Evaluative thinking is a cognitive and analytical process that involves systematically assessing, analyzing, and reflecting on information, data, or experiences to make informed judgments, decisions, or improvements. What does that even mean???

It means being curious and asking why and then why again. It means being open about knowing what you don't know. It means uncovering and questioning your assumptions. It means actively seeking the voices of those outside of your institution. Then it means finding some answers! By talking, listening, adapting, and iterating. By going into the community and inviting the community in. Evaluative thinking means using that information to inform the design, story, and goals of your programs and exhibitions. And then wondering if you met your outcomes. And how your work impacted your visitors and community.

Evaluative thinking means all of that and then it means starting all over again with your next musing.

This workshop asks attendees to consider what questions you have about your programs, exhibitions, and institutions. What do you want to uncover? What do think you already know? What questions do you still have? Where can you go to find that information? And most importantly, what do you do with it when you get it?



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



The Museum of South Texas History and

Vanguard Academy, a local charter school in South Texas, partnered in 2022 to host the first-ever Vanguard Family Day. This four-year partnership is supported by a GearUp grant awarded to Vanguard Academy. School officials decided to refocus their college readiness strategies and use the Museum of South Texas History, a historical and cultural institution, as a backdrop to bridge college readiness between parents and their children who may become first-generation college students.

In a small sampling in 2022, many families were impressed that Vanguard Academy and the museum were able to provide free admission to Vanguard families. Many families felt a stronger connection with the charter school, and also realized that learning about their own past, or where they live now, connects to self-discovery and their place in the world. Many children in South Texas leave to attend universities or colleges outside the area and face challenges in adjusting to a new culture—since many never had the opportunity to learn about themselves at school. But, a history museum provides a safe space to learn about who they are and why they are the way they are.

The Bullock Texas State History

Museum recently collaborated with the Ysleta del Sur Pueblo on two digital media projects for the Museum's core history exhibitions — adding Southern Tigua to an existing Native languages and landscapes video and creating a short documentary about the Tribe's deep ties to Texas. In this session, Curator Angie Glasker and Head of Web and Digital Media Mel Tamporello from the Bullock Museum and Ysleta del Sur Pueblo's Director of Cultural Preservation Rick Quezada will discuss their experiences working on these projects from both sides of the table. They will delve into the unique opportunities and challenges of collaborative projects with external stakeholders from Native Nations, emphasizing the importance of cultural awareness and sensitivity in producing media initiatives that honor Tribal traditions and narratives and ensure the end result benefits both the institution and the Native Nation. Quezada will also pull from his experiences working on projects for his Pueblo's Cultural Center as well as with other cultural institutions. The session will also explore why digital media is a useful tool to provide accessible history, connect with marginalized communities, and provide a platform for people to tell their histories and stories in their own voices. Attendees will leave this session with practical strategies for developing mutually beneficial licensing agreements and interpretive content, establishing relationships with Tribal representatives, creating inclusive project plans and goals, maintaining open communication, fostering ongoing relationships beyond project completion, and implementing the final piece in your institution.
