May 22-25, 2011 Houston, Texas

Sunday, May 22

1:15 to 3:30

Hurricane Ike and the Efficacy of Disaster Planning and Recovery

Staff from the Galveston Historical Foundation, the Museum of Fine Arts Houston and AIC-CERT will detail the efficacy of disaster planning and response for the hurricane, the resulting challenges and future modifications to their emergency planning that may help other collection stewards improve their own recovery outcomes.

Climate Change, Collective Action and Museum Futures

This session panelists will present leading-edge research critiquing the current roles of museums and science centers in climate change and propose new potential interventions emerging from research undertaken in the U.S. and Australia as part of an international project funded by the Australian Research Council.

Creative Use of Volunteers with Collections

This roundtable session will discuss ways three institutions are using volunteers with collections and their challenges in managing, training and supervising them.

NAGPRA: The CUI Rule: What It Is and How to Use It

A panel of museum and tribal officials will discuss how they have used the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) rule addressing the culturally unidentifiable inventories (CUI) of human remains held in collections, what they have learned, what works and what needs improvement.

This session will help you research a new collections management system or implement the first database for your institution.

Sustainable Preservation Strategies for Museums

This session will feature projects funded by the NEH's Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections grant program that balance preservation effectiveness, cost and environmental impact.
