WAI CEO Lynda Coffman Hosts First Member Meeting



oday's 2024 WAI membership meeting officially opens our conference. WAI CEO Lynda Coffman notes that our organization is the largest in the world dedicated to increasing the number of women in all aspects of aviation and aerospace. She welcomes #WAI2024 attendees to a record-breaking event this week with more than 5,000 attendees and over 200 exhibitors.

The WAI mission continues to support members throughout their aviation journey with a Lifetime of Programs, Lynda explains. She specifically addresses WAI's resources available for students, workforce entry, mid-career, as well as experienced professionals and beyond. The strong sense of WAI community is built

through a worldwide network of 180 chapters in 26 countries. Approximately 42% of our members belong to a chapter. Also, nearly 500 corporate members represent global aviation along with dozens of aerospace companies.

Lynda also notes the number of junior members, aged 18 years and younger, has increased to over 5,000 and student members has grown to over 3,700.

Since 1995, scholarship funders have given over \$15 million to WAI members. And through our new international scholarship program, scholarships have been awarded to seven international universities.

WAI has received a Platinum Transparency rating from GuideStar Charity Check and is good financial health with an approved 2024 budget and an endowment solidly above \$1 million.

Looking to the future, Lynda, noted the sky is unlimited with plans for WAI to expand its virtual resource centers for members and to increase the organization's global community of empowered women shaping the next frontier of aviation and aerospace.

The board election results will be announced with one new board member Captain **Bart Roberts** and a renewed term for **Michaela Lucas**, board secretary. We thank Captain **Deborah Hecker**, outgoing board chair, for her longtime service as well as **Marci Veronie**. Both have served on the WAI board for nine years.

Effective April 1, 2024, **Kathy Yodice** will assume the role of board chair, and **Shannon Weidekamp** will step up as vice chair. **Michaela Lucas** will continue to serve as board secretary, and **Linda Markham** continues as board treasurer.

Lynda encourages members to build their WAI network by getting involved in WAI events, utilizing WAI resources such as Mentor Connect, as well as connecting with your local chapter.

Teachers at Work

The annual WAI Aerospace Educator Workshop, sponsored this year by Republic Airways, is all about sharing resources, contacts, and support for teachers and educators to bring back to their students and classrooms. This workshop, presented by the Federal Aviation Administration STEM AVSED team, focused this year on air traffic control education and the collaborative network of aerospace education including Civil Air Patrol, NASA, as well as Women in Aviation International. Each organization shared about their program and provided information and resources to attendees.

With a growing shortage of air traffic controllers in the FAA, educators are introducing and engaging students to strengthen the ATC industry. During this workshop, educators explored NASA's Smart Skies air traffic control simulator. This math-based educational resource teaches the importance of balancing aircraft en route to a destination and allows for manipulations to safely navigate aircraft to landings by changing the aircraft's speed. The simulation is one of many free resources provided by NASA and can be utilized in every educator's classroom to feature an important career in the aviation industry. Explore the simulator on your own at **atcsim.nasa.gov**.

Educators left the WAI event with a tool kit full of options for teaching their students about the plethora of resources for budding air traffic controllers. The hope is that they can help the National Airspace System find its next generation of air traffic controllers.

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Make it Fit!

You'll be humming along with Etta James singing "At Last" as Jennifer Knapp, Aerospace Experimental Psychology (AEP), shares the Navy and Marine Corp's anthropometric survey. Originally conducted in the 1960's at a time when women were not flying, the survey is used in the design of aircraft and safety equipment. Now, there is a new survey that will fundamentally change the disproportionate accommodation of women in aviation.

Jennifer describes the study, what it's like collecting data, and meeting fleet aviators. She discusses the history behind it, how humans have evolved since the 1960's and the impact the study has on naval aviation accommodations, flight gear, survival gear, and more. While this study is being conducted by the military, it is relevant and important for all domains across aviation and will be shared with the industry.

There is also a recruitment message to be heard. Jennifer will share her personal journey, earning two sets of wings and how her career has gone from pilot to aeromedical officer to researcher.

Come hear more about human system engineering, the different aviation pathways in the Navy, and the anthropometric survey that will change the safety and accessibility of flight for women in **Crystal N** at 4:15 p.m. today.

Sounding it Out

Speech-Language science is critical to aviation communication in an "English only" sky.

Linguistic diversity in pilots is on the rise and raising safety and operational concerns for air traffic controllers worldwide. The English language has a complex sound system and the most advanced vowel system in the world. Non-native English speakers have a difficult time hearing and reproducing some sounds impacting the dialogue between the pilot and tower and causing near misses on runways and incorrect landings.

In her WAI education session (**Crystal 3** at **3 p.m.**) Dr. Katie Pierson is discussing the impact of speech-language pathology in aviation and how speech therapy can help pilots learn how to reproduce sounds not existing in their native language. Dr. Pierson focuses on targeting the missing sounds in the hierarchy of the brain, teaching the pilot to both hear and reproduce the sounds needed. All provided therapy is individualized as everyone has a preferred way of speaking in any given language and the concern

could not be sound related but rather due to a thick accent carried over from the native language to the learned language or due to a lack of separation between words when speaking, which may not exist in the native language.

During her session, Dr. Pierson will share statistics from various industries, introduce what speech therapists can do, and provide an avenue for those in need to find help.






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Bridges and Boundaries at Work

re you struggling with the challenges of working in a male-dominated workplace? Do you know what elements you need in order to be happy in your career? Whether you need advice on workplace challenges, are at a crossroads, or simply don't know how to start defining what is right for you, come to **Crystal H** at 4:15 p.m. today to hear Lane Wallace, columnist for *AFW* Magazine, share her experience and the tools needed to succeed when there are gender imbalances where you work.

"It's hard to be in a male-dominated culture without losing yourself," Lane says. "Get your strength up first, apply it, build

bridges wherever possible and draw boundaries whenever necessary."

Following a packed house at last year's WAI conference, Lane is continuing the dialogue first prepping participants on the key elements to building core strength and stability within yourself through self-awareness (who you are and what matters most to you) and becoming more well-grounded (being at peace with who you are and focusing more on meaningful, internal rewards). This core strength, like a good workout, helps you keep your balance, focus and clarity in your career.

With that internal clarity, it's time to look externally. Success doesn't come from focusing on fighting battles or worrying about fitting in, but from building bridges with those who can help you; those you can rely on. "Bridges and Boundaries are how you work effectively in the world," Lane continues. She guides participants through how to build bridges with others and how these bridges will help you manage boundaries.

"Focus on the value of internal rewards versus external rewards," Lane concludes. "Be relaxed, comfortable in yourself, grounded, and clear about what elements you really need to be happy, so if your job falls apart, you are able to react. Rely on your bridges – strategic, tactical and genuine."

Road to Revolt: a History of Women Aviators in Combat

Today at **3** p.m. in **Magnolia 20**, Eileen Bjorkman leads a panel of pioneers who are part of a group of strong individuals who pushed open the door for women in the U.S. military to legally fly aircraft in combat encounters. Come hear the dramatic retelling from the brave women who led the charge in the halls of Congress to repeal the law, written in 1948, preventing women from flying combat jets in harm's way.

Incited by Desert Shield/Desert Storm, the public became aware that women were flying in combat, but not in combat aircraft. Women, who were not all aviators, wrote letters to and lobbied Congress to repeal this law. While the law was finally repealed by Congress, it took two years and a Presidential commission to allow women to legally fly combat jets into actual engagements and "harm's way."

This panel fought the legal fight to eliminate all policies preventing women from achieving their military ambitions in aviation, and they succeeded, but there is still a social fight. The current and next generation must fight to improve the number of women in military and civilian aviation and overcome challenges, which include being a pilot and having a family.

This panel of esteemed women did not get to reap the benefit of their actions and fly jets in combat, but they did get to see the next generation of women achieve this goal. Come listen, interact and be inspired to pay it forward and see even more change and opportunity for the next generation.



Getting Past Microaggressions

Today at **4:15 p.m.** in **Crystal 3**, Katie O'Malley, a skilled therapist in the intersection of career and mental health, will lead a workshop focused on the impact of microaggressions in the workplace. In this session, participants will learn what steps we, as individuals and organizations, must take to address and repair the impact of microaggressions.

Microaggression is a prejudiced action (consciously or unconsciously) against an underrepresented group. When unaddressed, microaggressions lead to increased stress, induced trauma, difficulty sleeping, and burn-out. While women are often on the receiving end of microaggressions, we also are guilty of imposing them on others.

Katie will provide an overview and understanding of what a microaggression is, the impact and implications of leaving it unaddressed, what it looks like to take accountability when we deliver a microaggression, and how she has personally experienced four microaggressions. The discussion in the workshop encompasses both the micro (what I can do as an individual) and macro (what the C-suite can do to help) view and calls on everyone to be advocates and support each other.

Come join this workshop to gain hands-on experience learning to recognize and address microaggressions and leverage proven frameworks for resolution.

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Curtis-Taylor is in it for the really long cross country: open cockpit style

racey Curtis-Taylor's education session today (Magnolia 22, 4:15 p.m.) is an event not to be missed for aviation history buffs and long-distance fliers alike. She's sharing her story of romance and resilience as she solo piloted her vintage Boeing Stearman across the globe, paying tribute to and following similar flight routes of three incredible and unconventional women of the golden age: Amy Johnson, Lady Heath and Amelia Earhart.

Through storytelling, Tracey shares her own personal love of flying, how the movie "Out of Africa" inspired her, and how she was humbled and honored by young school girls in a small village in Pakistan who were part of one of her many stops.

Throughout her trip she was reminded that while women have been piloting planes for decades, it is still a profession where women are rare participants. In her presentation Tracey shares her own stories of prejudice and inequities, of the socioeconomic opportunity that women are denied. She focuses on how large organizations need to step forward and ramp up recruitment of women and how training needs to be designed for everyone, not just for men.

Thinking Like an Engineer

Ever wonder what it's like to perform flight tests? If so, come to **Magnolia 17** today at **4:15 p.m.** to hear from **Bailey Bonac**i, Boeing Flight Test Ground Operations Engineer, and **Katie Brown**, Boeing Product Development, as they share the process of flight testing from writing the test plans to practicing with pilots in flight simulations to performing tests live in the air.

Participants will receive an introduction to experimental flight tests includ-

ing who's involved, when it happens, what's involved, and examples of specific testing such as performing obscure maneuvers required by the FAA. Bailey and Katie will walk through a risk probability and risk severity matrix used to evaluate the severity of what could go wrong so that a mitigation can be created to reduce the probability that the issue will occur or, at least, reduce the severity of it at time of occurrence. After guiding a discussion about the key factors involved in flight testing, Katie and Bailey will show videos and pose potential risks, such as an engine failure, and ask the audience to think like an engineer and brainstorm how the risk could be mitigated and what could be the next failure that may endanger the test crew (like a second engine failure).

Thinking about engine failures, severe crosswinds, or loss of instrumentation is scary, but understanding the rigor of testing and the people who think critically about it, makes commercial flying safer (and less scary) for everyone. — Mary Woolf, WAI 45799



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Debunking Myths around Military Flying: Hear it from those who do it.

Today at 1:45 p.m. in **Magnolia 17**, Lt. Col. (ret.) Jessica Ruttenber leads a panel of distinguished women who collectively have more than 100 years of military service. Together they will share their stories of resilience throughout their military careers and debunk myths around flying, mental health, and military regulations.

The discussion will focus on mental health, emotional needs and physical requirements from the development of a maternity flight suit to dismantling the policy preventing 44% of women from entering aviation because of height restrictions.

Demonstrating vulnerability, Jessica is leading off the panel by sharing her own experiences with mental health and invites the panel members to do the same. Through stories, these leaders and advocates for women share how mental and emotional health does not happen to just one person nor only during service. "The nightmares I had," she sighs. "It's not normal to take bodies home, not normal to leave your kids all the time, not



normal to feel isolated. I'm learning to parent again in retirement and I am not used to being

home for birthdays – it feels awkward," Jessica says.

The women will provide advice on building resilience in yourself and your troops, discuss the tools commanders can use to prepare their unit mentally for combat/natural disaster missions, and tools to help heal after events or service. Jessica will demonstrate an app called "Med Standards" which provides standards, by service line, for flying, including pre-approved drugs, waivers, and more.

Come hear these experienced military leaders share their passion for their teams as they work to dismantle barriers, improve communication, and provide resources and assistance for ongoing mental and emotional needs.
