## **CONSERVATION** CORNER

Removing Dust From Ceramic and Glass Objects

Dust is abrasive and can scratch glass and ceramics and if left over time can even degrade their surfaces. If dusting is needed avoid wet cleaning. Keeping objects in dust-proof storage and exhibit cases is a must in order to decrease the need for dusting and handling of the object. Archaeological objects, incomplete (or unstable) objects, and objects that have surface deposits should not be routinely dusted. The two major ways of removing dust are vacuuming and dust wiping.

**Vacuuming:** Hold vacuum nozzle 1in. from object surface and use a soft artist's brush to remove the dust by brushing towards the nozzle. Multi-speed HEPA filter vacuum is preferable. Recommended for textured surfaces.

**Dust wiping:** One of the most effective dust cloths is the Dust Bunny Magnetic Wiping Fabric. It will not scratch the object and is lint-free. It is non-conducting and creates a static charge as it moves over the object, which attracts and hold onto dust with minimum pressure. Recommended for regularly-shaped, smooth-textured objects.

## Available Grants and Funding

#### Hurricane Harvey Recovery Grants

**Humanities Texas:** Texas cultural and historical institutions that suffered damage and losses as a result of Hurricane Harvey to apply immediately for fast-track grants to support recovery efforts. Grants are awarded on a rolling basis. Visit the Museum Services page of the Texas Historical Commission's website for application form.

#### National Endowment for the Humanities

Humanities Collections and Reference Resources: Past applicants used this grant to arrange and describe archival and manuscript collections; catalogue artwork and material culture; conservation treatment for collections, digitizing collections, oral history interviews about war and military service in conjunction with NEH's Common Good initiative, and develop digital resources. **Deadline is July 19, 2018** for projects starting in May 2019. Updated guidelines for grant will be posted at least two months in advance of deadline.

**Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections:** The Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections (SCHC) program helps cultural institutions meet the complex challenge of preserving large and diverse holdings of humanities materials for future generations by supporting sustainable conservation measures that mitigate deterioration, prolong the useful life of collections, and support institutional resilience: the ability to anticipate and respond to natural and man-made disasters. Deadline is **December 12, 2018** for projects beginning October 2019. Updated guidelines for grant will be posted at least two months in advance of deadline.

#### Costume Society of America

**Small Museum Collection Care Grant:** A CSA Small Museum Collection Care Grant of \$1500 is intended to assist the costume and textiles collection of a small museum (including historical societies, historic houses or sites, and other similar institutions) that has a very limited budget and staff. Funding may be used to support the care, conservation, and/or exhibition of costume and textiles that have historic, regional, or other significance and are intended for preservation. **Applications due October 2018.** 

#### Humanities Texas

Mini-grants: Mini-grants fund up to \$1,500 of the costs associated with public humanities programs. These small grants, which are easy to apply for and administer, are particularly appropriate for funding a speaker and/ or the rental of a traveling exhibition, including those provided by Humanities Texas. Mini-grant applications are accepted on a rolling basis, but applications must be received at least six weeks before project promotion begins. Decisions are made within ten business days of an application's arrival in the Humanities Texas office.

#### Texas Historical Commission

Texas Preservation Trust Fund: The Texas Historical Commission (THC) awards grants for preservation projects from the Texas Preservation Trust Fund (TPTF) on a yearly basis. The purpose of the Fiscal Year 2018 Texas Preservation Trust Fund Emergency Grant Program is to provide grant funding to historic properties and archeological resources in the state-declared disaster area that sustained damage from Hurricane Harvey. The THC will accept applications on a rolling basis until the final deadline of 5 p.m. on Wednesday, August 15, 2018.
