## Treasury, SBA Making Changes to PPP, Issue Guidance on Flexibility

The U.S. Treasury Department this week announced several changes to the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) designed to expand access to \$130 billion of as-yet unused aid.

In testimony before the Senate Small Business Committee, Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin noted that:

- The <u>Trump Administration does not plan to release the names of businesses</u>in receipt of PPP loans.
- Even more business owners will be eligible to have their loans partially forgiven. Mnuchin said that, while recent legislative change has reduced the amount of the loan which must be used for payroll from 75 percent to 60 percent, even <u>business owners that spend less than that on payroll could still be eligible for partial forgiveness</u>.
- Treasury guidance will be released to <u>allow more people with criminal records</u> to receive PPP loans.

In partnership with the U.S. Small Business Administration, the Treasury Department has now also issued <u>changes to its interim rules on PPP</u>, reflecting changes mandated by the enactment of the <u>Paycheck Protection Program Flexibility Act</u>.

## Wisconsin Small Business Owners Can Apply for "We're All In" Grants Beginning Monday

Wisconsin's "We're All In" Small Business Grant application portalgoes live next Monday, June 15 at 8 a.m. and is scheduled to close on June 23.

Funded by the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act, the program will provide \$2,500 grants to 30,000 small businesses to assist with the costs of business interruption or for health and safety improvements, wages and salaries, rent, mortgages and inventory.

A business may apply if it:

- was in operation in February 2020;
- is Wisconsin-based and for-profit;
- employs 20 or fewer full-time employees, including the owner; and
- has less than \$1 million in annual revenues.

#### **Wisconsin Farm Aid Period Opens Monday**

The \$50 million Wisconsin Farm Support Program will begin to accept applications next Monday, June 15, with forms and full information available on the Wisconsin Department of Revenue website. Wisconsin farmers with gross income between \$35,000 and \$5,000,000 in 2019 may be eligible to receive a payment. Individual payments will range from \$1,000-\$3,500 and will be issued after the application period closes on June 29. Farmers are encouraged to apply as soon as possible.

# Wisconsin's Marathon County Puts the Brakes On Sweeping COVID-19 Ordinance

After <u>pushback from WCMA</u> and others, members of Wisconsin's Marathon County executive committee voted unanimously late yesterday to send a <u>sweeping</u> <u>coronavirus ordinance</u> back to committee, rather than advance it to the full board. The measure had threatened business closures and large fines.
