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
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WELCOME!

Convention Goals

Target Audience

Cancellation Policy

Cancellations after March 21, 2025, no-shows or changes made onsite to registrations will not be refunded. Refunds will not be given for inclement weather, nor will refunds be given due to registration errors made by the participant.

If you selected convention attendance with a new membership purchase through the registration process, you will not be eligible for a refund should you choose to cancel your event attendance. If convention attendance cancellation is necessary, you must contact the MPA office directly to process your cancellation and keep your membership intact.

Program Restrictions

Continuing Education Accreditation

The profession of pharmacy has moved in a direction that focuses on continuous professional development (CPD) for



pharmacists and pharmacy technicians. MPA plays a critical role in CPD and aims to provide continuing education programs that support the continued development of pharmacy professionals and enhance competency. In an effort to assist you in targeting programs that will enhance your professional development, these activities are accredited through the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ACPE) for pharmacist and pharmacy technician continuing education credit.



Michigan Pharmacists Association is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ACPE) as a provider of continuing pharmacy education.

Individuals have the opportunity to earn up to 16 hours of LIVE continuing pharmacy education (CPE) credit throughout the weekend. Educational activities are structured to meet knowledge- and application-based educational needs. A knowledge-based activity acquires factual knowledge. An application-based activity applies to information learned in the timeframe allotted. Information in knowledge- and application-type activities is based on evidence as accepted in the literature by the health care professions. CPE credit will be earned based on participation in individually accredited activities. Attendance and participation are required before obtaining CPE credit. Any individual who is more than 15 minutes late to an activity or leaves an activity early will not be granted CPE credit. This procedure will be strictly enforced, so please plan accordingly.

CPE Monitor is a national, collaborative effort by ACPE and the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy (NABP) to provide an electronic system for pharmacists and pharmacy technicians to track their completed CPE credits. To obtain your e-profile ID, visit nabp.pharmacy/programs/cpe-monitor/. Pharmacists and pharmacy technicians earning continuing education credit, while meeting all requirements, will be able to view a comprehensive list of the ACPE-accredited activities they have taken in their CPE Monitor account.

MPA reserves the right to revoke continuing education credit for individuals who have not paid the registration rate in full or to participants who claim to have attended programs on days for which they were not registered. Partial credit will not be awarded.

Required Continuing Education

Continuing education requirements for licensed Michigan pharmacists and pharmacy technicians are indicated below.

Pharmacists are required to earn (inclusive of the 30 hours normally earned in a licensure period):

- 10 hours of live CPE credit that provide direct interaction between faculty and participants
- One hour of pain and symptom management CPE credit
- One hour of pharmacy ethics and jurisprudence
- In addition to the 30 hours of required continuing education credit hours, licensure renewal cycles effective June 1, 2022 must complete two hours of implicit bias training

Pharmacy technicians are required to earn (inclusive of the 20 hours normally earned in a licensure period):

- · Five hours of live CPE credit
- One hour of patient safety CPE credit
- One hour of pharmacy ethics and jurisprudence
- One hour of pain and symptom management CPE credit
- In addition to the 20 hours of required continuing education credit hours, licensure renewal cycles effective June 1, 2022 must complete two hours of implicit bias training

Look for pain, ethics and jurisprudence, patient safety, controlled substance awareness training and implict bias training symbols next to continuing education programs in this brochure that meet education requirements. Additionally, according to state law, both pharmacists and pharmacy technicians must complete a one-time course on identifying victims of human trafficking.

In order to bill for medication therapy management (MTM) services for Medicaid beneficiaries, pharmacists must have successfully completed MTM program(s) approved by ACPE.

State regulations mandate that pharmacists and pharmacy technicians cannot earn more than 12 hours of CPE credit in a 24-hour period.

Process to Claim Continuing Education Credit

Participants will be required to register for and complete program evaluations and applicable posttests through Lecture Panda.

INSTRUCTIONS

To earn pharmacy continuing education credit, complete the following steps.

- 1. Register with Lecture Panda Prior to the Convention, you should have registered on the Lecture Panda website and set a username and password of your choice and provided your e-profile identification number and date of birth (MMDD format).
 - If you have already registered on the Lecture Panda website, move to step 2 below.
 - If you did not register on the Lecture Panda website, you must do that first. To do so, go to lecturepanda.com/a/2 025MichiganPharmacistsAssociationAnnualConventio nExposition and click on the blue REGISTER button. You

MUST register to be able to claim CE credit. You can also scan the QR code with your cell phone or tablet to be directed to the Convention event page on the Lecture Panda website.

Upon registering on Lecture Panda, you will receive an email confirming registration with a



link to complete credit requirements. This link allows you access to all program handouts, evaluations and posttests. To avoid emails going to your spam folder, be sure to set up your email account to allow emails from Lecture Panda.

2. Access Handouts – To access program handouts, refer to the registration confirmation email that you received from Lecture Panda and click on the blue button titled "Complete Credit Requirements." You will be directed to all program handouts where you can conveniently pull them up on your PC, cell phone or tablet, or you can print them if you wish to have hard copies. Please note hard copies of handouts will not be provided onsite.

- 3. Claim Credit To complete all evaluations and posttests for programs that you attended and "claim credit," refer to the registration confirmation email that you received from Lecture Panda and click on the blue button titled "Complete Credit Requirements." You will be directed to confirm your name, email address, e-profile identification number and date of birth. Progress to the "Claim Credit" screens, where you will enter the program claim code provided at the end of each program and complete the evaluations and posttests. More information about program claim codes is below. Upon completion of the evaluations and posttests, credit will automatically be submitted to your CPE Monitor record. You must pass each posttest with a score of 70 percent or greater to earn credit.
- **4.** Overall Event Evaluation MPA would like to know about your overall experience while attending the Convention. Please be sure to complete the overall event evaluation on Lecture Panda in addition to program evaluations. Your feedback is used to improve the Convention and other MPA events.

Program Claim Codes

When completing evaluations and posttests, you will be required to enter a "claim code" unique to each program. Be sure to listen at the end of each program to receive that program's claim code. **Program** claim codes will not be provided to participants after participants are released from the program. It is recommended that you keep track of program claim codes by recording them as they are provided during sessions.

Posttest questions are not applicable to application-based programs; however, evaluations must be completed. For knowledge-based programs in which presenters did not submit posttest questions, attendees will not be penalized. MPA, as an ACPE-accredited provider, is required to report pharmacist and pharmacy technician CPE credit to CPE Monitor. ACPE guidelines prohibit MPA from issuing credit 60 days or more after the activity for any reason. Therefore, to avoid denial of credit, it is imperative that pharmacists and pharmacy technicians complete the online evaluations and posttests before June 10, 2025. Evaluations and posttests will not be available for completion and requests to process credit will not be accepted after this date. You will receive periodic emails from Lecture Panda reminding you to complete requirements. Due to this process, participants will not receive an attendance form to record programs attended.





EXHIBIT HALL MAP







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

EXCELLENCE IN INNOVATION AWARD



CURTIS COLLINS

The Excellence in Innovation Award is presented annually to an individual or team that has demonstrated an innovative pharmacy practice program, resulting in improved patient care or safety, advancement of the profession, enhanced systems or other professional development.

Curtis Collins is a clincial pharmacy specialist, infectious diseases and antimicrobial stewardship, at Trinity Health St. Joseph Mercy Ann Arbor.

In 2013, Collins initiated and led a multidisciplinary team to rethink and redesign the approach to allergy management at Trinity Health Ann Arbor and Livingston. Collins performed an extensive literature evaluation and ultimately developed an antibiotic side-chain based cross-reactivity chart for the institution's formulary β-lactam antibiotics. Further operational processes were developed for pharmacy staff to improve allergy assessment including historical profile review for tolerance of β-lactam agents, electronic medical record updates and defined communication procedures to clarify allergies and antibiotic choice.

In 2022, the Joint Task Force representing multiple allergy organizations suggested that for patients with a history of anaphylaxis to a penicillin, a structurally dissimilar R1 side chain cephalosporin can be administered without testing or additional precaution. Collins led this process nearly a decade before official society practice recommendations and his work serves as a model for institutions across the world.

The innovative nature of this allergy management work has been recognized through an ASHP Best Practice Award in 2021. Collins has demonstrated strong improvements for patients and revolutionized antibiotic use in patients with allergies at Trinity Health Ann Arbor.

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BOWL OF HYGEIA AWARD



FARAH JALLOUL-RIZK Dearborn Heights

The Bowl of Hygeia derives its name from the Greek goddess of the same name, who was the goddess of health, cleanliness and hygiene. The Bowl of Hygeia Award is given to a pharmacist who has made outstanding professional contributions and has participated in community or governmental activities that reflect well on the profession.

Farah Jalloul-Rizk is the chief pharmacy officer for the Michigan Pharmacists Association. Jalloul-Rizk was MPA's Executive Fellow in 2017 and was named its director of professional affairs in 2018. She has also served as the state of Michigan's pharmacy emergency preparedness coordinator since 2018. Jalloul-Rizk was named MPA's chief pharmacy officer in 2024, expanding her role to take over the association's education department. In this role, her focus is on grants, community pharmacy and engaging students. This lifetime achievement honor is given to a pharmacist who demonstrates professional excellence and exemplary service to the profession in advancing public health at either the state or local level and displays all the traits and characteristics of someone with a true commitment to advancing the pharmacy profession and public health.

Jesse Hogue is the pharmacy education coordinator, the PGY1 pharmacy residency director and an emergency department pharmacist at Bronson Methodist Hospital in Kalamazoo. He received his Doctor of Pharmacy degree from Ferris State University and completed residency training at Bronson Methodist Hospital.


