More than 220 member representatives packed the NC Biotechnology Center on Wednesday, Sept. 18, for the NCLifeSci Annual Meeting where they learned from expert panels on AI, patient advocacy and what the future holds for the patient experience and from a keynote exploring Lilly's growth in the state. The meeting marked the 30th anniversary of the NC Life Sciences Organization.

Edgardo Hernandez, executive vice president and president, manufacturing operations at Eli Lilly and Company provided the keynote address entitled, "The Future of Pharma Manufacturing is Now: The Role of Strategic Partnerships."

STATE UPDATES

Cooper vetos legislative budget adjustment

The General Assembly returned to Raleigh the week of Sept. 9 to approve H.B. 10 "Require ICE Cooperation and Budget Adjustments." The legislation

- provides \$248 million to clear the Opportunity Scholarships wait list for private school vouchers
- provides a total of \$377 million for Medicaid, and
- funds enrollment growth, allocating \$95 million for K-12 and \$64 million for community colleges.

Gov. Roy Cooper opposes private school vouchers and vetoed the bill. The legislature is expected to attempt to override his veto the next time there is a voting session, either in October or after the election.

Congress funds government through Dec. 5 including pediatric vouchers, adjourns

Congress on Sept. 25 passed a temporary measure to fund government agencies at current levels through Dec. 20 with an additional \$231 million for the Secret Service.

The bill passed 341-82 in the House and 78-18 in the Senate. Congress then adjourned for six weeks.

The continuing resolution funds the Pediatric Priority Review Voucher program through Dec. 20. The program was set to expire Sept. 30. The House passed the Give Kids A Chance Act

on Sept. 23 by voice vote, a bill that includes the reauthorization of the Pediatric Priority Review Voucher, but the bill has not been taken up by the Senate.

PhRMA notches rare win Medicare price negotiations

A federal appeals court ruled in favor of a health care provider association backed by PhRMA challenging Medicare's drug price negotiation program.

The court found that the National Infusion Center Association had demonstrated sufficient harm to have standing in the lawsuit. The association's suit argues that the program violates the separation of powers and nondelegation doctrines.

The case will now return to the district court for consideration of the merits of the industry's challenge.

U.S. senators say attacks on Novo Nordisk are misdirected

After a while, a much-ballyhooed U.S. Senate committee hearing with Novo Nordisk's CEO became less a roasting of Novo's pricing of Wegovy and Ozempic and more a roasting of pharmacy benefit managers for merely existing.

Members of the Senate Health, Education, Labor & Pensions didn't really follow the lead of the panel's chairman, Vermont independent Sen. Bernie Sanders, who wanted answers for why the list prices of the GLP-1 diabetes and weight-loss drugs are much higher in the U.S. than in Europe.

Novo CEO Lars Fruergaard Jørgensen repeatedly stiff-armed that question, and instead sought to put the spotlight on PBMs.

As more committee members weighed in, it was obvious that most were happy to go along.

"Novo Nordisk is not the villain in this story," said Sen. Roger Marshall, R-Kansas, a physician and OB/GYN. "They're a hero. We should be here celebrating this miracle innovation that's responding to this diabetic epidemic we have in this country." More at BusinessNC

Medicare Advantage and drug premiums to slightly decrease

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services announced that Medicare Advantage and standalone drug coverage premiums will likely decrease slightly in 2025 due to new policies aimed at reducing out-of-pocket drug costs.

The Inflation Reduction Act's provisions to lower out-of-pocket drug costs have contributed to the premium decrease. Medicare Advantage enrollment is expected to continue growing, reaching 35.7 million people next year.

While some health experts anticipated premium increases, CMS has implemented a temporary program to help plans absorb the additional costs. In the face of Republican criticism that the program amounts to a government bailout for political gain, CMS maintains that the program is intended to support the market's adjustment to the new policies.

PhRMA pushes FDA to change 'overly simplistic' and 'unduly restrictive' online misinformation proposals

PhRMA is pushing the FDA to expand drug manufacturers' powers to correct misinformation about their products, including allowing them to respond to opinions, value judgments or personal experiences and communications made offline.

The trade group made the comments in response to draft guidance the FDA released for consultation in July. The draft proposed two types of responses to misinformation: tailored responsive communications, referring to internet-based messages to address internet-based posts; and general medical product communications, referring to messages that implicitly or explicitly address misinformation using various channels including TV.

The FDA proposed prohibiting companies from posting tailored responsive communications in response to misinformation spread offline and in response to an individual's posts about their own experience, opinion and value judgments. PhRMA wants the FDA to lift those restriction. More at Fierce Pharma

FDA posts draft guidance on biocompatibility testing of devices

The Food and Drug Administration has published draft guidance detailing recommendations on biocompatibility assessments of medical devices.

The document, which the FDA released Thursday, is the regulator's response to deficiencies

it said it often sees in premarket submissions. Lab-to-lab variability in approaches to analytical chemistry leads to inconsistent reports, the agency said.

To promote the consistency and reliability of analytical chemistry studies, the FDA has shared recommended methodological approaches for device biocompatibility chemical analysis. The FDA is accepting feedback on the draft until Nov. 18. More at MedTechDive

FDA issues draft guidance to help industry conduct global cancer clinical trials

To help clinical trial sponsors who are planning global cancer studies best position themselves for FDA approval, the agency has released draft guidance for conducting multiregional clinical trials in oncology. The draft includes considerations for selecting clinical trial sites, analyzing data and incorporating regional information about the disease and available treatments.

"The FDA encourages sponsors to pursue multiregional clinical trials, but stresses that such trials should be conducted within the appropriate context," Richard Pazdur, M.D., director of the FDA's Oncology Center of Excellence, said in a Sept. 16 release. "It is important that data from multiregional clinical trials are applicable to patients in the United States who may use the drug and our current standards of oncological care." NIH review board revived

The National Institutes of Health recently reactivated its Scientific Review Board, a group designed to evaluate the agency's structure and research.

The board was established in 2006 but had been inactive for nearly a decade. Its reactivation comes in response to both Congressional requests and concerns about the NIH's oversight.

The board will advise the NIH director on various aspects of the agency, including its organization and research portfolio. The board will also be responsible for reviewing the progress and effectiveness of the NIH's research. The board's meetings are open to the public, and its annual operating cost is estimated to be \$336,136.

Some see the reactivation of the board as a significant step towards increased transparency and accountability for the NIH. It is also a response to concerns about the agency's handling of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Five NC community college students awarded 2024 Sam Taylor Scholarships

Five community college students have been awarded the prestigious Samuel M. Taylor Memorial Life Sciences Scholarship, providing up to \$3,000 per student to offset the cost of tuition, fees and books as they pursue careers in the life sciences field.

The scholarship was established by the NC Life Sciences Organization to recognize and remember Sam Taylor, a founder and president of the life sciences industry trade association for North Carolina.

Connecting NCI SBIR/STTR-funded small businesses and the next generation of scientists

The Mentor and Trainee Connections Hub Program by NCI SBIR connects scientist trainees with small businesses that have NCI small business funding. Partners through MATCHUP are then encouraged to apply for an Administrative Supplement to Promote Diversity, which provides funding for the trainee scientist to work on an NCI SBIR-funded project.

NIH SBIR awards administrative supplements to enhance diversity of the research and entrepreneurial workforce. The award will enable the recruitment and training of students, postdoctoral fellows, and eligible investigators who would be new to the SBIR/STTR company.

While a small business can identify a trainee candidate on their own, NCI SBIR created MATCHUP to introduce top-tier talent and SBIR/STTR companies eligible for administrative supplements. More at NCI >>
