Michigan's Integrated Behavior and Learning Support Initiative (MiBLSi)

 MiBLSi is an official partner with the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) National Technical Assistance Center on Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

Michigan's Integrated Mathematics Initiative (Mi^2)

- Kate Fanelli joined the (Mi)^2 staff as the Math Accessibility Specialist.
 (Mi)^2 is focusing on providing professional development (continuing the middle school course and researching early elementary offerings for potential roll out next school year) and technical assistance to math programs around the state.
- Over the past two years, (Mi)^2 has trained facilitators for the professional learning course Enhancing Mathematics Instruction for Students with Learning Difficulties, a middle school offering focusing on algebraic expressions and equations. Kate is meeting with trained facilitators to discuss course implementation, including specific challenges related to sustaining effective practices in mathematics instruction to improve outcomes for students with disabilities. She has also had the opportunity to speak with educators regarding any resulting shifts in classroom practice. (Mi)^2 will use information gained on these visits to align supports which help facilitators implement the course, sustain effective instructional practices, and build capacity in their districts.

Michigan's Integrated Technology Support (MITS)

- Accessible Educational Environments usability testing: Three-day PD around Accessible Educational Environments is implemented and studied in two districts. Both districts have completed the first day of the PD focusing on providing universal supports for students in their districts. Day 2 will focus around targeted supports (more personalized for students who are still experiencing difficulty with universal supports in place) and will take place in January. Day 3 will focus on intensive supports, individually determined through a process for consideration of assistive technology (AT), and the implementation and effectiveness of those supports. MITS is engaged in ongoing communication efforts between training with these sites to provide technical assistance. These efforts will inform the ongoing creation of facilitator training to increase district capacity.
- Collaborative efforts are being sought with Michigan Alliance for Families around AT following joint attendance at Closing the Gap in Minneapolis.

Michigan Special Education Mediation Program (MSEMP)

 The OSE has approved an MSEMP project to pilot the use of restorative practices as an alternative to the suspension and expulsion of students with disabilities for violating their school codes of conduct. Participating schools will use restorative practices to keep Tier III students with disabilities in class in the wake of misconduct. These practices include restorative circles, restorative conferences, and mediation. Services will be provided by participating conflict resolution centers in the MSEMP system.

- In upcoming months, the MSEMP will be conducting workshops in collaborative skills for parents in Port Huron and Flint and for school districts in Grandville and Oakland County.

Michigan Transition Projects (MI-TOP and RTSL)

- The Michigan Transition Projects welcome four new team members.
 - Maria Peak is the new Coordinator for the Michigan Transition Outcomes Project (MI-TOP). Maria has a rich history of transition leadership for our state including her most recent roles as the Transition Coordinator for Eaton Regional Education Service Agency (RESA) and the Region 2 Representative for the Michigan Transition Services Association.
 - Kriya Gaillard is the Implementation Specialist for Reaching and Teaching Struggling Learners (RTSL). Kriya has a Master's Degree in Social Work: Policy, Planning, and Administration from Western Michigan University where she interned with the MiBLSi project.
 - Miranda Owsley is a Financial Analyst. Miranda has a Masters in Accounting and Financial Management with a CPA concentration and Educational Management K-12 from the Keller Graduate School of Management. She came to us from the Skokie School District in Illinois where she was the Coordinator of Finance and Operations.
 - Jennie Brandenburg is an Administrative Assistant. Jennie has a Bachelor of Science in Community Development from Central Michigan University. Many of you know Jennie Brandenburg from the Center for Educational Networking (CEN) where she served as Administrative Assistant for the past five years. We look forward to the rich resources each of our new staff will bring to the Michigan Transition Projects.
- We finished October with a very successful Transition Leadership Conference
 that combined efforts from MI-TOP and RTSL. The pre-then-post test showed
 attendees gained knowledge in the areas of best practices for dropout
 prevention, secondary redesign, cross agency practices, and data-based
 decision making. The participants created plans to improve transition and
 dropout prevention in the coming year. Especially appreciated was the
 presentation from Teri Johnson, OSE, on the department's direction and a
 question and answer session.

Upcoming, we are hosting regional workshops for Intermediate School
District (ISD) transition coordinators and their central office teams in January
with Dr. Mindee O-Cummings and Amy Szymanski, from the American
Institutes for Research. The topic to be presented is the Early Warning Signs
for Dropout Prevention, and teams will interact with their local data to guide
decision making. Also in January, we will begin the pilot for the BackStory
Transition Data Portal and Student Engagement app with four ISDs.
