LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT AND CEO

Dear NACCE Supporter,

NACCE continues to serve as a conduit for new opportunities for students and communities.

In 2024, NACCE proudly accepted the opportunity to serve as a national partner with community colleges in the transformative **SMART USA** (semiconductor) and **EPIXC** (carbon emission reduction) projects. These groundbreaking initiatives expand our extensive network of colleges across the United States, driving innovation and preparing students for the workforce needs of the future. Central to these efforts is the **SkillPointe** platform, acquired by NACCE in 2023, which offers a free career exploration tool and financial resources – essential tools for supporting these major grant initiatives.

Also in 2024:

- SkillPointe generated 1.8 million site visits and enabled 87,769 training referrals.
- Building on our commitment to workforce and innovation, NACCE established a strategic partnership with Syracuse
 University's Institute for Veterans and Military Families (IVMF) to support veteran entrepreneurs on community college
 campuses. Additionally, NACCE joined with Epixego, one of the University of California, Berkeley's National Science
 Foundation (NSF) grant winners to advance mentorship initiatives.
- The Everyday Entrepreneur program funded more than 60 NACCE member colleges this year for a total of \$184,000.
- Through the **Ratcliffe Foundation's** "Pitch for the Skilled Trades" competition, a wide array of talented faculty, staff, and administrators competed for \$150,000 in prize money. Now in its fifth year, the program has granted \$750,000 to NACCE members.

Additionally, NACCE achieved the following:

- Served 10,000 students through the Verizon Innovative Learning STEM Achievers Program.
- Offered more than 50 instructional sessions and interactive workshops to 370 attendees from community and technical
 colleges around the country at the annual conference.
- Re-granted \$9 million to NACCE member colleges.

We continue our important work through partnerships with IBM, Intuit, the Michelson Foundation, and others, and we recently welcomed several new partners, including Solve CC. Through collaborations like these, students are informing our work, setting the stage for NACCE to become a more influential force on the global stage.

Opportunities for innovation abound, and NACCE continues to bring prospects and students together. Thank you for being part of this community. Thank you for believing in this work.

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
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NACCE Executive Academy

NACCE's board of directors created a prototype for the NACCE Executive Academy which focuses on strategic initiatives.

Sample efforts include: increasing NACCE membership through partnerships with corporations and foundations; offering solutions for colleges to increase enrollments; strengthening workforce development through SkillPointe; and diversifying NACCE's revenue base.





Solve CC helps students develop essential skills to tackle real-world challenges in their communities through hands-on problem-solving and fostering strong connections in communities. NACCE co-hosted a webinar this fall to explore the power of collaboration between students and diverse community members with Solve CC and several faculty members and students.

NACCE and SkillPointe launched the **School Counselor Advisory Council** to address the demand for workers



and entrepreneurs in the skilled trades and help transform how students are introduced to in-demand, and often overlooked careers. Through the School Counselor Advisory Pilot, 14 community colleges are working with SkillPointe to help potential students identify training opportunities.

Verizon Innovative Learning STEM Achievers Program

The Verizon Innovative Learning Program achieved a major milestone in 2024, reaching seven million students nationwide through the Verizon Innovative Learning STEM Achievers Program.

Sixty-two 2024 Verizon Innovative Learning STEM Achievers Program $\,$

directors from 28 states attended the director's professional development session during NACCE's 2024 annual conference, the largest group yet to convene at the meeting.

Fourteen-year-old student Grace Lester attended the Verizon Innovative Learning STEM Achievers program at Big Sandy Community and Technical College in Kentucky

where she learned to use leading technology and virtual reality (VR) applications to create a VR video using a 360-degree camera she accessed via the program.

Over two summers, another student, Ravian Lightfoot participated in the Verizon Innovative Learning STEM Achievers summer program at Jackson State University where he learned HTML coding, explored the intricacies of computer-aided design (CAD), and was introduced to drone technology. He attributes his early exposure to STEM with influencing his career path. Today, he is a cadet in the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado, where he is majoring in behavioral science with plans to pursue a master's degree in management or computer science.


Laramie County Community College student

and success while at their respective college.




Our Mission
