February 16-18, 2022 Spring Conference In Palm Springs – Speaker Highlights

California, Western Region, National and International Leaders Featured

The UWI conferences bring together water leaders engaged in current policy dialogues to provide information relevant to water decision makers throughout the west. The conference in Palm Springs will be an in-person event, at our 'regular' venue. Some of the confirmed speakers for the conference are highlighted.



Karla Nemeth was appointed Director of the California Department of Water Resources by Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. on January 10, 2018 and was reappointed by Governor Gavin Newsom on June 28, 2019.

DWR operates and maintains the California State Water Project, manages floodwaters, monitors dam safety, conducts habitat restoration, and provides technical assistance and funding for projects for local water needs. Nemeth oversees the Department and its mission to manage and

protect California's water resources, working with other agencies in order to benefit the State's people and to protect, restore and enhance the natural and human environments.

Nemeth will provide an up-to-date status of the water resources portfolio for California. She effectively works with both the science and art side of California Water Policy.



Adel Hagekhalil is general manager and chief executive officer for the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, the largest wholesale drinking water agency in the country. Metropolitan is a state-established cooperative that delivers water to 26 member public agencies, serving 19 million people across Southern California.

As general manager, Hagekhalil is responsible for leading Metropolitan's daily and long-term operations and planning to provide safe, reliable water to Southern California. He oversees Metropolitan's \$1.9 billion annual budget, 1,800 employees, and extensive system of conveyance,

storage, treatment and delivery infrastructure.

Hagekhalil is a registered civil engineer and was appointed in 2018 by Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti to serve as the executive director and general manager of the city's Bureau of Street Services.

We will hear his reflections on the science and art of water.

February 16-18, 2022 Spring Conference In Palm Springs – Speaker Highlights



Pat Mulroy has been a leader in the International water community for more than 25 years and currently serves as Senior Fellow for Climate Adaptation and Environmental Policy and Practitioner in Residence for the Saltman Center for Conflict Resolution at the UNLV William S. Boyd School of Law.

Between 1989 and 2014 she served as General Manager of both the Las Vegas Valley Water District and the Southern Nevada Water Authority. Mulroy was a principal architect of the SNWA, helping to guide Southern Nevada through an unprecedented period of growth and one of the

worst droughts in the history of the Colorado River.

She was exceptionally active in regional and national water issues, a passion she brings to her current role.

Her success is a testament to her understanding and application of the science and art aspects of water policy.



Jeff Kightlinger, former General Manager of Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

Kightlinger joined Metropolitan in 1995, serving as deputy general counsel and assistant general counsel before becoming general counsel in 2002. He took the reins as general manager in 2006. Working for Metropolitan has embodied Kightlinger's career for such a long time, his decision to step away was bracing in some respects.

He is known for his gentle straight-talking style evidenced in his comment in response to a question about what's going to happen on the Colorado River:

"It's going to be hard and there's going to be pain. The reality of the Colorado River is that we are struggling."

Jeff is a master at blending art and science with a legal twist in water policy-making.



Brenda Wren Burman, former Commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation, joined the Central Arizona Project (CAP) in 2021 as the new Executive Strategy Advisor. She is responsible for providing advice and leadership across multiple functional areas to recommend, develop and implement strategic and tactical plans and related policy to ensure that the CAP mission is accomplished.

Brenda has more than 25 years of experience working on Western water and natural resource issues, where she has been committed to finding collaborative solutions to secure reliable water

supplies for communities, farms, tribes and the environment.

She previously served as director of water strategy at the Salt River Project, and as Counselor to the Assistant Secretary of Interior for Water and Science. She too has understood and used the science and art aspects to navigate conflict resolution challenges.

Newsha K. Ajami, Ph.D. San Francisco Mayor London N. Breed nominated Dr. Ajami to the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission in December 2020. Dr. Ajami currently serves as the director of Urban Water Policy with Stanford University's Water in the West and a senior research scholar at the Woods Institute for the Environment. Until recently, she also served as a gubernatorial appointee to the Bay Area Regional Water Quality Control Board.

She is a hydrologist specializing in sustainable water resource management, water policy, the water-energy-food nexus, and advancing uncertainty assessment techniques impacting

hydrological predictions. Her research throughout the years has been interdisciplinary and impact driven, focusing on the improvement of the science-policy-stakeholder interface by incorporating social and economic measures and relevant and effective communication.

She previously served in the California State Senate's Natural Resources and Water Committee where she worked on various water and energy related legislation. Both science and art needed in the sausage making water legislative process.



Mark Pestrella, Director, County of Los Angeles Public Works. Mark has been sharing his vision for integrated infrastructure throughout the country, and for many years throughout the region.

Recently he has expanded beyond the world of construction and maintenance into the human side of the equation. His views around diversity, equity and inclusion are setting the performance bar in the water-related world.
