OSHA Endorses New CDC Masking Guidance

Following the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) release of updated mask guidance for fully vaccinated individuals on May 13, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) this week advised employers that the new CDC guidance can be applied to all workplaces outside of the health care field, and OSHA advisories would soon be updated.

21 States Move to Refuse Federal Jobless Boost

A growing number of states are moving to refuse the federal unemployment booster of \$300 per week, with many business leaders calling it a disincentive to work. Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, West Virginia and Wyoming officials have all announced they will stop offering the additional aid sometime this summer. Federal unemployment boosts are otherwise set to expire on September 6.

In Wisconsin, Assembly Speaker Robin Vos (R-Rochester) and State Senator Howard Marklein (R-Spring Green) <u>introduced a similar proposal</u> on Tuesday, May 18, saying their bill could be up for floor votes as early as June. Governor Tony Evers has stated he is <u>strongly considering vetoing</u> the legislation, should it reach his desk.

Wisconsin Lawmakers Vote to Require Work Search


for Unemployment Aid, Beginning Sunday

The Wisconsin Legislature's joint rules committee, led by Sen. Steve Nass (R-Whitewater), <u>voted this week</u> to eliminate an emergency rule waiving work search requirements for unemployment eligibility. This means that, beginning Sunday, May 23, individuals must again apply for jobs on a weekly basis to obtain benefits. The waiver was first adopted by the Legislature in March 2020, and would have expired in July.

Wisconsin's unemployment rate stands at 3.8 percent, similar to the prepandemic rate of 3.5 percent in February 2020.

Nearly Half of All Americans Partially Vaccinated

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) today announced that nearly 160 million Americans, roughly 48 percent of the total population, have now received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccination, while more than 125 million Americans are fully vaccinated.
