

Charting the Flight Path for Aviation's Future Workforce

Have you looked at drones and thought, 'that's cool, how could I get started?' Attend this morning's "Charting the Flight Path for Aviation's Future Workforce" education session starting at 10:30 a.m. in Crest 3. The Unmanned Safety Institute (USI) has gathered a panel of industry experts to talk about unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) - commonly known as drones. You'll learn about the skill sets that are needed to enter the drone workforce, what programs are available, as well as grants and scholarship opportunities, the pipeline for students who obtain their done certification to find jobs, and the diverse roles that will shape the future of aviation.

JOBS IN THE UAS ECOSYSTEM

Focus topics of the panel include statistics from the FAA, the number of registered drones compared to the certified pilots - and the percent of women certified pilots - plus a comparison of the growth of the drone industry as compared to general aviation. Hint - the drone industry is growing much faster.

There are many career opportunities that exist in the drone industry with new job opportunities on the horizon. For example, remote pilots are often flying multiple drones at the same time using automation. Workers with the proper skills are needed to write that automation. Then, each of those drones still needs to be maintained which leads to a larger

> need for maintenance technicians. As you will learn in this session, there are many skillsets needed and more job opportunities than is first

> "The future of aviation lies not only in technological innovation but in the next generation of skilled professionals who will shape its skies. As the industry evolves, so must the workforce, embracing new challenges, diverse skills, and a shared commitment to safety, sustainability, and progress," - notes Michelle Dina of USI.

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How to Communicate Confidently

Ready to pick up some useful tips to effectively communicate especially in negotiations? Attend this afternoon's session "Powerful Presence: Unlock Influence Through Confident Communication" from 4-5 p.m. in Willow Lake 3. "Many don't realize how our facial expressions, body language, and tone of voice impact the messages we convey. I'll be discussing how to unlock influence through these nuanced elements and learn to balance warmth and assertiveness in your communication," explains Karen Laos. She reminds us whether in person or online, it's essential to be mindful of how we carry ourselves. For instance, what do we do with our eyes? How do we present ourselves physically? Many people have blind spots, especially regarding their voice. Karen will provide practical strategies to help attendees become more compelling and credible communicators.

Intention refers to what we mean to convey, while impact is how our message is received. For instance, many people speak in a way that sounds uncertain, even when they're making a statement. This can lead to misunderstandings. I encourage participants to record themselves speaking and listen back to identify areas for improvement. It's eye-opening to hear how we come across versus how we intend to be perceived.

One major pitfall of communication is rambling. Many people fail to state their main point upfront, which can lead to listeners tuning out. It's crucial to get to the point quickly to maintain engagement. Karen will share strategies to help attendees articulate their messages clearly and concisely, ensuring they capture their audience's attention.


The audience is indeed unique, consisting primarily of high-achieving women in a male-dominated industry. Many of them may struggle with balancing assertiveness and likability. I'll focus on real-life examples and strategies to help women navigate these dynamics while maintaining their confidence. It's about finding that balance and understanding what effective communication looks like in various contexts, Karen explains.

The strategies I'll share are applicable in all areas of life, not just in professional settings. Whether you're speaking to a colleague, a family member, or even ordering a sandwich, every interaction is an opportunity to influence others. I want attendees to leave feeling empowered to create positive experiences in their communications, regardless of the situation.

I'm here for the woman who feels intimidated in a boardroom or hallway conversation. I aim to provide attendees with the confidence to express themselves clearly and assertively, ultimately unlocking new opportunities in their careers and lives," she says.

"I encourage everyone to join us! This session is about more than just public speaking; it's about mastering the art of communication in all aspects of life. Attendees will learn practical strategies to stand out positively, advance their careers, and build unshakable confidence. I'm excited to share these insights and help empower women to take charge of their narratives!"





Unlock Your Worth

Knowing how to negotiate your salary is more crucial than ever. Mandi Fenn, Senior Manager, Strategic Sourcing at FDH Aero, an expert in supply chain management, led an engaging workshop titled "Make It Make Cents" on Thursday. If you missed it, look her up here at the conference or online at LinkedIn or Facebook to find out where you can participate again. It's worth it! This dynamic session equipped participants with the skills needed to confidently negotiate their worth, set realistic salary expectations, and evaluate comprehensive benefits packages.

"It's a vulnerable thing to ask about salary, and many people don't know who to turn to for advice," Mandi said. Her journey into salary negotiation began early. Despite her role as a buyer, she often felt intimidated by the negotiation process. "I knew it was my job to negotiate, but I still felt scared. What if they took the offer back? Would I seem ungrateful?" she recalled. This common fear is one of the many barriers that prevent individuals from advocating for themselves in the workplace. Her turning point came when she attended a salary negotiation workshop that transformed her perspective. "I loved it and saw the value in connecting with women who had questions they felt were deal-breakers," Mandi explained.

After relocating to Oklahoma City she realized there was a gap in the market for such workshops in her new community. But a conversation with a friend sparked a new idea. "Why don't you just make your own?" her friend suggested. Initially hesitant, Mandi soon embraced the challenge. With a two-week paid leave from Boeing, Mandi dedicated her time to developing the workshop. She sought feedback from friends who had attended her previous training and incorporated their

insights into her materials. The result is a comprehensive, handson workshop that includes a workbook filled with resources, scripts, and prompts to guide participants through the negotiation process.

Mandi's workshop is designed to create an emotionally safe space for attendees to learn about a skill that is often shrouded in stigma. "We're taught to be grateful for job



offers, but we should also be concerned about equitable pay and benefits," she emphasized. The workshop not only covers negotiation techniques but also provides practical tools for participants to practice their skills.

Mandi's workshop is now a licensed program that the Junior League of Wichita intends to offer to the community without cost. "I don't want financial barriers to prevent anyone from accessing this," she stated.

If you've ever yearned for practical techniques to navigate salary discussions or sought real-life examples of how effective negotiation can impact your financial future, this session is for you. If you've ever thought about pursuing a career in aviation but felt overwhelmed by the hurdles of balancing life, work, and training, you're not alone. Kama Rueschenberg, a dedicated flight attendant and a nascent airline pilot, knows exactly what it's like to juggle multiple roles while chasing your dreams.

Kama's journey hasn't been without challenges. As someone who works both as a flight attendant for a national airline and as a pilot in a Part 135 operation flying Embraers, Kama has experienced the grind firsthand from both sides of the cockpit door. She shared with WAI how she's managing to build her flight experience while staying financially stable and maintaining her health. Her advice? Pick the right "day job," stay organized, prioritize, and never forget to care for yourself along the way.

"Being a flight attendant gave me the stability I needed," Kama explains. "The unique bidding system where I work allowed me to continue training as a pilot while still having a steady income and benefits. That's a luxury not everyone gets, and it is giving me the foundation I need to reach my goals," she explains.

In her Saturday morning educational seminar Pursuing Flight while Maintaining a Career & Your Health (9–10 a.m. room Crest 3) Kama will offer advice on how others can follow a similar path. She'll explain how to keep a day job while pursuing a dream job. And you can't forget to stay healthy through it all, something often sidelined by those working long hours in aviation.

"Health is a priority, but how you get and stay healthy is flexible. I've learned to make time for exercise even with a busy travel schedule. It's all about finding balance," she says.

As a woman in a high-demand industry, she knows the struggle of balancing ambition with personal life. Her advice? "You can't pour from an empty cup," Kama shares. "When you take care of yourself, everyone around you benefits."

Kama's seminar promises to be an empowering session for anyone interested in breaking into aviation or pursuing their goals, regardless of age or background. She intends to dialogue with her attendees, so be sure to bring your questions Saturday morning to **Crest 3**.

"Get into the community. Aviation is in every corner of America. Aviation related manufacturers are everywhere. How do we leverage this workforce? We already have to build an ecosystem to solve the workforce shortages?" Kathryn suggests, "There are dozens of ways to do so via local chapters of national organizations. Connect the chapters to the employers and work together to build and sustain a relationship with the youth who atte0nd locally sponsored aviation events. We can all think about who are the employers in our areas and what type of workforce do they need? Do they need a college education or work training?" The goal is to have an aviation/aerospace education ecosystem that creates a Kindergarten to Career awareness and pathway. Capitalize on the success of the Girls in Aviation Day (GIAD) by involving these local resources and then keeping the connection active with the girls who attend.

Trimbi will share her own personal stories of how VR enabled her uncle, a retired Continental pilot, to fly a 737 again and how VR is inspiring young girls, through Girls in Aviation Day, to try their hand at piloting various aircrafts using VR technology.
