Toolbox safety talks provide an ideal platform to educate employees about



# **Brigham Young University** Dominates the National Collegiate Landscape Competition, Again!

and scape contracting is among the top careers for those with an interest in horticulture. While low barriers to entry mean that many minimally qualified companies will continue to exist, professionalism among the best companies is growing at an amazing rate. So how do students with career aspirations related to design, construction, and management of landscapes find their futures? For Brigham Young University students majoring in Plant and Landscape Systems (the current name for the Horticulture program), the answer includes competing in the annual National Collegiate Landscape Competition (NCLC). This year BYU hosted over 1000 students, faculty, and industry professionals at the 48th annual NCLC event.

Presented by the National Association of Landscape Professionals (NALP), BYU has dominated the event recently, winning the national championship in five of the last six competitions and nine times overall. The champion school is determined by totaling scores from 30 landscape-related competitions. This year, over 600 students from 50 2-year colleges and 4-year universi-

ties competed. BYU students placed first in a record nine events, including 3D Exterior Landscape Design, Business Management, Computer Aided Landscape Design, Hardscape Installation, Irrigation Design, Irrigation Troubleshooting, Plant Problem Diagnosis, Sales Presentation, and Turf and Weed Identification. Second-place finishes for BYU included Exterior Landscape Design and Interior Plant Identification, while BYU placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in Arboriculture Techniques, Interior Landscape Design, Landscape Plant Installation, and Maintenance Cost Estimating. Other top schools from the Intermountain region include Colorado State University (3<sup>rd</sup>) and BYU-Idaho (4<sup>th</sup>).

While competitions are certainly the most visible part of the 4-day event, NCLC includes the largest landscape-profession career fair for college students passionate about horticulture, where nearly 90 companies competed to attract the next generation of landscape professionals. BYU students found employment across the country and here in Utah. For example, Shelby Monks (one of the BYU team captains), has accepted an Account Manager position with DC area company Rossen Landscape, while Angelica Franco accepted full-time employment with Utah-based Frederico Outdoor Living, where she will work as a landscape designer. For students not graduating this year, several found internships with companies they met at NCLC (again, in Utah and across the country).

BYU also scored well in the competition for NALP Foundation scholarships, where 13 students received over \$19,000. BYU student Isaac Broberg received the Foundation's highest honor, the President's Scholarship for \$5000. His cousin Spencer Broberg received another top award, the \$2200 Scott Allen Memorial Scholarship. For winning the overall competition, STIHL also donated \$5000 in equipment to BYU.

The National Collegiate Landscape Competition will be held at Colorado State University in March 2025.
