Most of the effects of network proportion of kin are indirect via support. Network size shows a similar pattern. The effects of network density on distress are mostly direct.

Thompson, Maxine Seaborn, and Wilma Peebles-Wilkins. 1992. The impact of formal, informal, and societal support networks on the psychological well-being of black adolescent mothers. Social Work 37(4):322-328.

Although several researchers argue that informal support systems provide economic and psychological resources for black families, little empirical research is available to inform policy and intervention programs. This article examines the impact of informal, formal, and societal support systems on the mental health of black adolescent mothers. Using the social work generalist theoretical framework, several types of resources are considered separately to determine whether they contribute similarly to psychological well-being. Data from a survey of black teenage mothers show that both lay and professional supports were important for the young mother's psychological well-being. Support from a male partner, caseworker contact, and membership in a support group decreased psychological distress and depression. Support from the male partner also enhanced psychological well-being. Support from friends, on the other hand, was associated with higher levels of psychological distress. A professional service plan that effectively incorporates informal and societal supports in a complementary manner offers the best possibility for reducing the distress of black teenage mothers.

Tilburg, Theo Van. 1992. Support networks before and after retirement. Journal of Social and Personal Relationships 9:433-445.

Changes in one's personal network can be expected to follow after retirement. A certain loss of relationships, for example with colleagues, is inevitable. How do people who are either about to retire or have recently done so react to this life event? Do they form new relationships or deepen their existing one? Which type of relationships are most likely to be terminated? Is overbenefiting or underbenefiting in support a significant aspect in the termination of relationships? This article addresses these questions on how retirement affects support networks. The data were obtained from 50 men, interviewed before and after retirement. At T2 approximately a third of the personal relationships were no longer part of the network. The average size of the networks had not changed. A larger proportion of network members was unemployed and most of the relationships with colleagues were terminated. The relationships were evaluated as being more pleasant and the frequency of the contact was higher. On average, the relationships at T2 were with older persons and tended to be more frequently with an acquaintance than those at T1. More exchanges were carried out at T2 than at T1. They were mainly exchanges in which support was given by the respondents to network members, so that there was a small reduction in the overall reciprocity. The results confirm the hypothesis concerning the significance of reciprocity for the stability of exchange relationships.

Tornstam, Lars. 1992. Loneliness in marriage. Journal of Social and Personal Relationships 9:197-217.

Earlier studies of loneliness have obtained quite confusing results about gender differences. This might be due to the fact that many earlier studies have used very limited and special samples. In the present study of 2795 representative Swedes, 15-80 years of age, it is found that there certainly is a gender difference in loneliness, but that this difference is restricted to married individuals between 20 and 49 years of age. Several possible explanations of this observation are tested, among them the assumption that women more willingly acknowledge their loneliness. This explanation is refuted by the fact that the gender difference in loneliness was not general but was restricted to a certain group of married respondents. Other hypotheses of the causes of the observed gender differences in loneliness are related to assumptions of women having higher expectations for intimacy in a relationship and women having lower self-esteem. Even if gender differences are shown to exist in these respects, they do not explain the observed gender differences in loneliness, neither do differences in the social networks of men and

women. The results of the study cannot rule out the remaining explanation, that the observed gender differences in loneliness are due not to social-psychological factors, but to a more basic difference in which men and women react to the stresses and strains in a relationship.

Virtanen, Von Timo, and Irma Moilanen. 1991. Stress and Stressbewaltigung bei Muttern von Kindern mit leichten zerebralen Dysfunktionen. Prax. Kinderpsychol. Kinderpsychiat. 40:a260-265.

Mutter von 6-9 jahrigen Kindern (n = 42) mit leichten zerebralen Dysfunktionen wurden mit einer Gruppe von Muttern mit gleichaltrigen Kindern (n = 42) ohne derartige Beeintrachtigungen verlichen. Die Mutter der Kinder mit zerebralen Dysfunktionen meinten mehr Erziehungsschwierigkeiten mit ihren Kinden zu haben, beurteilten ihre Erziehung eher negativ und erlebten weniger Anpassungserfolge. Sie bewerteten ausserdem ihre Lebensbewaltigung im ganzen ungunstiger als die Mutter der Vergleichsgruppe. Hinsichtlich des emotionalen Befindens der Familie und der Selbsteinschatzung der Mutter gab es keine Unterschiede zwischen den beiden Grupen.

Walker, Alexis J., Clara C. Pratt, and Nancy Chun Oppy. 1992. Perceived reciprocity in family caregiving. Family Relations 41(1):82-85.

A prerequisite for practitioners working with caregiving families is an understanding of whether care receivers are perceived to be contributors to their relationship with the caregiver. Toward that end, 174 care-receiving mothers and their caregiving daughters were interviewed. The majority perceived that daughters received aid from mothers in return for help given. Mothers who reported giving advice and money had better health while mothers who reported giving information were more dependent than those who did not report such aid. The implications for practitioners are discussed.

Wallace, Rodrick. 1991. Social disintegration and the spread of AIDS: thresholds for propagation along sociogeographic networks. Social Science and Medicine.

Previous work on the asymptotic spread of HIV infection along a low dimensional 'sociogeographic' network, a social network characteristically embedded within a limited geographic area, is extended to explore threshold conditions under which the infection extends widely beyond an initial set of infected individuals or communities. Results for one dimension suggest that threshold behavior is analogous to a chain reaction with criticality determined conjointly by the susceptibility of individuals within a community to a nexus of behavior conducive to rapid HIV spread and by the probability of transmission between susceptible communities. Once threshold is exceeded, a stochastic reformulation finds the asymptotic rate of transmission between communities may be markedly raised by positive correlation between susceptibility to rapid disease spread within a community and the transmissibility between communities, for example outmigration driven by social disintegration or residential instability arising from inherent structural factors associated with community susceptibility, as with male prostitution. Examination of threshold conditions for higher dimensional sociogeographic networks most likely characteristic of disease spread beyond the 'deep ghettos' now suffering the highest burden of infection suggests it is at least as, and likely more, effective to decrease the fraction of population susceptible to the high risk behavioral nexus as it is to lower the probability of disease transmission between susceptible individuals or communities. The research suggests the necessity of interventions to stabilize socially disintegrated or other affected communities, in addition to programs aimed only at decreasing the probability of disease transmission between individuals.

Williams, T. M., 1992. Practical use of distributions in network analysis. 1992. Journal of Operational Research Sociology 43(3):265-270.

When modelling project networks under uncertainty, there are a variety of probability distributions from which to choose for activity-durations. From experience of risk analysis in practice, this paper offers some conclusions on how many and which parameters should be estimated, and which distributions should be used.

Winefield, Helen R., Anthony H. Winefield, and Marika Tiggemenn. 1992. Social support and psychological well-being in young adults: The multi-dimensional support scale. Journal of Personality Assessment 58(1):198-210.

A large sample (N = 483) of community-living adults (M age = 23.6 years) responded to questions about the frequency and adequacy of emotional, practical, and informational support during the past month from three sources—confidants, peers, and supervisors—using the Multi-Dimensional Support Scalae. Factor analysis was used to distinguish meaningful regularities in item responses, and the resulting five scales have high internal reliability. Scores correlated significantly with measures of self-esteem, depressive affect, and psychological disturbance according to the General Health Questionnaire. To investigate what contribution support measures could

make to the prediction of psychological well-being was related to their level of life stress; however, the addition of social support measures doubled the explained variance in measures of psychological well-band. The support the strongest association with well-being was the frequency of supportive behaviors toward the respondent by close family and friends.

Wright, Erik Olin, and Donmoon Cho. 1992. The relative permeability of class boundaries to cross-class friendships: A comparative study of the United States, Canada, Sweden, and Norway. American Sociological Review 57 (February):85-102.

The structural analysis of classes can be divided into the analysis of class locations and the analysis of permeability of boundaries separating those locations. Marxist analysis of class structure has been primarily concerned with the first of these while Weberian class analysis has focused on the second. We attempt to combine a Marxist structural class concept, which views class locations in capitalist societies as structured by exploitation based on property relations, authority relations and expertise, with the Weberian concern with the ways lives of individuals traverse the boundaries of that structure. We examine patterns of friendship ties across class boundaries in four contemporary capitalist societies: the United States, Canada, Sweden, and Norway. Three empirical conclusions stand out: (1) The property-based class boundary is the least permeable of the three exploitation dimensions; (2) the authority-based class boundary is significantly more permeable than the expertise-based boundary; and (3) patterns of inter-class friendships are largely invariant across these four countries.

UCINET IV is a menu-driven, easy-to-use program for the analysis of social networks and other proximity data. UCINET IV is coded in pascal, and employs the latest algorithms available in the graph-theoretic and numerical analysis literatures. It runs on MS-DOS computers with 512K of memory. All procedures can handle 180-by-180 matrices; most can handle much larger datasets. The software is accompanied by a 50-page User's Guide and a 200-page Reference Manual.

Some of the program's capabilities include: connectivity (geodesic distances, maximum flows, volume of paths, cohesion, etc); measures of centrality; cohesive subgroups (components, cliques, mutually exclusive factions, etc); positions and roles (structural equivalence, automorphic equivalence and regular equivalence); QAP matrix correlation and regression; P1 model; density tables; matrix algebra; random data; and multivariate analysis (MDS, correspondence analysis, cluster analysis, etc).
