

Apprenticeship Corner - Apprenticeship is Not a Dirty Word

The Metal Building Contractors & Erectors Association is working hard to fulfill its mission of providing the best training in the metal building industry. Over the years, many people with vast experience and knowledge in the industry have worked hard to develop and market programs that help members train the workforce in the metal building industry and grow their companies. MBCEA, in conjunction with the Metal Buildings Institute, offered the Quality and Craftsmanship Training that has educated countless industry workers. Unfortunately, that training – as good as it is – is no longer sufficient. The changing landscape in which MBCEA members work is now demanding something different. Project labor agreements, responsible contractor ordinances, and other laws and regulations are requiring apprenticeship training to work in certain jurisdictions or on specific projects. Putting aside whether it's good policy or even fair, it is a reality with which our members will have to deal for the foreseeable future.

TECHNICAL CORNER - Metal Building Collapses: A Call to Prioritize Temporary Bracing Safety

Recent events in the news have highlighted multiple cases where metal buildings have collapsed during construction. These incidents are deeply concerning for everyone in the industry. Our thoughts go out to those affected, but we must also acknowledge the hard truth: we have to do better.

For years, the Metal Building Contractors & Erectors Association (MBCEA) has been dedicated to educating its members on the importance of temporary bracing and why it is an essential component of safe metal building erection. These incidents serve as a stark reminder that improper bracing is not just a regulatory issue—it is a matter of life safety.

OSHA 1926.754(a) and 1926.755(4), Temporary Bracing Requirements

OSHA Standard 1926.754(a) states: "During the construction of a steel structure, the employer shall ensure that the structural stability is maintained at all times during the erection process," and OSHA 1926.755(4) mandates that "a competent person shall determine if guy or bracing is needed; if guying or bracing is needed it shall be installed."

The Role of Builders and Erectors

It is the responsibility of builders and erectors to understand and implement proper temporary bracing. Every project is unique, and factors such as wind loads, site conditions, and erection sequences must be carefully considered when determining temporary guying and support requirements. Failure to do so not only risks structural integrity but also endangers workers on-site.

Manufacturer Expectations

Manufacturers emphasize that builders must assess and establish temporary guying and supports as required. While manufacturers provide detailed erection plans, these often

assume that industry best practices are followed. The ultimate responsibility for ensuring stability during construction lies with the erector.

A Call to Action

We urge all contractors, erectors, and field personnel to revisit their bracing plans, reinforce training efforts, and adhere strictly to OSHA standards. MBCEA provides resources to assist in understanding and implementing proper temporary bracing techniques. For complex jobs, consider hiring a competent engineer to oversee your temporary bracing plans and ensure you have adequate bracing.

We have compiled a small list of those interested or capable of performing this service. We would like to share this and request that if you know of an engineer who can do this work for members, we would like to get them on this list. Also, buy a copy of the temporary bracing guidelines from the Metal Buildings Institute (MBI), <u>linked here</u>.

We cannot afford to see more failures in our industry. Let's commit to doing better—because safety isn't optional, it's essential.

Let's talk about the elephant in the room – attorneys can be expensive. This is particularly true when it comes to the use of litigation to resolve disputes. To be clear, sometimes being in court or arbitration is the better solution. The other side gets a vote when there is conflict too. So they can force you into court and, in part, often cause litigation to be more expensive than is necessary by the way they approach it. These risks often lead to conversations about how best to avoid litigation.
