Wisconsin Directing CARES Funding to Ethanol, Dry Ice Production, Essential for Dairy Industry

On Wednesday, WCMA <u>applauded Governor Tony Evers' plan</u> to direct \$3.25 million in federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act monies to Wisconsin ethanol producers. Ethanol production is critical to the manufacture of dry ice, now in heightened demand as the nation prepares for the super-chilled distribution of Pfizer's COVID-19 vaccine.

In recent weeks, WCMA has called on <u>federal and state officials</u> to ramp up dry ice production and preserve the national dairy industry's access to an essential amount – 350,000 pounds per week – for dairy cultures. Three companies, all with manufacturing facilities in Wisconsin, make the majority of the world's supply of dairy cultures, which are vital to dairy manufacturing and must be held at subzero temperatures prior to use.

FDA Panel to Vote on Pfizer Vaccine Approval Today

A Food and Drug Administration (FDA) panel is currently holding a hearing on Pfizer's appeal for emergency use authorization (EUA) of its COVID-19 vaccine, with a vote on that request expected late this afternoon. If the panel recommends the EUA be granted, full FDA approval may come as early as Friday.

Operation Warp Speed Chief Operations Officer General Gustave Perna told reporters on Wednesday that the federal government plans to ship 2.9 million doses of Pfizer's vaccine nationwide within 24 hours of FDA approval.

The FDA panel has also scheduled a hearing on Moderna's EUA request for next Thursday, December 17.

WDHS Warns Most Won't Get Vaccine Until Fall 2021

Wisconsin Department of Health and Human Services Secretary-designee Andrea Palm Tuesday warned that, while vaccine approval is coming soon, most <u>Wisconsinites will not be able to get doses</u> until late summer or early fall 2021.

State officials expect to receive about 50,000 doses of the Pfizer vaccine and about 16,000 doses of the Moderna vaccine, upon approval. That number represents approximately one percent of the state population. The state expects to receive additional vaccine allocations on a weekly basis, with numbers rising in January.

WCMA is advocating for state prioritization of <u>vaccine availability for dairy</u> <u>manufacturing and processing workers</u>.

States Issue New Pandemic Restrictions

California

Governor Gavin Newsom has issued <u>regional stay-at-home orders</u>, closing indoor and outdoor dining, and strictly limiting store capacity for at least the next two weeks.

Indiana

Governor Eric Holcomb <u>reimposed restrictions</u> Wednesday limiting social gatherings to 25 people and restaurants to 50 percent capacity. He is also requiring hospitals to postpone non-emergency surgeries to preserve beds.

Washington

Governor Jay Inslee on Wednesday announced an <u>extension of restrictions</u> he ordered November 15, which include shutting down indoor dining and gyms and limiting social gatherings, through January 4.

State officials from <u>Pennsylvania</u> and <u>Virginia</u> are expected to announce additional restrictions today, as well.

Congress Urged to Fix PPP Tax Issue

Business groups are calling on Congress to act quickly topass legislation correcting a tax provision in the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP).

In recent weeks, the Internal Revenue Service has stated and reiterated that borrowers can't write off expenses covered by a PPP loan that's forgiven. In essence, this means tax-free loan forgiveness is viewed as taxable income. If not addressed by year's end, this policy will result in higher taxes for business owners.

WCMA is advocating for Congressional action, and will keep members informed of significant developments.
