MEMBER SPOTLIGHT "Red Meadow LLC"

This month we shine the spotlight on Jordan and Equus Trundy of Red Meadow Farm in Carver. While they are relative newcomers to all things cranberry & agriculture, they have taken to farming life with gusto! Read on to hear what they've learned so far and what they have planned for the future.

Growing up in Maine, Jordan does have a little ag in his background. He worked for Williams Family Farm and tended to their blueberries for a time. Equus, on the other hand, was more involved with horses. Fast forward through attending Wheaton college, where they met, and moving into IT careers, a visit to the Cranberry Harvest Celebration one year sparked an interest which has helped change the course of their life.

The Trundys were living in Hull but were interested in getting into farming, so they ventured to Carver to look at the property and loved it. Set on 17 acres, their home looks like a little retreat planted among the scenic land of cranberry bogs. They have 7 acres of bogs consisting of Early Blacks, Howes, and Ben Lears. Further back, they have a large garden planted and another area currently being prepped for pumpkins. They also have Katahdin & Painted Desert sheep and beehives—all creatures which serve a purpose on the farm. All of this combines into a small working farm with big goals which we'll get to later.

CHANGING ON THE FLY

We have some good news to share regarding bog renovations. First, the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources (MDAR) has released another round of bog renovation grants. This is a \$1 million funding pool, with similar protocols as to before. Previous recipients are eligible to apply. More information can be found on the MDAR web site at https://www.mass.gov/how-to/cranberry-bog-renovation-grant-program. Applications are due Friday, July 22 at 4:00 PM. Growers can apply online, download a PDF or can pick up a copy at the CCCGA office.

Next, the Bog Renovation Tax Credit Regulations have been finalized! We have waited sometime for them to make their way through the approval process but just today, EEA Secretary Beth Card has signed off on the regulations. EEA has created a web page where you can learn more about the tax credit program, see the regulations, download forms for applying and more. They will be creating a FAQ section on the website to help growers navigate through the process. EEA is also hosting a webinar on Tuesday June 21 at 4:00 PM to go over the regulations and answer questions. For any growers that wishes to attend the informational webinar but is technologically challenged, don't despair, CCCGA will provide a forum for those growers for you to come and watch the program.

A brief highlight of the tax credit program is as follows: For tax years 2020-2022, any grower that has a qualified renovation project is eligible for a tax credit, up to a maximum of \$100,000/grower/tax year. The program is capped at \$2 million dollars/ tax year and if any of these tax years are oversubscribed, growers will get a weighted share of the program dollars. For tax year 2020 and 2021, growers have 60-days to send in the application and required paperwork (all of which can be found on the EEA website). For tax year 2022, growers will have until January 31, 2023 to send in the paperwork.

For tax years 2023 and 2024, the tax credit will be available by lottery only. The regulations explain how the lottery will work. It is expected that the application for the lottery will be announced in late summer or in the fall.

It is encouraged that growers check out the EEA website at <u>click here</u> for more details. CCCGA can also print out information for any grower with internet struggles, just stop by the office. The webinar will be a good opportunity to learn more details from EEA staff as to how the tax credit program will work and a chance to ask questions. It's strongly suggested that growers attend who may be interested in the renovation credit.

The bog renovation grant program and the tax credit program were both major components of the recommendations of the Cranberry Industry Revitalization Task Force. It is gratifying to see the efforts from this task force come to fruition and to see the Commonwealth invest in the future of the cranberry industry in Massachusetts. Both programs are the result of the advocacy of CCCGA and the strong support of our cranberry delegation in the state house. These efforts are all spearheaded by Senator Rodrigues and Representative Straus. Further, this also would not have been possible without the backing of the Baker-Polito administration and the ongoing assistance from EEA and MDAR. This administration has embraced our grower community, recognizing the environmental and economic benefits of a strong cranberry industry and together with the legislature, are helping to position our growers for success in the years ahead. I hope that as many growers as possible are able to afford themselves of the opportunity to benefit from these programs and we look forward to more positive news in the months ahead.

Back to the sheep for a minute though. They are a piece of story that falls into our question of "what surprised you the most in your first year." Equus told us that the number of wild animals that appear was surprising. From the muskrat that wants to chew through irrigation lines to the heron, turtles, and frogs everywhere they always seem to have company on the bogs. But the one thing Equus never thought she'd have to figure out is how to get a snapping turtle off her sheep's face when the curious animal got too close to the reptile. Never fear, it all ended well, and the sheep is fine.

2021 was the Trundys' first full year and the first harvest they tackled themselves. They have found it to be challenging, yet truly rewarding. The biggest challenge faced is the maintenance and upkeep of equipment. Having no background in motors, Jordan said figuring out how everything works and how to repair it has been an education right down to the irrigation pump. Learning through the advice of other growers has been a huge help. As Jordan told us, there is no YouTube video, guidebook, or Google tutorial on how to grow cranberries. Also surprising to these newbies, was learning that stores don't sell most of the bog equipment used for cranberry growing and harvesting but instead it's built within the industry by talented growers.

Speaking of their first harvest, they learned quite a bit this past fall. They learned that lots of people want to come volunteer and help with harvest and that "bogs love eating little boys" which they discovered when some little 'helpers' got too close to the flooded ditches. They experienced the sun up to sun down harvest day where they ended up corralling berries by the light of headlights. They also dealt with a broken picker when they were almost finished and a trip to the ER for stitches when Equus got hit in the face by a metal tube from the pump. Through it all, however, they found it to be a rewarding and scientific experience where they use modern technology to do an old-fashioned job--farming!

Now for the goals. With the addition of beehives earlier this spring, the Trundys plan to continue to grow out their bee operation. This year they will be adding a farmstand (so look for it on Meadow St.) to

sell seasonal items and cranberries. Their vision for the farmstand is to have it be 3 seasons and invite other farmers to contribute so they can use it as a vehicle to tell the story of the family farm in New England. The ultimate plan is to have a wine, mead, and cider operation. Additionally, they would like to have the fruits of their labor on the menu at restaurants.

The things they've learned this first year will serve them well moving forward. Everyone they have met in the cranberry industry has been super friendly, kind, and welcoming. No one has turned them away for asking a silly question and everyone has been helpful. Their membership in the Association has provided important resources like frost alerts, information tracking with BOGS Online, general advice and networking with other members. Additionally, both Jordan and Equus have joined the Marketing and Promotions Outreach committee and have an interest in becoming more involved as the years progress.

Big things are coming from Red Meadow Farm, and we are excited to see where they grow!





The Cranberry Bog Renovation Tax Credit program is completed! The regulations, application forms and more details can be found on the Executive Office of Energy & Environmental Affair's (EEA) website at XXXX. EEA will host an informational webinar on Tuesday June 21 at 4:00 PM for growers to learn more and ask questions. CCCGA can print out information for any grower that needs assistance and we'll also provide a venue for watching the webinar if "Zoom" is not your forte. The applications for tax years 2020 and 2021 will be due in 60-days. 2022 applications will be due at the end of January. This is an annual \$2 million program, with individual growers eligible for up to \$100,000 per year for qualified renovation projects.

Cranberry Bog Renovation Grant Applications Now Open

The Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources (MDAR) has announced that grant applications for bog renovation projects are now open. Similar to previous allocations, growers can receive up to \$15,000/ acre for qualified projects. This is a competitive bid process with applications due to MDAR on Friday July 22 at 4:00 PM. The total grant funding is \$1 million dollars. Previous grant recipients are eligible to apply. Applications can be completed online, emailed or hand delivered to MDAR's Lakeville office. CCCGA has printed copies of the application for those growers that are not computer savvy.

Notes from Beacon Hill

As noted in my last report, the senate released its version of the budget on May 10^{th.}

Senators filed 1,178 proposed amendments to the budget. The senate Ways & Means Committee under the direction and leadership of our own Senator Mike Rodrigues, chair of the committee, spent days reviewing each amendment with sponsors in preparation for debate the last week of May. Ultimately, the Senate unanimously approved a \$49.78 billion budget for the fiscal year that starts July 1, adding some additional spending over the course of three days of debate. The senate version differs in some ways from the house budget. The result is that a conference committee of three members from each branch will negotiate the differences beginning in June and come to agreement on a single budget that will then be sent on to the Governor. The unanimous adoption of the budget is a tribute to the ability of Chair Rodrigues to work in a bipartisan fashion with his democratic and republican colleagues, sifting through the budget itself and the amendments proposed.

As for the CCCGA priorities, an important amendment sponsored by Senator Susan Moran was included in the senate budget. The provision provides funding for a study of the workforce development needs of the cranberry industry in Massachusetts. This is a priority matter for the CCCGA, and we are grateful to Senator Moran for filing the amendment, and to Senator Rodrigues for including it in the senate budget with the support of your senate delegation.

The amendment provides for a grant of \$100,000 to the University of Massachusetts at Dartmouth to conduct a study and submit a report on the workforce development needs of the commonwealth's cranberry industry. The university shall consult and collaborate with the University of Massachusetts at Amherst's Cranberry Station and the CCCGA in conducting the study. The report shall identify and assess current workforce challenges facing the industry including: i) existing workforce pipeline issues; (ii) emerging workforce needs; (iii) the development of workforce training programs at community colleges, state universities and regional vocational and technical high schools; (iv) the feasibility of grant, scholarship and other pipeline development initiatives to support current and future needs for full and part-time employees; (v) an assessment identifying chronic and acute workforce shortages affecting the industry; (vi) the need to



provide a greater awareness of the cranberry industry as a career; (vii) the need for employees with technology skills; and (viii) the use of drones, robotics, global positioning systems and data management technology The report is to be completed by December 31, 2022, although that time line may need to be extended for such a comprehensive review.

This undertaking will hopefully give structure and a blueprint for how to address chronic and acute workforce issues the industry is facing. It is a first step in a longer process of then executing on the report recommendations as has been so successfully done with the Cranberry Task Force report.

This provision will need to be discussed in the conference committee and CCCGA leadership will advocate for its inclusion in the final budget.

In addition, as I previously noted, Representative Bill Straus successfully included two amendments into the house budget that benefit the cranberry industry.

The first provides that not less than \$100,000 shall be expended for the operation of the Cranberry Health Research Center at the University of Massachusetts at Dartmouth.

The second provides the University of Massachusetts shall expend funds for the UMass-Amherst Cranberry Station.

Both provisions were in the senate budget, which means both are settled and will be included in the final budget that comes out of the conference committee's work.

Both amendments and the funding provided are critical to the research and development work done by the University and the Station to support the cranberry industry. We again thank Rep. Straus and Senator Rodrigues and the other members of your house and senate delegation who unanimously supported these provisions.

The CCCGA leadership once again continued discussions with stakeholders and legislators regarding several labor bills that have not received

final action. The bills propose to amend long established labor rules on overtime, mandatory days off during harvest, and minimum wage changes. We are continuing to advocate our concerns to leadership.

We are also closely following the work of the Glyphosate Commission. More on that in my next report.

Stay tuned for further updates on these programs and legislative initiatives.



UPDATES FROM THE CMC

Annual Summer Meeting

The CMC's annual summer meeting will take place Tuesday, August 16 and Wednesday, August 17, 2022. This year we will be an in-person only meeting at the Seaview Hotel in Galloway, New Jersey. The Cranberry Institute will host its annual meeting the afternoon of Wednesday, August 17. The ACGA's 2022 Summer Meeting & Field Day will take place Thursday, August 18 at Rutgers. Q2 Numbers

CY2021 second quarter summary reports, as well as several comparison reports, can be found by clicking "Data and Reports" under the "Industry" menu on www.uscranberries.com. A few general observations comparing the 2020 vs. 2021 Q2 YTD data are as follows:

Foreign acquired decreased 9.27%
Domestic sales decreased 5.2%
Foreign sales increased 12.78%
Total ending inventory decreased 21.62%
Shrinkage increased 26.22%

EU SDC Duty Suspension Update

The EU is the largest export market for US dried cranberries with more than \$80 million exported annually. The current normal EU duty for dried cranberries is 17.6%, however, there is duty-suspension down to zero because dried cranberries are considered an input and are not grown in the EU. This duty-suspension must be renewed every five years with 2022 being a renewal year.

There were no objections raised from EU Member States to the automatic renewal of the SDC duty suspension on January 1, 2023. The EU deadline for any objections was March 15. The EU's technical working group on tariffs met in late May to discuss and sign off on duty suspensions. The SDC tariff line was not on a list of tariff lines for further discussion, but was approved as part of broader package at the meeting. As a result, the automatic renewal of the SDC duty suspension on January 1 has been given a technical green light.

With the technical process complete, the next step is for political sign-off by the Member States at EU meetings. These meetings have yet to be scheduled but are anticipated around the end of July/early August. There is not expected to be any debate of the duty suspensions set for approval. Approved duty suspensions will be in place for a period of 5 years before the next review, so through Jan 1, 2028. CMC will continue to monitor the process through to the finish.




