We start with Secretary Lonnie Bunch from the Smithsonian Institution sitting down with Local Host Committee Chair Marise McDermott from the Witte Museum for a discussion concerning Texas and national museum matters; Christy Coleman from the Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation will then share strategies, outcomes and missteps in the field when tackling JEDI (Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion) work in museums; our first ever Spanish-language keynote with the Mexican Sculptor Sebastian, and then Laura Huerta Migus from the Association of Children's Museums will present "Systemic Solutions to Systemic Problems: Unlocking Barriers to Equity in Museum Practice." You won't want to miss these thought leaders who are documenting and charting our futures.

New this year are our rebranded TAM Talks. In this format, we are providing break-out rooms for attendees interested in facilitating topic-based conversations around timely and relevant issues in the field for any stage in your career, highlights include:
