WHY WE ARE HERE:

The goal of this course is to explore the process of economic innovation and entrepreneurship, from both microeconomic and macroeconomic perspectives. Key topics include risk and uncertainty, the psychology of innovation, institutional change, product verus process innovation, the externality of innovation, innovation profit, innovation life cycle, innovation diffusion, business cycle instability.

EXAMS:

Two 100-point exams will be given -- a midterm and a final. Each regular exam will be 4-6 short answer essay questions. The midterm will cover the first half of the course and the final exam will be comprehensive, but will emphasize the material in the second half of the course. The exam dates are listed in the attached <u>class schedule</u>.

TERM PAPER:

A 100-point, 10-15 page term paper will also be required. The specific topic of the paper is up to you, but should be related to the course content. I expect you to use what you have learned in the course to prepare your paper. You should have a tentative topic by the midterm, but you are encouraged to develop and even modify this topic as the semester progresses. I will require that you turn in a brief (1-2 paragraphs) overview of the paper before the midterm exam, then a detailed outline the last day of the class prior to pre-finals week. Contact me for assistance in selecting and developing your topic. The overview and outline is each worth 25 points. The paper should be typed and double-space, using standard rules for format and reference citations. I would expect at least a half dozen reference citations. If you are thinking about downloading a completed term paper off the Internet or otherwise plagarizing a published work -- DON'T! I expect orginal work. I expect you to study a topic, learn the topic, the write what you have learned.

MAKEUP EXAMS:

As a general rule I do not like to give makeup exams. Makeup exams are bound to be more difficult. Avoid them if at all possible. I expect you to make it a prioprity to take both exams when scheduled. This course may not be the most important thing you do this semester, but don't let me know that. If you know you will have a conflict before an exam (doctors appointment, vacation, school event, etc.), make every effort possible to rearrange your schedule to attend the exam. If not, contact me before the exam. If you unexpectedly miss an exam (malfunctioning vehicle, cancelled airline flight, illness, etc.), then contact me as soon as humanly possible after the exam.

The grading scale is based on a 350-point total, including 200 points from exams, 100 points from term paper, 25 points for the overview, and 25 points for the outline.
