CDC Proposes Plan for Vaccine Distribution; Prioritizes Essential Food Processing Workers

On Wednesday, the <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) unveiled</u> <u>preliminary guidelines for the distribution of a coronavirus vaccine</u>, once one is approved for public use.

The CDC plan prioritizes health care workers, essential personnel - including those who work in agriculture and food processing, and those most vulnerable to severe complications, such as the elderly and people with underlying health conditions.

There are currently no approved vaccines for the virus. Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, has stated he expects the country will initially have a limited supply of vaccine doses, not widely available until "several months" into 2021.

USDA Announces Initial Agreements for Farmers to Families Food Box Third Round

On Wednesday, <u>U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) officials began issuing agreements</u> for the upcoming third round of the <u>Farmers to Families Food Box</u> program.

USDA will continue to review bids and announce new Basic Ordering Agreements (BOA) through September 31. Agency officials say they are using BOAs in the third round of the food box program so that they have "greater flexibility to ensure contracted entities provide adequate coverage." BOAs establish terms for a contract, but do not authorize company shipments or guarantee future work.

Earlier in the week, President Donald Trump announced he was directing an

<u>additional \$1 billion</u> from the Families First Coronavirus Response Act to the food box program, and extending delivery dates beyond October 31.

CDC Updates Guidance on Asymptomatic Testing

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has reversed course on its guidance related to the testing of close contacts of those who've tested positive for COVID-19.

The CDC's <u>updated guidance</u> now states, "If you have been in close contact (within 6 feet) of a person with a COVID-19 infection for at least 15 minutes but do not have symptoms, you do not necessarily need a test unless you are a vulnerable individual or your health care provider or state or local public health officials recommend you take one."

Lawsuit Filed to Strike Down Wisconsin's Health Emergency, Mask Mandate

Private citizens from St. Croix and Polk Counties, represented by the Wisconsin Institute for Law and Liberty, this week filed a lawsuit challenging Governor Tony Evers' authority to mandate the use of face masks. Evers' order took effect on August 1 and is set to run through September 28.

Wisconsin is one of 34 states with mask mandates. Similar orders in Michigan and Minnesota also face legal challenges.
