Michigan's Integrated Behavior and Learning Support Initiative (MiBLSi)

 There are 26 professional development modules developed by MiBLSi regarding academic and behavior MTSS located on Michigan LearnPort (www.mi.learnport.org)

Michigan's Integrated Mathematics Initiative (Mi)²

• (Mi)² is working with the authors of a multi-day professional learning course for grades K-2 and 3-5 to introduce the work in Michigan and provide facilitator training during the 2014-2015 school year. (Mi)² continues to make monthly contacts with the network of trained facilitators, providing support as needed; and sending out the (Mi)² Update, a monthly e-newsletter containing math instruction resources and events around the state. The new (Mi)² website went live in December. The website connects math educators to resources and professional learning opportunities. Kate Fanelli has joined Laura Taylor for Accessible Educational Environments trainings for MITS, providing information about accessible mathematics instructional strategies and tools. Michigan's Integrated Technology Supports (MITS)

- MITS Provides tiered levels of support to districts, including intensive support with a
 particular district as we conduct usability testing for future professional learning and
 technical assistance to districts. MITS also provides targeted support to districts and
 families, particularly in the area of assistive technology. MITS is utilizing Google
 Hangouts and other online options to provide ongoing technical assistance.
- Collaborative Professional Development with Michigan Alliance for Families will take place on February 20. The topic includes Assistive Technology (AT) in the IEP – what assessment should look like and how parents can be better advocates in the process of requesting AT for their child.
- MITS is working with Assessment and Accountability regarding the Smarter Balanced Assessment and has produced a single-page overview of supports (see attached). MITS is also involved with revisions to the Technology Readiness Infrastructure Modules to include more robust consideration regarding students with disabilities and learner variability overall.

Michigan Special Education Mediation Program (MSEMP)

• The MSEMP, with support from the OSE, has launched a restorative justice pilot project in Macomb, Kent, and Ingham counties. The MSEMP centers serving those counties are offering restorative circles and conferences to select local schools as an alternative to suspension and expulsion in disciplining students with disabilities. Preliminary data indicate that these techniques have reduced both in-school and out-of-school suspension days. The two-year project is operating at the middle and high school levels.

- The MSEMP will conduct two presentations at the Michigan Council for Exceptional Children (MCEC) Annual Meeting on March 6. One session will provide an overview and comparison of the dispute resolution options under the IDEA, MARSE, and OSE procedures, including mediation. The second session will focus on restorative justice in discipline for students with disabilities.
- The MSEMP will also present at the Michigan Transition Services Association (MTSA) conference on March 14 regarding collaboration and transition planning.
 Presentations on the MSEMP itself have been scheduled for March and April in Menominee, Eaton, and Macomb. The MSEMP's workshop series on collaboration in the IEP process is being conducted in Oakland during February and March. The MSEMP is developing a short video overview of its workshops for its website, www.msemp.cenmi.org.

Michigan Transition Projects (MTP)

- In January, we hosted a Regional Online Workshop for Intermediate School District (ISD) Transition Coordinators that combined efforts from the MI-TOP and RTSL initiatives. Dr. Mindee O'Cummings and Amy Szymanski, from the American Institutes for Research, presented on the Early Warning Signs for Dropout Prevention. Teams worked with their local data to help identify students at-risk for dropout and making programmatic decisions.
- Also in January, we started the pilot for the BackStory Student Engagement mobile app with Ottawa ISD and will expand to other ISDs in February.
- After five years of successful state-led ISD transition-focused community conversations, our team has created materials to assist and build capacity for ISDled community conversations. During the month of February, the MI-TOP team will be assisting six ISDs in conducting community conversations focused on family involvement in the transition planning process.
