

Portland's Old Form of Government

- The "Galveston model" since 1913
- Mayor & four City Commissioners
- All five elected city wide
- Commissioners legislate AND run bureaus
- Mayor votes with the council
- Mayor assigns / re-assigns bureaus (at any time) and proposes the budget
- Commissioners hire and fire bureau directors

Also in 1913:

- Woodrow Wilson was president
- Federal income tax begins
- Henry Ford invents a moving assembly line




Everything is about to change...

November 2022: Portland voters approved Ballot Measure 26-228

- Ranked choice voting
- Four geographic districts
- Three City Council members per district
- City Council will set policy
- Mayor and City Administrator will have day-to-day oversight of bureaus






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Districts

- Districts 1 and 2 electing four-year terms
- Districts 3 and 4 electing two-year terms
- Starting in 2026, rotating four-year terms



Twelve Member City Council

- Council President sets agenda
 - Elected by the 12 Councilmembers
- Legislation
 - Committee process
- Budget
- Constituent services







- Mayor only votes to break ties
- Mayor can introduce legislation
- Mayor proposes the budget
- Mayor cannot veto legislation passed by council
- Mayor hires and fires the City Administrator
- Mayor hires and fires the Chief of Police & City Attorney





City Administrator

- City Administrator oversees all bureaus
- Six Deputy City Administrators (DCAs) have expansive power over the bureaus



November 2024 Election

- No primary in May
- November election (nonpartisan)
- Mayor elected in a one-winner ranked-choice vote (RCV)
- Council members elected in multi-winner ranked-choice vote
- Mayor and council candidates can opt in to public campaign financing system (small donor elections)
 - \$350 contribution limit. \$20 matched 9:1. Temporary match caps.





- 19 candidates!
- 5 have qualified for small donor elections
 - Three sitting City Council members: Rene Gonzalez, Mingus Mapps, Carmen Rubio; Keith Wilson, Liv Østhus







- District 1, East Portland: 16 candidates running
- District 2, North & Northeast Portland: 22 candidates running
- District 3, Southeast Portland: 30 candidates running
- District 4, West Portland: 30 candidates running
- 47 of 98 have qualified for small donor elections
