2021 was a big year for CCCGA's Bog Tour Program. With the assistance of A.D. Makepeace, we conducted over 40 charter bus tours this summer and fall. We also conducted 8 tours at Benson's Pond in Middleboro. Finally, we also conducted 8 public tours on weekends at various growers' bogs during harvest. Public tours are where we hire a school bus, guests sign-up online and then we bring them out to the harvest. Whether it's a public or private (charter bus) tour, our goal is for the next  $1 \frac{1}{2} - 2$  hours to educate them on cranberries. This is an opportunity to not only educate the public but to build up a base of cranberry enthusiasts, who will want to consume more cranberry products and better appreciate what it takes to grow this amazing crop.

Dawn Gates-Allen was the guide for the vast majority of the tours this year, utilizing her years of experience and comfort talking to people, making an enjoyable and impressionable visit. Dawn has a natural gift and a passion for talking cranberries. Because Dawn can't do all the tours, we have started to build a great team of tour guides to help further our reach. We were able to enlist growers Bob Bentley of Carver and Bill Scott of Hanson, along with retired Ocean Spray employee Judy Joy. We also had a retired schoolteacher from Wareham who previously created the cranberry bog STEAM program at the Wareham Middle School, as well as two other guides that have a passion for cranberries but no previous formal experience in the industry. 

#### CHANGING ON THE FLY

As of this writing, harvest season is winding down. CCCGA had the opportunity to host quite a few bog tours for state agencies and legislators. The tours are a great opportunity to engage these leaders, educate them about cranberry farming, allow them the opportunity to get into the bog to help load fruit and most importantly, to foster relationships. The tours we hosted are as follows:

#### **Proclamation of Cranberry Month**

The Baker-Polito administration again declared October to be Cranberry Month in the Commonwealth. We are proud to accept this recognition on behalf of all of the growers in Massachusetts. The Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources (MDAR) Commissioner, John Lebeaux, presented the proclamation at Matt Beaton's Eagle Holt cranberry bog in Wareham. Participating in the presentation was Representative Susan Williams Gifford of Wareham, Keiko Orrall, Director of the MA Office of Travel and Tourism (MOTT), along with several key members of the MDAR and MOTT staff.

#### Freshmen State Legislators

Matt Beaton again hosted the freshmen legislators and their staff on a beautiful fall day at the Eagle Holt bog in Wareham. Every two years there is a new group of freshmen legislators from all across the state, generally who know little to nothing about cranberries, providing a great opportunity to introduce them to the industry. This new group of legislators and their staff were inquisitive and engaged. The freshmen class president, Representative Jake Oliveira of Ludlow, organized a good turnout of legislators and their aides.

Joint Committee on Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture

This State House committee is the one where many of our legislative bills pass through. Chaired by Senator Rebecca Rausch of Needham and Representative Carolyn Dykema of Holliston, all of the members are new to this committee. Scott Hannula welcomed the committee and their key staff to his bog in Middleboro, where they learned about many facets of the industry. Topics included bog renovation, earth removal, technology improvements, IPM, pesticide use, among others.



Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs

Keith Mann welcomed Beth Card, the Undersecretary of Environmental Policy and Climate Resilience for the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs, along with Commissioner John Lebeaux and key staff from both agencies to his bog in Wareham. This energetic group participated in wet harvest and as in the previous groups, a chance to talk cranberries and discuss our opportunities and challenges.

#### Attorney General Maura Healey

This was the first bog experience for Attorney General Maura Healey and she was welcomed to MA cranberries by Rob Rubini at Piney Wood Bog in Plymouth. Besides getting a general indoctrination in cranberries, we were able to discuss bog renovation, technology and innovation, diversified income opportunities, among many other pertinent topics. The Attorney General and her staff were inquisitive and engaged, asking good questions and coming away with a much deeper understanding of what is involved in growing cranberries.

Notable at all of these VIP tour events was our CCCGA President, Steve Ward. Steve was in the bog with the guests, explaining the process and making connections. Steve's father, Dick Ward, attended all of the events as well, captivating the guests with his knowledge of the industry and natural charm but also provided fresh fruit to all of the attendees, in nicely arranged clamshell boxes, complete with a note about how and where to learn more about utilizing the crimson berries. The Ward family, along with our board members that hosted and participated at the events, again demonstrated their commitment to the industry and their ability to help educate our state leaders on the Massachusetts cranberry industry on behalf of all the growers.

#### Notes from Beacon Hill

The last few months have been busy ones for the CCCGA.

August saw the return of the in person annual meeting. We saw a good turnout of growers and legislators. It was a nice day and a nice return to normal. Representative Bill Straus was honored with the Scoop Award recognition and well deserved as he has been a strong supporter and good friend of the industry throughout his term.

The legislature came back into formal session in September, and as expected, the pace picked up dramatically, with many hearings scheduled to address the few thousand bills still yet to be heard. A bill sponsored by Senator Moran that seeks to correct an anomaly in the SMART legislation that would clarify the dual use of solar on agricultural land was heard by the Environmental Committee and it generated a good amount of testimony. We have had follow up conversations about the bill with legislators and will continue to advocate its passage. administration also released new guidance on the dual use program for review and comment, which will be shared with you as we move through the process.

There was a groundbreaking event for the coming cranberry station renovation and construction project, which when completed will vastly improve the work performed at station and improve working conditions, which will in turn improve the research and recommendations that growers receive from that work. Our thanks go out to our legislative delegation and especially Senator Rodrigues and Representative Straus who do double work as co-chairs of the cranberry station oversight board and who were critical in securing the support in the house and senate to move the funding for the project forward. Our thanks to the Governor and his administration including Secretary Kathleen Theoharides and Commissioner John Lebeaux for their support, as well as the UMass Dartmouth administration for their efforts in running the station.

We are all anxious to see the roll out of the cranberry tax credit program contained in last year's economic development bill. Brian and I

have kept in touch with MDAR and EOEA about the regulations for the program, which we expect to be released in the near future since the tax credits are available for 2020 grower capital improvement projects. We will let you all know as soon as the program is finalized. This program can be used in conjunction with a new round of Cranberry Innovation grant funding for the coming year. Brian will be in touch with more information on all this as it becomes available.

I recently attended a farm tour for legislators sponsored by the Farm Bureau. Several of us had the opportunity to address concerns with certain legislation that seeks to change certain agricultural labor rules regarding overtime, minimum wage, and rest time.

The CCCGA also sponsored several bog tours for governmental leaders during harvest to familiarize those legislators and administration members with the work of the growers in a hands-on fashion. The tours are well attended and well received as the participants eagerly get in the water and learn firsthand what the work is like. These tours present a great opportunity to educate these officials on the legislation and advocacy priorities of the CCCGA.





#### UPDATES FROM THE CMC

The U.S. and Europe Union have reached an agreement that addresses a three-year steel and aluminum tariff dispute. As part of the agreement, the EU agreed to not implement a proposed 25% tariff on U.S. dried cranberries and to suspend the current 25% tariff on U.S. cranberry concentrate. In 2018, the U.S. imposed steel and aluminum tariffs on several countries including the European Union. On June 1, 2018, the EU responded with its own set of tariffs on U.S. products including U.S. motorcycles, distilled spirits, citrus, and cranberries.

The EU originally recommended a 25% tariff on both concentrate and dried cranberries, but as a result of domestic EU pressure, only imposed the concentrate tariff and suspended the 25% dried tariff for three years in the hopes an agreement could be reached. In late May 2021, an additional six months to resolve the issue was negotiated. If no agreement was reached, the EU dried cranberry tariff would have gone into effect on December 1, 2021. The U.S. currently exports \$73 million worth of dried cranberries annually to the EU, the largest export market for U.S. dried cranberries.

CMC executed a request for proposals (RFP) for a new market development project for the following areas: 1) Russia, 2) South America (Brazil, Colombia, and Argentina), and 3) Southeast Asia (Thailand, Vietnam, Indonesia, Malaysia, and Singapore).

CMC received several submissions and conducted interviews with the leading candidates. Euromonitor was chosen for the market research project. Their strategy and staff are robust and professional, including both US- and foreign-based staff, who will be contributing to the project. Moreover, their clear vision for the deliverables to be provided to CMC most clearly aligns with the market development roadmap CMC hoped would be an outcome of this project. Another benefit, particularly given the short timeline to conduct this research, is that they are a one-stop-shop for all markets. Euromonitor is well-respected and utilized by USDA and other MAP cooperators.

CMC is currently also conducting RFPs and interviews for its trade policy program, its China in-market representation and its Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform (FAIR) Act Evaluation.

### 2022 Cranberry Crop Insurance Policy - Sales Closing Date - Nov. 20th


## November 20<sup>th</sup> 2021 is the last day to purchase a new cranberry crop insurance policy, or make changes or cancel an existing policy!

Considering the weather challenges of this past year, maybe it's time you reconsider how much crop insurance coverage you need! The deadline to purchase, change or cancel a policy is Nov 20<sup>th</sup>, 2021 so now is the time to explore crop insurance for 2022! Crop insurance is an option that can protect from a crop failure. Crop insurance has several options that can provide income security from a crop loss. Growers can select a level of protection from 50% to 75% of your normal yield and 67% to 100% of the established price. Growers with multiple tracts may insure each tract separately, provided they have separate tract records. The established per barrel prices for 2022 are \$37.00 for conventional practices, \$120.00 for certified organic, and \$37.00 for transitioning to certified organic.

Crop insurance is sold and delivered through private crop insurance agents.
